

Kalbarri House For Rent.

Is Reel Talk "Too Political"?

A comment has been made along the lines that the Reel Talk is getting too political, and it really should get back to having "interesting" articles, because <u>some</u> people do not want to read about the battles going on about marine parks, fisheries management, access restrictions, jetties being demolished, etc

As Reel Talk editor, I will publish whatever is offered for the Reel Talk provided it is of interest to the club members and suitable for publication and to be read by our family members. Problem - not much is being offered, so I have to use whatever else I have.

Should I publish just good news stories about fish and fishing, and ignore what is really happening? Should I let people float along with a warm and fuzzy feeling that everything is okay and everything will stay the same and they will always be able to go fishing in the same places, and do the same things, and catch the same fish as they can now, or should I let them see the reality, with all the potential problems?

How do you think we have got to the position we are in at present? That is, a position where:-

we are restricted in where we can fish,

jetties are not being maintained, and are then demolished without being replaced,

we are restricted where we can use our four-wheel drives,

we are restricted where we can camp,

tight restrictions such as reduced bag limits are put on some aspects of recreational fishing without (yet) any corresponding tight restrictions on commercial fishing for the same fish which are being targeted in big numbers in competition with recreational anglers,

parked cars at isolated beaches are now often just a target for thieves,

marine parks are closing up large areas with "no fishing" signs,

conservationist "greenies" have the ear of government and are pushing their agenda of a <u>minimum</u> <u>of 50 percent</u> of areas completely closed to all fishing, and if they had their way <u>100 percent would</u> be closed.

some consultation is an absolute farce, where organisations go through the motions of consultation but have already made up their minds and do not listen to anything unless it is what they want to hear.

recreational anglers are being misrepresented as being anti-conservationists, when we want sustainable fishing, protection of fish stocks, protection of nursery areas, but recreational anglers are being effectively being blamed and restricted for problems many of which are caused by environmental practices by governments and companies and the whole community.

recreational anglers are being told "you should be content and happy with what you have left - look you have much more than 60 percent of the area" - when what has been closed off is often the very best areas, and the percentage of good fishing areas which have been lost is much more than it seems,

and so on......

If you look at the history of the changes which have led to this situation during the last 40 years, you will find a lot of little changes, some middle size changes, and few larger changes.

All through the years, some people have been saying these changes need to be resisted, but the apathy and lack of organisation of recreational anglers has let most of these changes go through, bit by bit, little by little, cut by cut, restriction by restriction.

So when you look at the difference between what we had 40, 30 or even 20 years ago, and what we have now, the changes are dramatic, and recreational anglers and the community have lost so much.

But we have not seen all the losses yet. Whatever we still have, there are many people and organisations who want to take more away from us, to grab more for themselves, to lock it up because it is easier to simply lock stuff away or ban activities than it is to work out how to manage them properly. Or because of an ideology about the need to ban things without going through the work of finding out what really needs to be banned and what can continue without causing any real problems because, put simply, the activities are sustainable and do not need to be banned.

These people do not care if recreational anglers lose their rights and their privileges. These people do not care if the young people in the community, including your children and your grand children will never know what could have been, and what should have been because there is no real good reason to stop it.

High on the list for more closed "no fishing" areas are Rottnest, (yes, you read right - Rottnest) including some of the areas to which the Surfcasters make a beeline on all of our Rottnest Field Days, the Cape Naturaliste to Cape Leeuwin area, many areas of the South Coast, and so on. **AND** if the greenies have a win at Ningaloo, what makes you think they will stop there?

So, maybe you do not want to be bothered about any of this "political" or "resisting changes" stuff. All you have to do is to check the list of contents, flip the pages of the Reel Talk, read anything you are interested in, and skip over anything you are not interested in. No one is forcing you to read anything.

That is your right, and you can choose to exercise that right.

But if you choose to opt out of being involved in or taking any interest in or looking after the future of recreational angling, then you have also given up your right to criticise what happens in future. You have to accept what you will be given, or what will be forced upon you, and you have given up your right to complain about it.

Check the article "Vicious Disease Aimed at Recreational Anglers" on page seven of the October 2003 Reel Talk. Some extracts:-

"If it's worth having, it's worth working for."

"Fortunately some people in WA are immune to this disease and keep up the fight for recreational fishing without much support from the people who have so much to lose. These people soldier on without any thanks, even when THEY get blamed when they can't stop the opposition from getting their way.

The main danger these people face is those nasty double four letter words "over work" and "burn out" and getting "s\$\$t off" (well some are only 3 letter words, but you get the idea). "

"Recreational anglers are just typical of many ordinary Australians, they are apathetic, they jump up and down, spout off and say "they orta do something" but disappear when the call goes out for workers, they will bitch and complain when they lose something, but they aren't interested in stopping it before it happens."

