Pastoral Land Restructure Underway.

Or "Our grandchildren will thank us?". Media release on 25 November from Planning and Infrastructure Minister Alannah MacTiernan said that letters advising individual leaseholders of the proposed exclusions from 97 of the State's 527 pastoral leases would be mailed out over the next two weeks.

The land would be required by government agencies and local governments for a range of purposes including conservation, recreation, tourism, protection of Aboriginal sites and provision for the expansion of existing towns.

The exclusions would not come into effect until 2015 when many leases were due for renewal, but the Government was required to give notice of its intentions by the end of this year.

Since the current structure of pastoral leases was put in place by the Lands Act of 1933, resources development, the growth of tourism and increased recognition of Indigenous and conservation interests have all placed new demands. The exclusions which were proposed after extensive discussions with pastoral organisations, government agencies and other interest groups affect about two per cent, or 2 million hectares of the State's pastoral land.

Ms MacTiernan said that three working groups established at the Gascoyne Muster in May this year Pastoralism for Sustainability; Aboriginal Access and Living Areas; and Access to Pastoral Lands had all had input in to the decision making. These groups included Recfishwest which lobbied strongly for access to the coast and rivers for Recreational fishing.

Details of individual exclusion would be made available once all leaseholders had been informed.

From Reel Talk August 1953.

Editors Note (August 1953)

We are very pleased to be able to announce that we have secured the use of rooms at the National Fitness Council for future meetings. These rooms are quite an improvement on those at Aussie Cycles now that our numbers have increased and there's a greater interest in club activities.

Our next meeting will be on 12th August at the National Fitness rooms in James Street, near the Police Traffic Office and opposite Perth Boys' High School.

It's very pleasing to get news from Bunbury Surfcasting and Angling Club to include in our paper. We'd like to hear more from other clubs also.

Our next Field Day is to be held at Yanchep from dawn to 11 am. on Sunday, 16th August.

Notes from Bunbury. Our president, Eric Teede, who is a constant visitor to the coast between Busselton and Cosy Corner, cracked the jackpot on Saturday, 4th July. Fishing with. a "spinner" which consisted of about four inches of tubular steel and a piece of rag attached to the hooks, Eric hooked into and landed a 41lb. Mulloway. The gear used was a Rangoon Cane, Graeme Supreme Reel and 16 lb. B.S. Italian Nylon. Indeed an excellent performance! The spot where he caught it is called Sail Rock.

Noel "Dagwood' Johnson has just received recognition for the 22 lb. Jewfish he caught on one of our outings to the Capel River mouth - a letter of congratulations. This was the Outdoors and Fishing award. The "Jewie" was caught off the beach with a Rangoon Cane rod, 16 lb. line and 6" home made aluminium centre pin reel.

Field Day, Penguin Island (Reel Talk August 1953).

Last Saturday we set off to beat up the local population at Penguin Island. We were armed with every fishing aid known to science, and some that had never been thought of before, and we were fairly confident. We even went light on food because we were going to catch so many fish we wouldn't have time to eat.

Well, that's the kind of bland optimism that makes fishermen such a happy race. An angler is a grown man with the experience of years, and the heart and irrepressible enthusiasm of a school boy.

So off we went on a falling barometer, a rising sea and a ten foot plywood boat.

We got to Penguin Island O.K., wet through with spray, but undaunted. We thoroughly enjoyed the rough trip over and decided that since it was as rough as it could possibly get, we were over the worst of it. How little we knew! Five minutes after the landing we were all fishing flat out for fish, points and honour.

Next morning at first light we were off again; it was now blowing a full gale and fishing was worse. Some pilchard and flathead were caught, but casting into the wind the greatest distance we could get was two feet behind us, and casting with the wind there was a danger of hooking up on the rabbit proof fence. So at 10 a.m. we packed up and prepared for home.

Then Felix (the menace) Holywell had a bright idea, and threw all the sharks and the ray into the sea, Poor old Vic, when he heard of this he held a small committee meeting with himself and decided unanimously that we should divide Felix up for shark bait. However, they finally wrested the meat cleaver from him and after that relations between them settled down on a friendly basis.

At 4 p.m. Nelson Smith, Paul Kunzlie and Reg Wertheimer, in the 10 ft. dinghy, and Bob Agnew in his own boat, took advantage of a lull in the storm and headed for the mainland.

