FANTASTIC FRUSTRATION (or How to Win a Murchison Field Day)

by GEORGE HOLMAN as told to "ARCEE"
Like most of us, I learnt a lot on my first trip to the Murchison.
I got a 37lb mulloway the night before the competition - and then proceeded to bag a whole 4lb of fish during the field day!

I was dead keen to do well on the next Murchison field day, in (8, so I put a lot of thought into the trip beforehand.

I was going to be there for a fortnight, with a week before the field day, so I had plenty of time to decide on a plan of action for the competition. During the week I had enough success to be encouraged three mackeral, a sea kingie, two mulloway and a shark.

Obviously there were a few fish around, and it looked as though a man was going to have to fish hard and long to come out on top on the field day. I reckoned that stamina would play a part, so I decided to tackle the toughest fishing on the first night, while I was still fresh.

And that meant Frustration Rock, the most aptly named fishing spot in the West.

I figured that if I could fill a heavy bag out of Frustration on the Saturday night, I would fish the beach at the Bluff on the Sunday.

Our party arrived at Frustration about 4 p.m. With me were Alan McLachlan, Jack Muir and Mick Dawson. There was another party of club members too, so it looked as though about a dozen of us were going to be fishing the spot.

Our optimism was dampened somewhat by the fact that there were no fish taken from Frustration the nigh before. However, this looked to be a good night. There was a light sea breeze and conditions were ideal.

Things suddenly looked bright when I got into my first kingie at 5p.m. He went about 25lbs. I pitched out again and it wasn't long before I was away - this time a 35lb shark.

Then I lost a couple of good fish - including a sea kingie. I think but wasn't too worried because the night was still young.

Our technique of landing fish seemed to be working quite well. When heavy fish were hooked, the blokes alongside wound in and allowed the man playing the fish to work along to the northern end of Frustration, eventually washing the fish up the "steps" at that end of the rock.

Some good fish were coming in, too. I remember Ted Savage got a 651b noah. I suppose that on the average we were taking ten minutes on big fish, with longer on the sharks, of course.

I had two rods, with an Alvey on one (231b line) and a Penn on the other (281b). I used them pretty well alternately. Bait was no problem - by know the fish were really on and they were taking anything we threw out. Tailor, mullet, mulies, octopus... the lot. We were throwing out fish heads and we caught kingies with the heads inside.

I fished on until 1 a.m. and by that time I had eight mulloway and a shark lying on the beach. And I'd lost four good fish!

The kingies weighed between 17 and 27lbs, the shark 35lbs, and I found to my delight that I had a total of more than 200lbs - 210 to be exact. And boy was I pooped.

I collapsed on the beach and slept until dawn, and then began the ardous task of carting the fish back. I made four trips over to the boat-three with fish, and a final one with my gear.

I spent Sunday morning weighing and cleaning the fish, and in the afternoon headed for the Bluff. I ballooned for a couple of hours with no success and then moved on to the beach about 7 p.m.

My luck was really in now because the kingle and charks were around there, too. I fished until mid-night and finished up with five mulloway between 23 and 35½lbs and three sharks between 12 and 20.

And would you believe it, I lost four good fish that night, too I had my share of tin, though one kingie was nearly lassoed through the mouth and under the gills, and I pulled him in sideways.

My total bag added up to a real fishing bonanza - as much as any man could hope for.

I had 13 mulloway and five sharks for a total weight of 387 3/4 lbs for the two nights fishing, and the poundage of scale fis 314 was a club record for a field day.

It just goes to show that a fisherman's lot can sometimes be a happy one. Fate had lent a hand. Just as there had been no fish at Frustration on the Friday night, there was nothing much at the Bluffs beach on Saturday night. And there were no fish for four days after the field day! I didn't score again until the next Wednesday.

Just to emphasise that the fates aren't always so kind to me, let me remind you of my third trip to the Murch. Boy, was I going to kill'em last year.

It's history now that I didn't catch a fish. On my second day there, a Sunday, I passed out with accute appendicitis and wound up on an operating table at the Geraldton Hospital.

Thats fishing.

Fish bait can be stored in the freezer there. Some bait is available but I advise that you take some especially gardies.

The Asst. F.D.O & myself will be up early, also a number of other members, and we hope to have good news for you.

KING WAVES - These are a dangerous hazard in this area wo when fishing from reefs & rocks, please fish in groups, and always have a look out, particularly dangerous is Frustration Reef, and the outer prong of Red Bluff. Cuts from reef falls should be promptly treated. The first aid kit is always at my tent, so use it, and save your mate a possible trip into Geraldton as has happened in the past.

I will be at Headquarters to sign on between 2.00 & 3.30 p.m. Saturday. Anybody arriving late can sign on at the store or at the next weigh in.

I will have a notice board, giving details of catches, and any other relevant information, displayed at Headquarters.

FIELD DAY - Venue MYALUP BEACH 14th & 15th February

This is a beach NOT previously fished by this Club and is in keeping with a resolution passed some years ago that we have one new venue each year.

Take the Old Coast Road from Mandurah to Bunbury and the turn off is 43 miles from Mandurah - bitumen all the way. The turn off is well sign posted and is 100 yards from the Harvey River Bridge. A narrow road, rather winding, two miles into the caravan park.

There will be plenty of room set aside for us.

The only restriction by the Shire Council is that we don't fish in the swimming area immediately in front if there are swimmers. Fishing will commence at 4 p.m. Saturday and cease at 8 p.m. Sunday morning. Weight in will cease at 9 p.m.

Small whiting can be had for bait for the big line so take some no 10-12 hooks and a bit of red meat.
