A FEW NOTES ON FISHING GEAR FOR NOVICES. The fishing rod.

These are best manufactured from a reputable hollow fibre glass and should be, ideally, between 11 ft. 6 inches and 12 ft. long. The length is quite important, as the rod is used to cast the hooks, line, and sinker from the beach into the sea, and therefore must have the necessary amount of 'whip'. Great distances may be obtained with expertuse, and casts of 200 yards are common, provided the caster is expert enough to break the line at the rod tip simultaneously with the forward whip of the rod, completely unimpeded by the line, and as I remarked, great distances may be achieved.

The Reell

This is a device designed to carry your line in coils around a central drum or spool, which is attached to a set of gears and operated by a handle, enabling the angler to rewind the line onto the spool after casting. Only the best reels should be used, as the spool must have good balance and free running bearings. Good bearings are a must, as a sticking spool makes it impossible to obtain an 'over-run' and a subsequent 'birdsnest' when casting. For this reason fixed spoolreels should never be used, as, with this type of reel, it is possible to accidently cast off up to 100 yards of line which hasto be reeled in, and this is timewasting.

Fishing Line.

Most anglers prefer to use Nylon line and for several good reasons. 1. In direct ratio to the breaking strain of the line, is possible to wind a much greater length of line onto a given spool, and this has the obvious advantage of enabling the angler to obtain much larger 'birdsnests' from the over-rurs.

- 2. Nylon line is much easier to break and furthermore it breaks more cleanly than linen or other natural fibres. The clean break assures the angler of maximum distance for hooks, trace and sinker when 'breaking off'.
- 3. Nylon is almost invisible under certain conditions, and this assures you of three times the difficulty whensorting out the 'birds nests' when they occur. Sitting doing this is much less tiring than continually running to the water's edge to cast.

Hooks.

These are absolutely essential to good angling, and expert anglers will tell you that 5/0 to 6/0 limerick hooks are best. When used they are usually ganged together, two or three to a rig, and to obtain maximum efficiency a treble hook is attached to the bottom limerick.

Experienced anglers can pierce a fellow angler's ear from twenty yards and withouteven looking round to take aim. Less en getic anglers wait until after dark and stick their rods into the sand at a angle of 45°, and with the rig hanging from the rod tip at the most appropriate height, wait for their victimto walk into it. (I always feel that this method is a bit unsporting, as no real skill is involved).

We then come to the retired Army land mine expert, who drops a set of hooks onto the beach and neatly flicks a lyer of sand over them. He may have to wait longer for the results, but someone is sure to tread of them. The real disadvantage here is that your victim may be wearing waders and tearing the waders without drawing blood from the foot is a sheer waste of effort.

The Sinker.

This piece of equipment fitted to the line just above the trace is ostensibly designed to hold the line on the bottom. There are many types, so we shall note only the two most commonly used by beach anglers.

The Star sinker, A pointed, 3 or 4 angled triangular job is ideal for inflicting the greatest amount of pain to other anglers athe vicinity. Most anglers of experience cast directly verhead, and so achieve their two or three hundred yards or so. However there is the more talented angler who casts sideways ith a round arm action. With this action the angler can break fi prematurely, and clobber someone as far as 100 yards along the ach. Injuries sustained from star sinkers have been known disable an angler for periods in excess of 6 weeks. A truly table achievement!

The second type, known as the Spoon, is far less efficient,

due to the flatness of its design. It is mecessary to strike the victim with the edge to obtain good results. Blows from the flat surface of these sinkers cause only major bruising, and the result is hardly worth the effort.

The Rod Bucket.

This is a leather device and when used is strapped around the waist with the 'bucket' hanging in the appropriate position to take the rod butt. These are mainly used by experienced anglers who are unable to achieve a 'break-off', 'over-run' or the impaling of a fellow angle. They are, of course, more widely used by anglers who favour the fixed spooltype reel, and have the misfortune to see their hooks, line, and sinker fall, still intact, into the sea.

The Fish Knife.

A cunning tool, with a sharp cutting edge on one side, and on the back a series of serretions, (claimed to be ideal fos scaling.) These tools are ideal for sticking into the sand leaving approx. 3-4" of blade exposed. They are most effective when kicked by a barefooted angler on the cutting edge, and if correctly positioned and well sharpened, amputation of the small toe can be guaranteed, at least. Should the knife be unfortunately kicked from the back however, the serrations are designed to inflict a deep ragged gash in most feet, and tears off 6" or more in rubber waders would be the minimum damage. Definitely a MUST for all anglers!

The bait.

Experienced anglers use smallfish called Mulies, but of course, there are other varieties such a Mullet, Squid and Octopus etc. Mulies are the most popular, and when bought are usually frozen. If unwrapped and thoroughly thawed before use, they will fly off the hooks without fail at almost every cast. For this reason most other baits are avoided due to the much greater difficulty in getting them to leave the hooks before they hit the water. Should the angle find he has bait left over when fishing, it is recommended that they be spread around the beach well above the high water line where they will putrify and create a much more acceptable stench than they would if thrown into the sea or given to other anglers.
