This event will now be the first on the programme and will start at 9.30 a.m. sharp. I hope this will meet with the approval of all those interested as until some other arrangements can be made there seems to be no other alternative.

The casting in the distance event was exceptionally good as there were thirteen members who managed to get all three casts inside the lane and even with this accuracy there were thirteen who broke their handicaps. Bill Bridger got three good ones away 346 - 333 - 363, but unfortunately Bill's handicap kept him out of the top places, and they went to Bob Tichbon 310 - 177 - 487. Good to see you back up there Bob. Next was a new member Bill Utting who made his presence felt with a 276 - 210 - 486 and then came John Griffiths who was having his first outing at the casting with 266 - 210 - 476. I think we will be seeing a lot more of these two chaps before the season is over. George Greenham got one up to the 300 mark good going George, and I noticed Alan Livesey gradually getting back to his old form, also Jimmy Strong. "Snow" Tate, Hal Neil and Bob Jensen all chopped hunks off their handicaps (I like to have plenty of company when it comes to handicap pruning Norm - Ed.)

In the Bob Lilly event otherwise known as the double-handed accuracy, Bob had a runaway victory with 61 - 80 which broke his previous record of 59 - 80 for this event. Congratulations Bob you are sure making it hard for anyone to take that one away from you.

Next came our new member again Bill Utting with a good 46 - 80, followed by the consistent Bob Tucker with 42 - 80. There were no bulls scored but Keith Mulvay, Bob Lilly and Bob Tucker scored near misses and eight members scored with all four casts. R. Lilly, W. Utting, W. Bridger, N. Cross, K. Mulvay, N. Knight, R. Tucker and N. Clark.

The single handed event ended in a three way tie with Bob Jensen, Bob Tichbon and Bob Lilly all scoring 22 - 40 followed closely by "Snow" Tate 20 - 40 and Noel Wilkerson 19 - 40. "Snow" and Noel both helped their score along with good bulls and Mick Doscas, Norrie Cross and Jimmy Strong only that bare foot away. There are only four members who scored with all four casts - R. Tichbon, R. Lilly, R. Jensen and I McLennan. Bob Lilly has the honour of being the only one who scored with all eight casts in the accuracy events, an excellent event seeing that Bob also finished in top place in both events.

There were only three juniors along again which is very disappointing considering that we are getting quite a few lads in the Club now, so come along lads and make the junior section a worth-while competition.

The two regular juniors are having a keen tussle with Don Bridger gradually increasing his lead over Rick Jensen but I am sure Rick is determined to make every effort to close the gap next month.

FIELD DAY GARDEN ISLAND - 14th & 15th July, 1962

Weather conditions:- North to North-West winds, heavy rain during the night and early morning. Northern beaches heavily weeded - though further North (gun position) the beach was in a really excellent condition with a low tide, and once again the interest centred around this area, which appears to be getting very popular with the lads.

Twenty eight seniors and nine juniors made the crossing to the Island which was quite a fair attendance considering the inclement weather. During the week many lads phoned me and advised that owing to flu and colds etc. they would not be able to attend the venue and I thank them for letting me know and sincerely hope that they will soon be up and fishing again in the near future.

This was quite an amazing venue - for a number of the South-end stickers changed coats and visited the Northern waters in an endeavour to knock off a few Mulloway, and it is good to see the boys moving around, though evidently a few of the lads, Lofty Griffiths, Doug Newton and his boys and Joe Kuba decided that a little bit of the North goes a long way for they later returned to the South end, evidently looking for the elusive Tailor and Salmon.

There was quite a constant procession up and down the beaches, as the lads visited the various bays etc. Phil Neri, Gary Davidson and myself started the ball rolling for after looking over the gun position we strolled back down South as far as the first bay, however, all these bays were heavily weeded so we returned to the North, and on the second time round Doug Newton remarked that if we passed him again he would go crazy and follow us. Little did he realize that we were only the forerunners of many groups of the boys who got walkabout fever.

I noticed a new member, Joe Kuba in action who is a very keen angler and it was pleasing to see him on the venue, and he landed several good sized King George Whiting from a hole alongside the reef from which he caught quite a few Mulloway several weeks ago.

It looks like Joe is starting to learn his way around, though after his excursion he sure looked tired on the boat going back. Come to think of it, most of the boys were dead beat, even George Greenham was noticed having forty winks which was most unusual for George.

Having finally returned to the gun position we waited for the lads from the second boat to arrive, and while waiting for them Phil and I strolled further up the beach and had a chat with Alan Livesey and "Snow" Tate who are strangers to the area and I guess that it may be a while before they return as they sure took a beating during the night. We also met "Tiger" Lilly, Ron Kildahl, Hugh Gregory, Ted Savage, Bob Tichbon and George Greenham who were preparing for the nights fray with the fish. Even though the overall fish captures were not great quite a few of the boys caught fish.

So closed an extremely busy Field Day, and I don't think that anyone can say that they don't know all the areas on the Island after that week-end, for quite a few of us saw spots that we had not seen before. As fish men we make good hikers.

My congrats. to the award winners, they certainly earned them, and many thanks for the help I received on the venue and here's hoping for a larger roll-up on the next field day at Garden Island on the 11th & 12th August. Boat timetable 9.30 a.m. and 2.00 p.m. from Palm Beach.

Will members, juniors and seniors, please MARK all packs etc. etc. with marking ink so that they can be plainly seen and identified, as one bag did go astray containing Mitchell Reels etc. to the value of £25 at our last venue, and we would not like an occurrence of this again. Please double check all your packs etc. etc.

In future please place all gear being unloaded in one place so that before I leave I can check to see if everything has been claimed. Any gear found please hand to me and I will see that the member receives it. Make sure your name is on your packs etc., and then double check to make sure you have all your packs on board your vehicle before you leave the parking area.

I have just had the Club scales checked by the Weights and Measures branch and passed as being correct, so be in it next Field Day and let's get them working recording fish captures. Members to note also that our Club stands firmly behind the Fisheries Department as to legal length of fish caught. So even though we like catching fish, let's make sure that we have none in our fish bags that are under legal length.
