A.A.A. OF WA REPORT

There were 26 delegates present at the October meeting of the above association held at the Marmion Angling and Aquatic Club's premises.

A motion was put to change the association's auditor, as at this date the audit had not been done due to his work load. The motion was lost so we have now to wait until he can find time to complete the audit.

Angler of the Year selection criteria (the association has asked clubs to put forward suggestions of how the selections should be done) must be lodged with the association's secretary prior to the February 1986 delegates meeting so that submission may be looked at with a view to having a more equitable selection method.

The boat championships are to be run by the Whitford's Club on the 22nd March 1986.

State Estuary Championships are to be held on November 23rd - 24th 1985 in the Swan and Canning Rivers. That Club is the Swan River Angling Club. Any fish other than those listed in the State legal lengths must exceed 18cms.

Boundary:- Any water upstream of the new traffic bridge at Fremantle.

George Holman was presented with a certificate of appreciation for his services over the previous five years pertaining to drycasting and for past service.

A motion was put by Melville Club to alter the minimum legal length of fish (other than those listed on the State Record Sheet) from 18cms to 22 cms for all State Championships. Motion to be voted on.

The association is to hold the "Mandurah 500" in the Mandurah area in mid January 1986. A trophy officer is needed.

The association magazine is now being printed and will be available soon.

A motion put by Bunbury Club to select the "Champion Club" each year on open and ladies divisions in all four sections on a 10% basis for each division was carried.

CAPE CUVIER - 1986

Proposed time Friday 13th - Saturday 21st June 1986

1st quarter moon Sunday 15th June 1986.

As most of our members are now aware it has been the intention of some of us to organize a "Safari" type fishing trip to our Northern Climes not only for those regulars of Steep Point and Cape Cuvier etc., but for all members especially those who have not yet had the good fortune or opportunity to tangle with the tackle busters not usually encountered closer to Perth. After many "backyard" and "over a quiet drink" discussions it has finally come to fruition as the first wheels have started to turn for an organized "Assault on Cape Cuvier" in June 1986.

For the uninitiated this may seem a long way in the future but be re-assured the more time you have to prepare for one of these trips then the better trip you are likely to have. So first thing to do is book your time off from work, (nine months is enough notice for your boss I hope!)

Having made your decision to go (and I hope that is the decision you have made) then your first obstacle is immediately confronted... who will you go with. Well this is why we are trying to make this a club organized affair. All you need to do is contact the co-ordinator (me) and the fellers will automatically go out. (I already will have a knowledge of who else is going and will call upon the experience of the clubs more seasoned campaigners to ensure that no-one goes away under equipped or ill-informed. Once again this fairly long time span between now and the trip can be used to advantage. As soon as your group or party is settled, then you can all begin working together immediately, e.g., start fishing together on Field Days occasionally to develop a team situation. To further develop this situation, make the Field Day to "Bluff Creek" on the March long weekend your dry run, the effort will be worth it, the fishing won't be as spectacular but you will find that a lot of the fish you catch down there will make excellent bait in June.

The ideal group for a trip of this type is probably six people travelling in two 4 wheel drive vehicles (desirable but not essential). Both pulling trailers for the large amount of equipment which we have found makes life to much more comfortable

when camping for long periods of time. Here is a list to show most of the equipment it is desirable if not essential to have at your disposal:-

1. RELIABLE VEHICLE with essential spares (hoses, plugs, points, fan belt etc).
2. TRAILER well maintained and servicable. Spares if possible e.g. in the last 24 months Graham Reeley and I have broken 2 sets of trailer springs and rolled a trailer over and they were all in good condition, so imagine what we would have done with a "crook" one.
3. TENT must be sturdy construction and waterproof.
4. ANNEX ON TENT or a Terp or other shelter for shade, as it gets warm in the North even in June and sunburn can be your worst enemy and ruin an otherwise fantastic trip with sleepless nights and illness.
5. FREEZER (S) I would suggest a minimum freezer capacity of 7 cubic feet for each group of three people. We usually take at least 2 and sometimes 3 freezers of this capacity for a trip of this type.
6. GENERATOR - A good reliable generator is essential as it is going to run your freezer as its primary function. If your generator doesn't work neither does your freezer, without a freezer your food and bait won't keep and neither will your catch so you might as well go home - what a disaster. This is so important that our trips are now planned to even include a second generator) As well as freezers the power plants are used for lighting and battery charging even electric toasters, kettles and frypans.

All this is irrelevant if you have a petrol driven freezer but if you have access to one of these make sure it is well maintained and serviced before you leave. We have hired these on 2 occasions and both time they have broken down and brought nothing but hardship.

7. FUEL - For your vehicles and your generator/freezer, Cuvier is a place where travel can be beneficial both to your appreciation of the country that you are fishing in and to the level of fish fillets in your freezer. If you run out of fuel for your generator you must leave or your catch will spoil and we all know what happens if you run out of fuel for your vehicle, so don't be caught short.
8. WATER - Terrible stuff but probably the most important thing in your gear. We once had an instruction period where a survival expert informed us that for good health in an exposed location such as the North West an adult should have access to at least 1 gallon of water per day (water, not beer for you die hard). Beer and other alcohol does more harm than good if you are dehydrated and serves a better purpose if you pour it over yourself to cool you down rather than drink it. How much water you take it up to you but it is better to take it and waste it than to spoil your trip with unnecessary illness due to dehydration.
9. Stoves, lights, cooking equipment.
10. Creature comforts, chairs, tables and a comfortable bed is very important, eight or nine nights spent sleepless under canvas is no picnic - believe me I've been there and I won't do it again.
11. A comprehensive medical kit fully stocked - for obvious reasons.

Well that is a start and will give you some idea of what you are getting into next month. I will be able to give you some indication of the type of fishing to be had and the equipment needed and also how we go about planning our food and "nourishment" requirements. So make your decision, book your holidays and start talking to your mates about it and don't forget if you want help on joining a group or any information you can phone me anytime and I will make sure you are in.
