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CHAPTER I KOLAS SOUTH INDIA.

"SHOOTING FISH WITH A .22 RIFLE"

Archie was born in the forrest of Southern India, the son of a District Forrest Officer, and from an early age was taught the trick of hunting and fishing and through him I also learned the art of native fishing, how to catch and shoot fish. The Englishman does not know these methods unless shown and taught by someone who knows how.

So on this bright sunny morning we made our way to the village of Kolas and our "Shakire" Asis Khan had already the night before been to the village and made arrangements for divers. These were son's of the local fisherman and their ages ranged between 10-12years. These boys vertually lived in the waters of the Nizam Dam and could swim like fish and were able to remain under water for up to 3-4 minutes at anyone time. These boys were able to dive to the dams floor some 40-60 feet in depth.

On arrival at the village we were met by Asis Khan and four young boys with smiles on their faces. These boys were extremely happy to earn a few pence for their services, the money they earned would help feed their whole family for some time, for their mornings work they would receive 8 annas each that would have 8 pence in English money which was good money in those days.

We left the village and made our way to the Dam. The walls of the Dam stood about 12-18feet above the water level and we would sit on the wall with a native boy on each side, our legs dangling over the edge. At exactly 12 o'clock noon when the sun was directly over head, the big "rhawe" fish swim just under the surface of the water. These young boys are able to see these fish long before us and would point in their direction, their eye sight is equal to a hawk, they seem to have the ability to see under water.

Now to catch our fish we use powerful .22 rifles, I was using a "Savage 5 round Mag", with open sights. Now with open sights, I had to aline the sights up with the nose of the fish and follow the fish as it moved gracefully along, and wait for one of the boys to tell you when the fish was about to rise to the surface and in a split second pokes its nose out of the water and seem to blow bubbles. It is at that instance you fire or he is under the water and the bullet will recochet off the water and miss him.

The native boys sitting along side, just as the big fish pokes his nose through the water, scream "Marro" which in India means "Hit him". You fire and before you can say "Bobs your Uncle" the two boys beside you have dived into the water to retrieve the fish which you have hit between the eyes. After a couple of minutes the boys re-appear holding up a beautiful 30-40lbs Silver Fish and shouting out "Shabash" which means "well done".

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Drifters Deep Sea Angling Club sent in a application for membership to the Association which was also accepted.

Saltwater Angling Club (the old Mullaloo Angling Club) re submitted for membership and was also accepted under the new name into the Association.

Discussion was had on a letter from the Surfcasters re the recent prosecution and fining of an amateur angler who sold fish and also any subsequent situation of a similar kind that may happen and it was decided that this Association take no action, even though the Association received some adverse publicity.

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ROD HAS HOOK, LINE AND THINKER.

You might have imagined that rod and reel fishing was safe from the intrusions of microchip technology. But no. The MYAMMO COMPANY of Osaka, Japan's leading fishing tackle maker, has released the world's first computerised fishing rod. For the complet computer angler the firm's top - of - the - range Miya Epoch 1000 is equipped with a 8 - bit microcomputer, more than 150m of 24kg breaking strain line and a 12 volt 330 rpm motor that can hook and land a 95kg fish with ease. The reel has 10 different controls which monitor position of bait, winding speed, drag, overload and other variables. It can be programmed to alter depth settings and winds the fish in to the precise distance for gaffing or netting. If the modern fisherman is really lazy, the whole contraption can be operated by remote control from bunk or cabin. Cost : around \$600.

"NOT THIS TRIP"

Ben, Gordon, Jason and Robert and the trip to Cape Cuvier.

It was 4 weeks away from the time of departure January 17th, when 4 of the most inexperienced, supa keen, supa fit fisherman had made there plans.

