IMPLEMENTATION OF 1984 DRYCASTING RULE CHANGES

The following motions are proposed in order to clarify in detail the rule changes passed at the April meeting, and to facilitate their implementation:

1. The "percentage" system agreed to will be applied in the following manner:

- (a) For each of the 4 regular events on a casting day (ie. the two level line events, and the two accuracy events), the highest aggregate will be awarded 100%. Each other competitor will be awarded a percentage score determined by the ratio of his aggregate to the highest aggregate.

eg. Highest aggregate, 240 scores 100%
Another aggregate, 120 scores 50%

Thus, a competitor who top scores in all 4 events will be awarded the maximum possible of 400%

- (b) Under the new system, the top score for the day will typically be approximately 3 times what it used to be under the previous system. In order to maintain parity with the previous system, therefore, attendance points must also be trebled, ie. 30 points will now be awarded for attendance.

Thus the maximum possible score for a casting day is now $400 + 30 = 430$ points.

- (c) The handicap system will be applied in the following simple manner:

The caster's average score will be subtracted from 400 to obtain his handicap. This handicap will then be added to his actual score on a casting day to give his "handicap total".

The above "average score" to be calculated and reviewed in the previously agreed manner. For handicap purposes, the term "score" is inclusive of attendance points.

IMPLEMENTATION OF 1984 DRYCASTING RULE CHANGES (Cont.)Example:

A caster's average score (including attendance points) is calculated to be 300 points.

Handicap is then $400 - 300 = 100$

His actual score on the day is 310 = 30 attendance, or 340 points.

Handicap total is then $340 + 100 = 440$ points.

- (d) Open events to also be scored on a percentage basis, ie. each competitor's best cast to be awarded a percentage of the top scoring best cast.

NEW COUNTRY

FIELD DAY REPORT FOR JUNE LME FROM THE DEEP SOUTH

After years of promising ourselves a trip to the South Coast but always ending up at Luvier or Steep Point, Graham and myself finally got our act together and headed for Reef Beach (with 10 minutes to go before we left we were still contemplating "WAGU"). With trailer in tow and ice boxes at the ready we slipped into sub-zero temperature in the early hours of Saturday morning. After five hours sleep in a truck bay outside Jerramungup we started on the last leg of our journey. After carefully following instructions on "HOW TO GET THERE" all we had to do was look for a sign and we were there. However the sign had fallen down over 12 months ago so we missed the turn and ended up in Bremer Bay where we bought a map (a blessing in disguise) and sought some local information.

Back tracking we found "Reef Beach Road" at least it was a road for about 100 metres then it became newly turned soil, the only sign of vehicle traffic on it were caterpillar tracks, strange for such a popular place we thought but turning yet another bend everything was explained as a bulldozer loomed into view flattening and demolishing what we had been warned a terrible, cap rock ridden excuse for a track into a soft yet reasonably comfortable road (still 4WD only though). Our first look at Reef Beach from the top of the hill was inspiring to say the least. Deep holes, gutters, channels rips, offshore reef this joint had it all and more.

We didn't even pitch camp just grabbed fishing gear and away we went in search of piscatorial bliss. About 3 hours later and all we had to show for our effort was one puff, should have known it was too good to be true. We pitched camp, had lunch and a quick snooze and then started the field day proper. Sunset saw us fishless and disillusioned - bloody south coast/always hated it/at least its not raining (yet)/gee its cold/lets go and drink the bottle of port/good idea/nuff said.

Sunday morning we packed up sadly thinking we had blown it again. We perused our recently purchased map and decided on a place called Dillon Bay.

Dillon was magnificent, blue water, clean beaches, rock and reef and absolutely fishless (we had been here before we thought). No to be outdone out came the map again this time Cap Knob was the target, the map said good rock fishing for skipper, salmon and groper so how could we fail, anyone could catch fish off the rocks. I won't go into how it took us two and a half hours to do about 8 kilometres to the spot on the map but suffice.

However I finally got the hang of it and slipped into 'em. Around dark we gave it away and started to worry about getting out.

The tide had dropped considerably during the afternoon so we took the car for a run along the beach to try to find another escape. We found one, went back and hitched up the trailer and took off. The way out was a piece of cake and about 45 minutes later we were on bitumen and heading home. The area was everytning, we expected and more. The fishing a little slow but potentially brilliant. Can't wait to get back.

"YOU SHOULD HAVE BEEN HERE LAST WEEK"

How often have you had some local say "you should have been here last week" as you have left some favoured fishing spot carrying a near empty reef bag? If it has happened more than once or twice you had better read on.

The message is not meant to imply that during the last seven days all of the fish have moved on to some more favoured location which a lucky angler is about to stumble on then and go home lying about how he left them biting because he ran out of bait, lures or what ever. What you are being told is that if you pay more attention to the phase of the moon and as a consequence the tidal range you may catch more fish.

Tidal range is the difference between high and low water, measured in metres and is governed by the moon and to a lesser extent the sun. The following diagram which shows in a very basic fashion the movement of the moon in relation to the earth and sun over a 28 day lunar cycle helps to demonstrate why fishing conditions will be totally different from one week to the next.

The greatest tidal influence is when the sun and moon are in conjunction - Day 0 and opposition - Day 14. This gives you the highest water and the lowest low water levels - in other words the greatest tidal range resulting in the "Spring" tides

"YOU SHOULD HAVE BEEN HERE LAST WEEK" (Cont.)

When the moon is at right angles to the sun - quadrature - on Day 7 and 21 you get the least influence which gives the lowest highwater and the highest low water level. The range or movement is not very much at all and the result is the "neap" tides.

Not only does a great tidal range seem to stimulate fish which in time induces the need for a step up in the feeding cycle but the low water level of a Spring tide will allow you to wade to and fish offshore reefs and holes which are not accessible at other tide times. Then you have a added bonus that the high water level at the top of a Spring tide will permit fish to come into reef pools and other accessible locations where normally there would be an insufficient depth of water.

If you can fish a spot where the top of a Spring tide occurs around sun set your chances of filling your bag will increase as most fish are reluctant to move close into shore and consequently casting ranges during daylight. This is the reason why some skippy fisherman swear they get more fish on a full moon and other prefer a new moon. It is not the "light" or "dark" that makes the difference out the fact that at both of these times you have the greatest tidal variation more water over inshore reef and gutter areas.

Many fishermen prefer to fish the period from the first quarter to the full moon to plan their trips accordingly. This means they are fishing at a time when the range of the tide is increasing daily with the attendant fish stimulation. A similar tidal range exists in the period from the last quarter to the new moon and is claimed by some to be the best time to fish for pilagics like mackerel who are reported to feed at night in the light of the full moon and as a consequence show less interest in baits and lures cast by nopefulls in the traditional down/dusk feeding cycles.

Have a look at the phase of the moon and a set of tide tables - they cost less than a "nilsmaster" and may be you will be able to walk away from your favourite fishing spot without some bystander saying "you should have been here last week" the next time you head off to do battle with those funny divisions of the deep.
