CLEANING & MAINTENANCE OF A MITCHELL OR FIXED SPOOL TYPE REEL

Less time is necessary on cleaning and maintenance than with the overhead geared type reel, but don't get away with the idea that maintenance is not required. Cleanliness and proper lubrication are of prime importance. This point cannot be over stressed, there is nothing worse than a fault occurring through neglect, when away on a fishing trip.

On returning from a fishing trip, it is essential that your reel be cleaned of all trace of salt water and sand etc., as although all salt water reels have been treated to make them salt resistant, they are not entirely proof against saltwater corrosion. The most effective and easiest way of cleaning a reel is to put it under the tap. The spool should be removed to enable you to get at the bail tripping mechanism. A rider will have to be added to this method however, and that is to make sure beforehand that water will not get into the internal working parts. To guard against the entry of water, either salt or fresh into the internal mechanism of the reel, completely fill the housing with grease thereby eliminating the possibility of water entering, while also assuring adequate lubrication.

After the reel has been washed and dried, all external oiling parts are attended to with the oil can. A check should be made to see that no screws or nuts have worked loose during use, and you are then ready for the next fishing trip.

For complete cleaning and lubrication which is only required occasionally, the reel is completely stripped. Excess grease is wiped from parts which are then washed in cleaning fluid or petrol (not kerosene) and then dried. Individual parts are greased as they are re-assembled, and then before the side plates are fitted, the housing is packed with grease. Do not tighten any screws or nuts when assembling until you have checked by operating the reel, as considerable damage can be done by parts incorrectly assembled. If the reel does not operate smoothly, do not force it, take it apart again and check your sequence of assembly.

Before the rotating head is replaced, operate the reel for several minutes and excess grease will be forced out by the moving parts. I can recommend Mobilus Grease No. 2. or Shell Retinac "A"., as after the initial excess of grease has been removed these two greases do not continue to ooze out during operation of the reel.

The rotating head is then assembled and external oiling points attended to. Finally recheck for any loose screws or nuts.

A little about lines - choice of line is important as with all types of reels, always make sure it is as soft and supple as is available. A No. 45 of $19\frac{1}{2}$ lb. Water Queen is insufficiently heavy for all beach work. A lighter breaking strain line will give you greater distance, but may require a heavier leader which should be of sufficient length to reach from the sinker or spinner through the guides to the reel, and a few turns on the spool.

It is rather important that the line should be wound to fill the spool to just below the level of the tip, approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ inch below and no more. Too much line on the spool causes the line to throw off in tangles when casting. Too little line on the spool restricts the cast by means of excessive circular motion of the line as it leaves the spool, causing it to slap the rod and sometimes cut the binding of the stripping guide.

RODS.

To balance your tackle for beach fishing and beach casting, you require a rod to throw your bait and approximately a 3 oz. sinker with ease. It should be more flexible than the average rod used with overhead reels. A stiff rod is likely to cause "break-offs" with the lighter lines used, and also the line would tend to cut into your forefinger when casting.

RULE 16.

Markers shall stand to the side of the target area in accuracy events, not behind, and shall stand perfectly still while the cast is being made.

A TRIP TO MONKEY MIA AND THE MURCHISON.

Heather and I started off for Monkey Mia on a Tuesday morning and arrived on Wednesday morning after an overnight stop at Geraldton. Monkey Mia is a pretty little spot in a big calm bay with a jetty at one end, and porpoises swimming everywhere. It looked a beaut spot for camping, but too calm for fishing. It was, but we'll be back next year even if it's only to feed Charlie the Porpoise with whom we made firm friends.

After a welcome from "Panther" Payne, we started straight into fishing but it was the same old story - "you should have been here last week".

About 30 Tailor and three days later we headed for the Murchison where we met Denis Bodle and his wife Maxine and saw the River in one of its muddiest states ever, staining the sea for miles. We didn't like the look of this, but after settling in we hopped off for a bit of fishing at "Chinamans", but as there were no fish there, it was an "early to bed" night.

Next morning we were on our way to "Oyster Reef" where we bumped into Dave Latto and Brian Hanks, and when they told us of Dave's 8 lb. Tailor and Brian's wife Dinah's 31 lb. Mulloway, we were almost ready to swim across to Oyster Reef and not worry about the boat. Once on Oyster it didn't take long for Dave to land several nice Tailor around the six pound mark, and I landed one about five pounds.

The following day Dave left for home and Denis and I went to Chinamans where I caught one Mulloway about 33 lb about 9 o'clock in the morning, and Denis caught one 25 lb. about 3 p.m.

Brian Hanks came with us the next day and we landed 10 Mulloway from 12 lb to Denis' 38 lb. We had the spot to ourselves except for one woman who caught 2 Mulloway around the 30 lb mark which we had to take home for her in the Landrover as she could not carry them.

The next morning we ambled down around 7 to find nearly every rock filled with bods who had heard of our catch, but we managed to

squeeze in and really hopped into the Malloway with Tailor bait, catching 14 which were from 15 lb. up to 28 lb., three of which the wives caught. The women thought this was pretty good, but complained that the men could not throw straight.

Getting fed up with catching just Malloway and sitting around eating fresh crayfish and drinking cold beer, we started after the big Tailor. In the next week or so Denis caught a 10½ lb. and I came around 7 lbs on his Double hander, and I caught about 18 from 4 lb. up to 9 lb. on my single hander, and we were still getting Malloway for a few days but then they finished.

The river had been clearing up more every day and with two days of our holiday left to go, we decided to go over the Oyster Reef for a crack at the Spanish Mackerel. We arrived there early, and started casting our Gardies out before the muddy river water started flowing out and spoiling it for Mackerel.

I had seen a Mackerel jump earlier and was still hoping when there was a flurry of water around my gardie and I was onto a fish. Even with 500 yards of 39 lb. line, I thought it was going to get the better of me as it took almost all the line out in two big runs, but after about 15 minutes, Denis sank the gaff into my first Mackerel, a 51 lb. which I reckon is the right way to finish a good holiday. We left Terry Mannion to carry on where we left off.

Weights, except when used with baits, and spinners, must have attached not less than 12 inches of half inch yellow tape. Tape is to be attached by one end, not tied in the middle. (This rule also applies to practice casting, and must be strictly adhered to.) Penalty for non-compliance - no score for that cast.
