THE KEWDALE SCHOOL ANGLING CLUB.

In 1966, in order to provide a sphere of interest for a group of children who would never become brilliant, academically, a club period was initiated. It was during one such period that the topic of Angling came up. A child requested that an Angling Club be formed. On investigation it was discovered that a surprising number of children had some type of gear and fished with their parents quite often, thus the Kewdale School Angling Club came into being.

After the election of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, and children began to become familiar with the formality of a meeting, it was decided to write to three or four existing adult clubs as part of the Written English curriculum. The letters requested some assistance as to the availability of suitable fishing areas, care and use of gear and other activities other than actually fishing, for example, dry casting.

An amazing response was received from the Surf Casting and Angling Club, who sent two men out to the school to instruct the children. This had a most stimulating effect on the children, and since that date, regular drycasting days are held in the school.

Drycasting.

Usually on the first Monday afternoon of every month some twenty to thirty children now participate in level-line and double handed accuracy casting. The following is still very good and competition is very keen. A handicap system similar to the Surf Caster's is used. The two double handed accuracy targets vary from forty to seventy feet in casting distance. Incidentally on the last casting day, a girl with a handline won the day! She not only won the accuracy section with 46/60, but won the distance of 114 feet.

Field Day.

It is here that this Junior Club is limited. Due to the children's size and the fact that both boys and girls participate, and to their gear, suitable venues are difficult to find. Children of this age, between nine and twelve years, need constant supervision as they often do not appreciate the dangers associated with angling.

However, we have held three such field days but with very little success. The writer hastens to add that children are very adaptable and if there are no fish, gear is abandoned for sandhill exploration. Even though not successful from a fish capture point of view, everyone usually has a good time. Their gear is very often unsuitable for each angling and parents are not eager to spend large sums on more adequate equipment. Despite these problems, it is intended to hold two more field days this year - when the weather is brighter.

The aims of the club would be summarised thus :-

1. To foster club activities within a school community.
2. To integrate the club's activities with such school academic areas as Oral and Written English, Reading, Social Studies, Elementary Science, Art and Citizenship.
3. To foster in children an existing interest.
4. To endeavour to give the members an opportunity to become competent in the skills of angling.

To a considerable extent these aims are being realised and fulfilled. However, the club has problems and limitations and it is here that the writer wished to pay a sincere tribute to the Surf Casting and Angling Club for its members' generosity and assistance in order to try to overcome some of these problems.

The writer with endeavour to foster such a club in a school no matter where the school may be. There are great possibilities from inter-school participation in the sport, either in theory or practice. Our visiting Superintendent of Schools remarked at a Staff meeting "one of the finest things I have seen in any school in 42 years, is this school's Angling Club."

It is moments like these together with the opportunity to work with young enthusiastic people that make the project well worth the associated worries. T. CORCORAN

THE FIRST MACKERAL.

The Easterly pushes gently, with a trace of chill, against your back, & around your short clad legs, wet from the last swell "lumping" over the reef knee high.

You wonder, as you stand on the reef's edge, in the chill light of the April dawn, what it will be like, when it happens? What will you feel, when that fish, which has brought you 400 mile & involved much expense, takes the Gar-fish bait you keep casting & retrieving, almost mechanically? Will it be as you've heard it, from those who have caught mackerel? Will you remember all you've been told?

As you idly watch the grey-blue water suck back from the reef, to build into the next swell, your mind reflects on the time spent, preparing for this moment. Bending the big 7/0 hooks, wiring on the treble & sharpening "sets". Making wire traces, checking, oiling & doing all the things you've been told by the "Experts".

Time passes, sea birds fly past or wait on the rocks in anticipation of a feast. Perhaps, the sun catches on wings as, out to sea they wheel & dive where big fish are feeding. A Mackerel jumps close in & new excitement grips the Anglers standing at what they hope is the "Hot" spot along the reef.

At first you're not sure what has happened. From idle musing to instant action, takes the mind a split second to register. The screech of the reel clutch paying out line & the rod jumping in your hands, make you forget the swell surging toward you. You have a strike !!

You try to remember what it is you should, or should not do, when the line stops peeling off. Lift the rod tip & strike home the hooks, feel the weight of that fish, which at this moment is the most important thing in your life. Your first Mackerel.

By now, you have the moral support of one or more "Experts" & you settle down to recovering line by pumping the rod, keeping tension on the line by thumbing the spool. "Fingers off that drag". Slowly, so slowly, you gain line, then the fish is off again. Not a long run this time. You go on again as before, retrieving line, wishing that long gaff handled by a supporter, was dragging the fish your fish up the reef's sharp edge.

"He's going right, keep at right angles to him", you hear, so off over the rough reef surface you go, trying to watch everything reef surface, swell coming in, glance at the reel to see how the line is recovering, & wanting very much to see that fish. Then you do!!! Under the water, off the reef's jagged edge, is the most exciting fish shape you've ever seen. cigarshaped & gleaming silver

The Easterly has strengthened as you walk back along the beach & you think how it would be "ballooning", but four or five hours of casting, plus the excitement & battle with the fish now resting on your shoulder, put all else but hot shower, food & a sleep, out of your mind. First, there's the fish to be photographed, weighed, cleaned & put in a freezer.

Maybe, your Mackerel will come from ballooning, or trolling from a boat. However it comes, you won't be likely to forget it.