As no boat could return, Sunday night was a grim night for those left on the Island. Fishing was impossible so all went to bed at dark and stayed there until 11 am. Monday.

Bob had taken the only edible fish back with him, and we were just drawing lots and sharpening up the meat cleaver, when Vic produced 12 packets of dehydrated soup and one Port Jackson shark which had escaped Felix, and the situation was saved.

Next day we had one cup of soup, two square inches of shark, driving rain, a 90 mile gale, and very little hope.

We rescued four Fairy Penguins, which had been blown down a well. We released these and chased a rabbit all round the island all day until our strength gave out, We retired Monday night empty and forlorn, and at midnight the gale was at still blowing.

Tuesday morning brought a lull in the storm and local fisherman, Mick Warne, in his boat. He set us ashore, and we headed for home. What a life!!

Another Story of Penguin Island (R/T August 1953)

Dear Bill.

I apologises for me grammer and me spellin' but I likes to write the way I talks. Getting' any lately? I guess you've 'eard enough about me jewies - any'ow I uses 'em for bait these days - but there's a few things worth mentionin' - about the Club's weekend at Penguin. I'm not goin' to burden you with the whole story 'cause there's others as probably got different versions and I'd like to ear 'em.

You know Bill, it seems to me we're never too old to get sillier - some of us any 'ow. It was like this. On the Friday night afore the weekend I rings up the Sec. and sez that seein' as 'ow the weather don't look too promisin' it might be as well if 'e tees up about a place to stay at Safety Bay (in case it's too rough to get across to the Island). He sez 'e will, so I leaves it at that and tootles off down on Fridy night.

I spends Satd'y mornin' fixin' up me boat and gear and listenin' to the radio bloke givin' out storm warnin's every ten minutes or so. I thinks to meself "Any mug who'd go over to the Island in this weather oughta be certified" (but I keep on getting' ready).

About two o'clock I'm at the meetin' place and some of the mob arrives soon after. She's already blowin' a bit but not too bad. 'Alf 'eartedly I mentions the storm warnin's and urges caution, but I'm just wasting me breath. They 'ires a 10 foot dinghy that'll 'old about three blokes with their gear and I've got me own little boat wot'll just 'old me. You know, Bill, I've always been a bit proud of me little red boat wot I built meself 'bout sixteen years ago. (She's gotta 'alf 'orse motor in 'er now). I've always treated 'er babylike and this time I painted 'er up special for the occasion. (I mentions this 'cause I got somethin' more to say later.)

Well, I thinks to meself "You silly B's, (includin' meself) and we pushes off. She's a bit wet but we gets over O.K. and one of the blokes starts the ferryin' business to get the rest across. Meanwhile us takes a look around. The caves we meant to use proves a washout, so we parks in a cupla huts, all comfy like with beds and mattresses - a real 'ome from 'ome and everythin's sweet. Out comes the fishin' gear and we moves off to start the competition.

Well, Bill, seein' as 'ow we're all mates I shows 'em all your best fishin' places and they takes their pick. I gets teamed up with Smithy and we fishes a 'ole where I've 'ad some good bream and skippy in me day. This time I can't take a trick Bill. First I 'ooks a beauty and afore I can even get me drum payin' out 'e shoots through with the lot. Then I gets a decent bream and tries to lift 'im straight out - 'e breaks me 'ook, and sez ta-ta. Meantime Smithy's fillin' the 'ole with lead and leavin' it there (I reckon I just about got Smithy converted to using me corked up 'ooks by now). After a while I gets a small bream and by this time we've just about 'ad enough. We decides to 'ave tea and come back later.

On our way to the hut we runs into the skipper bloke with three sharks alongside 'im and another one on 'is line. (His mates down below, 'alf drowned in the surf tryin' to get 'is fingers in its gills to land it for 'im).

We sez 'ello friendly like to the skipper but 'e's so darned busy with 'is shark that 'e just mumbles somethin' and then forgets we're there. It's then, Bill, that 'e remembers 'ow we changed the rules at the last meetin', to make sharks and rays count equal with respectable fish. I also remembers 'ow when our spinnin' expert, Vern, reckoned the change weren't fair to the dinkum anglers, the skipper waved 'is 'ands virtuous like and sez as 'ow no bloke would 'go after sharks or rays just to win a competition.

