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SURVIVAL (PART TWO) BY BASIL MARSH:

In part one of this subject I wrote of the necessary things to do before and during the trip away and also on arrival at the camp site. Let us now consider some of the things which should or could be done in the case of an accident causing physical injury. Rarely will two accidents be completely identical. There is only one thing that is identical in every accident and that is that the person who has been injured hurts like hell.

To deal with an injury anywhere, every club member should have a good knowledge of first aid. Apart from a session on resuscitation, I can't remember the last time there was any instruction in the club in first aid. The main types of injury club members could expect to encounter on a club outing or trip would be:

- . Knife cuts
- . Accidental hooking
- . Broken limbs
- . Tent fire burns
- . Motor vehicle accident injuries
- . Water immersion

To cope with these types of accident injuries, the first aid kit should have a reasonable quantity of medications and equipment applicable to these injuries.

Let us now imagine that an accident has happened. First aid has been carried out and the patient is as comfortable as can be expected, but it is considered that evacuation to better medical facilities is necessary. Decisions on quite a few points will need to be made. Some of these decisions are:

- . Should the patient be evacuated by road. If we had a CB radio, a call could be made for an ambulance or aircraft. (I wonder if our members have coverage for ambulance transportation.)
- . How far is it to the medical centre? Will the patient be able to stand the journey over a rough track. The type and severity of the injury will play an important part here.
- . If the patient is carried in a private vehicle, will we break camp completely and take everything with us, thus finishing the trip early. Maybe the patient could be just taken to hospital and we could return for some more fishing and complete the trip.
- . At what stage should the injured persons family be notified of the accident. Will it be necessary to report the accident to the police.
- . What would be the consequences if the patient was not quickly transported to hospital.

The size of the party and the number of vehicles available will provide the answer to many questions or problems. If there are only one or two vehicles then probably both would need to go. In a big party with half-a-dozen vehicles, only two would need to go- one to carry the patient and one support vehicle.

A written record should be made of all the circumstances of the accident for later use if necessary. Items which should be recorded are:

SURVIVAL (PART TWO) CONT'D:

- . Events leading up to the accident
- . The accident itself
- . Injuries evident at the time of the accident and the first aid treatment given
- . Action taken after the accident

At the first opportunity after all the problems of the accident have been cleared up, a full report and discussion of the accident and any complications or difficulties encountered should be made to the Club. By doing this, lessons will undoubtedly be learned and may be the means of avoiding a re-occurrence.

STATE ROCK & BEACH CHAMPIONSHIPS REPORT:

The representatives from the Surfcasting and Angling Club in the State Championships were as follows:-

Tony Richardson (Capt.), George Holmar, Graham Reeley, Wilf Core, Barrie Waddams, Bob Foreman (Res.), Basil Marsh (Res.), Peter Conroy (Open).

On the Friday night after some running around the metropolitan area collecting members and gear we were on our way at about seven o'clock. We met up at a very cold Mandurah with Barrie, Wilf and Bob and the three car convoy continued the long drive to arrive at Hamelin Bay Caravan Park at 12.30 a.m; very quickly two tents were erected and after a nightcap we settled down for a few hours sleep. Barrie had intended letting the park manager know we had arrived, but a large black unknown shape patrolling the office caused him to change his mind.

At 7a.m. mounds of blankets stirred and the occupants made a recce of the beach. A Nor-wester was beginning to blow, but the back beach was sheltered though partially covered with heaps of weed. Four fishermen using hand lines were pulling in a steady flow of herring and skippy and it was accepted that we would fish the competition time on the rocks until dark then move around to the clear beach area during the night.

NOTE 2. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICE

- 2.1 Accounts have been prepared using Historical Cost Method of accounting.
- 2.2 Purchase of covers and wrappers for "Reel Talk", club badges, insurance, rates and other annual expenses are written off in total in the year of payment and are not apportioned.
- 2.3 The Kalbarri property is recorded at cost plus estimated value of members labour for additions and no provision for depreciation of the building has been brought to account in arriving at the financial result for the year. The Management Committee considers the property would have been, at the 30th April, 1980, and would now be, capable of realising at least Balance Sheet value.
- 2.4 All Current Assets are expected to realise Balance Sheet values in the normal course of Club operations and no provision for Doubtful Debts is considered necessary.
- 2.5 Depreciation of Plant and Equipment is calculated on the Prime Cost method (i.e. on original cost or valuation) at 10% per annum.
