BLUFF CREEK FIELD DAY

Bluff Creek is only accessible by 4WD and is East of Albany. Beach access is easy and there is kilometres of good fishing water. The camp site is near a fresh water creek, "great for muddy little urchins" (or washing off the salt), with other camping spots nearby if you wish for some solitude. Fish species range through Silver Bream, Herring, large Trevally, Flathead, as well as other varieties. This all makes it ideal for children. One method of getting to Bluff Creek is to go down the Albany Highway to Mount Barker and then East on the Mt Barker/Porongurup road. Then go South on the Chester Pass Road approx 20 kms and turn onto the Kalgan/Napier road. After 6 kms you turn onto the South Coast Highway. Continue on through Manypeaks and approx 30 kms further on you turn South on to Warriup Road. (DON"T go down Bluff Creek Road which is before Warriup) Go approx 18 kms and you will come to a turn off to the right which goes to a quarry, with a farm entrance and a lake to the left. A couple of hundred metres more and you come to a poorly defined track going off to the right. This we hope to mark with a club flag with the first person going down on Friday. Take this track and you will come to a fence line. Drive with the fence line on your right and you will eventually get to the camping area.

KALBARRI INTERLUDE

Hi once again fisher folk. As I do each year at around about this time, I've just spent 10 glorious days at Kalbarri - glorious in that it was good to get away from the rat race of the city and relax but not so good in that the weather was adversely effected by this meteorological aberration they call the El Nino Effect. Would you believe that at this time of the year we had a few days of gale force winds, pelting rain and near freezing temperatures. Despite this I still managed enough trips to the beaches to keep the freezer stocked with enough fish to last at least a few weeks. However if you look at the amount of effort involved, the hours spent fishing were not commensurate with the weight of fish caught. I guess that anticipation of matching the huge catches of bygone days is rather unrealistic when you consider the pressure on fish stocks these days caused by demand, undersize capture and the like. My total catch was 27 Tailor averaging 1/2 a kilo (a pound in the old currency) and two Mulloway of 4 and 5 kilos respectively. I hooked another fish, the weight of which I'll never know because after about 10 seconds it decided that Mulies these days don't taste like they used to and spat it out. I reckon though that it would have weighed around the 15 kilo mark.

Anyway, besides being an avid angler I'm also a lover of native flora and fauna and the National Park always has plenty of both to offer - so even if I hadn't caught a single fish I'd have been more

than happy.

On the subject of happiness, I can't let this occasion go without offering congratulations to all the club members who have put so much of their time into refurbishing the house in Mallard St. Unless you visit regularly you probably wouldn't notice any great changes from the outside - but to me it was immediately evident that some fairly extensive clearing had taken place. Gone were all the fallen leaves near the fence and gone also were a number of lower branches from the two beautiful Eucalypts including one troublesome bough which inhibited the use of the front yard as a conveniently circular driveway. I must admit to a feeling of trepidation after Eric had told me that the busy bee included a session of extensive tree pruning. However my fears were quickly laid to rest as we rounded the corner to Mallard Street, there they stood in all their majestic glory - and in a tidier shape than on previous trips.

Once inside we were amazed at all the changes and improvements that had taken place. The most significant difference hits you in the face as soon as you walk in the front door - the paint job. All the walls have been painted a nice neutral creamy pastel shade and the ceilings white - in contrast to the old seasick green/turquoise that they used to be. To put it in more professional terms, Angela described it as tasteful designer co-ordinated colours! In The Lounge: The strange partial walls (which looked like they once supported a curtain or a concertina door) have been removed, giving a feeling of spaciousness and allowing for a greater degree of individuality if you decide you'd like to rearrange the furniture for the duration of your stay. The bench seat which partially adorned two of the walls (another movement restricter) has been removed. A colour Television set has appeared. New neon light fittings have been installed. The door closer on the flyscreen has been fixed. The cracked pane of glass in the front window has been replaced.

In The Main Bedroom: A new bed head, bed spread and a board fixed to the base to improve the concave shape which all beds eventually assume (although we always bring our own thicker boards - we've got bad backs). The gap in the ceiling has been fixed and both neons work. The doors on the wardrobes in both bedrooms have been removed (at least you can now see at a glance whether you have left anything behind when you leave). The spare drawer which contained all sorts of hardware and sat on the top of the wardrobe since day one has gone!

In The Kitchen: For the cook, the kitchen is now a positive delight to work in. New melamine bench tops have been installed and extended between the sink and stove and beyond. New wall tiles have been affixed above the bench top for its entire length. The mismatched crockery and cutlery has been discarded and new sets acquired. As far as the cook is concerned, the most useful inclusion is the microwave oven; there is also now a good quality stereo radio with which the fisherman can easily pick up the all important weather forecasts. The only thing I personally missed in the kitchen is the large freezer however, on this particular occasion (due to the paucity of fish) it was hardly necessary.

In The Second Bedroom: The bunks (including the one in the lounge have had sturdy timber composite boards affixed to their bases. The mattresses have new covers and protectors fitted and new pillows have also been acquired.

<u>In The Laundry:</u> The battleship grey, Government issue locker has been removed.

<u>In The Bathroom:</u> A new wash basin/vanity unit with mirror and single outlet with dual taps. An exhaust fan and double power points have also been installed.

Finally, <u>In The Backyard:</u> The old bird roost, which could have passed for an OTC antenna or maybe even something on which to dry one's clothes, has been removed and instead - a real rotary clothes hoist.

There is also a brand new rubbish bin at the front with which the local Garbo had an unfortunate accident while we were there. In putting the bin out the night before, I had placed a couple of large rocks on top of it to prevent marauding dogs (quite a problem up there) from knocking it over. In the morning the silly Garbo tried to do an Arnie Schwarznegger and pick up the lid without first removing the rocks - result, he was left sheepishly holding only the handle. Our Kalbarri cleaning lady, Sandy Potter (for whom nothing is too much trouble) said she would have it pop riveted back on.

So all in all, though it is not yet quite five star class, it has progressed from being just a fisherman's hut to comfortable, functional, holiday accommodation.
