Do you own a camera ? What about a pen and some paper ?

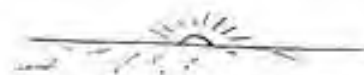

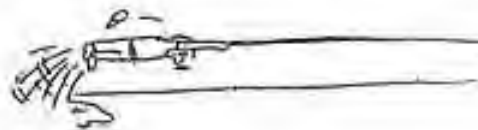

ROTTNEST FIELD DAY REPORT.

Rottneest Island offers the kind of fishing most land based metropolitan anglers can only dream of, with deserted reefs and plenty of fish. Yet despite its close proximity to Perth it remains relatively lightly fished.

The prospect of tangling with Yellowtail Kings, Skippy and other denizens of the deep had ten of us gathered on the Northport Ferry Jetty, ready to be transported to an angling Utopia. The trip over was filled with talk of where we were going to fish and past experiences.

After arriving on the island and making our way to the huts, it was time for a quick bite at the bakery before preparing gear in expectation of some great fishing. By 1.30pm we were climbing off the bus at the west end hut. Most of the group decided to hit Radar Reef and ledges to the east, while Cookie, my mate Cary and I headed in the opposite direction. After checking out the water around the cape, it was obvious, due to the swell, that we were going to need to find something a little more protected. So we thought Cathedral Rocks might be worth a look at.

The hole out in the reef certainly looked calm enough, a little too calm to be honest. Despite this we found ourselves wading out on the reef to give it the once over. Cookie fished a White Bait rig, while Cary and I bait cast Mulies. It wasn't long before Cookie hooked up and started reeling in a Pink Wrasse.

Unfortunately the Pink Wrasse never quite made it, because it was promptly bitten in half by something aggressive with a very sharp teeth. Cookie was flabbergasted and to say we were a little excited by this turn of events was something of an understatement. Baitcasting continued with renewed vigour and within a couple of casts Cary was connected to something that didn't like having a 4/0 hook stuck in its mouth. After a bit of the old pump and wind a 3kg. Tailor (gilled and gutted) was lifted from the water. I kept casting waiting for my rod tip to be slammed down, while Cookie put his eyes back in his head and lobbed out another couple of White Baits. It was the biggest Tailor he'd seen caught at Rottneest in a long time. Unfortunately, despite seeing a couple more fish cruising in the pool, no one hooked up one.

After flogging the water to death, I decided to head out to the outer reef ledge to have a cast. I cast out my Mulie and within a couple of cranks of the handle had a fish on. A Tailor of about a Kilo was slid into the bag and another Mulie was impaled on the hooks. Another cast and a couple of cranks and bang! I was on again. Another Tailor, this one about a kilo and a half. By this time Cary had joined me, but Cookie was back up the cliff sorting out his gear. This was a red hot bite, the likes of which a Tailor addict casts a lot of Mulies between. The action continued until I was one off my bag limit, so I had switched to a 40gm Baitfish replica for a bit of fun and started releasing fish, hoping to hook that really decent one that I thought had to be in the school somewhere. Anywhere a bait was cast was hit by very hungry fish, and as my lure raced along just below the surface the water literally boiled with fish slashing wildly until one hooked up.

Cookie eventually joined us and got his bag limit in no time. We fished for about an hour and a half and the action did not let up. Finally, wondering what was happening over at Radar we trudged off the reef with very heavy overflowing bags.

As it turned out, things had been somewhat quiet on the other side. We arrived at Radar to find only Darryl Halton plugging away, the others still fishing around at Wilson. I didn't catch another fish, but did have a very meaningful run from something (Yellowtail)? before being efficiently busted off.

Sunday morning came around and it was back on the bus, this time heading for Salmon Bay. Cary and I jumped off in the half dark and made our way down through the sand dunes. We rigged up and started fishing, eventually covering every likely looking hole and rip for very little besides undersized Skippy and Silver Bream. Again we wondered what the others were up to because we looked like bombing out. By 12.15 we were doing the rounds picking the rest of the group up. It seemed everyone except Ian Taggart and his boys had had a very average time, so we didn't feel so bad.

At the weigh-in, bags that stood out were Morris's for variety, Darren Batchelors for quantity, Ian Taggart's 1.75kg Skippy and chunky Pike and of course Cary's Tailor.

The only thing wrong with the Rottnest trip is that I have to wait another 8 months for the next one. If you haven't been to Rottnest yet, do yourself a favour and book a spot on the next field day. Thanks to my fellow members for a memorable weekend.

A Few Tips For the Enthused Angler.....

- # Look around before you fish . Try and find possible fish holding features .
- # Normally the best times are early morning , mid afternoon till after dark .
- # In very calm conditions work any area of the wash , no matter how small .
- # Fish light (minimal sinker weight / light line also) and make sure your bait is well presented.
- # Always use berley to sweeten the wash and cast your baits right in underneath.
- # Around rocks and cliffs take extra care and take no chances . Stay alive to enjoy another day of fishing and catch only what you can eat .

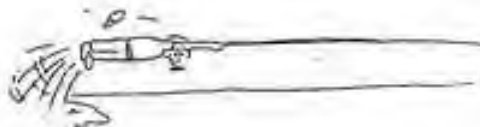

This submission responds to section 23. in particular recommendation 7.

My concern relates to beach access along the seafront of the Leschenault Peninsular.

Recommendation 7 suggests 4wd access south of Belvedere Beach only in accordance with a permit.