Well, Smithy and me goes back to the Hut and there's the rest of the mob comparin' notes and nobody's done any good. There's one of these blokes named Felix - you outa know 'im - 'e's the tall slab as always as a grin on 'is dial and never sez a word out of place. Well Felix ain't lookin 'is usual self -'e's been spinnin' all round the flamin' island and ain't 'ad a strike.

Then I thinks of the skipper out there gloatin' over 'is sharks and thinkin' 'e's got the money in the bag. Innocent like I tells Felix about a place that's just lousy with big rays. I notice 'is face brighten up and it ain't long before 's sidles off and I don't need two guesses where 'e's 'eadin' for. Mind you, Bill, I ain't got nothin' against the skipper bloke, but you gets a bit browned off when 'e keeps on winnin' all the competitions and I'm just 'opin' that this time Felix 'as some luck.

Smithy 'an me 'as our tea (just can't 'elp the poetry, Bill) and goes back to our 'ole again (we're dinkum anglers). We pelts some more lead in without doin' much good and finally gives it away.

When we get's back to the hut, there's Felix with 'is old familiar grin again. He's got a 40 lb. ray. Blimy, Bill, you should a 'eard the skipper's language when 'e cum back and found Felix 'as thieved 'is jackpot.

Next mornin' the wind starts to rise good and proper. It ain't long before she's blowin' a gale and the boys starts askin' me wot I thinks about gettin' back to the mainland. Well Bill, seein' as 'ow you and me more or less talked 'em into this trip and as 'ow you've exercised your superior intelligence by stayin' 'ome, I feels a bit responsible an' I gotta say the right things. I thinks we can probably get across alright if we travel light, but I got me doubts about gettin' back for the ferryin' business. Do You RTFRT?

I know some of you do, because of what's said. Sometimes I wonder about the rest of you, though.

Why do I wonder? Not much response or no response to questions, or requests for help, information or opinions. Very few or no comments, for or against, about the contents. Questions asked when the answer is right there for everyone to see and there is a list of contents on the first page to help find it.

Following some discussion at the December General Meeting, some comments were made along the lines that some arrangements weren't generally known, and that the notice about these should have been more prominent or that it should have been a full page spread in Reel Talk.

The reality is that information was in the previous four Reel Talks as follows:-

November Reel Talk:- A heading and 8 lines, listed in the "List of Contents", and Listed in "Coming events".

A heading and 4 lines, listed in the "List of Contents", and Listed in "Coming events".

September Reel Talk:- A heading and 4 lines, and listed in the "List of Contents". August Reel Talk:- A heading and 4 lines, and listed in the "List of Contents".

The listings in "Coming events" in the two Reel Talk issues closest to the event were **in bold** to stand out from the rest.

Here are some details so that you understand what goes into the Reel Talk, (provided you RTFRT of course).

<u>Emphasis.</u> In Reel Talk, almost everything is laid out and printed with the same size letters, headings, paragraph layout and spacings, etc. Only a few things get emphasis such as large letters, bold, underlining, boxes, etc if they are important enough to the Club or the majority of Club members.

This layout is the Reel Talk Editor's decision, but there are some good reasons for it. If too much emphasis is added, then you risk the things which aren't emphasised being overlooked, after all, some people might think these articles can't be important if they are in an "ordinary" style. Emphasis takes up extra space.

It's easy to make a few lines fill up half or a whole page, by printing them in large letters, and with large spacing. See the Fleets cover page advertisement for what could be done as an example. But what's the point in doing that for ordinary club activities and notices?

Extra pages. Each single sided page in Reel Talk costs the club and thus it's members 8c per copy - that's \$6.00 extra for each extra page for the 75 copies printed each month. Without cramming stuff in, or going to small fonts which aren't easy to read, I try to lay out the pages so that we get as much in each issue as possible, while keeping the number of pages under control. I try to end up with an even number of pages, all filled up with useful or interesting information, because that gives best value for the money spent.

<u>Content.</u> I print whatever I am given which will be of interest to members, and which won't get the club into trouble through breaching copyright. There hasn't been any need to cut out whole paragraphs or pages from what I have been given while I have been Editor, except to cut out things which are repeated and to change the layout, which is the normal job of an editor. The real problem is getting articles from members.

What's RTFRT stand for ? Read The Flippin' Reel Talk!