Now, answer the question "do you know anyone who has been afflicted with this disease?"

But in the end, articles in Reel Talk depend on the club members and what they want. If the club members do not want to know about these topics, and do not want them published in their club magazine, then that is the final decision.

But until I am told by the majority of Club members as they do not want it, then I will assume that they want to and need to know about them, and I will publish articles about them.

What do you think.? Tell us, please....

December 2004 Recfishwest Board Meeting Report.

The December RFW Board meeting elected the following people:-

Recfishwest Executive Committee: - Des Wood, Keith Tocas, Terry Fuller, Craig Bibra, Norman Halse.

Howard Gill was invited onto the Recfishwest Board as the replacement Public Board Member in place of Des Wood who was re-elected as Board Chairman.

The Department of Planning and Infrastructure is doing concept designs for a boat ramp north of North Mole.

Recfishwest is to write to the Department of Fisheries about netting in the Pallinup Estuary.

Recfishwest needs an example where the Department of Fisheries change in the role of the Fishwatch service from a response service to a data gathering service has left some serious illegal activity get away.

A meeting was held Tuesday 14 December where the Integrated Fisheries Manager Greg Paust gave a presentation on progress with Integrated Fisheries Management. We were also shown a video of Sampson fish schooling at a depth of 100 metres west of Rottnest

Frank Prokop has had a 1½ hour discussion with Rod Lenanton from Fisheries Research. The main concern is the sudden decline in herring numbers, while there are increasing concerns about tailor numbers falling following the trend that has been obvious for some time.

Recfishwest has been approached for comments on the buyback of a salmon fishing license on the south coast. A reply setting out Recfishwest requirements has been sent to the Department of Fisheries.

Discussions are continuing on closure of the part of the Broome jetty and the relationship to barramundi spawning areas. A barramundi accord is due in March 2005.

The Recreational Boating Facilities Scheme has been oversubscribed with more projects than there is money for. The Department of Planning and Infrastructure has announced further funding, with round eleven increasing to \$870,000, round 12 to \$1 million, and around 13 to \$1.2 million. Considering only a few years ago, money had been diverted from this scheme, the change is a win for all recreational boaters.

A group called "Geobay for the Future" from Busselton have prepared a three-page document setting out the requirements for changes to the fishing arrangements in Geographe Bay, and have asked for Recfishwest's support.

Funding from the Department of Sport and Recreation has been received and will be distributed. AAA will receive \$6,500.

Norman Halse reported on meetings which had been held about the Rottnest marine management plan. An agenda of sanctuary no take zones is being pushed again. Norman Halse, Andrew Cribb and Ross Cusack will not accept the current proposed plan. A public consultation process is to follow.

Natural Resource Management. Frank Prokop attended a meeting recently. Department of Planning and Infrastructure has no understanding of the issues involved, and is it is a wonder why they are involved in NRM planning. Based on measures made at four spots, CALM made the statement that "recreational fishing is responsible for the decline of fish stocks in the metro area" the Director of the Department of fisheries was not present at the meeting. Recfishwest is to prepare a funding submission to cover all the consultation required for NRM planning. The South Coast NRM paper has been rewritten but Recfishwest was not sent a copy.

Graham Anderton tabled a report on damage to the seagrass in Mangles Bay and passed around an aerial photograph which clearly showed the damage caused by moorings in the Bay.

Recfishwest chairman attended a meeting of the abalone integrated fisheries management group. There was lots of criticism of the recreational impact and "commercial's resource"

New fishing jetties on the Canning River were launched last Sunday, and these are magnificent.

Recfish Australia is progressing with recommendations for spending the \$15 million from the Federal government as promised in the last Federal election campaign.

Shark management. There is some action on the impact of the southwest Tuna and Billfish fishery. An independent observer saw tuna boats catch 37 adult dusky whale sharks. 36 survived and were released although there are concerns that many would die later from their injuries. This catch rate differs markedly from the catch rate (believed to be very low) reported when observers are not present. This catch rate is unsustainable and the letter is to be written to State Fisheries.

Recfishwest had had a major involvement in both the South Coast and the Pilbara/Kimberley recreational fishing reviews, we are all inputs were examined by Mark Pagano, Frank Prokop, (Recfishwest) Nathan Harrison and Clinton Syers (Department of Fisheries)

Ningaloo. Questions about Ningaloo are causing enormous grief to the government. Publicity in local newspapers is continuing to raise new details. An article quoting Paddy Cullen as accusing the Department of Fisheries of lying about the impact of recreational fishing, left it open for Peter Rogers to defended the Department against these attacks, whereas previously he had been effectively gagged. Any Fisheries Department submission to another Department is now available to the public, under Freedom of Information, whereas previously they had been confidential.