I am an active beach angler who visits this area and find that this proposal restrictive.

I seek 4wd access to the whole beach, from the water-line to an unspecified point that is prior to the beginning of any sand hills or vegetation for the whole length of the beach from the Cut to Buffalo Rd car park.

Use of this beach by 4wd's will not cause any form of damage. Any tracks that are left in the sands will be blown over by the wind.

I am concerned that if access to this area is restricted it sets a precendant and there are now less areas to fish, with increasing developments.

I look forward to a favourable result.

EXMOUTH MAY 1997

ANOTHER NORTHERN SAFARI IS IN THE PIPELINE

This latest club excursion will be to sunny Exmouth about 15th to 22nd of May 1997. We are planning a week long trip. For those with the inclination or payola some of us will be enjoying two weeks of sun and fish. We have decided on the Light House caravan park on the western side of the peninsula as the best all round location for our needs. The location is about 17 kms from Exmouth town site and below the light house.

This caravan park is well laid out clean with lots of grass and shade. It would make an ideal spot for the wife and family as the accomodation levels range from budget to high quality. There is a couple of days worth of scenic sites to see round Exmouth so allow time for this. The nearest boat launching ramp to the caravan park is at Tandibidi about 18 kms to the south. The beach fishing on the right tides (high) is good at this time of year. The beaches are coral sand, coral rubble and shallow rock shelves. The average depth at most locations along the shore is only 1 - 2 metres at high tide so you are restricted to fishing the high tide and this may be during the night. The tidal range is about 1.5 metres. For all round versatility and range of fishing a boat is essential. This can range from a tin dinghy 11 ft to your 48 ft Bertram. I will be looking into boat charters for groups but the cost per day is in the order of \$90 to \$110 per head per day. Cost of exclusive charter ranges from \$800 - \$1200 per day. You can run a tinny for \$40 per day ie 20/head and do your own thing. If you are after game fish (Sail fish) then a charter is more appropriate. So far there is an indication that 4 boats will be going up to Exmouth and I am sure for a share of running costs we can organise boat fishing for a good number of members.

Food and drink costs are high so it would pay to take the costly essentials with you. The weather at this time of year is Max 28 - 30^oC. Min is down to 14^oC. The wind data is a little less clear but for May 1996 the 0900 breeze was from the NE at less than 10 knots for 70% of the month. At 1500 it was between NE and SE at up to 12 knots. There was only two days with real onshore breezes of any significance. See tide table for tides but remember that weather conditions ie strong breezes and highs will have a marked influence on the tidal hight.

The type of fish that can be encountered from shore are Queen fish, Blue bones, Perch, Trevally, Spangled Emperor, Chinaman cod. Fishing from a tinny inside the reef for bottom species is very good with variety and size available. Outside the reef there are Tuna, Red Emperor Masherai, Cobia, Trevally and bottom fish ie Coral trout, Rankin cod, Spangled Emperor, Perch, Blue bones. Exmouth is not suitable for ballon fishing as there are no cliff with deep water.

Exmouth is a long days drive of 1280 kilometres north of Perth so some people may wish to break the journey at Caravan

Refer to the following page for accomodation costs. I will be trying to negotiate a group discount for the club. If I can a firm commitment and deposite will be required by January 1997. Accomodation is normally very limited by January so we need to get in early. I will enquire about discount at the two tackle shops in Exmouth.

Different Location

Where and Where do I Fish?



Over the years with the club I have been fortunate to experience and watch how other people managed to catch a lot of fish and some not as much and it made me realise the difference between the varied types of angling techniques. Conversations ranged from reading the beach, length and distance of cast, ability to cast into the exact location of a hole, mobility and in having the proper equipment. All these inferences play a very important part of an anglers success rate especially casting ability, but for this episode let's look at trying to read a particular beach front.



Trying to read a beach your not used to is not really that difficult. What to look for is a gutter, holes and shells etc on the beach and make it a practice to climb a sand dune for a birds eye view. Gutters are formed by outer sand banks that are running parallel to the beach. It is best located on a low tide. Holes are really an "out-let" channel of water moving out to sea, flowing between either broken reefs or sand banks.

The ideal gutter is the one that is narrow enough to cast to, to the outer bank. Look for the different color of water. The darker color of water the deeper the water is and so on.

Do not be afraid to cast your bait in the white wash and also in bays that hold slack water.

Fish live there as well. Fish also are found where the gutter empties out to the ocean. The surge of the ocean (white wash) coming in and out, stirs up the sand and with that their food.

Always use berley as an attractant.

Cast your baits using the clock system that is start at ten o'clock and finish at the two o'clock direction. Time yourself and be prepared to move on, henceforth being more mobile. No fish in 15 minutes move on. Best times to fish are normally Dawn and Dusk but have a Solunar Chart available for yourduring the day usage.

Oh.. and one more thing, sharpen your supposedly sharp hooks.

3 teaspoons olive oil
1 teaspoon butter
3/4 cup fresh orange juice
juice of one lemon

1 tablespoon orange marmalade
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
4 orange slices
4 lemon slice
fresh parsley



In a frying pan, heat butter and oil and saute fillets on both sides over a low heat. Remove from pan and keep warm. Add orange and lemon juice, lemon rind, and marmalade and stir. Boil until liquid is reduced by half. Garnish fish with a slice of lemon and a slice of orange and spoon liquid over fish. garnish with parsley and black pepper.
