Kalbarri House For Rent.

The Club has a house in Kalbarri. The house is situated close to the river, beaches and town. Busselton Jetty Update

The new observatory is sitting on the bottom at Busselton Jetty, but it will be some time before it's completed and open to the public. It also means the push for the fishing exclusion zone at the end of the Jetty will hot up.

The Busselton Shire's web site has an item in the minutes of the Council meeting 26 February www.busselton.wa.gov.au/minutes/council/c

C0302/093 Cr Evans Cr Shervington (En Bloc One);

- 1. That Council advertise to invite written public submissions for the proposal for a clearly marked and signed Habitat Protection Zone at the seaward end of the Busselton Jetty being the final 293 metres of the jetty 100 metres east and west of this entire section of jetty and 100 metres north of the jetty's northern end. The advertisement is to contain background on the proposal.
- 2. That the invitation calling for public submissions be advertised for a period of 42 days and that a public workshop be held concurrently facilitated by Council and to be attended by representatives of recreational fishers the Busselton Jetty Management Committee any interested members of the public and by Department of Fisheries advisors. The workshop is to enable recorded public statements to be made questions asked and answers given which can be taken into account by Council when considering the matter.
- 3. That the outcomes from the submissions and workshop are to be reported back to Council for consideration of support for an application to the Department of Fisheries for the Habitat Protection Zone. Carried 8/0

They are calling for a "Habitat Protection Zone" - but they really want no fishing at all in the final 293 metres of the jetty, and 100 metres east west and north of this part.

I understand that only the Fisheries Department can declare a "Fish Habitat Protection Area" (FHPA) and they set the limits. A FHPA does NOT have to exclude ALL forms of fishing - Cottesloe has a FHPA but recreational line fishing is still allowed, (with some limitations.)

At least the Shire will advertise and consult the public. Let's hope they listen to the points against as well as those for the size of the FHPA they are asking for.

Recorders Report.

The Cobia entered into section 15 of the Open Competition by John was captured at Quobba Station using Squid bait. John used a Penn 850 spinning reel with braid line. This fish eclipses his earlier 17 kg Cobia. John hooked up to some larger Cobia while at Quobba but was unable to subdue them. John is aiming to achieve a capture of a Cobia around the 25 kg mark. The Cobia goes into the free choice section of the Grand Masters category.

The Club record for a Cobia currently stands at 33.0kg caught by Allan Carr at Steep Point on 2 October 1979 on a mulie. That fish was 1.36 metres long. The State record is 61.5kg caught by Peter Goulding at Monkey Mia on 9 July 1985 - some cobia!

I think a short talk at the April General Meeting by John on the art of locating and capturing Cobia on a regular basis would be of great interest to all members. I am yet to land my first Cobia after about 30 trips to the NW. Damien D'Mello was John's partner for these trips to Quobba. Congratulations John, well done.

Possible Dry Casting Rule Changes.

The following questions have been raised by Dry Casting Officer, Bob Henderson, and the following possible changes have been suggested. This list was written before the lengthy discussions about a few aspects of the dry casting rules at the March Committee meeting, and some changes may not be made for this coming competition year. Details will be confirmed and changes moved at the April General Meeting.

These are not formal notices of motion. Notices of motion aren't required to change our Competition Rules, but any change normally must apply for the whole competition year, so needs to be done at or before the April General Meeting.

3.2.10 SAFETY OF MARKERS AND OTHERS. Add "Any caster wishing to use a pendulum or backwards style casting action, must notify the Dry Casting Officer prior to commencement of any dry casting event."

3.3.1 DOUBLE HANDED EQUIPMENT. Add "A maximum weight of 112 grams is allowed."

3.3.2 SINGLE HANDED EQUIPMENT. Add "A maximum weight of 56 grams is allowed. Maximum length of rod allowed is 2.4 metres."

Why are Single handed and open Single handed events open slather to weights used (eg 3.4.2 in open event) Set a limit on weight for level playing field.

- 3.3.7 PLASTIC TUBE AND POMPOMS. Delete "Colour is optional." Add "Colour must be flouro pink."
- 3.3.9 ACCURACY TARGETS. Delete "normally yellow". Add "Must be a distinctive colour (flouro pink)"
- 3.8.1 TOP TEN CASTERS. Question. Just where does the so called attendance points 3.8.3 ATTENDANCE POINTS go to in this section? Do we penalise a caster who is unable to attend the general meeting?.
- 3.8.2 CASTER OF THE YEAR POINTS. Change to "Highest Overall Points Score."
- 3.8.3 ATTENDANCE POINTS. Question. Why are these given and where do they go?
- 6.2 POINTS FOR DRY CASTING DAYS (Sportsperson of the Year). Top Ten as determined by rule 3.8.1, 10 1 points. Add "For each Casting Section". Plus for all the following, add Section Winner, except Open events.

