DRYCASTING ORGANISERS.

JURIEN BAY VENUE - OCTOBER 1967

The weather; the all important weather was reasonably kind as 51 members and visitors made tracks for the venue. Roads were in excellent condition and tracks soft only in minor spots.

A young lady at the service station en-route asked me whether there would be enough fish for the hundreds? who had gone through my reply was far from the mark!

A good weekend was had by all.

DRYCASTING RULE NO. 7. No cast shall be made until permission is given by the starter, who shall wait until the all clear signal is given by the marker and he has replied with the same signal before giving the permission. Any defaulter of this rule shall not be credited with a score for that cast.

THE SQUID.

With whatever feelings you view the squid, you've accidentally hooked, or hooked with intent, you have on your hands an animal from a most interesting specie.

A relative of the Oyster and Clam with talents that strain the credulity, cephalopods, the class of mullusks containing squid, octopus and cuttlefish are among the swiftest swimmers in the sea, (surpassed only by some of the game fish, and exhibit behavior close to active intelligence.

Squids inhabit every ocean and range in size from fully grown midgets barely the size of a 10 cent piece, to giants of 60 ft. overall, and perhaps larger. They are carnivorous and feed at all depths. To do this some squids have developed one eye larger than the other, each appears to be adapted to different light intensity. Some are squipped with light producing organs or photophores which flash on and off like neons, although no one fully understands the purpose of the lights, it is thought they are used to attract food or a mate.

Propagation of the specie is carried out by means of male and female lacing tentacles together and by means of a specially adapted arm, the male transfers glutinous packets of sperm from his body to under the females mouth. Sometimes the sperm packets are placed inside the female's mantle to wait in readiness for spawning.

The male sperm cells are remarkable in that they could be likened to a closed parachute. When released by the male a rip chord like thread is pulled causing the outer casing to break, turn inside out and expose a cementing material with which to affix the enclosed sperm sac to the female.

After spawning by ejecting here buoyant eggs through her water ejection eunnel, she attaches them to the sea floor. Other females also attach their egg pads (containing roughly 100 eggs per pad) and leave them unattended for 10 days or so to hatch.

The young hatch from eggs varying in size from 1/16" to over 1" in length. In some species, as larvae, in others as tiny editions of adult squid. As he grows he develops the nearest thing to a brain, in all the invertebrates. He also develops most remarkable eye, as efficient, it not more so, and closely resembling the human eye. Young squid prey on anything, as in turn it is preyed on by most everything. He is, however, well equipped by nature with jet thrust, camaflage cells, two built in smoke screens for survival in the sea from all but man.

The usual method of movement for the squid is by fins along the outer margin of its mantle. When alarmed or in pursuit of prey, water is drawn into the outer mantle, giant nerve fibres almost 100 times thicker than mans activate the muscles of the mantle instantly which contract in unison to force water through a nozzle-like opening allowing the animal instat forward or reverse thrust. The usual direction is backwards.

Fast moving and excitable the squid is difficult to keep in captivity making study hard. Most die of shock or suffocate in their own ink. Known as sepia, the ink of squid and its relative the cuttlefish has been used by artists for over 2000 years and was the forerunner of Indian Ink. It is long sting and potent. Writing ink has been made from fossil ink sacs more than 1,000,000 year's old.

Whether you wish to use the squid you've caught as bait or food (Japan uses 650,000 tons yearly as food and fertilizer) or curse it for spraying you with ink and leave it on the jetty or rocks, you have caught a member of a most interesting family.

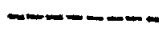