Toohey Report - Integrated Fisheries Management.

The report has 21 recommendations. The Minister for Fisheries has given his initial response to these recommendations, which *are shown in italics*. The report is open for public comment until 28 February 2003.

This report has been awaited for a long time, and will have a major impact on the management of fishing in Western Australia. The report, "Fisheries Management Paper No. 165" is available from the Fisheries Department or from www.fish.wa.gov.au/comm/broc/mp/mp165/index.html

Recommendation 1. The Western Australian Government introduce an integrated management system for the sustainable management of Western Australia's fisheries.

Minister:- Agree.

Recommendation 2. The development and funding of a comprehensive research and monitoring program encompassing all user groups is essential to provide the necessary information for sustainability and allocation issues to be addressed under an integrated framework. **Minister:-** *Agree*.

Recommendation 3. The Department of Fisheries investigate standardising catch information at five nautical mile grids to provide comparative information across all user groups. **Minister:-** *I* agree to a review aimed at standardising catch information between sectors, however it is important that the scale for data collection and reporting is appropriate for each particular fishery.

Recommendation 4. The integrated management system must be open and transparent, accessible and inclusive, flexible, effective and efficient. **Minister:-** *I* agree with the general thrust of this recommendation,

however because of the complex and time-consuming nature of fisheries management processes and likely disagreement between parties over allocations, it may be difficult to satisfy 'effective and efficient' criteria.

Recommendation 5. The following nine principles be recognised as the basis for integrated management decisions and, where appropriate, incorporated into fisheries legislation. More specific principles to provide further guidance around allocation decisions may also be established for individual fisheries. **Minister:-** *I am in general agreement with the nine principles. A number of minor changes may however provide greater clarity around some principles. A review of the recommendations against the current legislation is required to determine if they are already embraced in the head powers contained in the Fish Resources Management Act 1994 (FRMA). In particular, Part 6 of the FRMA requires review to ensure it adequately embraces the principles of integrated management and its application across all sectors. Some of these principles may be better incorporated into Ministerial Policy Guidelines rather than legislation because of the uncertainty and risks of enshrining what will be an 'evolving process' into legislation.*

- (i) Fish resources are a common property resource managed by the Government for the benefit of present and future generations. **Minister:-** *Agree.*
- (ii) Sustainability is paramount and ecological requirements must be accounted for prior to any allocation to user groups. **Minister:-** Agree. There may be benefit in amending the objects of the FRMA to make the application of ESD principles clear.
- (iii) Decisions must be made on best available information and where this information is uncertain, unreliable, inadequate or not available, a precautionary approach adopted to minimise risk to fish stocks. The absence of, or any uncertainty in, information should not be used as a reason for delaying or failing to make a decision. **Minister:-** Agree, however I believe the required approach to management may be better defined as a cautionary or low risk approach, i.e. ".... a cautious approach adopted to minimise risk to fish stocks".
- (iv) A sustainable target catch level must be set for all fisheries and explicit allocations designated to each user group. **Minister:-** While a target catch level should be set against a backdrop of sustainability objectives, it may also be set against a number of other management objectives. This may be compounded because of factors such as definition around measurement, determination of imputed catch levels in some fisheries, stock recovery, etc. Therefore I suggest this principle should be amended to read "A target catch level must be set where practical ..." I see merit in including an additional principle as follows: "In setting allocations for commercial and recreational sectors, recognition must be given to existing customary and passive use of the resource and possible aquaculture requirements".
- (v) Allocations to user groups should account for the total mortality on fish resources resulting from the activities of each group, including bycatch and mortality of released fish.

 Minister:- Agree.
- (vi) The total catch across all user groups should not exceed the sustainable target catch level. If this occurs, immediate steps should be taken to reduce the take within prescribed levels. Management arrangements for each user group should aim to contain their catch within the level set for that group.

