

Kalbarri House For Rent.

The Club has a house in Kalbarri. The house is situated close to the river, beaches and town. It has two bedrooms and will sleep up to eight (max) in 1 double bed and 3 bunks, has reverse cycle air conditioning and ceiling fans to keep you cool in the summer months. Field Days 2002 - 2003

FDO Malcolm Harris gave an interesting summary of the last fishing year when he spoke at the trophy presentation night.

Vix and I have only been in the club for just over twelve months and we find ourselves on the committee. Don't know just how that happened, but it did. So first of all I would like to express my gratitude to all those people who have made the field days possible with their assistance over the last nine months. I thought I would share with you my memories of last year's field days.

May - Rottnest. Looking back over the last couple of years, Rottnest always attracted a good number of starters. This time numbers were down some what due to the Exmouth safari held at the same time. I think that they drove to Exmouth just to avoid the bad weather. The boat trip over was a little rough to say the least and by the time we had arrived on the island there were a few very green fishers. The wind abated as the weekend wore

on, needless to say that the return journey was over glass calm waters. In spite of that, the fishing was good, 17 salmon as well as good bags of tailor.

June - Bremer Bay. A bit of a drive to get there, but well worth it. We enjoyed some very good camping facilities at one of the two caravan parks and as well as some good advice on local spots from the manager. It's one of those places that you can fish in any weather, there is so many bays and headlands that you can always find a spot out of the wind some where. It's just as well because again the weather was not the best. Good catches of salmon and skippy.

July - Cape to Cape. The weather gods were not happy with somebody because no sooner had we set off from Perth, a cold front descended on us. Trying to fish the west coast of the capes in windy conditions was to say the least a challenge. We did have some reprieve from the rain until Saturday night but after that it was only suitable for ducks. The conditions did not however prevent a couple of the more senior members from weighing in healthy bags. We received a fishing lesson that weekend; those two I think could find fish in a fruit bowl.

August - Rottnest. We didn't get to this field day but going on the results sheet it looks like it was a good one. Just about everybody weighed in good bags of tailor and herring with six reaching their bag limits of tailor, one of which was caught on fly. Other catches included yellowtail kingfish and snook.

September - S Bend. At last some reasonable weather as well as a good roll up, 22 made the trip north. There was some confusion regarding accommodation, so unfortunately the group was spread out from Dongara to Greenough. S-Bend Caravan Park would have to be the pick of the camping spots in terms of location. Great stretch of coast line and some good tailor were caught as well as 6 mulloway and a shark.

October - Cervantes. Another one we were unable to get to which was a bit of a shame because the Tailor were all good size. Throw in a couple of mulloway and a shark and you get a spot well worth fishing that is only a few hours from Perth. The local fished quite well that weekend as well. You don't normally associate salmon in the metro area with October, but that's what happens sometime.

November - Hill River. This looked to me a pretty unremarkable piece of coast line. Not very deep at all in fact very shallow in places, not what I would call fishy. But I had been told otherwise by more experienced hands than me and as usual they proved right. A couple other pieces of advice also proved spot on - try the steak burger at the service station and try for tailor at mid afternoon.

December - Open. The options for this field day were from Eucla to Wyndham; the only catch was that you have to be back at George's place for the weigh in on Sunday afternoon. Now you wouldn't think that anyone would drive for 7 hours, fish for a day and drive back again in the name of sport. Well that's what three of our members did. One of them weighed in the most fish I have seen for a long time. The catch included pink snapper, tailor, tarwhine and skippy, a very impressive 33 kgs. However the highlight for the weekend would have to have been the night cast. An absolute hoot, apart from the very dubious scoring system, if in fact it was a system.

January - Mandurah 500. This field day coincided with the AAA open fishing competition held in Mandurah. Very well run with a number of our members ensuring that it ran smoothly. Not a great many fish caught due to some very ordinary weather but two of our members took out section prizes for their catches.

February - Open. Another opportunity to fish anywhere in the state. One of the same blokes who likes to drive a lot did it again, this time he topped it off with 12.5kg cobia while the rest of us scratched around for a few tailor and herring.

March - Bluff Creek. This is a magic spot, fresh water creek, good camping spot and kilometers of beautiful beach. This year however it was full of weed when we arrived but miraculously it disappeared over night. Bluff is usually the place where the salmon are plentiful, but not this year. The best we could manage was one decent size salmon, which was caught by a visitor, and a few "sammy juniors". The herring made up for it though.

