AAA OF WA REPORT

The monthly meeting of the above Association was held at Marmion Angling Club premises on the 20th March. Eric Parker and George Holman were our two delegates present.

Lancelin angling and Aquatic Club were accepted into the association as a new club.

Walpole Boating and Angling Club (Inc) wrote a letter expressing disappointment at the WA Division asking them to delete the word championship from their Easter Tournament. They indicated that they run a championship and Tournament together over Easter and pointed out that in 1973 the WA Division granted them permission to use the word championship. Their titles are "1984 Annual Easter South West Angling Championships" and "1984 Craven Mild Angling Tournament".

Live firing will be conducted at Lancelin Firing Range on the 15-16th April. Clubs please note.

Laurie Birchall gave a further report on the forthcoming Fishing Clinic to be held at the Leederville Town Hall. The hall is booked and arrangements are being made. Laurie needs more helpers and trophy donors.

The price for lodging a Nation Record for fish capture presently is \$5.00 and for our State Record \$2.00 - a deficit if the record is also a National Record of \$3.00. Each year it costs the State Association approximately \$200 to lodge State Records received that also qualify for National Records.

Notice of Motion by our Club to standardise drycasting accuracy targets to a cone shape measuring 500mm in diameter with a height of 300 mm was carried.

Notice of Motion from Offshore Boating branch to include cloth badges to the "Angler of the Year" and "Junior Angler of the Year" was lost. a division was called.

A lengthy report was given by our President - Ted Hayman of the Mid-Term meeting held recently in the Eastern State. Some items reported were as follows:

- Our motion to standardize targets to cone targets 500 mm in diameter with a height of 300 mm was carried.
- The use of plastic tubing for casting (accuracy and distance) was rejected entirely.
- Weights of sinkers - 56, 84 and 112 grams had to measure exact!!

AAA OF WA REPORT (Cont.)

- Motion to have casting at convention over two days was lost. It was pointed out that it is up to the host state to allocate times.
- Snarks are out on all National competitions, boat and beach.
- Bag limits not to apply for Bunbury. Our state was the only one in favour of limits of 50 of each species. Current state bag limits (such as salmon) will apply.
- Northern Territory have affiliated with the National Association.
- New Zealand Association have declined to affiliate at this time as they have a fear of being "taken over by Australia".

On the local scene concern was expressed that the Minister for Fisheries was about to lift the food fish classification on salmon, this opening the door to catching them for crayfish bait once more. Salmon numbers have started to pick up again and this would be a giant step backwards.

A lengthy submission to the Minister for Fisheries prepared by Frank Csiczak pointing out numerous areas of concern regarding the Ningaloo Marine Park (an area the government has set aside of some 80 - 90 kilometres of coastline) was read.

STEEP POINT RE-VISITED

Like to try a spot of quiet snapper fishing? If Ray Belgard issues the invitation anywhere in the Steep Point area be wary.

The night I went down with him I lost the first bait, a half mullet impaled on a 6/0 hook with an 8 inch wire trace to pickers. The second bait produced a good solid tug - hit it to crank up the Alvey to get it clear of the bottom - feels like a really good fish. Five feet up and the fish decides he has had enough of this and heads down and out.

This is the time it first sinks in that it is something more than one of Ray's snapper. A steady run with a feeling of immense power and weight being transmitted back up the line. Unstoppable, the drag working smoothly and providing a good test for the new teflon washers saw 250 yards of line off the spool.

At last he has stopped and it is my turn to try to pump him back.

Too much weight to achieve anything standing up - find a seat on the rocks put the rod butt down, brace the legs and make like you are in a game-fishing chair. Even tried to move a brick walt that's what it felt like and I realised we were probably tied into one of the monster Cod that live in the caves under the cliff.

With the heavy beach rod bent in a tight curve, drag on as tight as I dared with 32lb line I slowly worked the fish back. Gain a yard of him, loss two then get a bit more back on the reel. Eventually have the fish back at my feet but can't see him as he is still on the bottom.

A long run down towards the Point put paid to an early end to the fight. Work him back, line singing in the darkness as it nears breaking point only to have him make a new run out to sea stripping off a further 150 yards from the Alvey whose back plate is now noticeably warm.

After a battle which had been in progress for well over an hour my arms were tired and weak. Knowing that we had to keep maximum pressure up if we were to tire a brute like this I handed the rod over to Hew who worked him back in only to spark off a new run which I had a beer and tried to restore some circulation to my arms and that other portion of my anatomy which had been in solid contact with the rock for all this time.

Taking over from Hew again after half an hour another couple of runs and some solid pumping on the rod left me completely beaten so I handed over to Ray which was fair enough as it was his suggestion that had started the whole damn thing anyway.

STEEP POINT RE-VISITED (Cont.)

He played the fish hard and it was showing that it was tiring the runs were shorter and we had now lifted it from the bottom to the mid water level. Preparations were under way for an attempted gaffing however we believe the fish was in the 200-300lb class and if this was the case we would let it go as we were not prepared to lose a good gaff on it when most of our 10 day stay was still ahead of us.

The fish solved the problem by making a much slower but still unstoppable run into the shallow reef ridden water to our left and cut the line on a rock. The hood up was made at 6.45 pm and the fish lost at 9.25 pm - 160 minutes with the biggest, toughest most obstinate fish I have ever had on the end of a line.

