

Markers

Please do NOT throw the casting rigs off the court or to the side after marking. This often causes the rigs to roll and tangle and that stops any swivel from working, especially with artificial bait rigs. All that is required is to make sure the rig is not stuck in the ground or tangled and just place it flat on the ground for the caster to wind in. A plea from an Alvey user who needs that swivel to work to let the twist get out of the line.



Bluff is somewhere I hadn't heard about before joining the club and this is probably due to me usually heading to spots north of Perth for most of my fishing adventures. Well I can safely say now that Bluff is a spot I would love to return to again and makes me wonder what other great spots I need to discover on the south coast.

I joined the convoy for the trip down there and it was an enjoyable trip down. There was a bit of difficulty on the beach with a camper trailer, as the beach seemed to be its softest on our first day. One thing I noticed on the beach was the way the sand squeaked as the car tyres went over it, being that the sand was so fine and pure.

After setting up camp I went for a look around and noticed the huge gutter that ran the length of the beach that looked like a fisher person's paradise. This was broken up with a few rocky structures that also looked pretty interesting. I decided not to fish until the competition started so I could conserve a bit of energy and bait. The next morning after a sleep in and a bit more of a look around it was soon lunchtime and time to sign on.

I think everyone will agree it was a memorable time with beautiful conditions and some good fish caught and lost with all of us fishing side by side, and I guess in essence this is what club fishing is all about. Recfishwest report

Commonwealth Marine Parks campaign

A decision from the Commonwealth government about bioregional marine planning in the South-West is expected by the end of March or early April. Recfishwest undertook a media campaign on Friday 18 February to add balance to the marine park debate. Some high profile sports stars and a fishing clinic at Matilda Bay were part of this targeted campaign. The media release and associated event generated considerable media attention. Media coverage on radio, television and print significantly raised the public profile of the issue.

This received coverage on:

- Channels Ten and Nine,
- Packages on WIN and GWN TV news,
- · A great article in Saturday's West,
- A live interview with Paul Murray on 6PR's morning show.
- ABC radio news story in 12 noon bulletin and throughout afternoon.
- Busselton Dunsborough Times article
- Bunbury Newspaper article
- Article in The Australian Newspaper
- Article in Sunday Times a couple of weeks ago.

RFW has received some good feedback from Recfishwest members and strong support for their position on this issue.

"Simplification" of recreational fishing rules and possession limits

Delegates may have seen the report in the Sunday Times about this, which said:-

WA's Department of Fisheries chief executive Stuart Smith has admitted the state's recreational fishing rules are a tangled web and has promised sweeping changes within the year. He said bag limits and catch sizes varied wildly across WA and he planned to bring in

uniform rules, cutting red tape and the minefield of regulations....He said the overhaul would also crack down on fishermen who "fill up a freezer" and plunder fish stocks. Fisheries officers are preparing a discussion paper on cutting the red tape and it will be put out for public comment within months.

RFW has been aware of this for some time. This is potentially a very divisive issue, which could turn into a no win situation. This topic and how to interact with the Dept of Fisheries has been the cause of considerable difficulties between me and the RFW paid staff. My background includes the interactions with these same Dept of Fisheries people over the 2003 introduction of the current rules. See the "Submissions" page on the AAAWA website http://www.aaawa.iinet.net.au/SubmissionsMain.html I have concerns that the "consultation" will not be what is expected or required.

Separately, the Department is proposing to tighten up on transporting fish from the Abrolhos Islands, saying:- "At present a person may accumulate up to their possession limit of finfish while staying at the Abrolhos Islands. Under current legislation, they may also transport fish back to the mainland unaccompanied if consigned through a "courier business" such as a carrier boat or commercial aircraft. In such cases the person may then commence accumulating their possession limit of finfish once again. I am therefore seeking RFW's comments on a proposal to require all persons wanting to transport recreationally caught finfish (within their possession limit) from the Abrolhos Islands to personally accompany those consignments."

RFW has agreed to this proposal for the Abrolhos and suggested that similar provisions should apply State wide.