April - Cape to Cape. Back to the Capes, this time we knew the bad weather was coming so the boundaries were set to include Geographe Bay. This was where the Bluff Creek salmon had moved to. Everybody caught salmon that weekend and usually the hook ups were at our feet which made for some spectacular aerial displays.

All in all, its been incredible year for Vix and me, and a fantastic opportunity to fish places we had only heard about, and with people who are only too willing to share their many years of experience. On 20 June, the Department of Fisheries announced a delay in the implementation date for Western Australia's new recreational fishing rules.

To provide a smooth transition to the new rules in the West Coast and Gascoyne Region, a revised implementation date of October 1 has been endorsed by Fisheries Minister Kim Chance.

Department of Fisheries Recreational Fishing Program Manager Andrew Cribb said the date enables the Government to enact complex legislative changes before the southern summer recreational fishing season starts.

"Rather than changing the rules in the middle of the Gascoyne fishing season, the Department believes the October date will make things easier for recreational fishers in both regions," Mr Cribb said. "The West Coast and Gascoyne implementation change means the State's anglers will be better informed and prepared to take responsibility for their share to ensure that there are Fish for the Future."

AAA Report.

AAA Fishing Clinics are run for the public and for club members in two different areas, each over three nights, to help beginners become proficient and help experienced anglers to learn higher fishing skills.

If you want to learn how to fish better, how to catch your preferred species, what gear to use and where to use it, make sure you're at the Australian Anglers Association's 2003 Fishing Clinics.

The North of River series will be held at Hillarys Yacht Club, Hillarys Marina, (north side) on Mondays, July 7, 14 and 21, all commencing 7:30pm. There will be a door prize each night, and great raffle prizes. Admission: Adults, all three nights for \$22.00, or \$11.00 per night. Juniors (under 16) all three nights for \$11.00, or \$6.00 per night.

These are great nights and always interesting. No matter how much you know, you can always learn something new. The South of the River series will be held on Mondays September 1, 8 and 15 at the Fremantle Sailing Club.

<u>Management of Commercial Fisheries.</u> The Australian Anglers Association is concerned at the delays in the plans for management of professional catches of finfish species shared with recreational fishers, particularly Jewfish, Pink Snapper, Herring, Salmon, etc. AAA sent a letter on 20 March to the Minister for Fisheries, Hon. Kim Chance

AAA asked if some early action could be taken to manage and control commercial catches, because recreational fishers will have their limits changed from 1 July (as was planned then, but since changed to 1 October), and it is equally important that commercial catches be properly controlled from the same date.

AAA gave the Minister the chance to announce some early action, but got nothing. the Minister's reply can be summarised fairly as simply, and only, trying to justify the proposed changes to recreational rules and their timing, and saying "the management of commercial wetline fishing is going ahead". The conservative element in the Fisheries Department (and to be fair, that's not everyone there) seem to have put their views in this letter.

It seems pointless now to push the view that the work on the commercial management changes should have started much earlier, even though that's very obvious now when the Minister talks of "complex issues and require widespread consultation".

The emphasis needed from now on would seem to be to push the process and the timetable for the wetline review and it's implementation so that it all happens in as short a time as possible. That means convincing the Minister and the rest of the Government that the voting public want that. The next State election is 18 months away.

Membership Fees Are Due 1 July 2003.

The membership fees for 2003/4 have been set at the June Committee meeting. There are no changes to the fees except for the concession rate which has returned to the same amount as applied the season before last.

Club membership fees paid for past years were for the year from 1 May to 30 April, but the financial year is from 1 July to 30 June. This made it difficult to know how the club was going financially.

The February 2003 General Meeting changed the Constitution so that membership fees for the ensuing year become due and payable on the 1st of July in each year, and must be paid by 31 July. This change was so that money was received and paid out for services to members over the same financial year period.

The Committee decided that just for this year, the "missed" two months membership from 1 May to 30 June would be paid for after 1 July pro rata with the 2003/4 fees. The amounts due are:-

Eligibility for the concession membership is covered by the Constitution Section 16(e) "The committee shall set a reduced annual membership fee for members of age 60 years or more. This reduced membership fee will apply to pensioners who make application to the committee. Members in paid employment are not eligible for reduced fees."

You need to pay your fees by 31 July, or by the 9 July General meeting if you want to vote at the 9 July Annual General meeting. The above amounts will take your membership up to 30 June 2004. Please contact the Treasurer if you wish to pay by installments.
