#### YALLINGUP - APRIL 1967.

Despite the promise of gale force winds, lashing rain and rough seas, the attendance was excellent with fifty members and visitors (notably our friends from the Collie Club) appearing on target.

We were, I am sure, pleasantly surprised to find almost cloudless skies and a mild breeze all that had to be contended with. Most popular beaches were virtually unfishable due to shallow water, heavy swells and a certain amount of heavy weed, and accordingly most went to the rocky areas where it was possible to fish in a certain amount of comfort.

The Club text was set up at the usual spot and by the time yours truly had arrived, our President had booked in a large contingent (thanks Jack).

Probably the most popular spot was the shore end of Canal Rocks where reports were that Salmon were biting freely. On arrival at this area it was obvious that there was very little room on the safe rocks and word was out that Tommy Vivian and Brian Hanks were amoung the Salmon.

Jack Harvey, Jim Strong and others were preparing to give the herring a go from the shore to the North of the rocks, and George Holman and Alan McLauchlan were having the success and the Salmon were coming along in two and threes as from our vantage point a sudden burst of activity was observed at intervals, with rods bent and gaffs flying, and then, all quiet for a spell.

Just apoint of interest, the fellows fishing from the beach rocks, shore side of Canal Rocks were having no success with Mulie bait, but a spinner cast well out and trolled very slowly accounted for three salmon, so don't despise the spinners, they do work.

As the evening wore on, we were informed of 9 Salmon to Tommy Vivian, 5 to Brian Hanks and many others with 2 or 3 each, and whilst there were no fantastic individual catches, each member was getting his share.

Two or thee members were smashed up by a marauding shark and sundry salmon, attacked while on their way to gaff, but he was too bi

or too willy to be caught himself.

The following dawn the rocks were once again populated by members, but disappointinly the Salmon were no longer very much in evidence, and eventhe herring, after being thick at dawn, very soon disappeared. Two or three Salmon were hooked in the canaproper, but none were observed being landed in the bay.

A further large fish smashed one or two rigs at about 7 a.m., but by 8 a.m. it was obvious that we had had it.

As usual, the weigh-in time had us wondering what was coming to scales, and the high light was, I am sure. Eric Sullivan's 55 lbs. of herring (anyone who works that hard deserves what he gets:)

Now just a few points of interest. This was, of course, virtually our tenth anniversary field day, and we broke a few records.

904 lbs. total catch - an alltime record. 4547\frac{1}{4} for the year - another record, and they will both take some beating:

A total year's attendance of 537 members and visitors, an a rage of 44 members per venue. Next month we begin our New Year, so Happy New Year, and bigger and better fish - and let's make this year's records look a bit sick.

We were glad to have the Collie Lads along with us, and we hope they had a good field-day, and we certainly enjoyed their Company. We hope to see them with us again from time to time.

### PLAYING THAG BIG FISH.

Fish that are lost when once properly hooked are usually lost because of the following reasons:-

- (a) Bad Knotting. The answer to this fault is obvious, learn to tie your knots properly and use the right knot.
- (b) The line being bitten through by the fish. The answer, of course, being the use of ganged hooks or a wire trace.
- (c) The line being cut or frayed to breaking point on rocks etc. or the rough sides of the larger fish or sharks. The use of a heavier leader helps to overcome this.
- (d) The hooks being pulled from the fishes mouth by the angler adopting bullocking tactics. It would not be exaggerating to say that 50% of fish lost are lost because of one or both of these reasons.

This is where the correct drag setting used on light line makes it far easier to keep a constant and steady tension on your fish, and obviate that sudden jerk which tears the hook free. When fishing it is advisable to keep your drag as light as is reasonably po( ble, always check before commencing to fish. With your anti-reverse lever set ON, and with the line hard, if the spool turns too freely, tighten the drag setting and jerk again to check. Only experience will tell you when a drag is nicely adjusted, but until then, remember that a lightly set drag will lose less fish than one set too tight.

As a fish is taking out line and the spool empties, so the drag automatically increases with the decrease in the diameter of the spool. This is probably best explained as considering the radius of the spool as the length of a lever operating the drag. As the length of the lever shortens, owing to the line being taken out, so greater effort is required to operate the drag.

In concluding, get to know the controls and adjustments on your particular Reel. Try them all, get the feel of making each adjustment. Equally important, learn what NOT to attempt to adjust. Do not force any control or adjustment. If it is done correctly, it is done easily.

Have you notified the secretary of your change of address?

Members must cast, hook, and play to the gaff point unaided, any fish which is entered in any division of the Fishing Competitions.

Fish hooked before Field Day times, CANNOT be played into the Field Day competition, e.g. a fish hooked at 3 minutes before starting time of Field Day, and landed 2 minutes past starting time, can only be entered in the OPEN Division, but a fish hooked 3 minutes before end of Field Day and landed after hours, IS eligible for F.D. division.