The Premier now appears to be putting the responsibility for the decisions back onto the Marine Parks and Reserves Authority, where as initially he was giving the government credit for the decisions.

Recfishwest is avoiding openly criticising the Labor Party and the Labor Party machine. Recfishwest will have to work with any government which is elected.

Newsletters will be released soon about progress with Integrated Fisheries Management.

Recfishwest will hold a strategic planning session in late February or early March.

Terry Fuller reported on the proposed changes to the Fisheries Regulations to implement the changes announced by the Minister over one year ago covering the filleting at sea regulations. The draft still had many problems and detailed comments have been given to the Department of Fisheries.

The commercial rock lobster fishermen in the Capes area have lost the trust of local people over the negotiations with surfers over the placement of rock lobster pots, ropes and floats.

Recfishwest have not received a single response to any letter to Environment Minister Judy Edwards since September. Announcements on a number of extensions to or new marine parks due any day. (Dampier Archipelago and Cape Preston, Montebellos, Barrow Island and Rowley Shoals have been released since the RFW board meeting)

A response has been received from the Minister for Environment which appears to be replying to the election policy questions from Recfishwest, and this is surprising because the tradition is that policies are expressed as party policies, not individual portfolio policies, and few say "get lost" like these ones do.

Liberal Coalition party policies are coming out soon.

Recfishwest is investigating accommodation at the Waterman's Marine research laboratories after Fisheries Department researchers move to the new facilities at Hillarys.

Ningaloo and Other Marine Park Objections - 1.

The following is a copy of an email sent to Surf Casting and Angling Club members, enclosing a copy of the email to Members of Parliament and Candidates for election at the next State Election..

You will have seen a lot of recent publicity about the Ningaloo Marine Park. Recreational anglers have a lot of concerns about the way the closed areas have been decided and have been increased without sufficient justification in an apparent attempt to woo the votes of the conservation lobbies.

This is a complex issue, but a very telling comment is from Ron Campbell, a now former member of the local Ningaloo Coral Coast Committee who said:-

"I'm not sitting anymore, I resigned last Friday. I had been a member since its inception. Throughout the last 14 months our committee debated and scrutinized at length, each of the 22 proposed changes/extensions to the reserve system. They examined all the pros and cons environmentally, socially, and practically. These areas were nominated for inclusion into the draft because of some outstanding feature/environmental value setting them apart from the rest of the reef.

What happened? How did we end up with a plan increased to 34%? None of the areas in the 6% increase have been put to any test or consultative process. Obviously they were not considered environmentally significant to be included in the original plan, so how can these changes be even remotely credible or democratic?

What kind of autocratic BS is this? This government has sold out our committee, the locals and the public of Western Australia. This is the thin edge of the wedge, all West Australians whether they agree or not with this plan have to sit up and take notice of a government willing to attack a democratic process for their own gain. Without the tiniest shred of deliberation and the stroke of a pen they have taken away a huge chunk of our lifestyle, if we as a community accept these changes where will it end?"

Now you would expect that he would know what areas were significant after all that discussion, wouldn't you?

A real concern is that this same apparent misuse of the community involvement and consultation process could happen to the many future proposed Marine Parks.

Two Marine Parks which are "ready to go" are the Capes and the Walpole/Nornalup Inlets Marine Parks. The conservation groups are not happy with the current draft proposals, and you can be sure that they will be pushing hard for a minimum 30% to 50% of the areas to be completely closed to any recreational fishing. Those groups are already saying 34% isn't enough at Ningaloo.

The government could release those drafts for the 3 month public consultation process and then do whatever they want after that - unless they get a strong message to listen to recreational anglers who are only asking for a fair deal which recognises sustainable recreational angling and which is based on reality and science, not on ideology or political deals or expediency.

Even if you don't go near Ningaloo and the unfair fishing restrictions there won't affect you personally, think about the future. You can be sure that it will only be a matter of time before a marine park which does affect you will be proposed. And that could involve major restrictions in metro Marine Parks such as Shoalwater and Marmion Marine Parks.

If you have any worries about Ningaloo and/or what might follow, you need to make sure YOUR elected member of Parliament is aware of what you think about the proposed extensions and/or the way these have been decided, so that if they really listen to their constituents, they can decide how they will handle this.

Their response may well help you decide how you will exercise your democratic right and who YOU will vote for at the next State election.

It's good if people can put some ideas into their own words and send that to THEIR member of Parliament and members of the Government, friends, newspapers, etc. A few copies and pastes, a few word changes and there's a personal email to a person/people who should listen to you.

Ningaloo and Other Marine Park Objections - 2.

The following is a copy of an email sent individually addressed to members of Parliament and candidates for election at the next State Election, from: Secretary Australian Anglers Association WA.

Dear Mr. (or Ms or Mrs.).....