 Minister:- Agree. (delete 'sustainable' as per (iv)).
- (vii) Allocation decisions should aim to maximise the overall benefit to the Western Australian community from the use of fish stocks and take account of economic, social, cultural and environmental factors. **Minister:-** Agree, however the words "maximise the overall" should be replaced by "achieve the optimal" to make it consistent with the FRMA.
- (viii) Allocations to user groups should generally be made on a proportional basis to account for natural variations in fish populations. This general principle should not however preclude alternative arrangements in a fishery where priority access for a particular user group(s) may be determined. **Minister:-** Agree.
- (ix) Allocations are notional they are not "owned" by a group however management arrangements must provide users with the opportunity to access their allocation. **Minister:-** Agree, however I suggest an additional sentence should be added: "There should be limited capacity for transferring un-utilised shares into future years, as such a process may not be sustainable." This is to confirm that, in general, un-utilised shares should not be able to be carried over from a given year because of sustainability reasons, while making allowance that there may be the potential for some limited transfer of capacity in effort managed fisheries.

Recommendation 6. A working group comprised of representatives from the Department of Fisheries and relevant interest groups be established for each fishery, to undertake widespread consultation and develop a draft sustainability report for each fishery. **Minister:-** Disagree. The existing ESD policy framework meets this requirement. While ESD processes are currently focussed on commercial components of fisheries in order to meet export requirements, the future application of ESD will incorporate wider information across all users. The ESD reports with adjustments will meet reporting requirements.

Recommendation 7. The Executive Director, Department of Fisheries, approve a Sustainability Report for each fishery, which includes a clear statement on the sustainable target catch level. **Minister:-** As resources allow, this will occur over time. To date applications for six fisheries have been submitted to Environment Australia and a further nine are under ESD assessment. There are still some 30 fisheries requiring assessment in the future.

Recommendation 8. An Integrated Fisheries Allocation Council be established by statute and be responsible for investigating resource allocation issues and making recommendations on optimal resource use to the Minister for Fisheries including:

- (i) broad allocations between groups within the sustainable catch limits determined for each fishery;
- (ii) strategies to overcome temporal and spatial competition at a local/regional level;
- (iii) allocation issues within a sector as referred by the Minister for Fisheries;

(iv) more specific principles to provide further guidance around allocation decisions for individual fisheries; and

(v) other matters concerning the integrated management of fisheries as referred by the Minister for Fisheries.

Minister:- I agree with the general thrust of this recommendation. I recognise that the system must be flexible due to the differing aspirations of users. I suggest a Ministerial Advisory Committee, with clear terms of reference, be established under s42 of the FRMA which incorporates points (i) – (v) in the recommendation. In the longer term, the FRMA can be amended and the committee established as a formal body under Part 4 of the FRMA. A review of Part 4 of the FRMA may be required to examine the role and relationship of various committees to reflect a more flexible committee structure and changing processes under integrated management. A number of minor amendments are suggested: R8(i) - Delete word "broad". R8(ii) after "... overcome" insert "allocation and access issues arising from" An additional principle should be added "(vi) Allocation principles and processes will be developed in the context of Ministerial Guidelines under s246 of the FRMA. These Guidelines will need to cover process of allocation, mediated outcomes and recommendations on allocations based on catch history, or reallocations utilising methodologies incorporating net economic worth calculations with supporting socio-economic data.

Recommendation 9. The Integrated Fisheries Allocation Council comprise a chairperson and four members, not representing sectoral interests in any fishery. **Minister:-** Agree in part. An expertise-based committee of three members should be appointed, who bring legal, economic/social, fishery science or management knowledge and experience

Recommendation 10. The Minister for Fisheries be required to explain publicly any departure from the Integrated Fisheries Allocation Council's recommendations or advice. This obligation should extend to any matter referred to it by the Minister. **Minister:-** Disagree. This process should occur in a similar manner to that of other committees in which the Minister advises stakeholders of his decision following consideration of the committee's advice. There should be no constraint on the Minister's discretionary powers.

Recommendation 11. The Integrated Fisheries Allocation Council be responsible for determining the process and timeframes for resolving allocation issues in each fishery. **Minister:-** Disagree. The terms of reference and timeframes for fishery reviews should be determined by the Minister.

Recommendation 12. The Integrated Fisheries Allocation Council's recommendations or advice to the Minister for Fisheries should become public at the time it is submitted to the Minister. **Minister:-** Disagree. The committee should report directly to the Minister and the appropriate release of information determined on a case by case basis

Recommendation 13. Where a reallocation of resources from one user group to another results in demonstrable financial loss to an individual, in principle there should be an entitlement to compensation. Compensation may take various forms and does not necessarily involve the payment of money. No compensation should be payable where allocations are reduced for sustainability reasons. **Minister:-** Agree. Cases for compensation should be assessed on their merits on a case-by-case basis. I believes priority needs to be given to investigating the potential development of market-based systems to achieve reallocations, along with due consideration of social equity considerations, as soon as practical.

