PURCHASE OF LOUD HAILER

The Committee decided at its last meeting to purchase a loud hailer for the Club's use. It has a range of 500 - 1000 yards and cost \$37.61 including tax.

REMINDER TO MEMBERS

Members are reminded to take a lot more care when packing their gear and to mark them legibly.

A great deal more care should be taken in handling bait boxes when loading and unloading gear. A good number of these boxes have fallen prey to rough handling, particularly by grabbing hold of the handle at the end, thus ripping it out of the box and also half the side. Even though some of these boxes are loaded to extremes, they are still expensive to replace, so take a little more care chaps. You never know, it may be your bait box!

CHANGE OF VENUE:

At the August General Meeting it was decided to change the October venue from Cervantes to Lucky Bay/Wagoe by nearly a 100 per cent majority.

CASTING CAPERS

Practise finished at 9.00 a.m. and immediately the S.H. Open was conducted. There are two reasons why the Opens are first off. Mainly that everybody is still in one group and makes it easier to organise, the other being, that inevitably there are latecomers and they would be ineligible to compete in the eventtaking place. (Rule 2).

Most members are familiar with the rules under which we operate, however we all have lapses at times and a little boning up on these would help to make the organising a piece of pie. New copies of the Dry Casting Rules in the revised form should be available shortly.

Having consumed copious cups of coffee and a decent breakfast it was a forgone conclusion who the winner was to be - BOB TUCKER. Bob only managed one successful cast - it was enough, 306 ft. This is the new figure to chase gentlemen and a record (in the book). GEORGE HOLMAN was really trying to peg Bob back with two good throws, however George's best (285 ft) wasn't quite up to Bob's standard. GRAHAM BASKERVILLE ran third in this open event with 267 ft which is Graham's best for a considerable time. Closely following these placegetters were TOM CORCORAN with 264 ft, BILL UTTING 253 ft, HEWIE 250 ft and BRIAN LEICESTER with 240 ft. Take a bow members, well done.

Just for the record, the weather for this event was almost perfect, overcast, no rain, very slight wind up high and this gave all members identical conditions.

At the conclusion of this segment, A's - M's went on to the L.L. Hep and the M's - z's went to the accuracy.

Starting off with the two good scoring shots it seemed as if BOB TUCKER was staking a claim to the D.H. Acc. However fate decreed otherwise and the results tell the story. DEADLY DOUG, while not red hot, nevertheless managed to secure the winning score with 51/80. The D.C.O. jagged second spot with 49/80. BRIAN LEICESTER and BILL UTTING tied for third placing here with 48/80. (Not much between these scores).

Others to be mentioned are BOB TICHBON, GRAHAM ROSS and RON KILDAHL with 46/80. Ron had a costly miss after starting nicely. On the other hand BOB started off on the wrong foot but finished strongly. ERIC SULLIVAN (nice to see you along), and ERIC PARKER had 44/80. Only one "bull" was scored during this event and this by the A.D.C.O. on the shorter distance, pulling it in from the rear (nicely judged or r.c.!)

The L.L. Hep was won by HEWIE who secured 54 points but lost 30 from his handicap. (Fair exchange). Casting in this event was well above average with sixteen members reducing their handicaps, ranging from JIM STRONG'S 42 to TOM CORCORAN WITH a reduction of 1. JOHN DEVITT also had 54 points but his penalty cast him points for Sportsman of the Year. JOHN gained the longest cast with an excellent distance of 485 feet which goes in the

book as the new record. (This distance has been exceeded only in the open or in practise).

As verified by handicaps reduced numbers cast to a high standard. Mentioned previously was JIM STRONG whose persistence with the Alvey appears to be paying dividends. TREVOR STAM had his handicap tarnished with 23 knocked off (keep it up Trevor). HAL NEIL sent down three good casts to face a reduction of 27.

BILL MORROW managed to persuade his reel (O.G.R.) to behave and went from strength to strength. Good on you Bill. Conversely was BOB JENSEN with his O.G.R. who fared badly. METHOD OF MEASUREMENT (Amendment to inside cover):

GARFISH are measured from the tip of the upper jaw to the end of the upper half o the tail; prawns are measured along the body from eye to the tip of the tail; CRAYFISH are measured along the mid-dorsal line from the anterior edge of the pronounced ridge which joins the front edges of the rostral horns immediately posterior to the eyestalks, to the posterior margin of the carapace; CRABS are measured from tip to tip of the posterior margin of carapace spikes; MARRON are measured from the tip of the rostrum to the posterior margin of th carapace along the mid-dorsal line; all other fish are measured from the point of the snout to the end of the tail.

USE OF DISTRESS FLARES:

The Committee has considered the use of emergency flares to be used on Field Days and is of the opinion that this matter is acceptable, but that members are responsible for their purchase. Those wishing to delve further into this matter are asked to contact Committeeman, Les Reid, for details of the various types and prices. The colour chosen is GREEN. Red, White and Orange are not to be used as they are International Distress Colours.
