Page 8

Rule 2.3Double handed Accuracy

Competitors to use standard fishing gear.

Two alternate casts ARE made at 4 discs set on the ground at varying distances from the casting plate or line.

This distance is determined by the casting organisers and shall alter each casting day.

Rule 2.4To Score

The casting weight is aimed at the disc or bull.

The object being to hit the disc on the full for maximum score.

Scores decrease by 1 point every 250 mm increment away from the disc to the end of the tape.

Maximum points for hitting the bull shall be twenty five.

Note: The score shall be registered only from where the weight or plug first lands.

AMENDMENTS PASSED AT APRIL GENERAL MEETING (Cont.)

Page 9.

Rule 2.15

The use of a heavy leader to the sinker is only permitted in accuracy - 112 gm level line distance, 112 gm level line distance open, single handed distance open and 56 gm level line.

Leader not to be more than 380 mm in length and is attached to the weight being cast.

Swivels may also be used

Page 10.

Rule 2.24

Marking shall be to the nearest metre in distance events.

In accuracy events, the target area will be either a 3 or 6.25 metre radius circle and scoring using the accuracy marking tapes shall be as follows:

Within a 300 mm radius of the target, 10 points in the 3 metre target area and 25 points in the 6.25 metre target area.

From 300 mm to 600 mm radius circle of the target, 9 or 24 points respectively.

From 600 to 900 mm radius circle of the target, 8 or 23 points respectively.

Scoring shall continue in the like manner until either the 3 metre or 6.25 metre radius circle is exceeded when no points shall be registered.

Page 10.

Rule 2.25

The accuracy marking tapes shall consist of 3 metre and 6.25 metre lengths of the best quality tape available and at one end shall be attached a ring of sufficient size to allow the shaft of the target.

The tape for single handed accuracy shall be in 300 mm increments and the tape for double handed accuracy in 250 mm increments.

Between the first and second graduations, the figures 9 & 24 respectively shall be marked.

6.25 tape

3 metre tape

9 - 8 - 7 - 6 - 5 - 4 - 3 - 2 - 1

Page 11.

Rule 2.26

Second paragraph.

Single handed accuracy event is scored by the addition of points obtained in the four casts.

Double handed accuracy event is scored by the addition of points obtained in the EIGHT casts.

Single handed accuracy casting distances to range from 20 metres minimum to 45 metres maximum.

Double handed accuracy casting distances to range from 30 metres minimum to 88 metres maximum.

ALSO MOVE

DRYCASTING

That all divisions at Drycasting be on a percentage basis

Field Day Point Scoring System

The heaviest bag is awarded 100 points.

All other bags are awarded a proportion of 100 points, determined by the ratio of each bag weight to the heaviest bag weight.

For example, if the top bag weighs 10 kg, it is awarded 100 points.

A 7 kg bag would then score 70 points and a 2 kg bag 20 points.

An additional 50 points is awarded to all members attending the field day.

Thus the top bag of 10 kg in the above example would receive $100 + 50 = 150$ points, whilst the 7 kg bag receives $70 + 50 = 120$ points and the 2 kg bag receives $20 + 50$ points.

FISHING FIRST AIDSHARKS

Fishes responsible for attacks on humans are generally large Predators, those flesh eating species which prey upon other fish.

Sharks have certainly earned their reputation as man eaters. Almost 350 attacks have been reported since 1791, although only 20 of these occurred in WA.

PREVENTION

Some authorities give so much advice that if all was heeded nobody would ever enter the water. However, some recommendations that should be followed are listed below:

- . Always swim or dive with a companion not because it affords a 50 per cent chance of the other person being attacked, but so that immediate assistance may be given.
- . Blood attracts and excites sharks, so stay out of the water, or leave it, if you have an injury that is bleeding.
- . Avoid swimming in dirty water. Poor visibility may lead to a shark mistaking you for a large, struggling fish.
- . Never swim in an area where fish are being cleaned.
- . A struggling fish emits vibrations that sharks can pick up from a considerable distance. Remove speared fish from the water as soon as possible and never attach them to your body. It is realistic to say that if you are frightened of sharks don't take up spearfishing.
- . Don't panic if you see a shark. Most are wary of humans and will generally swim off when approached.

FISHING FIRST AID (Cont.)FIRST AID

- . In the event of an attack, every effort should be made to control bleeding, even while the victim is still in the water. A tourniquet should be applied above the wound if on a limb or packing pressed against the wound if it is on the trunk. This prevents loss of blood, and also helps to reassure the victim. Both shock and loss of blood can lead to the victim's death.
- . The victim should be carefully taken from the water and laid on the beach or boatdeck in a position with the legs higher than the head. Handling and movement should be as gentle as possible and kept to a minimum. If the victim has to be brought ashore by boat, see that this is done carefully and gently. The victim should not be moved again until medical help arrives. Many shark victims have died from the shock of being rushed to hospital by the rescuers.
- . Reassure the victim (if conscious) and cover lightly with a dry towel or similar article. Nothing should be given by mouth.
