STEEP POINT TRIP REPORT Black Friday....What a day to leave for Steep Point. Regardless, Eric Bombardieri and myself set off at 2.30 pm, accompanied by three friends. We took two vehicles and towed a trailer. After a twelve hour cool and uneventful trip we arrived at the Point. The road to Useless Loop was quite good having recently been graded and there had been no changes to the route. However from January 1993 the turnoff will be closer to Carrarang Station Homestead. This will take you over the old causeway near False Entrance. To go to Steep Point it will then be necessary to drive down the western side of the ponds to the Point where you would have come off the main causeway. The main causeway will be closed to prevent people jamming the gates open. Last year Clough's lost over a million dollars of brine. Once again we were happy to find our usual camping spot was vacant. To make things even better, daylight revealed only one other camp of two people, who on investigation we found were leaving the next day. This left us with the whole area to ourselves. With so much space we decided to spread out, with three of us on the fault line and two fishing the Point. This turned out to be fortunate as for the whole week the wind, although not overly strong, kept alternating from SW to E making it very difficult to get a balloon out. They would hug the coastline either way. By the second day things were looking bad. The only two Spaniards landed were taken by our so-called novice. Tony, who walked around with a huge grin on his face telling us how he had never caught anything bigger than a chopper tailer. Storm clouds had blown in bringing occasional downpours of rain, and an even bigger cloud hung over Eric's head as he had been busted up by a shark and dropped two Mackerel at the gaff. At this stage we decided two

after himself. He obviously needed no help or advice from the supposedly experienced members of the party. On the Monday the swell started to build up and luckily the fish with it. Even with the problems of a huge swell breaking over the Point and a gaff that was next to useless, we still managed to land ten Spaniards ranging from 26 to 47 pounds. One of these turned out to be a little lighter after I had a tug-of-war with a shark. The shark won as my share only came to 19 pounds.

The Gibbon Hole didn't produce very much and the Tailer hole was virtually unfishable because of the swell. After a lot of hard work we were able to capture a few Bald Chin and Snapper, a couple of Mulloway and a Yellowtail Kingie. Night fishing at both the fault line and the Point proved to be a dead loss.

Thursday brought a break in the weather and a steady stream of fishermen. By Saturday the fault line looked like a picket fence. However we had a freezer full of fish even though several had been lost because of the swell and that bloody gaff so everyone voted that it had been a reasonably successful and most enjoyable trip. The trip home was only marred at the very end. Five kilometres from home and the new water pump collapsed. Another lesson to be learnt. Don't listen when somebody tells you it's about time you changed your water pump. Also, for anybody who has an FJ60, the shaft on some of the replacement water pumps is too long. This prevents you from tightening the fan down onto the belt pulley on the water pump. The result is that the pulley collapses and rubs a hole in your water pump. Thankfully it takes over 2000 km to break down or I might still be up at Steep Point enjoying myself.

JOHN LEE'S FISHING DIARY

In an earlier issue I vowed that as I was unable to attend club events as often as I would like, I would submit articles for Reel Talk as my contribution to engendering club spirit. So here are a couple of items that may be of interest to club members.

For my first recollections of Surfcasters I have to delve back to the early fifties and a chap named Arch Ticklie whom some of the older members would still remember. In those days my Dad and Arch were in the Army together and many is the hour Arch and his lady friend Gladys spent in the company of my folks talking about old times during the war years. Invariably the conversation would get around to fishing.

Being part New Zealand Maori, Arch loved his fishing - to such an extent that like a lot of other anglers he decided that the best way to get amongst them was to buy a boat. On most Sunday mornings from then on Dad and Arch found that there was never a household chore urgent enough to keep them at home (except if the weather turned foul). The boat was clinker built, about twelve feet long, heavy as lead and powered by the latest in marine automotive technology - the good old Seagull 1.5 horsepower. Its top speed was about 5 knots absolutely flat strap with a following current and a tail wind.

Like all clinkers it was built to last - heavy marine ply planks brace ribbed on the inside and cross thwarted by planks which also served as the seats. Being built of individual planks and looking something like an ocean going weather board bathtub, the boat suffered in extremely hot or cold weather because expansion and contraction would cause small seams to open up (come to think of it, this happened in any weather). So owning one of these craft meant constant maintenance - I lost count of the number of times Dad and Arch were forced to careen her in order to fill the cracks with pitch. Needless to say, a bailing can (which also served as the latrine) was standard equipment. It was a far cry from todays modern boats; you couldn't trail it as it was just too heavy therefore the boat was either moored in the river or upturned on the river bank.