The next morning bait casting and spinning quickly gave way to ballooning as aching arms evoked memories of the night before. A pleasant noting sitting on the rocks watching the balloons, birds (feathered) sea and occasional boat while sipping the odd beer.

After lunch Hew went to the Point to collect some of his gear as another group were proceeding to set up camp there. He had been gone about half an hour when suddenly his balloon burst a glance at the rod indicated not the slightest movement so it was probably the sun taking its toll of our dwindling stock of balloons.

Wind in the slack, nit it just in case and blink again as a sail-fish in the 100lb class explodes from the water. Two fantastic leaps, silvery body arched and reflecting the afternoon sun against the deep blue background of the seas then a scaring run watching 350 yards of line peel of the Alvey before being able to stop him.

Four or five more leaps and unable to throw the hooks he heads down to slug it out. Hang on keep the pressure up and after about 15 minutes he has turned and I have regained some line. Then disaster, maximum pressure was being put on the 35lb line when the anti-reverse fail on the Alvey slipped letting the reel run beserk with horrible clunking noises from the vicinity of the back plate as it proceeded to knock the teeth from the spindle.

Hopeless mess but there may be a way out. This fish has not run since I turned him, just a heavy weight to haul back, may be we can cut the line and join it onto my rod and reel. Worth a try.

Kay sorted as much slack from the massive blow up on the reel as he could then I cut it making him probably the only guy in Australia to have a 100lb plus sail fish on a 35lb hand line.

STEEP POINT RE-VISITED (Cont.)

Hew arrived back at this stage after spending some time at the Point watching the aerobatics put on by the fish never realising it was on his line. I gave him the honours of tying off the two lines and the fish which was completely docile but incredibly heavy was again bweing winched hack foot by foot.

Have you ever tried to get 350 yards of line onto a spool that was nearly full to start with - well Hew was naving a good try anyway but we were never to know if it could really be achieved.

With just 30 yards to go the sail-fish which was well and truley dead by now sank and was too neavy to lift. The line was cut again and spliced on to a stout game rod but no avail, the line broke under the strain and the nuge fish which we later believed we could vaguely see lay on the bottom.

A sad end to a magnificent fish which as a "shared" capture was to have been released. The only consolation is that it had most likely swallowed the bait and was hooked down deep inside. This would explain just the one long hard run followed by the quick death, so it probably would not have lived even if we had been able to release it.

I am not sure I really want to hook another sail-fish but if anyone knows a physiotherapist that is good at fixing crook backs I will see if he would like to come to Steep Point with us next time.

FISHING FIRST AID

As most of us club members spend a lot of our recreational pleasure in an aquatic environment, we generally recognise and understand the dangers on the sea and are capable of taking measures to protect ourselves.

To refresh your memories and make you aware of the hazards with the more dangerous sea inhabitants, we will feature each month details of these fish found in WA waters.

1. Venomous fish CATFISH (COBBLER)

PREVENTION, SYMPTOMS AND FIRST AID

PREVENTION

- . Never handle a catfish while it is alive. A hard blow to the top of its head should kill the fish. It can then be safely handled, provided care is taken to keep clear of the spines. Both recently killed and frozen specimens are still venomous.
- . When walking through weed beds in shallow water, use footwear and shuffle the feet to frighten off any catfishes that may be nearby.
- . When sorting the catch of a net, keep an eye out for any fish with barbels around its mouth.

SYMPTOMS

- . Immediate pain which increases in intensity for a short while, and may move up to affected limb. The pain usually is severe for several hours and then reduces in intensity to a dull ache.
- . The area around the wound generally becomes swollen.
- . Some difficulty in breathing may be experienced.
- . Professional fishermen claim that a person stung many times may acquire a tolerance to catfish venom.

FISHING FIRST AID (Cont.)

FIRST AID

- . Immediately wash the wound in water (salt water if on the ocean) and encourage bleeding.
- . Immerse the area in hot water (as hot as bearable) and repeat until pain subsides. The venom is denatured by heat and while relief is almost instantaneous, the pain will return if the limb is removed from the hot water, or as the water cools. One or two hours of repeated hot water treatment may be needed before the pain decreases enough to be bearable. Do not apply hot water to an unconscious patient as scalding may result. For areas that cannot be immersed, apply a towel soaked in hot water.
- . A tourniquet should not be used, as incorrect procedure may lead to more dangerous consequences than those resulting from the sting.
- . As a precaution against secondary infection, medical assistance should always be obtained.

NOTIFICATION OF LIVE FIRING

Notice is hereby given that live firing exercises will be conducted on Lancelin Naval Gunfire Support Range between the following times:

- 6 AM Sunday 15 April - 2300 Sunday 15 April
- 6 PM Monday 16 April - 2300 Monday 16 April

During exercises at Lancelin N.G.S. Range on 15 April till 16 April 1984 ship to shore and Air to ground firing will be conducted. Access across the Range will be closed to all traffic and persons throughout the period.

Warning notices and sentries will be posted to prevent entry into the danger zone which covers an area approximately 10 Km by 15 Km between Lancelin town and Wedge Island.

All members of the public are warned of the danger of handling unexploded shells or other projectiles. In the event of discovery of any unexploded shell or other projectile, it is not to be touched and the nearest police station or Naval Establishment is to be informed of its location.
