This is the last report for me as President as elections are due August 1994 & I will be standing down at that time. It is with some satisfaction that I look back over the last two years to see what has been achieved. We have enjoyed a doubling of membership bringing with it fresh enthusiasm & a renewed sense of purpose. The overall assets of the club have substantially increased with the improvement made to our Kalbarri property & to our accounts. Ideas introduced by both old & new members to which the committee in the main has acted upon, have resulted in improvements to the general running of the club & placed Surfcasters in an enviable position with all comparable clubs in most of the important areas such as, Organisational - constitution, Bylaws & day to day running procedures. We are not suggesting that we have got it 100% right & look for your continuing comments to further improve all areas. The Surfcasters annual trophy presentation, dinner & dance attracted some 107 attendees & was a great night, a fitting cap to what has been a magnificent year for the club. Surfcasters are set for a great decade, with the organisational side well catered for a sound financial position & an enthusiastic group of members to carry the club forward. Thank you for your enthusiasm, ideas & support.

MEETINGS: The revised general meeting format with instruction periods in the middle section is clearly a winner which when combined with the overall committee & general meeting format enables business to be handled yet retains the interest at meetings. Instruction periods are clearly an integral part of our general meetings, an area in which we need to plan, to secure both the speakers & the subjects in which our members are interested. Please give consideration to the areas that you would like to see discussed. Page two of the July Reel Talk suggest eight subjects, we need your input as to the areas you prefer, so we may proceed to organise these. "Would you like to include an additional subject?", talk to a committee member, we welcome your thoughts & suggestions.

FUND RAISING, MEMBERSHIP FEES & THE FUTURE.

The fundraising activities by the club members in areas such as Mandurah 500, raffles & now the fishing expo has enabled us to curtail costs. But what of the future? Inflation will dissipate the value of membership fees unless we address it & gradually adjust fees to attempt, in part, to combat inflation & increasing costs. Membership fees have not risen for some seven years, expenses however have risen over that time with the possibility that the AAA (Australian Angling Association) may require an increased levy from Surfcasters for each member registered. I would like to again thank you for your understanding & support in this area when this subject was raised at a previous general meeting & agreeance to consider raising membership fees. Note: actual amount, if to be raised, is still to be voted upon. In the future, with a little planning the club could look at the purchase of our own clubrooms and/or purchase/lease a block/s of land in the coast areas (particularly down south) securing lifetime access for fishing areas as more & more land particularly coastal is being locked off & access refused. This move could be a lifesaver for the club. The single & most rewarding result over the last two years in my opinion is the comradeship, fellowship, attitudes & positive feelings amongst the members of the club which in itself will generate the strength & resolve to continue the forward thrust of the club. Thank you, Committee & Members for a rewarding two years & a future to which as a member I am looking forward to enjoying & participating in. This last section is specifically for new members defined as individuals joining the club within the last two years. We need your thoughts, ideas & enthusiasm at committee level. The results that this club has achieved would not have eventuated without new members & in particular new members at committee level. Please consider giving a little of your time. We need & welcome your participation & have in place all that is needed to ensure that your committee role is one to which you can contribute & help the club & its members. The information stated in the committee folders is simply expressed in the overall context & specifically for each committee position, thus enabling a new member to fill a committee position & be able to function effectively. SWAN RIVER LOCAL FIELD DAY

The last time I did any serious fishing in a river was as a teenager growing up in Toodyay. The Avon River was good to me then, providing plenty of cobbler in the summer months. The good spots were easy to find & garden worms plentiful, But the Swan River!.... where to go & what bait to use?

I'm pleased to say that this & many other questions were answered by Garry Shugg at the Wednesday club meeting the day before the field day. The hints & tips regarding where to go & what gear & bait to use were invaluable & provided a boost to my confidence in giving the river a go. As a new member, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the club for providing this type of tuition from local experts as well as our own club members. It really is from these types of sessions that we are able to draw on others experience & then put things into practice on the field day.

The 3.00pm Saturday sign-on at Matilda Bay carpark saw an enthusiastic crowd of members all keen to give the river a go in search of the monster Bream or Cobbler we had all heard about. My brother in-law Derek & his son Dean accompanied me to a spot near the Casino which Derek was told by a local was sure to produce Bream. Right he was! While we only ended up with one Bream, caught by Derek (approx 28cm), the interesting part of the afternoon was talking to an old timer, local to the area, who within an hour & a half had bagged a total of 5 Bream. Three about the same size as Derek's & two I estimated to be just under a kilo each. Other spots we tried were the old Brewery & Jo Jo's jetty where we caught up with Derry & Cookie. Their success so far was a little like ours, not too much to show, but it was such a lovely night that it didn't seem to matter too much anyhow.

Two of my daughters decided to brave a 5.30am start on Sunday to join us in trying the Casino spot again. Unfortunately no fish.

The 9.00am weigh-in back at Matilda Bay saw a lot of club members keen to catch up with others to see what the river had produced. The majority of fish I saw were Bream & Cobbler with some nice examples of the latter by Andy Thorgensen & Tony Daionzo. Now, if only I could have used the old timers fish at the weigh-in, I might have been able to compete with the super Dalonzo & his fine bag of Cobbler.

A great field day, different & as always very well organised (Thanks Mr Cook). Being local, the opportunity for my family to more easily get involved was a bonus & I would welcome a similar event either river or ocean next year.

