METHOD OF MEASUREMENT (Amendment to inside cover):

GARFISH are measured from the tip of the upper jaw to the end of the upper half of the tail; PRAWNS are measured along the body from eye to the tip of the tail; CRAYFISH are measured along the mid-dorsal line from the anterior edge of the pronounced ridge which joins the front edges of the rostral horns immediately posterior to the eyestalks, to the posterior margin of the carapace; CRABS are measured from tip to tip of the posterior margin of carapace spikes; MARRON are measured from the tip of the rostrum to the posterior margin of the carapace along the mid-dorsal line; all other fish are measured from the point of the snout to the end of the tail.

CASTING CAPERS

After contending with some very dirty weather, our worthy President, RON KILDAHL, accumulated enough points (136) to head the sheet for September. RON scored well in the D.H. Acc. and thoroughly deserved his 62/80. JOHN NUICH ran second overall (133 points) on the day with his best score also coming from the D.H. Acc. with 61/80.

For both of these casters the weather seemed ideally suited. To the rest of us it was damn awful. The worst feature was that two thirds (2/3) of the members had neglected to bring wet weather gear (clothes) and consequently anything waterproof was at a premium. Would you believe somebody offered me 40 dollars for my jacket? I thought not.

It was quite amazing to see a dozen of the more astute members sheltering under a piece of canvas about 6' x 4' and ducking out to cast as their turn came. A couple of casters who live reasonably close, made off and came back suitably attired (chickens). Anyway as indicated by the scores RON & JOHN revelled in the conditions, or was it pure tin?

Third on the day was DOUG TALBOT (always gets a mention). DOUG gathered his points (125) over all sections of the days programme and whilst not spectacular was steady.

We started off the morning with the L.L. Open and in this we had a sure fire winner in JOHN DEVITT. JOHN has gone from strength to strength and it is hard to see his distances being bettered. Previous best was RON JOHNSON on the 7th July, 1968 with 504 feet. The new record is 518 feet, but with JOHN casting extremely well this might not last.

Second in this event was BOB TUCKER with 423 feet and its a distance I wouldn't mind achieving myself. BOB should be pleased with this effort, his best for sometime. RUDY LERCH ran third with 419 feet. This distance would be RUDY'S personal best and very satisfying.

There were many instances of good casting and names readily to mind are BARRY REYNOLDS, TREVOR SHAM (improved), BRIAN HANKS (the blue blur), BERTIE PAYNE, BILL MORROW, MIKE DAWSON and BRIAN LEICESTER. Nearly forgot GRAHAM BASKERVILLE with two good casts of 404 and 405 feet.

I always seem to have a pop at someone in this yarn. This month it concerns young HANKSIE. Two casts, two blue blurs of line, you should have seen it; like a haze laying over the oval or like a polluted atmosphere. Each time I noticed BRIAN he was pulling of yards of line off his Alvey and rewinding. (Springy line Brian?)

RON and JOHN as mentioned, finished first and second respectively in the D.H. Acc. and JOHN DEVITT and myself tied for third some distance back on 48/80. (You can see how they handled the conditions). JOHN was unlucky in that his 4th cast didn't register, (a hasty index finger?) I was content to score with the four casts.

Others to cast reasonably well were DOUG TALBOT and BERTIE PAYNE with 46/80. BOB TICHBON faired badly with his second cast and must have been disappointed. BILL UTTING was strangely out of touch, missing with the two longer casts. Next month should see BILL returning to the winning lists, as you can't keep a good caster down. BILL MORROW was also out of touch, and except for his last shot scoring, would have had a miserable total. TREVOR STAM had a complete wipe out and BOB JENSEN was off target.

BILL UTTING knocked off the S.H. Acc. with 24/40, making up slightly for his D.H. Acc. effort. As a result of this casting, BILL drops down from 5th to 9th position in the Top Ten. Second to BILL UTTING was BRIAN LEICESTER with 23/40. Good casting from these two. There was a threeway tie for third spot with RUDY LERCH, JIM STRONG and DOUG TALBOT on 19/40. Following closely were COLIN BUCHANAN, BOB TICHBON and GEORGE HOLMAN.

BARRY REYNOLDS massacred his handicap with a massive 118 reduction. BARRY scored a tidy 63 points under the new system and was a comfortable L.L. Hep winner. This was Barry's first effort with us as he is a comparatively new member. BRIAN HANKS as a result of good casting lost 31 from his handicap, as also did TREVOR STAM who has greatly improved over the past few months. JOHN DEVITT lost 19 for his trouble and also recorded the longest cast of 512 feet (another record). Congrats John.

All in all thirteen members lost varying amounts from handicap, some large, some small, but all are to be congratulated as this shows improvement.

Masn't forget GRAHAM BASKERVILLE - borrowed JOHN DEVITT'S rod and for his third cast sent down 424 feet. We'll probably see GRAHAM with a new rod shortly.

The Top Ten takes on a new perspective with DOUG TALBOT having a 7 point lead over BOB TICHBON (keen rivalry here). RON KILDAHL as a result of his effort moves up one place and RUDY LERCH moves in at the expense of IAN McLENNAN who was absent.

DICK HOLLAND made a welcome reappearance and while not one of his better days did quite a good job. (Good to see you on deck again Dick).

The attendance was only average. The Drycasting is arranged for the members enjoyment as well as to improve casting technique. I would like to see more members obtain at least one leave pass and appear. For those of you who have not participated in the events, I am sure you will enjoy the morning. Many thanks to the members for their assistance to Rudy and myself

particularly the markers, as it sure was wet.
