ROTTNEST ISLAND VENUE - AUGUST 1968

Saturday morning saw a cheerful group of lads aboard the "Panta-Rae" even though the weather conditions were not very promising. There was a total of 43 starters (including two visitors and four juniors).

The trip over to the Island was a little on the rough side, and produced some rather seedy-looking faces among the boys. However upon arrival at the Island, they all brightened up and the boat was soon unloaded and the gear transferred to the waiting trucks.

The trucks set off to Radar, and with the exception of one, which took a wrong turn and went the long way (with you guess who on board), soon had the boys who wished to fish the top end off-loaded, and set off to Bald Hill to deposit the remainder.

Well, old "Hewie" (the weather) stepped in and did his little bit and let go with everything - rain, wind and just about the kitchen sink. The net-result was near impossible fishing conditions and few fish caught for the evening.

Andy Mulgrave and the boys settled in the hut at Radar to pass the evening, (and to watch Terry DeJussing cook his steak), whilst yourstruly prepared his bed alongside the hut. My evening's rest was frequently disturbed by some persistent Quokkas and it wasn't until I had done a good deal of land-based gaffing that the little blighters were discouraged.

The weather had blown itself out a bit by the morning, and though still not good did not hamper the fishing to any extent with the result that a few fish were caught. The weigh-in proved to be a little on the light side compared with the trend to date, only 293 lbs of fish. Hew Hoy Yew caught a Buff Bream 4.1/2 lbs. and the heaviest bag went to Ron McQueen 22 lbs. The Junior section went to G. Ross who is in good form with a bag weighing 26.1/2 lbs.

The trip back was rather pleasant compared with the trip over, and although the creels had only a slight rattle, I think all enjoyed themselves.

LIFE IN THE SEA

The Sun, as the source of all life, was worshipped by the people of such great and ancient civilizations as the Egyptians and Aztec Indians of South America. We are all aware of its influence on the growth of plant matter onland, the source of much of our food material. So also, the sun provides the basis of food life in the sea.

Floating free, in countless billions, in the sunlit areas of the world's oceans, are the diatoms and dino flagellates, the tiny, on celled "grass's" of the sea, or phyto-plankton (phyto for plant and plankton from a greek work planktos, meaning to wander). These minute micr osms produce carbohydrates (sugars and starch) and release oxygen through a process known to Science as photosynthesis. This is achieved by the sun's light and warmth reacting on the chemical, chlorophyl, carried in the cell structure of each "grass" as it is in land based plants. Molecules of carbon dioxide and water are converted into larger molecules of carbohydrates which have stored in them, some of the sun's energy. This, then, is the energy which finds its way, by means of eat and be eaten, to man. Although the process of photosynthesis is known, Science, has, as yet, been unable to duplicate it.

The tiny phytoplankton is eaten by the animal, or zoo-plankton, and thence by small fish, etc. etc. The cycle of life in the sea goes on as it does onland, the debris of life, both plant and animal sinks to the ocean floor, there it decays and is carried by up-willing currents to the sunlit regions, there to enrich with nutrients the sea "grass's". These upwilling currents are mostly located in colder regions of the oceans. The Grand Banks of Newfoundland, the North Sea and along the southern shores of South America, are some of the places where plankton are most numerous. It follows, also that these places are among the best fisheries of the world.

Both diatoms and dino flagellates exist in proportions, staggering to the mind, often reaching 60 million to the quart and multiply at something like 100 million in one month. The diatom reproduces itself by means of division of its pill-box-like body. The two "halves" separate and each half produces another diatom smaller than the parent and so on, until finally a reproductive mass is released and normal sized diatoms form & begin the process over again.

The dino flagellates of literal "whirling whip" (for its method of propelling itself) is considered by some scientists to be lowest on the evolutionary scale. They appear to have features of both vegetable and animal, yet it can be classed as neither. Evolutionists think these creatures, the oldest of life forms, perhaps even the original stock from which present animal and plant life evolved, countless time periods past.

Perhaps the sun, shining on the ancient seas may have given man his start on earth. Whether or not this is so, it is scientific fact, that the sun certainly maintains life in the sea as it does on land.