In hindsight it was really a river craft and never should have been taken to sea - but take it to sea they did although they never ventured more than a mile or so out except in the calmest of weather. To this day it still amazes me that Dad and Arch would go fishing in that boat at the drop of a hat; neither of them could swim a stroke and yet the thought of capsizing never entered their minds. In those days there was no such thing as built in buoyancy aids in marine engineering nor did the Dept of Marine and Harbours exist, thus boating safety was left largely in the hands of individual owners.

So considering that I had just learned to dog paddle I was their only hope if the boat sank. Yes I can clearly remember the day when, shortly after my seventh birthday, I was at last invited to go with them - much to the chagrin of the local parish priest who sometime thereafter called on my mother enquiring as to why I no longer attended Sunday School.

As incredible as it may seem, we never came to serious grief but later when Arch had updated and bought one of the first fibreglass boats that could be trailed, he and Gladys capsized somewhere in Cockburn Sound and were lucky not to have drowned.

Anyway despite the shortcomings of the clinker boat we regularly caught good fish in her. I can recall that one of our favourite spots was about a mile or so out from the Dingo Flour Mill over a broken bottom of weed, reef and sand - we were always assured of a good mixed bag of Skippy, Silver Bream, King George Whiting, Flathead and dinner plate size Leatherjackets (a rarity these days). My first ever encounter with a really large Tailor was out of that boat - we were fishing not far from the wreck of the Lygnern (no longer there) just outside South Mole catching the odd KIng George using Craytail for bait (it was cheap then) on weighted hand lines. I had no sooner tossed my line over the side when it tore off like a rocket, nearly yanking me over the gunwale in the process. It was too powerful for me so I handed the line over to my Dad who grappled with it for quite a while before hoisting it on board - we didn't weigh it but I reckon it was probably about ten pounds (incidently I've never bettered it since).

I remember one day reading an issue of a magazine that my Dad occasionally bought called The Anglers Digest and Shooters Monthly and seeing a picture of Arch taken on Garden Island during an SCAC field day in about 1955 or so. The picture was of Arch holding what was then a State record Jewie of about 50 pounds; of course when boat and shore records were amalgamated in the mid seventies this record was beaten by a boat angler.

In later years when I was a teenager I would ride the old treddley along the coast road to see what was being caught and if I was early enough, there at Grant St or Mosman Park in front of the old hospital annexe would be Arch hauling in Herring one after the other. I never tired of watching the effortless way he could cast with his new fangled hollow glass rod (a Conlan of about eleven feet). Along side him stood the others of the purist Herring brigade - wogs, blobs, ultra light line and Rangoon canes. It always intrigued me that with his flimsy looking glass rod he was able to consistently out cast the others with their fourteen foot Rangoons. Had I known at the time that Surfcasters promote excellence in the art of casting I would probably not have been so awe stricken at his mastery of it.

In the early seventies I joined Surfcasters and was again able to renew my acquaintance with him. Unfortunately in the mid seventies is where it all ended for those two fine old angling gentlemen - Arch and my Dad. Within a year of each other they had both succumbed to the ravages of cancer. Any way, to end on a happier note, largely because of my association with Arch I was determined that one day I would join the Surfcasting and Angling Club.

On a more humorous note, my next story concerns a club member who joined about the same time as me - Tony Richardson. I'm not sure if he still receives the Reel Talk but Tony, if you do, this article is not meant to offend and furthermore please feel free to refute it or at least write a story about me. It was a Field Day at Cervantes and Tony had teamed up with another new chum named Wilf (I've forgotten his surname) and both had driven from Perth in a ute. I had attended the Field Day with my first wife in my old HQ and was driving along a track somewhere close to Thirsty Point looking for a likely fishing spot. We had just rounded a thickly overgrown bend in the track when there in front of us was a ute with Tony standing alongside pointing Percy toward us and doing what a man must do when he is without the proper facilities. With a tinny in his other hand he nodded a cheery greeting but, the smile on his face quickly turned to a horrified grimace when he noticed that my wife was sitting alongside me in the front passenger seat.

Now because of the denseness of the scrub surrounding his vehicle, he was not able to make the gracious retreat he would have liked - so, he did the only thing possible and swivelled 180 degrees. Unfortunately Wilf, who had been standing directly behind him was completely unprepared for the speedy about face and received a rather moist shock.

Well pandemonium ensued as Wilf tried frantically to move out of range while all the while Tony was advancing on him trying to get behind the ute. At the time I guess they were not impressed but it certainly still causes me mirth when I think about it.