Recommendation 14. Appropriate management structures should be introduced for each user group which will allow for the catch of each group to be contained within its prescribed allocation. **Minister:-** Agree. This is a Ministerial/ Departmental responsibility to administer. I suggest the words "and processes" should be inserted after "structures".

Recommendation 15. Management arrangements for each user group should incorporate pre-determined actions which are invoked if that group's catch increases above its allocation. **Minister:-** *Agree in principle.*

Recommendation 16. In recognition of the need for more effective management of finfish fisheries:

- (i) Regional recreational plans for the West Coast and Gascoyne regions be implemented as soon as possible, and planning commence for the North and South Coast regions, to provide a more effective framework within which to control the recreational catch; and the future to include target catch levels.

 Minister:- Agree. It should be noted these plans will need review in the future to include target catch levels.
- (ii) Specific management arrangements be introduced for the commercial wetline fishery, based on the four regions adopted for recreational fisheries, which provide a framework in which the commercial catch can be contained. One of the key access criteria for the wetline fishery should be fishing history prior to the benchmark date of 3 November 1997. **Minister:-** Agree, noting that the Department is seeking clarification on legal issues around benchmark dates given possible National Competition Policy considerations.

Recommendation 17. Each user group within a fishery should continue to be managed within existing catch ranges until a formal assessment under the new allocation process is undertaken. **Minister:-** Disagree. I believe we need to be more timely in dealing with allocation issues. I am considering the merits of establishing a benchmark date to formalise existing allocations, possibly consistent with the announcement of this Review in March 2000.

Recommendation 18. A baseline of existing catches should be determined for each fishery by the Department of Fisheries based upon the best information available. **Minister:-** Agree. However the lack of data should not be used as basis for not achieving the resolution of resource sharing issues.

Recommendation 19. For integrated management to proceed, the State Government must ensure that sufficient additional funding is made available to:

(i) Provide the necessary levels of research, management and compliance for the sustainable management of fisheries; and

(ii) Ensure the effective operation of an integrated management system

Minister:- Agree. Clearly this will affect timeframes for implementation, however this is a matter for State Government and availability of funds.

Recommendation 20. To embrace the principles of integrated management, the required funding package should take a multi-tiered and multiuser approach and be equitable across user groups and include:

- (i) Increased contributions from commercial users, including an increase in the level of contribution to the Development and Better Interest Fund;
- (ii) Increased contributions from recreational users, including the introduction of a general recreational fishing licence; and
- (iii) Additional State Government contribution from the Consolidated Fund to ensure required funding levels are met, in acknowledgement of the significant social and economic values associated with sustainable fisheries.

Minister:- The issue of greater contributions from users is a matter for Government policy. In this regard it should be noted the Government's current policy is:

- It will not increase the level of fees paid by industry to the Development and Better Interest Fund (DBIF) above the level in the Cole/House agreement unless the industry support an increase.
- It will not seek to introduce a licence for recreational line fishing in salt water.

Recommendation 21. The State Government establish a separate review to determine the basis for the introduction of a general recreational fishing licensing system. This review should include an analysis of social equity considerations (such as applicability, cost, concessions and exemptions) and applicability of the system to provide information on recreational effort, and possibly catch. **Minister:-** Existing bodies and consultative processes are already in place to undertake such a review if required.

Mackerel Management Plan.

The Minister for Fisheries has announced major changes proposed to commercial fishing for spanish mackerel. The details and the Minister's responses are in "Fisheries Management Paper No. 164" which is available from the Fisheries Department or from www.fish.wa.gov.au/comm/broc/mp/mp164/index.html This plan is a great improvement on the original proposals which were hotly opposed by Recfishwest and the Game Fishers. It has been bought in early because of the urgent need for action on mackerel, and hopefully is an example of what will come out of the follow up to the Toohey report over the next few years.

The really good bits are:- 1. No commercial fishing for mackerel in the southern zone from October to March, the peak recreational period for Cape Leeuwin to Exmouth !!!. 2. No bycatch, means no one but permit holders can catch and sell mackerel. 3. History of catches after 1997 don't count for getting a license. 4. Maximum of 20 licences, probably fewer in each zone (5% or more of the quota is needed) 5. Research logbooks compulsory.

