John Lee Reports

Hi club members,

Although I rarely attend club events these days, I still like to read about what club members are up to.

Perhaps I should first introduce, or rather re-introduce, myself - my name is John Lee and to new members it wouldn't mean a thing. I guess I fit into the category of "apathetic lazy bugger", who likes to keep in touch, but contribute nothing in return to the clubs' welfare.

I really have no excuse when I look at the likes of George & Ric, who had been in the club for years when I joined in 1973 and are still tireless workers to this day.

Well, I have resolved to redress this deficiency in the new year, by trying to attend functions where ever possible and, starting with this article, I hope to contribute more to the Reel Talk.

Firstly, a few things I believe in - and if you wish to criticize, please do; what follows is just my opinion.

I have always been a conservationist at heart and was not unhappy when, in 1974, Surfcasters introduced an experimental restrictive bag limit.

In putting forward his resolution, for the best four of each species rule, the club president (Tom Corcoran) showed remarkable foresight and sadly, although the rule was short lived (one year), the events of that year were a portent of things to come.

Notwithstanding that the Fisheries Dept. has now introduced bag limits, it is now almost impossible (with the exception of Herring and perhaps Salmon) for the responsible shore fisherman to achieve the bag limit, let alone exceed it.

I cite as examples of marine creatures that came close to extinction - the Blue Groper and the freshwater Lobster (Marron) - admittedly the Marron is now an artificially stocked creature and is not in imminent danger.

However, you only have to look at the way mature Marron drop away in size after the first two weeks of the season, to see what would happen if there were no bag or size limits. Blue Groper in my opinion are in grave peril - their curiosity allows skin divers to approach within a few feet.

The biggest worry for shore fisherman is Tailor - although they are not yet in grave danger, just consider the number of anglers chasing them and the technology of fishing tackle used to ensure their capture.

The main problem with Tailor (and I guess with all endangered species), lies in their inability to reproduce quickly and frequently enough before being captured.

Oh I know a size limit already exists, but it is not being observed by a lot of anglers, nor is it possible, with the scant resources available to the Fisheries Dept., to enforce it.

So it is up to us to remind any errant anglers we may encounter, of their obligations to conserve our marine resources.

Anyway, I didn't intend to lecture and I know that Surfcasters have always been at the fore front of conservation measures. I'm not a saint either - in the past I've been as guilty as anyone - mainly through ignorance.

Like many others I had no perception of marine life as being exhaustible.

Enough of that, what I really wanted to do was throw down the gauntlet to some of the old stalwarts to write about memories of past events and incidents.

There are plenty that I can think of, but for the time being I would like to relate a couple of recent experiences.

My spouse and I recently enjoyed a week at the Kalbarri house where, wonder of wonders, most of my idle moments were spent fishing.

The first day there, we spent most of the daylight hours looking at and photographing wildflowers (I'm also a wildflower nut) and by about 6 pm my mouth was fairly slobbering at the thought of wetting a line.

Since it was too late to travel far, I decided to try at Wittecarra Creek as it is now known (club members might know it better as "the Cutting").

When we arrived, there were plenty of hopefuls in attendance - both locals and inter-staters, judging by the number plates of the vehicles on the beach.

Since all the anglers were bunched up on the northern extremity of the beach, just before it becomes reefy and awash with white water, I assumed there must have been a Tailor run recently.

My chances of remaining tangle free in amongst that lot looked remote, so I picked one of the spots where one has to cast over a flat reef and began rigging up.

As I walked down to the water's edge the chap to my left, who had obviously been burleying the area for a while, gave me a bemused look - no doubt sceptical of my chances of retrieving my rig over the top of the reef without snagging it.

Considering I haven't been beach fishing for over 6 months, my first cast was as you would expect - short; one dumper later my rig was surfing back toward me as fast as it went out.

Winding the handle of the Alvey furiously, I managed to retrieve my rig without incident.

Next cast - perfect, just at the back of where the swells were breaking. I had no sooner wound in the slack when - whack, I was tied into a good fish.

With reef on both sides, a big surge caused by the swells, and an out of form mug hanging onto the rod, it took a lot of coaxing to get it ashore. I didn't weigh the Mulloway, but I estimate it would have been about 10 kilos.

The reaction from the chap on my left was immediate and predictable; with disgust written all over his face and doubtless with evil thoughts on his mind, he snatched up his gear and stormed off the beach. Needless to say, on subsequent visits to Wittecarra I'd have had to stand in line to fish that spot again.

The reef at Wago was only for the foolhardy, but there were many spots where the sand had covered it, making a good beach fishing platform. South of the Lagoon, huge quantities of sand dumped by Winter Westerlies had turned what is usually pretty rugged country into a nice long beach.

I wasn't there long enough to test whether the fish also liked it. However, I managed to fish around the settlement at Lucky Bay a few times and found that the Tailor, although not thick, were good size.