The Australian Anglers Association (WA Division) is an Association which promotes club angling as a sport and recreation for everyone. Our 2004 membership is made up of 27 fishing clubs from metro and country areas of the State.

Like many other recreational anglers, Association members are conscious of and concerned about environmental issues and sustainability of both the environment and of fishing.

The Executive of the Association has authorised me to contact you and express our serious concerns about the actions of the Government or CALM or MPRA in the process of deciding the Marine Park for Ningaloo and nearby islands.

There are so many issues and discrepancies with the process for Ningaloo. The latest is where the Government is quoting the "Status of Coral Reefs of the World 2004" as specifically supporting and justifying their actions, when it does not.

We have summarised some of our concerns in the following summary. <u>Every sentence could be expanded out to many paragraphs of explanation and examples.</u>

We understand the CALM Act requires the Governor to place an order in the Government Gazette creating the Ningaloo Marine Park etc, and that the order must be placed before the Houses of the Parliament for 14 sitting days.

Please listen to recreational anglers who are only asking for a fair deal which recognises sustainable recreational angling and which is based on reality and science, not on ideology or political deals or expediency.

Please help in any way possible to convince the Government to reconsider the plans for the Ningaloo Marine Park and Muiron Islands MCR.

As you are aware, a State election is due in 2005. We look forward to your reply so that we can inform the members about your response to anglers' serious concerns about the proposals for Ningaloo.

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Concerns about Marine park planning for Ningaloo.

We object to the Government's plans for increases in no take zones in the Ningaloo and Muiron islands Marine Park and its extension. We object to the way these latest increases above the 28% area clearly stated in the draft plan were decided. And of course we have some concerns about the original 28% as well.

The proposed increases were put out for public comments, but ended up being increased even further without any science or justification, in an attempt to get approval from groups which want nothing less than closures of 50% or more of the area.

The 6% increase flies in the face of the process the government was publicly committed to. The Coral Coasts Committee considered all the environmental, social and practical aspects for each of the 22 changes included in the original proposal because of a stated outstanding feature and purported scientific research warranting sanctuary protection.

Without due process and more importantly public consultation how can the addition of these extra areas be even remotely credible?. Some committee members are so annoyed by this sell out of the Committee and the process that they have resigned in protest.

The statement from the Minister for Fisheries in Parliament that "he is unaware of any research suggesting that recreational fishing is affecting biodiversity within the Park", and the advice of the world renowned Department of Fisheries that there is no need for such large no take zones, and in fact there may be a risk in having these zones, have all been ignored.

No notice was taken of existing and future fisheries management arrangements for sustainable recreational fishing, but instead claims of fisheries management benefits from no take zones have been used as part of the justification for their size and locations.

Suggestions from many recreational fishing organisations about alternatives have been ignored completely, making it obvious that the Government is not honest about its supposed commitment to effective inclusion and consultation with ALL key stakeholders .

We can not see why Ningaloo needs a bigger percentage of no take zones than the Great Barrier Reef

when even the conservationists agree that the impact from activities on land near the Great Barrier Reef are the major causes of problems there, and those threats simply don't exist at Ningaloo.

We do not think it is fair that major restrictions apply ONLY to recreational anglers, and not to any other activity, some of which WILL affect the reef, but have been ignored.

We object to the way that publicity for the Park implies that the reef will be badly damaged if the no take areas aren't there.

We object to quoting the "Status of Coral Reefs of the World 2004" as specifically supporting and justifying the proposals, when it does not.

We object to the way that recreational anglers have been presented as being anti conservation because they object to these proposals even when they are not supported by the Department of Fisheries.

We object to publicity which says recreational anglers should be satisfied with the remaining open areas. Percentages of areas remaining open to fishing don't mean much if lots of the good areas for fishing are locked away, and there is no recognition that sanctuary zones can CAUSE fisheries to collapse if you put all the effort into part of the area.

Recreational anglers are not opposed to Marine Parks.

Recreational anglers are not opposed to no take sanctuary zones in the right places for the right reasons.

Recreational anglers want to protect the environment, but locking up large areas is not the only way to do this.

Recreational anglers want sustainable fishing and good fishing experiences.

Recreational anglers want to protect spawning fish stocks and spawning fish aggregations, but these don't need total closures all year long.

Recreational anglers want to protect nursery areas, but the Marine Park plan does not list any of these.

Marine Parks and Sanctuary zones aren't the only way to achieve these things.

Marine Parks and Sanctuary zones by themselves are not SUFFICIENT to achieve these. That needs a region wide approach which the Government recognises and is working on but refuses to apply at Ningaloo.

Marine Parks and Sanctuary zones are NOT the right way to do Fisheries Management.

Recreational anglers don't want to be the only group which has any major restrictions applied.