INSTRUCTIONS TO GET TO FLINDERS BAY

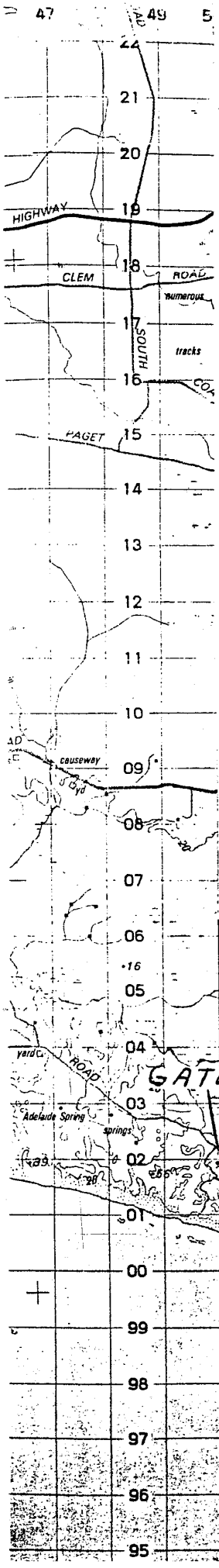
After going through CAPEL go past the mineral sands mines for approx 6km. You cross a small bridge and come to road on the left marked Ludlo / Heathergreen road. Follow this through till you hit the T junction of Busselton Nannup road. Turn left and go through Nannup. Proceed down the Brockman Hwy for about 33 km. At Canebreak picnic area which is on the left hand side turn down Canebreak Rd / Milyeannup Rd. This turns into a gravel road. Head towards the coast for about 20 km. You will cross a narrow bridge over the Scott River. About 2km on there is a road to the left, go on a further 2 km and on the left is the access gate to the property. Follow this track through the trees till you reach the camp site.

FLINDERS BAY VENUE

This is a really great field day to take the whole family on. The camping area is native grass and is well sheltered with large peppermint trees. The area allows for small children to fish as easily as the senior members. Fish caught range from skippy, bream, whiting, through to mullet and school shark. This is a private property so we need to show extra care and remove all our rubbish and dispose of it in a local dump. Make sure that vehicles dogs etc do not disturb his cows and calves. Please see accompanying map for details on how to get there. Access instructions through the locked gate will be given at the proceeding general meeting. The property is accessible to conventional vehicles with a camper unit. There is a 4wd track behind the first sand hills which gives access to the fishing spots. People without a 4wd should make prior arrangements to get a lift to fishing locations.

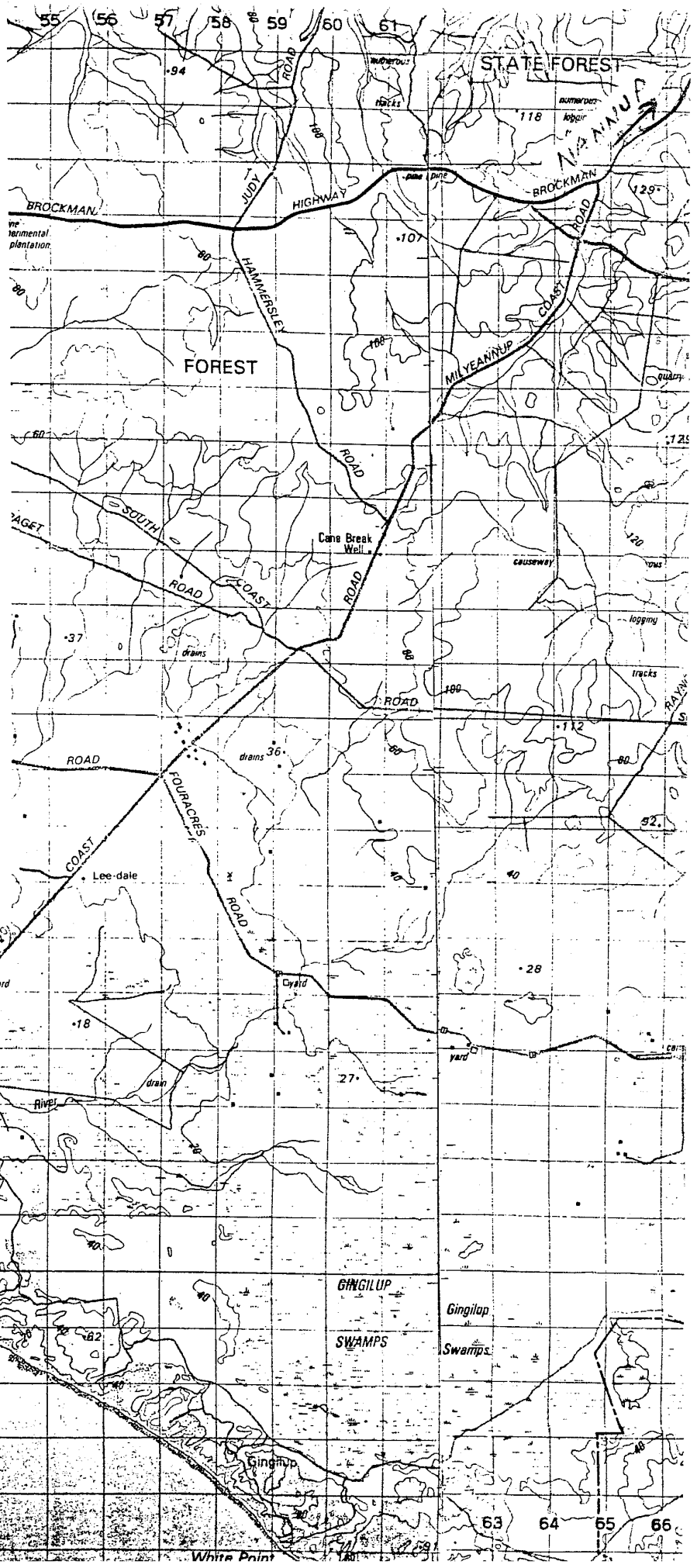
Those who have been there previously with remember the good fishing and great social atmosphere.

INSTRUCTIONS TO GET TO FLINDERS BAY
