TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE TEN MONTHS ENDED 30TH APRIL 1967.

The Members, Surf Casting & Angling Club of W.A. (Inc.)

Mr. President, Gentlemen,

I wish to submit to you the Statements of Income and Expenditure and receipts and Payments for both the General and Building Funds for the 10 months ended 30th April 1967. These are the first statements to be prepared with our Financial year ending at 30th April, and therefore 12 months income has been accounted for, whereas only 10 months expenditure has been offset against this income.

As can be seen from the statements, the general fund shows an excess of \$402 for the period, compared to last year's excess of \$164. This is an excellent result, and it is hoped this trend will continue in the years to come.

During the past 10 months, Subscriptions totalled \$597 as compared with \$482 for the previous year. The increase is due to Subscriptions being increased in this period. The remainder of the clubs income has remained fairly constant with last year's figures, with the exception of Raffle proceeds and Social Fees. This year a raffle was not conducted, and at the date of this statement the Social Fees for our Annual Dinner and Dance had not been paid due to the change of our Financial Year.

On the Expenditure side, the cost of the Reel Talk showed a decrease of \$9. This item of expenditure will vary from year to year, as supplies are purchased as and when required. The amount expended on Trophies for this period was \$9 as compared with \$90 in 1965/66, but once again the reason for this decrease is the changing of our Financial Year, and further costs will be incurred for Trophies. As indicated in last year's report, the Club's Gestetner and Typewriter had to be repaired, the cost of which was \$22. There has also been a decrease in costs of our social activities in this period, but this, of course, has occurred for the same reason as the decrease in income from this source (i.e. At the date of this statement the only expenditure incurred for our Annual Dinner and Dance was the rent paid in advance for the Hall).

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As a supply of Club Badges was purchased last year, this expense did not occur again. Insurances increased by \$42 due to new policies being taken out. I feel the additional expense incurred is more than warranted for the cover that has been acquired by the Club.

In the past 10 months the Building Fund Balance increased by \$173 and at the date of this report, has almost reached \$1200.

As the Club over the years has acquired such assets as the Club Tent, scales, gestetnar and typewriter etc., I feel that in future a Statement setting these out should be presented. This would mean going back as far as possible and extracting these from the statements of income and expenditure for previous years. Then in the future, only a proportion of the cost would be charged against each year's income, and a statement of what the club had purchased would be readily available at any time.

Club Membership totalled 135 at 30th April 1967, which is an overall increase of 1 on last year. In the past 10 months, 13 senior and 5 juniors were admitted, but 17 previous members either did not renew their subscriptions or resigned.

In conclusion, I feel the past 10 months have shown a good result and the Club's finances have continued to show the improvement experienced at the end of last year. I would also like to thank members for the assistance and co-operation shown to me, and a special thanks to our last Treasurer, Mr. Ted Savage, who has always been happy to assist me wherever possible.

The Register of Members has been examined and the names of new members as recorded through the Minute Book have been correctly entered in this Register. The Payment of subscriptions by Members has also been correctly recorded for the period.

Gentlemen, I would like to record my appreciation of the work done by our present Treasurer and his predecessor. No doubt they co-operated well in the change of duties, and in my opinion, our new Treasurer has maintained the very high standard set by his predecessor.

Your SPINNER can be a Fish WINNER.

Spinning, or catching fish on an artificial lure or some such other type of hardware peculiar to anglers can be one of the most satisfying facets of angling. It certainly gets the angler away from dangling - or bait soaking, and the variety of fish prone to the lure are many, i.e. Tailer, Salmon, Herring, Mackerel, Skipjack, Pike etc., just to mention a few.

Tailer and Salmon are probably the most sought after fish by the spinning enthusiast, as they are both at times plentiful and offer a challenge as a worthy adversary when on the receiving end of light spinning gear.

Our local beaches, reefs, moles and groynes lend themselves to this approach to angling, but generally for success with a spinner, the angler must be prepared for plenty of exercise, as mobility is essential, and it is food for thought that while on this activity that the weight of your gear whilst in pursuit of your quarry be kept down to a minimum. The main requirements being:-- Rod and Reel, a selection of spinners (shapes and weights), rod bucket and knife, and a shoulder bag for fish and you are on your way. A word of warning, if you are working rocks or reefs, is that care be exercised in the use of footwear. Also a pair of Polaroid sunglasses can be advantageous.

Some of the ideal places to place your spinner are channels, gutters, sand banks and close to reefs. While working a beach or reef area (or angling anywhere for that matter), watch for the feeding action of sea-birds, they can always give you a clue where surface fish are feeding, especially Tailer, Mackerel Tuna etc., for these fish are voracious feeders and sea-birds are not slow at picking up left-overs.

The choice of lure of course, depends on the type of gear you use. For a double-handed rod a spinner weighing between two and four ounces can be used. For the single handed rod a spinner weighing between 3/4 oz. to 2 oz. will give best results. What weight and how far you wish to cast, of course, depends on ability and requirements. Always bear in mind that the more

water you spin over the more likely you are of a fish for tea. So while the bait soaker will argue that is is not essential to be a distance caster to catch fish, this may be true, but it is not essentially so when spinning - where distance is an advantage.

The methods of spinning vary with the type of water one is working. Methods, of course, means the manner and rate of retrieve of the spinner. If one is working close to a reef or over a rock bottom, it is not advisable to allow the spinner to sink too low, and to start the retrieve as soon as the spinner hits the water. In these areas the beginner soon finds that experience is the best teacher.

When spinning into deep water, try varying the depth of your spinner. This can be done by the rate of recovery, by hesitating before retrieve. If it is sand, try letting it sink to the bottom before retrieving - but once you have started to recover line, don't stop - for you never know when your spinner is being followed, and a strike is about to take place.

After a strike and the hooks have been firmly set, endeavour to keep the line firm from you to the fish, for it is remarkable how most fighting fish when caught on a spinner or lure can "throw" it, and it is whilst endeavouring to "throw" the spinner that slack line occurs, and by eliminating this, helps to prevent the spinner from so being "thrown".

At times Tailer and Salmon and others, although there, may not show much interest in your lure. This is the time when a range of different pattern spinners may produce results. It is always worth a try at any rate - good spinning, I mean spinning.
