MAY GENERAL MEETING:

It's a pity that our Club is not more interested in these venues as Syd said there was a magnificent array of trophies and prizes. A motion was moved by George Holman, seconded Jim Strong, that Peter Osborne be the custodian of the Club Trophy, which is a miniature game rod and reel. This motion was carried.

MAY GENERAL MEETING CONT'D:

Then a motion was put forward by Alister Broughton, seconded George Holman, that the winners of the Fun Fish Competition make their own personal selection from the prize - This motion was also carried.

The \$2 note was won by Barrie Waddams and donated to the Building Fund. Meeting was then closed so we could proceed with our Instruction Period which was a very informative and well presented talk by Peter Osborne on fishing on the East coast and his experiences to date of his fishing on this side of the coast. Peter presented diagrams and sketches on their methods of worming for bait, plus his experiences and again diagrams on the type of gear and equipment used for rock hopping. All in all, a really first class instruction period. I'm sure all the members would welcome more of them. To you Peter, thanks for a job well done.

About eleven o'clock we were all back at the cave, cleaned fish and packed some gear. When we decided to eat, a big problem arose. All sorts of food appeared with each person wanting his to be eaten so he wouldn't get into trouble with the little lady at home for bringing back uneaten food.

At one o'clock we were back at the road and settled down to wait for the bus. We were constantly amused by the continuous stream of cyclists arriving at the top of our hill all red faced and breathing heavily. If we had had a drink stall there we could have made a fortune.

The bus and truck arrived. A pleasant trip around the Island back to the jetty for the weigh-in and finally a smooth trip back to the mainland.

I tell you man, it was a great weekend with great company.