AAA Report.

The following is a summary of a letter AAA has sent to the Minister for Fisheries about the management of professional finfish fisheries.

There is an anomaly because a management plan is not yet ready for the professional finfish fishing sector, but a new management plan will take effect for Recreational Fishers from 1 July, 2003.

Fisheries Department have only recently started to look at how they were proposing to implement management of the professional sector, and the Minister has yet to announce the two committees to oversee this. AAA believes these actions should have happened early in 2001 at the time of the announcement of the Toohey investigation.

A serious concern is that fish which will not be caught by Recreational Anglers because of the changes proposed commencing 1 July will be taken by the professional fishers and there will be no nett change to the quantity of fish caught. Recreational fishers will be forced to exercise restraint, but professional fishers will be free to catch whatever they like.

AAA believes that if it is important to introduce changes for recreational catches on 1 July, then it is equally important that professional catches be properly controlled from the same date. AAA urges that significant and effective controls on professional finfish catches be introduced by that date.

If this is not possible, then AAA thinks in the interest of the Australian tradition of a "fair go", that the Minister should delay the implementation of the changes in management of the recreational sector until the professional finfish management for a significant number of the species shared with recreational fishers is ready to be implemented.

If this is not done, then the view will be reinforced that the Government is taking the "soft option" of putting controls on recreational catches but not introducing any effective controls on professional catches.

Cookie's Firewood/Fishing Trip

This little parable start off several weeks ago when I asked the renowned 'Cookie' if I could borrow his trailer to go down to Bluff Creek. Even with the mighty Nissan, space for three people and their luggage/fishing gear was a little short, so the request was put.

Here the problem/story started. Cookie was planning to 'go bush' and collect some firewood in preparation for the forthcoming winter months. According to his schedule, this was 'about the only time he could go and get the wood' unless he had some help during the week. I opened my mouth and changed feet. "Yep. I could arrange that for you Cookie. Just let me use the trailer.... Please." So the trailer went down to a wet and windy Bluff Creek weekend.

A week or so later I thought, well I had better keep my promise to Cookie, so I made the necessary phone call and informed him of my availability on Friday 14 March. I also said that my father Harold would assist in locating suitable 'dead wood' and would cut it up for him. I suggested that we could take some fishing gear and have a go at catching some trout while we down there. You could almost see the smile over the phone.

Monday 10 March, I again rang Cookie to make sure everything was still OK. "WHAT. I thought that was next week" was the response I received. A little persuasion here and there and the time was set for pick up at Cookie's at 4:45 am on Friday 14th. An invitation was also extended to John Romano as he was not working (and an extra hand loading firewood would be handy).

On Friday morning at 4:35 am, John arrived at my house and we loaded his fishing gear in my car. Around the corner to Cookie's place and all appeared to be in darkness. Not so. The front door opened and we were greeted by Hunter, Cookie's dog. He must have thought he was coming with us as he had a huge grin (doggy style) on his face. Cookie came out and called Hunter back in, telling him he wasn't going. You could see the poor dog's face fall like a brick. Not happy Cookie....

We hooked the trailer up, Cookie swallowed the last mouthful of his coffee, and we were mobile. A short fuel stop at the Shell just north of Mandurah, and we arrived at the Drakes Brook weir just as the sun was poking its head over the hills. Mind you, Cookie couldn't get over the number of kangaroos in the two kilometres of road between the Waroona town site and the weir. Something about being in 'plague proportions' I think he said, and said,

I parked the vehicle just off a gravel road and walked down to the waters edge with "a little chum", a small container of 'fish pellets'. The fish in the Drakes Brook weir are all hatchery bred and stocked there for fishing purposes. They still respond to fish pellets in the water. We were situated on the western side of the weir with a fresh easterly wind blowing into our faces. An indicator of the warmth in the rest of the day to come.

We all set up our little 'flick rods' and settled down to wait for the fish to bite. After about half an hour, with no takers, I decided to try my fly rod, even though I knew I would have a battle with the wind. A six weight fly rod in 15 knot winds is just a tad difficult to control. I moved down wind from Cookie and John and set myself so that the wind would blow the fly line away from me rather than tie me in knots. I chose a fly with a gold bead head as I thought it would be a little more attractive with the glisten on it.

My first attempt drew some attention as I felt a couple of little taps, but didn't succeed in a hook up. I tried the same area again and got a solid hit. Hook up... The first fish of the day. A solid little Redfin Perch of about 100 grams.