- The plan will be called Mackerel Fishery (Interim) Management Plan and will commence operation on 1 January 2004 or as near to that date as is administratively possible.
- The plan will cease to have effect five years from the date of commencement, or earlier, if appropriate.
- The mackerel fishery will be zoned:

The Gascoyne-West Coast Zone, from Cape Leeuwin northwards to 114° East longitude, (Exmouth.)

The Pilbara Zone, from 114° East longitude to 121° east longitude; and

The Kimberley Zone, from 121° East longitude to the Northern Territory border.

- All zones will be managed under a quota management system, with the use of a Vessel Monitoring System (VMS), prior reporting and an option for the Executive Director to vary the mackerel fishing season.
- The Total Allowable Commercial Catch (TACC) for each zone of the fishery will be set by the Executive Director, after taking the best scientific and operational advice available to him to ensure the sustainability of the mackerel fishery.
- The TACC will not be subject to annual review and will be set for three to five years. However, biological reference points will be put in place and if they are reached in two consecutive years, the TACC will be reviewed.
- The legal minimum length of 90 cm for Spanish mackerel will remain.
- There will be a six month season in each zone of the fishery. The Kimberley Zone from 1 June to 30 November and the Pilbara and Gascoyne-West Coast Zones from 1 April to 30 September.
- The ports/anchorages of Denham, the Blow Holes, Carnarvon, Kalbarri, Geraldton, Dongara, Jurien and Fremantle must be used to unload mackerel taken in the Gascoyne-West Coast Zone and the Department of Fisheries' Regional Offices will manage the Catch and Disposal Records.
- The ports/anchorages of Exmouth, Point Sampson, Onslow, Dampier, Port Hedland and Broome must be used to unload mackerel taken in the Pilbara Zone and the Department of Fisheries' Regional Offices will manage the Catch and Disposal Records.
- The ports/anchorages of Broome and Darwin must be used to unload mackerel taken in the Kimberley Zone and that the Catch and Disposal Records will be managed by the Department of Fisheries' Broome Regional Office and through a memorandum of understanding with the Northern Territory.
- Only permit holders in a particular Zone will be permitted to unload mackerel in that Zone.
- The benchmark date for criteria to enter the fishery is 3 November 1997. A criteria period of seven years will be taken into account, from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997.

- Access to the Kimberley Zone mackerel fishery will be based on the following criteria: Must have caught a minimum of one tonne each year for four out of seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997; or Must have caught an average of a minimum of one tonne a year over seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997, as shown on the returns submitted to the Department of Fisheries.
- Access to the Pilbara Zone mackerel fishery will be based on the following criteria: Must have caught a minimum of 750 kg each year for four out of seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997; or must have caught an average of a minimum of 750 kg a year over seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997, as shown on the returns submitted to the Department of Fisheries.
- Access to the Gascoyne-West Coast Zone mackerel fishery will be based on the following criteria: Must have caught a minimum of 500 kg each year for four out of seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997; or must have caught an average of a minimum of 500 kg a year over seven years from 1 November 1990 to 31 October 1997, as shown on the returns submitted to the Department of Fisheries.
- The proportion of each boat's catch to the sum of the catches of all boats that meet the criteria will determine that boat's proportional access to the fishery.
- Each zone of the fishery will be unitised, with the unit value being derived from the TACC for the Zone. The number and value of units will be specified on the permits.
- The following conversion rates will be used when assessing the landed weight of product for criteria for access to the mackerel fishery: Whole weight = head/gutted weight (kg) x 1.176, Whole weight = gutted/gilled weight (kg) x 1.048, Whole weight = fillet weight (kg) x 1.608
- At the commencement date of the Interim Management Plan a minimum proportion of five per cent of the units in the Zone of the fishery must be held before an operator can fish in the fishery. Any new operators in the fishery must hold a minimum unit holding of ten per cent of the units to operate in the fishery.
- A person must not sell, deal in or purchase any mackerel taken from the fishery unless the fish were taken by a person who holds a permit in the fishery.
- No auxiliary boats/dories are to be used in the Gascoyne-West Coast or Pilbara Zones of the fishery.
- Dories will be allowed in the Kimberley Zone of the fishery.
- A person fishing from an authorised boat in the fishery must not use a reel other than a manually powered reel to set, haul or pull gear.
- Carrier boats are not to be used in the Mackerel Fishery.
- The Department of Fisheries is to negotiate with the Commonwealth to exclude bycatch of mackerel in other adjacent Commonwealth Managed Fisheries and to provide separate advice to the Minister on this issue.
- Completion of research logbooks will be a compulsory requirement for all permit holders.

