JUNE FIELD DAY:GARDEN ISLAND:

When it comes to catching skippy, Hewy takes a lot of beating. What his secret is I don't know, but he sure catches them fast when they are on. Of the total caught on the field day, approximately 160 lbs came from the Caves area. Out of this, Hew's total was 40lb 6oz. Closest to him from the group fishing there was Eric Sullivan's 26lb 2oz. Terry Fuller's 25lb 8oz, George Holman's 20lb 8oz and Bob Fredericks 16lb 2oz were other good bags to come from this spot. The fish started to bite about six p.m. and they left them still biting at 10 p.m. Hew had two last casts for luck, result four skippy.

The Gun Bay did not yield anything of great note. John Devitt's 7lb 3oz being the best. John sure battled for his fish, from our position a few hundred yards away, often his arm and rod were all that showed above the foam as waves pushed him off the reef and into a gutter. Stan Renshaw's 6lb 4oz was next best, he and all the Renshaws, Eric Parker, Trevor Stam and new member, Gus Sussmyer, fished the North point of the bay. Their fish consisted of Herring, Skippy and one Tailor. Ron and I fished the middle of the bay with little result. We lost bait to herring and whiting most of the time. Around 7 p.m. the weed moved in and really choked things up so we departed with 4 herring and a tailor between us.

Alby Norman and Phil Isbister found a spot south of the guns. Both remained fishless until 7 p.m. when they landed three good tailor around 4lb each, they were then bitten off and by the time they were back in the water the weed had moved in and finished it for them.

The back beach area yielded a few, the best being Lofty's salmon, landed just after 3 p.m. He added a tailor and some skippy for 8lb 4oz. Tom Corcoran's 1½lb of skippy and herring from this area was not sufficient to allow him to show off and break chairs. This time he was rather quiet about it. Bob Jensen failed to pull a salmon from his favourite hole, but managed a tailor instead.

Snow Tate, Doug Newton, Ron Mansfield, Hugh Gregory and Ted Savage, fished at the Skippy Hole. Here they encountered a very large, very dead and very high sea turtle. They estimated its weight at between 400 and 500 lb, so there should be plenty of burley around for awhile. Their catch was pretty light but a few nice King George made up a little in quality.

Garry Gildersleeve fished the south end for the second biggest bag of 38lb, all herring. Mark Tucker and Don Taylor fished at the jetty for little result, although Mark managed a salmon trout.

The field day resulted in a few section changes, Lofty's salmon goes into Section 2, replacing John Devitt's skippy. Alby Norman's tailor goes into Section 6 and Hew's bag makes Section 10. Eric Sullivan has his unusual catch of a 1 lb 9oz Flounder in Section 14.

Well that wraps it up for Ron and I, next month you will have a new F.D.O. We thank everyone who has helped us in many ways during our term. Its been a pleasure to do a job of this sort, and I have learned a lot about the functions of the Club and the people in it.

JUNE CAST:

Once again perfect weather prevailed for this month's casting morning with a most co-operative breeze blowing straight down the lane. Casters were wondering what good distances would be produced on this morning in the Single Handed Open and the Level Line; they were not disappointed, as the wind and "spag" produced some excellent results.

Thirty two members and one visitor geared up to do battle. As previously mentioned, the Level Line saw several casters break 400' for the first time; namely D. GREEN 409; G. HOLMAN 424; the D.C.O. 417 and B. LEICESTER 411 (with an egg-beater). The longest cast of the morning was J. DEVITT'S 481; other significant distances were G. BASKERVILLE 475; H.Y. HEW 453; R. TUCKER 428. Graham was unfortunate enough to break off and this may well have cost him the day, but certainly cost him 20 cents. R. LUNDY managed to break off twice, while M. DAWSON managed one. Out of 99 casts, there were only four break offs, and as always, the unexpected - E. PARKER did not break off at all! When the figures were computed the event was won by J. DEVITT 45 from H.Y. HEW 44, R. TUCKER 43, D.C.O. 41 and G. HOLMAN 40.

Double Handed Accuracy scores were slightly down this month as often happens in perfect weather for some reason or other. D. LATTO won this event with a fine 56; followed by G. BASKERVILLE 52; D.C.O. 51; R. KILDAHL 46 with B. LEICESTER and W. UTTING sharing fifth place.

The Single Handed Accuracy always seems to provide a few highlights, not the least of which, was a fine "bull" by RALPH LERCH, who beat Dad in this event. Rudy says that after Ralph arrived home from casting, about tea time, (he was made to walk home), he was still talking about his beloved "bull". E. SULLIVAN took out this event with an even 28, followed by R. KILDAHL 27; D. LATTO, G. BASKERVILLE and RALPH LERCH all on 24; with RUDY LERCH 23 fifth.

Not only did the Single Handed Open provide some good distances, but provided the casters with one of the most sprightly and eagle-eyed markers ever seen; W. MORROW, revelling in the conditions, did everything except "mark" a sinker as in football. You may remember that R. TUCKER defeated G. HOLMAN last season by one foot in this event. That's exactly how they have begun this year. G. HOLMAN'S 331 feet, although good enough to set a new record, was not quite good enough to beat R. TUCKER'S 332, thus breaking George's record which was only about 10 minutes old. There looks the makings of a good tussle for this title again. Poor old Bob was casting under some difficulties too. One other caster broke last season's record too - D.C.O. put down 315 feet; G. BASKERVILLE put down a creditable 305 feet, while J. DEVITT came fifth with 285 feet.

On the final analysis, D. LATTO with 126 points was the clear leader and moves into top spot in the Top Twenty. R. KILDAHL 115 was second from G. BASKERVILLE 115, (not bad after the break-off), D.C.O. 114 and W. UTTING 111. The top twenty underwent some remarkable changes with G. HOLMAN slipping to ninth, D. LATTO from 8th to top, D.C.O. 2nd, R. KILDAHL from 9th to 4th and only a break-off separating 1st and tenth - truly a most interesting competition. 2 Juniors are now in the top twenty in J. RENSHAW and R. LERCH with M. Tucker "knocking on the door" 21st.

Look forward to seeing all the old faces and many new ones next month. Roll along chaps even if you haven't been for some time - its a great morning.