Recfishwest website

Members may recall my report in the October Reel Talk, saying:- "The Recfishwest website http://www.recfishwest.org.au/ has been completely rearranged under a contract issued by Recfishwest staff to a local web developer and with content provided by RFW staff. The contract relied on and left many decisions to the web developer. There have been long delays and there are still many items which are not complete, do not work consistently or need considerable further development or rework. My several years' involvement with the development of and adding new content of the RFW website has now ended. I have resigned from the position of Chairman of the RFW Communications and Membership Committee for 2009/2010"

Six months have now gone by since the revised website was placed online, with little real change or improvement. Having a professional website is a critical part of communications with the fishing and other public.

I have provided detailed written summaries of the major problems, including:-

- about 2/3 of hits or attempts to access material from the RFW site fails to find the file, and the number of failed hits is about 5 times the number of pages successfully displayed;
- the single search box does not work for most browsers, only works for Internet Explorer 8;
- Google and other search engines cannot "see" many of the pages, and so cannot list them when people search;
- virtually all links used in all fishing forums and documents in the past several years are now dead, due to changes in the link naming for the equivalent pages, if they exist on the new site, and most don't. The only link which has remained unchanged is the home page. Worse, when such a dead link is clicked, a very unhelpful screen was displayed, leaving it up to the user to work out what to do next. Faced with this, most users will simply abandon their attempt to access the linked material. Some time around 14 March, these dead links have been redirected to the Home page, but with problems with the site search this is still a very unacceptable outcome.
- A requirement was the ability to run comprehensive polls with multiple questions and graded responses with options of free form comments, and comprehensive presentation of the results. Instead the poll on the home page has only a single simplistic Yes/No question, does not have a link to any background information relevant to the question, the

voting results are not visible except to the computers and browser on which someone has actually voted, a person who has voted can vote again using another browser on the same computer, and/or can clear the cookie and vote again using the same browser, only one poll can run at a time, (apparently), and there is no link in the poll box to the results of earlier polls.

• The important Marine Parks page has been scrambled since early December, and has not been restored from a backup, or rewritten.

Recfishwest support for fish frame donation program

The Department of Fisheries has recently ramped up its fish frame collection program. Recfishwest has received a letter requesting support and assistance in promoting this program.

Fish frame donation is utilised in developing 'fishery independent' analysis of fish stock status. The Department of Fisheries would like Recfishwest to take up a greater role in the program and form a partnership to deliver a more united front to the fishing public.

Young Future Leaders.

Recfishwest held the "Young Future Leaders in Recreational Fishing" project in early March 2011 at the Abrolhos Islands. It was designed to give younger Western Australians a voice and opportunity to be involved in maintaining the quality of our State's recreational fishing future, and according to reports, the participants are exceptional young people and the course was a great success.

Fishing for herring from the shore

Herring are a very important recreational fish on the West and South Coasts of Western Australia. With autumn and winter coming on, herring usually become more common.

Herring are great fish to catch on light gear such as a small single handed rod and 2 or 3kg line. They are speedy, acrobatic and strong, often jumping out of the water when hooked.

Australian Herring (Arripis georgianus) and juvenile Australian salmon (Arripis truttaceus) in Western Australia are similar in appearance and often confused. That's not surprising, since they are related species. Both species have rows of golden or light brown spots on their sides and back.



Australian Herring. Note the large eye.

Herring:- have a large yellow and black eye, black tips to the tail fins, clear pectoral fins, and rough scales.

Herring size limit:- none. Bag limit (current as at March 2011):- 30 per day combined in the "Low Risk" category in the West Coast Region, 40 per day combined in the "Low Risk" category in the South Coast Region.



Compare: - juvenile Australian Salmon (left) and adult Australian Herring (right).

Juvenile salmon:- are very similar and are sometimes confused with herring, but have a smaller eye, no black tips on the tail, pectoral fins tending to be yellow, and smooth scales.

Salmon minimum size limit:- 30 cm. Salmon bag limits (current as at March 2011):- 4 salmon per day within an overall 12 fish per day bag limit of "Medium Risk" category in the West Coast region. 4 salmon per day within an overall limit of 16 fish per day bag limit for "Medium

Risk" category fish in the South Coast region. Check the Fisheries Western Australian Fishing Guides for any changes.

Where:- Herring can be found everywhere on the lower west and south coasts, in estuaries, near reefs, reef holes, beaches, rock walls, and jetties. Herring are easily attracted with berley.

