OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING:

This must be the shortest on record!!- and for good reason too, with a guest speaker to come on such an important subject.

Our first lady (junior) member was introduced to the club, Miss Donna Retallack was welcomed aboard by President George Holman and presented with her badge. Welcome from us all Donna- it looks as though you will soon have company.

Your Editor reported to the meeting that any member who has not paid his dues will be struck off the mailing list as from this month.

Club bylaws:- Clause 3: Subscriptions:

1. Subscriptions for the ensuing year shall become due and payable at the annual meeting in each year.
2. Any member whose subscription is in arrears for three consecutive months shall be deemed to be unfinancial and the Committee, without further notice, will terminate the membership of such person.
3. Any person whose membership has been terminated in accordance with sub clause (2) above, may, at the absolute discretion of the committee be readmitted as an Ordinary Member, upon submission of a duly completed 'Application for Membership' form which must be accompanied by the prescribed nomination fee and current subscription.

During a lull in the instruction period (while Don tried to get the projector to work) we had some fishing reports including one from a visiting club member which is probably another first for the evening! Bob Klein gave a full, detailed report on the change of owners at Quobba. (Cape Cuvier). Meikle Meecham is the new owner and he intends to continue, and expand, the tourist side of things. Going rates are \$3.50 per night in the shearers quarters- slightly more in the cottages.

Bob recounted the report of some 'Hippies' moving into caves at the Red Bluff. After they were persuaded to move on some local salt mine workers moved in and chipped off the wall paintings the hippies left behind. They must have been pretty rough if the mine workers objected to them!

Our instruction period was a report by Dr. B. Hamilton of the ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AUTHORITY. Dr. Hamilton explained what their policy was all about in some detail, setting out how it would be implemented. He then answered a host of questions and it was good to see the other clubs that had accepted our invitation taking part.

We all learned a great deal, the upshot of it all was that the state land forming a large part of the coastal zone would be almost certainly vested under the control of the local shires, to be administered by the shires under guidelines laid down by the E.P.A.

Dr. Hamilton suggested we liaise directly with the shires setting out our point of view and requirements.

I think we got our message across that we seek only access to the beaches for angling, and to be allowed to travel along the beaches seeking out fishing spots. We can all help by NOT driving over the bush, cutting new tracks, it is this constant widening of tracks (that form new sand drifts) that worry the E.P.A. and give all 'off roaders' a badname.

DECEMBER GENERAL MEETING:

December General Meeting will be followed by Supper and a few drinks as usual, in place of instruction period. Members are requested to bring a plate along and help out the social committees funds.

A.A.A. REPORT:

1. A special meeting was held on September 30th to elect the A.A.A.'s nomination for Sportsman of the Year. Our President, George Holman was the S.C.A.C. nominee. There was a field of five from the various clubs. A final ballot reduced this to two; George Brown and Don Schmidt. On the final vote, George Brown won the nomination. The criteria, included National Competition and George Brown had done well in the Veterans Section at Caloundra, apart from his administrative contribution to the A.A.A., so the selection was just one.  
Paul Foster mentioned a 1975 UNESCO report which listed Fishing as the fifth most popular participant sport in the World.
2. The normal monthly meeting was held on October 18th. Firstly I would like to apologise for incorrectly stating that Graham Baskerville had had the State Record for a Lowly Trevally; in fact, Graham's fish had been knocked off by Bob Klein back in May 1975.

Discussion took place on the recent State Rock and Beach Championships. In general it was a very successful event, plenty of fish and a profit of \$200 odd. The only sour note was some bad behaviour on the Friday evening by some who had too much to drink. They apologised to the F.D.O. next morning, but the language and violence caused some complaints from another club. The F.D.O. has the power to disqualify such people. In future, the matter of some reasonable decorum would be stressed to the participating clubs prior to the event.

Our club presented a notice of motion "that separate State Records be kept for fish caught from the shore and fish from the boat! Our rationale for this is the straightforward notion that one cannot compare the fish or the capture in the two instances. The move to combine the records apparently originated from the desire of the combined A.A.A. State Branches to have uniform record keeping. The norm in the East is apparently to combine the records so hence the move of our Branch. Also, I was told if we had stayed out of the combined system we could not have had National records recognised. This last I doubt and will clarify. There is a book-keeping problem if the records are split, and, having the system altered, as it has done a few times, makes nonsense of the records as a History. Nevertheless, there is merit in a split record system.

A record is due to be entered for the catch of a 102 lb Sailfish from the shore- details will follow.

Qantas will give concessions to groups of fifteen up for travel to Competition venues, which is not likely to effect us!

Rolly Handek gave a report on the State Open Dry Casting Competition we are running- all is in hand, thanks to Roy Lundy.

An offer has been made to give technical assistance in the setting up of a monthly A.A.A. Magazine. This came from outside the A.A.A. The project looks promising, a special meeting is to be called to fully discuss the matter, which will be reported next month.

The delegates were interested to hear of the instruction period given by Dr. Bruce Hamilton at our last club meeting. A very brief and crude synopsis was ad-libbed!
