Some of the boys must have had flying lessons prior to drycasting, as three members, Norrie Cross, R. Ellis, and George Holman came many miles from the country to be with us at this venue. This paid off for Norrie Cross as he was the outright winner of the day with a total of 104 points, and the other two boys reduced their handicaps - good casting chaps.

Missed two regular faces this month - R. Jensen and K. Jones, hope it wasn't the 'wog' that kept you away.

In the L.L. distance, the longest cast was made once again by W. Bridger with 375 ft. The outright winner of this event was R. Ellis.

FIELD DAY VENUE - ROTTNEST, SEPTEMBER 1966.

All that can be said is "Can we pick 'em". This of course refers to another weekend of strong Northerly winds and definitely hostile water, which turned many members' faces from green to grey within minutes of leaving Fremantle. The sailors amongst us made for the bar! whilst yours truly and others like me made for the nearest rail!

On arrival at Rottneest, most of the lads decided on the Radar Reef area, and after loading truck, the bus, with the exception of three truck passengers made for the West end. The bus arrived in good time and a concerted stampede to look at the state of the water was on. About 30 minutes later we were still hopefully waiting for the truck, and when it finally put in an appearance, three exhausted passengers informed us that the first truck had broken down which necessitated unloading and reloading onto another truck.

The Radar Reef lads were soon having a go, whilst the rest of us spread out between Strickland Beach, Green Island and Geordie Bay.

For those who are lucky enough to catch fish, here are two recipies, one for Salmon, and one for Barbequed Fish.

SALMON BRIDETTE.

- 1/2 Cup Olive Oil,
- 1 - only 8 lb. Salmon,
- 2 lb Sliced Potatoes
- 1 lb. Brown onions
- Small ti. Tomato Puree
- 1 lb. Tomatoes
- Salt and Pepperto taste
- 1 cu. Light Sherry
- 1 " Vinegar, 1 cup Potato water.
- Salmon cut into 3/4" cutlets.

METHOD. Fry onions and tomatoes in oil, when cooked add water puree, wine and vinegar and oil, and all to large stock pot. Place a layer of partly cooked potatoes, Layer Salmon Cutlets and Layer of mixture, continue until all mixture used up. Bring to boil and simmer for 1/2 hour.

BARBECUED FISH

- 3 desp. Shortening
- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 2 lb. Fish Fillets
- Salt and Fepper to taste
- 1 cup Barbecue sauce
- 3 tabs. Lemon Juice.
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 " Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard.

METHOD. Frypan to 360°, add shortening, fry onion until brown then remove. Cut Fillets into serving size pieces and fry until lightly browned, spread onion over fish season with pepper and salt. Combine barbecue sauce with other ingredients and pour over fish. Cover with lid and simmer at 220-260°, until fish can be flaked easily. Sprinkle with chopped parsely before serving.

FISHING HINTS.

A piece of hose pipe, about 12" long, is ideal for protecting leaders. With the hooks fastened into the rubber at one end, the leaders can be wound through the hose and forced into several small slits, cut with a pocket knife, at the other end so that they will not tangle with one another.

An old tooth brush is excellent for cleaning the gears and other internal parts of your fishing reels.

Sand, in level winding surf reels, causes damage. An old shaving brush will do the trick and save wear and time spent in trying to remove by disassembling the reel.

Chromed rod fittings and reels will remain in perfect condition if coated with a good quality furniture wax and polished.

Wet a soft cloth with acetone and rub the cork on your rod grip with it. All dirt will come off in quick time. Go over it several times for best results.

DRYCASTING RULE No. 10.

Weights, except when used with baits and spinners, must have attached not less than 12" of 1/2" yellow tape. Tape is to be attached by one end, not tied in the middle. (This rule also applies to practice casting, and must be strictly adhered to). Penalty for non-compliance - no score for that cast.