Pot Hook Ban Helps Conserve Dusky Sharks.

As part of worldwide action to conserve all shark species, Fisheries Minister Kim Chance has introduced regulations banning the use of 'pot hooks' on lobster pots, boat mooring lines, floats and anchor ropes.

The measures will help conserve breeding stocks of dusky sharks, which are under threat from the use of such gear. Mr Chance said the lucrative shark fin market had encouraged commercial rock lobster fishers to catch large sharks, including dusky sharks, because their fins were among the most prized.

Fines of \$5,000 will apply for a first offence and \$10,000 for second and subsequent offences under the new regulations, which will target rock lobster and other commercial fishers but will also apply to recreational fishers.

"The ban is needed as some rock lobster fishers have been using pot hooks to catch sharks to supplement their fishing income," the Minister said. "While the majority of commercial rock lobster fishers generally see this practice as undesirable, the practice has become more widespread as shark fin prices have increased and demand has grown. These new regulations are part of a range of actions that is being undertaken to help conserve WA shark stocks."

Sharks are generally slow-growing, long-lived and very vulnerable to overfishing. Dusky shark breeding stocks are now assessed as being below the level required to maintain their population. Department of Fisheries research in the 1990s indicated that even a four per cent or higher mortality rate of mature dusky sharks would cause a serious decline in the population of this shark species in WA.

"The use of pot hooks and similar unusual fishing methods to catch sharks also poses a safety risk to rock lobster fishers and fisheries officers inspecting pots who might not expect large sharp hooks to be attached to pot lines."

You'd have to think that "pot hooks" might catch more than sharks, and big hooks, big baits often mean big fish, so the ban could reduce that catch a bit.

Did you know that the Department of Fisheries booklet "Field identification guide to Western Australian Sharks and Shark-like Rays" shows that the dusky whaler is very similar to the bronze whaler, and whereas the bronze whaler occurs only as far north as about Geraldton, the dusky whaler covers the entire Western Australian coastline. So those friendly brown shapes at Quobba are probably Dusky whalers and not Bronzies. And while the big ones take their taxes on the fish hooked, if there are no big ones, soon there'll be no little ones to stretch the arms.

Kalbarri Blue Holes FHPA

A group known as the 'Friends of the Blueholes' has advised the Department of Fisheries that they wish to establish a Fish Habitat Protection Area (FHPA) in the vicinity of the area known as the 'Blueholes' at Kalbarri. The Australian Marine Conservation Society will be assisting the 'Friends of the Blueholes' with this proposal.

The main objective of establishing a FHPA is to provide a small area where local people and tourists can observe a reef system which is not fished. However, the Department is also aware that the Blueholes is adjacent to a popular tailor fishing area, which is of interest to local and visiting recreational fishers.

It is obviously important that the views of all people who use the area, including fishers, are expressed and taken into consideration during the planning stage of the FHPA. Details of permitted activities within the FHPA, for example where recreational fishing can take place, as well as the boundary of the FHPA, will be addressed and considered in detail at this time.

An informal community workshop with persons at Kalbarri to discuss the boundaries and permitted activities within the proposed FHPA will be held during the peak holiday period in mid January 2003. Representatives of Recfishwest have been invited to attend this meeting. Following this meeting, information will be collated into the form of a draft plan of management for the area. This draft plan would then be released for public comment as required under section 115 of the Fish Resources Management Act 1994.

Fill in Spot.

What do you do when someone comes and stands nearby and starts pulling fish out nearly every cast, when you are not? Could it be he's a lucky fisher, or maybe a gun fisherman, or has that special secret bait/berley/lure or ??

Answer:- watch carefully and ask. Often it's just the combination of the rig, the bait or lure and the presentation he's using at the time. If you ask, usually he'll be happy to tell you all the "secrets", which are often not secrets at all, but just the particular combination the fish are biting on at the time. Look and Learn - it's worth it, and can make a big difference to your catch.