We stayed at the weir until about 8:30 am, then headed on down to my parents' place at Yarloop. Upon arrival we were greeted by a note on the kitchen bench telling us that Harold had already gone to cut the wood and where he was doing it. A guick introduction of Cookie and John to my mother, then back into the car and off we went.

We located Harold sitting astride his chain saw with a file in hand, sharpening the chain. Behind him was a large pile of freshly cut firewood. The glow from the smile on Cookie's face was such that both John and I had to put our sunglasses back on.

After introductions and a half hour wait while Cookie and Harold discussed the relevant merits of different types of chain saws, we got around to loading the trailer. Twenty minutes or so of effort saw the trailer loaded to the hilt. "Well that's the quickest load of wood I have ever got" was Cookie's comment.

Back into town to my parents place we went to be greeted by my mother Ruth and a fresh batch of 'Cheese and something' muffins. As Cookie had never tasted Redfin Perch, I cleaned/filleted the one I had caught and cooked it up for him. Next time you see Cookie, ask him what he thought of it.

I then made a phone call to an old school chum and got his permission to go up a little creek on his property and try again for some trout. He stated that it was an irrigation day and that the creek was high and flowing fast. He wasn't sure we could catch anything the way it was but had permission to try. We changed the way we had our rods rigged, unhooked the trailer from the vehicle, and headed off.

At this time I think it prudent to mention that Cookie had only ever seen pictures of Rainbow Trout. He had never caught one or seen one before.

As we arrived at 'The Blackberry Patch' on the Brook, we were greeted by a large black feral sow and a litter of about eight piglets, none of which would have been any taller than about 25 centimetres. They were accompanied by another slightly larger pig. Cookie's exclamation of "Even I could hit them that close" sent them scurrying of downstream.

I explained to John and Cookie how to go about catching trout in the situation with the gear they had. John was happy to walk upstream until he got to our vehicle. I informed him that it would be parked on a flat in 'The Bend' of the brook about a kilometre or so distant.

Cookie and I arrived at 'The Bend' to be greeted by another sow with a litter of about six piglets, all smaller than the first mob and also with another bigger pig. This group took off upstream. Cookie was starting to get worried at the numbers of feral pigs around.

I showed Cookie the water and suggested he get started. I then went into the bend and floated my little Rapala minnow (silver and blue) past a sunken log before holding it in the flow so it swam out and away from the log. I saw the fish only as it turned and the silver flash gave away its presence. 'Bugger. Missed.'

"Hey. Is this thing a trout?" Cookie walked up to me holding a wild rainbow trout just legal size and wearing a grin a Cheshire cat would be proud to display. It must have taken him all of about thirty seconds to catch it. Cookie had first blood. His little trout was a yearling I would guess but a solid little fish about 150 grams. He caught it on a red ¼ ounce 'Marble Spinner'.

The little creek we fished in is one of very few that is not 'stocked'. The fish here are all wild bred as the owners of the two properties the creek flows through protect the access in order to keep 'pillagers' out. It is a privilege to be permitted access.

We then moved upstream a short distance to the bottom of a good riffle where I again let my minnow drift down underneath a log before slowly moving it back towards me. It hadn't moved more than a metre when bang, a solid hit and hook up. With the light line and lighter drag settings, it took a couple of minutes in the fast flowing water to get the fish to the edge of the creek. A male Rainbow of about 350 grams. A good fish. Cookie came up and commented on the colourations it displayed, especially the pink sides and the large gilgie that it disgorged when picked up.

I relocated to the deep pool at the start of the riffle and repeated the process again. This time the minnow was no more than a metre from my feet and I watched as a hen trout of similar size to my first came up and swallowed the minnow. She decided to play around and performed several aerial leaps before submitting. Unfortunately, due to the depth she had swallowed the lure, I could not release her. She was injured too much.

So the day went on and we walked upstream for several hundred metres more, careful of the time as we had promised to be back at my parents for lunch by 1:30 pm. Cookie and I returned to the car to be met by John who stated that he had seen good fish but hadn't caught one.

As it was very hot in the valley with no wind getting to us, I stripped off and plunged into the cool water for a swim. A voice was heard to comment "That's not a pretty sight". Who said it, I'm still not sure.

We returned to my parents via the local pub (to get ice to put on the fish) and sat down to a hearty meal before returning to Perth. Cookie's trailer load of wood was unhitched at his place and we were back at my house by 5:40 pm.

A good time was had by all and I must say the camaraderie was excellent.

March 2003 Field Day, Bluff Creek.

Give the Dry Casting Markers a Go!

So it would <u>really help</u> the markers in the distance events if you point in the general direction of where the weight landed, and wave the markers to move further away or closer in as required.