When:- Herring can bite well at any time of the day or night. Early morning is sometimes better, because the bites can taper off if they are fed with too much berley. But like all fish, sometimes they are just not very interested in feeding. Then you might need to tempt them with the right type and size of bait or lure.

Seasons:- Years ago, herring were a seasonal fish on the West Coast, with autumn and winter the best times and much fewer fish in late spring and summer. In recent years, herring can be caught all year round if you know how to fish for them.

Baits:- Maggots (sometimes called "wogs"), whitebait, bluebait, pieces of mulie (pilchard) or other fish, squid, octopus, prawn, red meat, shellfish, chicken, any of the artificial baits cut to a suitable size. Lures:- Herring really love small chrome or gold lures, small soft plastic lures, flashy flies, flouro green or white tubing.

Vary the speed of retrieve, because if a herring really wants your lure, you can't wind fast enough to pull it out of its mouth, and they can zip through the water at amazing speeds.

Herring are expert at throwing off weighted metal lures when they jump out of the water. If you land one in five hook ups with a weighted lure, you're doing well. The good thing is, often there's a queue of other herring after that lure.

Berley:- Pollard, fish oil, minced up fish scraps, mashed up mulies, tinned sardines, etc. Use little and often. Herring will come right to your feet in 30 cm or less of water. Cast shorter each time and bring them closer to you. Throw a little burley close in. You'll see the herring darting around and making splashes on the surface as they take the burley.

Hooks:- For whitebait or bluebait:- a gang of three Limerick or Tarpon size 6 to 2 depending on the size of bait. Make sure they are sharp. For other baits size 8 to 4 Beak, Suicide, wide gap or similar hook type. If herring are fussy, go to smaller hooks and smaller baits.

Traces:- (The line between the weight and the hook) Herring sometimes refuse to bite on short and heavy traces. Use 2 to 3 kg line, 1 to 2 metres long behind a burley cage or blob. Sure, it might wear and you might snap it, but you will get a lot more bites, and there's the bonus of garfish if they are around.


Bite:- Herring often bite hard and hook themselves, particularly when you are moving the bait. At other times they are fussier. In calm conditions, one way is to just watch the line and you'll see the bites or see the line tighten. Just tighten the line without jerking and you'll feel the weight of the fish.

Sinkers:- Use the smallest / lightest sinker you can cast or will take the bait down to the fish. Berley herring in close and try using no sinker at all. Sometimes a cast of 3 metres is enough.


Blobs:- (Floats) Solid or with a hole for packing with burley.

Use a heavy line through the blob to avoid break offs due to wear on the line, tied to rings or swivels.

Burley blob (float) and bait or lure rig >>




Rigging a blob (float). Main line to the left, bait to the right. The bead is to protect the knot from damage and break offs after repeated casting.




Burley Cages:- Sinking or floating, wire or plastic.

Berley cage and bait rig >>










Ganged hooks "Limerick" type on top, stronger

<u>Double whitebait or bluebait rig.</u> From page 16, March 2010 Reel Talk. This is ideal for fishing for herring or skippy. Uses the dropper loop knot in the article "How to tie a dropper loop knot", page 15 of the March 2010 Reel Talk.

This rig can be cast a country mile with a reasonable sized sinker even in windy conditions.



I suggest use about 8 to 10kg trace line for this rig if you intend to use it with larger sinkers. All the stress of casting the weight is on those two dropper loop knots, and don't forget Salmon love whitebait, so a rig made with light line may let you down if you hook a good fish.

Herring fishing "Secrets"

- 1. Fine, light, long traces will give many more bites compared to using shorter or heavier traces. Use clear nylon or even fluorocarbon leaders when they are really fussy.
- 2. Burley, little and often. Intelligent use will make all the difference.
- 3. The "secrets" of using whitebait and bluebait without them going mushy and falling off the hooks are to make sure they are fresh, and add a handful of dry pollard after they have thawed, dip in fish oil for extra smell.
- 4. There are many ways to catch herring, but sometimes they are fussy. If someone else is catching herring but you are not, check the rig, bait and fishing technique being used by them, and do the same. Simple.

And when you have caught your herring, make sure you look after them properly to get the best out of these delicious small fish.
