NOTICE OF MOTION

The following notice of motion is to be put at the April meeting in relation to the 1991/92 field day competition.

(1) That the bag consist of the best three (3) fish for the field day and, in sections 10,11 and 12, the best three (3) fish of that specie caught on a particular field day.

(2) Attendance points, ten (10), be allocated for attending the previous General meeting, plus ten (10) points for attending the field days.

(3) Ten (10) points per kilo and (10) points per specie also be awarded (wrass/rock cod be classed as one specie).

(4) Section winning fish to be weighed by F.D.O. and, to receive specie points, the different specie need to be shown to the F.D.O. and the number of different specie recorded by him.

FLINDERS BAY VENUE

This is a really great field day to take the whole family on. The camping area is grassed and well sheltered with large peppermint trees. The area allows for children to fish as easily as the adults. Fish caught range from skippy, whiting, bream through to mulloway, school shark and salmon. This is a private property so we need to show extra care with rubbish and not to disturb his stock. Please see the accompanying map for details of how to get there. Access through the locked gate will be given at the proceeding general meeting. The property is excessable by any conventional vehicle with a camper unit. There is a 4wd track behind the first sand hills which gives access to the fishing spots and anyone without a 4wd will be able to get a lift.

Those who went to the last F.D. at Emu thoroughly enjoyed it despite the lousy weather. The Springs usually turns on some good tailor, shark and mulloway fishing.

WHAT'S A TAILOR ?

LEGAL SIZE: 25cm (nose to tip of tail)
NEW BAG LIMIT: 20 per fisher day

WHAT'S A TAILOR, GRANDPA?

Uncontrolled recreational fishing nearly destroyed the tailor fishery in South Africa. They now have a bag limit of four tailor (elf) per day, and a three month closed season. Tailor catches in WA have fluctuated wildly in past few seasons, and indications are that the heavy fishing pressure on juvenile tailor may be seriously affecting stock levels. Tailor are one of WA's most popular recreational angling fish, and over 86,000 anglers went fishing for tailor last year. About 70 per cent of this fishing occurred between Bunbury and Jurien Bay. Tailor take about two years to reach sexual maturity, and don't spawn until they reach at least 25cm in length.

WHICH WOULD YOU RATHER CATCH?

A tailor one year old is less than 25cm long, weighs about 150g, and is likely to be soft-fleshed.
A tailor two years old is about 30cm long, weighs nearly 500g, tastes superb, and has already laid some 400,000 eggs.
A tailor 14 years old weighs about 8kg - have you ever seen one?

DO THE RIGHT THING!!

It is vitally important for the future of the tailor fishing in WA that every angler sticks scrupulously to bag and size limits. Besides, tailor are superb eating when fresh - and who needs more than 20 at a time?
Put back your tiddlers, and help protect WA's tailor stock for your grandchildren - next year!!

INSTRUCTIONS TO GET TO FLINDERS BAY.

After going through Capel go past the mineral sands mines for approx 6km. You cross a small bridge and come to a road on the left marked Ludlo/ Heathergreen road. Follow this through till you hit the T junction of the Busselton Nannup road. Turn left and go through Nannup. proceed down the Brookman Highway for about 33km. At Canebreak Picnic area which is on the left hand side turn down Canebreak /MILYEANNUP ROAD. This turns into a gravel road. Head towards the coast for about 20km. You will cross a narrow bridge over the Scott river. About 2 kms on there is a road to the left go on a further 2 km and on the left is the access gate to the property. Follow this track through the trees till you reach the camp site.