The time was 2.00a.m. on a hottish Thursday morning when everyone arrived at Roberts place. Moments later we all decided that there wasn't a better time to depart for our fishing trip. Imagine the seen a great looking H.T. Sedan with four hairy yobbo's reciding within, a camper with so much gear in it, it was bulging at the seams. Travelling at top speed 45miles per hour there was a strong head wind. Twelve hours later we arrived in Carnarvon \$80.00 poorer and about about 2 dozen cans less. Ben was bragging on the way out there how he was going to jump in with all his diving gear and literally rape the carnie waters of all it's treasures, but by the time we reached the end of that bloody 1 mile jetty he had changed his mind, because of these few marine species (1) 7 FR Sea Snakes, 3 or 4 large Turtles who might mistaken him for a strand of black seaweed or the sharks - yea teeth jaws of death, so diving was out of the question.

After a few minutes of study we saw shat we were looking for yes a large silver flash that leaps from the water, Ben said it's a Tuna. So after that, the four of us made record time in returning back to the car and finding a caravan park to stay in.

Three quarters of an hour past and we were back on that bloody 1 mile jetty, hoping that the fish were still on the bite. Jason and Ben were fishing on the left side while Gordon and Rob fished on the other side. Robert was using a lure, spinning for anything that was willing to take the plunge, 1/2 a dozen casts later he had a strike but no hook up it was a small mackeral. Gordon had caught the first fish of size but we didn't know what it was until now (Black Trevally). Ben and Jason were taken by suprise by something that had picked both line up and dragging them up the jetty and finally snapping them off between the pillons, good bye you unsociable thing said Ben. That was enough for the day so we went back to camp. Tomorrow is a new day said Jason.

We were up early that morning and our fishing began with a start near the Blow holes where there were hundreds of birds feeding in a frenzy, just out of our range by 30-40 metres. One hour later we made a move further up the coast finding a suitable spot we made another effort, Ben and Jason were losing tackle like it was dirt cheap and not all of it was theirs, Robert good float he's had for years and years, Ben lost first cast. We retired that day early with an expensive effort without a fish. Back to the caravan park that home for genile fisherman or that's what it was turning into, we cleaned the fishing gear ready for our next effort.

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After that we decided on some R & R, yes you quest it, down to the local Disco for a drop or two and a bit of limbering up on the dance floor. So there we stood the magnificent four each with a ale in hand, within minutes one of us was approached by a female member, of one of the local tribes (lucky Gordon). Several times during the evening she approached him saying I want you I need you, but he kept stalling her by saying "later", the nights young. Later Ben and Robert decided to leave him and Jason to her. It must of been hard for Jason not even once was he approached. Closing time was soon upon us, Ben & Jason & Robert let Gordon leave first knowing what was about to happen, outside she grabbed Gordon with a grip of death, there must of been one hundred you ladies (tribal) sitting on the otherside saying Lyn's got a white feller. In deperation Gordon said Lyn you like mob jobs. Lyn let go saying she would miss her bus. The next day we decided to leave and head for safe territory Sharks Bay. Arriving there we set up camp and drove to the local to find out the best spots to fish. Within five minutes of taking up our places at the bar we spotted an elderly gent sitting at the other end and he looked as if he would know of the best spots to fish, so we sent Jason chief mediator to find out all he could. Twenty minutes later he rejoined us and said No boat No fish. Determined to prove the elderly gent wrong Ben and Robert made for one spot that they were told about only to find it was a bloody long way down to it. Ben and Robert proceeded on down, the sharp decent to fish for two hours. Without fish, Noticing the weather changing rapidly they packed up. On arriving back at camp they found out that Shark's Bay was on red alert (Cyclone coming).

The four of us packed that camper in a matter of minutes and headed for Kalbarri. Three hours later we were at Kalbarri where we meet some friends who were having several good catches of fish.

Gordon "Lover Extraordinaire" saw two young ladies and said no more fishing for him. The next morning Ben went to Eagle Gorge and to our surprise brought back fish and we had them for breakfast.

We just sat around the rest of the day enjoying the rest. Ben, Robert and Gordon had the best of the fish caught, with several fights from large fish which they won, stripping the gears in one reel.

Home, we may not of caught heaps of fish but a good time was had by all, that's the main thing.