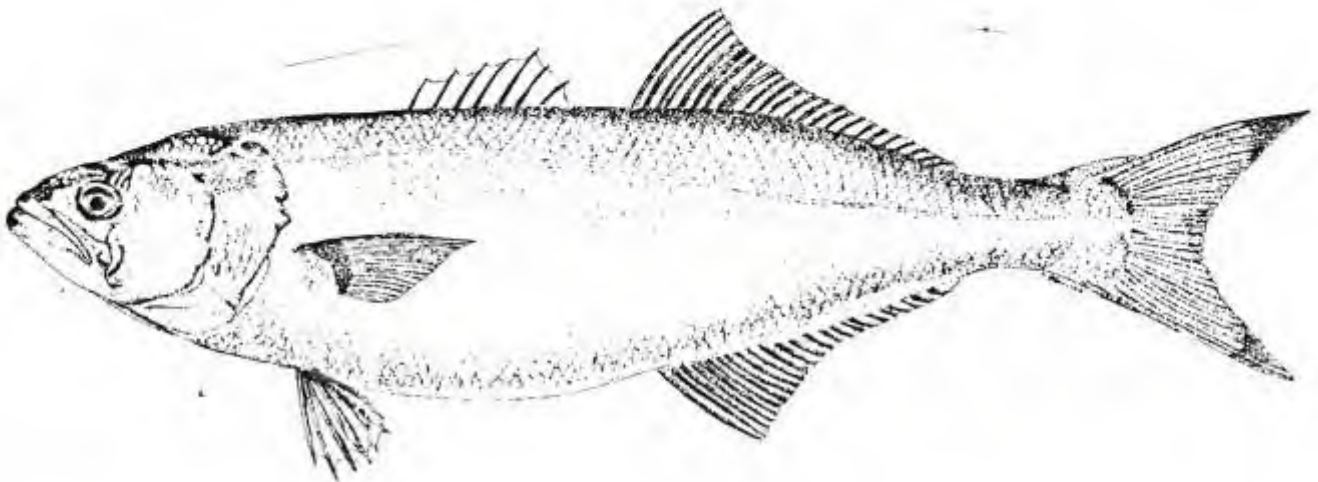

SALMON FISHING 1991

Western Australia's commercial salmon fishers will be able to catch up to 2600 tonnes of fish this season.

A decision on the total allowable catch, and on other aspects of the salmon fishery, was announced by Minister for Fisheries Gordon Hill today.

Mr Hill has also asked the Fisheries Department to examine a buy-back scheme aimed at reducing the number of salmon fishing units in operation.

"Salmon is important to both commercial and recreational fishers in Western Australia, and management of the fishery will benefit from having a total allowable catch introduced for both south and west coast professional fishermen," Mr Hill said.

"Over time, the recreational fishery should have a greater share of the salmon resource.

"In setting the catch limits, I have wanted to ensure that commercial salmon fishers will not be unfairly disadvantaged.

Mr Hill's decision follows talks with both south coast and west coast fishers on the future of the fishery.

"On the south coast, the total allowable catch will be 2000 tonnes, which will include a sale of bait limit of eight tonnes per limited entry licence. The 2000 tonne allocation will be reviewed early in April.

"On the west coast, there will be a 600 tonne total allowable catch, but no constraint on the sale of salmon for bait. The 1992 allocation may be adjusted to reflect the 1991 catch."

Mr Hill has asked the Department to initiate talks with the salmon processors aimed at phasing out the food fish notice. This will result in salmon being used according to market requirements.

"I am also establishing a salmon management advisory committee to provide advice to me on future management of the salmon fishery.

"The committee will comprise representatives of the commercial and recreational fishing sectors, the processing sector and the Fisheries Department.

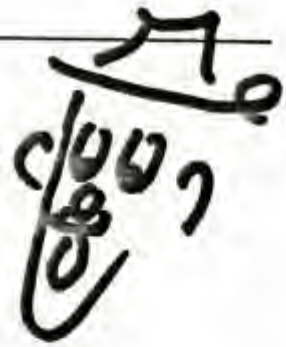

BOOZY Recipe...



A GREAT FISH RECIPE FROM THE BOOZY CHEF!!! (HIC)
POACHED FISH IN WINE AND CAMEMBERT

This fish dish is poached in wine stock and served with melted Camembert. It is excellent accompanied by a good sauvignon blanc or riesling.

- 1 kg white fish fillets (tailor is a good choice)
- 1 cup white wine combined with 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- juice 1 lemon
- salt and freshly ground pepper
- FISH SAUCE
 - 1 Camembert (sliced)
 - 1/2 cup cream
 - 1 lemon (sliced)
 - sprigs fresh dill (to garnish)

PLAN OF ATTACK

Consume one bottle of Bundy Rum in readiness for the long wait most will have whilst catching a kilo of tailor fillets. If this doesn't work send the kids down to the fish mongers. Don't drive! Standing well back light the oven and preheat to 200c (400F) and place fish fillets in a buttered ovenproof dish approximately 7cm deep. Over them pour wine (finish the rest of the bottle and follow with a dry sherry chaser!), lemon juice and mustard. Cover with foil. Poach in oven for 15 - 20 minutes until they're done (the fish that is. You should have at least another 10 good minutes left in you!)

Place the sliced camembert so it covers the fish, about 4 slices per portion. Grill (the fish not your hubby!) for 2 minutes (husbands require at least 15 minutes) to melt the Camembert. Garnish with lemon slices and sprigs of fresh dill.

To make sauce, boil reserved cooking liquid (the booze left in the baking dish) in a pan for 2 - 3 minutes to reduce; remove from heat, add cream and serve in a sauce boat.

Finish off your evening with a Margaritta lay-back night cap! For this nite-cap you will need 1 bottle Cointreau, 1 bottle Tequila and 1 lemon cut into quarters (just the drink after a fishy meal). Lie seductively back resting your head on the bar (or kitchen table, it makes very little difference to the effect) and have some-one, anyone, gently pour both the Tequila and Cointreau simultaneously down the back of your throat followed by a squeeze of lemon juice. After such a hard day this should be followed by two panadol's and a lie down to guarantee a good nights sleep!!!! CHEERS!! From the Boozy Chef.

FEBRUARY

1.0 AAA STATE EVENTS

2.0 AAA has undertaken to speed up getting data from the Telecom Boating Forecast (tel: 11541). Telecom is looking internally to achieve this.

3.0 A speaker from the Exhibition for Sports, Hobbies and Leisure which is to be held at the Fremantle Passenger Terminal the 11th-15th of July gave a discussion promoting the exhibition with the aim to get the AAA to participate.

"Seaweek" on 7th-14th April: AAA supports, but wants to get some volunteers.

4.0 A new publication on Net Fishing by the Recreational Fisherman is available, as is a publication on tailor size and bag limits.

"THE DEEP HOLE"

Miles of open uninhabitated beach surrounded by high dunes contained at either end by two seperate river mouths.

'Entry' one only being a 1.25 mile dune climb with off road tracks from same to civilisation some further 2 to 3 hours away. "The water" dropping to approximately 20 to 30 feet in depth within 15 feet of shore with intermingling channels and gutters every 200 yards or so providing an almost unlimited choice of fishing holes. "The catch" Taylor, Mulloway, Shark, Brim, Skippy, Whiting (at last legal size, the chicken of the sea). "WHERE" READ ON:-

January, 91 saw the surfcasters deep south exploratory trip with members Ian Cook and Derry Barber combining to beat the path to the best spots. Combination was excellent, Ian with his navigational skills, experience in the area and necessary practical and mechanical ability to ensure the one vehicle convoy achieved its objective, Barber, well he had a 4 wheel drive.

Route chosen was the Walpole/Pemberton coast areas attempting to cover all beach access spots.

Friday night saw the first camping site on a beautiful bend in the river about 15k out of Pemberton. We were keen to explore the possibility of river fishing that night hoping to find the elusive black brim. It was immediately apparent upon stepping out of the vehicle that this could be the spot as one could somehow even smell the fish. There was a fishy smell alright, two bottles of pure whale oil had split in the back of the Hilux taking residence in all nooks and crannies and infiltrating the soft cover bags to which clothes and sleeping gear were in. There's nothing better than travelling for several hours negotiating bush tracks, creeks etc., to finally arrive at a spot for the night and then commence to unpack the vehicle, boil unending billys of water and commence washing clothing, containers and inside of one's vehicle. I think Ian enjoyed it, he kept mumbling something I couldn't quite catch. (PS. NO BRIM EITHER).

AM Going to skip all spots we transversed (over 350 k off road) other than the one which is the sole recommendation to the club. Although some excellent spots were uncovered they were far apart and could not accommodate more than say 6 to 8 members. Unfortunately there is now almost no direct access to the beach in these areas as shire's have closed off all vehicle access points & in a number of areas, closed all beaches to vehicles entirely.

"RECOMMENDATION TO THE CLUB"

Pemberton and in particular Calcup beach providing some of the most promising water either Ian or myself have seen. Single entry to area is a 1.25 mile sand dune hill direct to the beach and straight down a truly magnificent climb one back up to which the hilux was drooling at the mouth. For those who are not familiar with the vehicle it is powered by a Chev. 4.3 litre V6 port and polished slight head work mild cam fitted with a Motex fuel injection and topped off with a Sprintex Blower (super charger) developing some 163 brake horsepower at the back wheels and loves to move. Hill turned out to be a breeze actually climbed about 1/3 of the distance in two wheel drive, bogged put into 4 wheel and climbed out and up the hill.

We saw a Toyota troop carrier climb hill whilst we were there complete with 3 kids and two adults which should mean our club vehicles can climb hill.

- * Real four wheel territory (without the scratches)

All trips have there moments and in our case we had two, initially an oily one now the refined and upgraded product and problems of petrol. We had moved on from Calcup towards Walpole and were approximately 100k from civilisation with enough gas to take us about 150k. A strong smell of petrol wafted into the cab convincing us to stop and investigate. It was immediately obvious what was happening as fuel lines on second tank were leaking and we could not fix same where we were. A steady run of petrol was swirling across top of second tank spilling on both sides of the vehicle and spraying on the exhaust pipe. Perhaps the answer was to cause the consumption from the main tank to rapidly increase thus avoiding this problem. That meant speeding "well" one could not then help making the ultimate sacrifice and bolting on the big boot. Who said Cookie won't shut up? I'll give you the tip, try 80 to 100K on rough unknown bush tracks, four wheel drifts combined with two and four wheels off ground after riding mounds, tight corners, heavy acceleration and breaking with each gear change and boot bringing out the brute power and the high pitched scream of the blower.
