2. Terry Fuller gave moved seconded Rick Parker to amend Constitution Section 16, (a) and (b) to read:-

16. Membership Fees.

Membership fees for the ensuing year shall become due and payable on the 1st of July in each year, and must be paid by 31 July.

Any member whose membership fee is not paid by 31 July shall be deemed to be unfinancial and the Committee without further notice may terminate the membership of such person. Such person will not be eligible for any club competition, nor be eligible to vote or stand for Committee selection until membership fee is paid or an alternative arrangement is approved by the Committee.

Amend Section 16 c), d) and e), Section 3 c), Section 4 c), Section 15, replace the word

"subscription" with "membership fee" for wording consistency.

Kalbarri House For Rent.

The Club has a house in Kalbarri. The house is situated close to the river, beaches and town. It has two bedrooms and will sleep up to eight (max) in 1 double bed and 3 bunks, has reverse cycle air conditioning and ceiling fans to keep you cool in the summer months. Users need to bring their own linen, blankets and towels, tea towels, etc.

It has a radio and television, stove with oven, microwave oven, crockery and cutlery and all cooking utensils, fridge and freezer. Outside has a fish cleaning facility and a full width verandah. Rates are:-

Bookings taken for the school holidays go from Saturday to Saturday (leaving by 10am). Outside of school holidays it does not matter. Club members need to do their own cleaning on departure, or we can arrange cleaners at around \$46 per clean, extra on the rates above.

Check in time is 1pm. Check out time is 10am. Keys can be picked up from Ray White, Shop 1, Kalbarri Arcade. If people arrive after hours, they leave a note on the door of their office with a map of how to get to the house and telling them where the key will be.

At the February General Meeting, a change was made to the Club's Competition Rules Sub Section (b) and (c) of Section 3.5.2 Double Handed Accuracy Target Distances.

The reason for this amendment is to bring the Club into line with the distances now being cast by these Sections, as a result of the amended distances introduced at National level and subsequently adopted by the A.A.A. W.A.

Change of Membership Year.

At the February General Meeting, a change was made to the Club's Constitution Sections 16, (a) (b) and (e) which now read: 16. Membership Fees.

- a) Membership fees for the ensuing year shall become due and payable on the 1st of July in each year, and must be paid by 31 July.
- b) Any member whose membership fee is not paid by 31 July shall be deemed to be unfinancial and the Committee without further notice may terminate the membership of such person. Such person will not be eligible for any club competition, nor be eligible to vote or stand for Committee selection until membership fee is paid or an alternative arrangement is approved by the Committee.
- e) The committee shall set a reduced annual membership fee for pensioner members aged 60 years or more. Eligible individual members must apply to the committee for reduced fees. Members in paid employment are not eligible for reduced fees.

Constitution Section 16 c), d) and Section 3 c), Section 4 c), Section 15, have the word "subscription" replaced with "membership fee" for wording consistency.

Effect:- This change aligns the membership year with the financial year so that income and expenses will be in the same period and the club can budget better.

The changed wording in (b) allows a member to make arrangements to pay in installments if approved by the Committee. Once that arrangement is agreed, the member will have all membership rights.

The changes to (e) are rewording and don't change the details from what was passed at the August 2002 meeting.

This change of membership leaves a two month period between the "old" 2002/2003 membership year which ends on 30 April and the "new" 2003/2004 membership year which will start on 1 July for which membership fees will not have been paid.

The Committee has decided that a once-off pro-rata payment of two months' fees will be added to the amount to be collected for the 2003/4 fees. That's an extra 2/12 of the yearly rate, or Single \$12.50, Family \$14.15, Concession \$6.25, Junior \$8.35, Associate \$4.15, at current annual rates - but these need review based on the club's likely income and expenses.

No change is proposed for the Club's fishing and dry casting competition year which runs from the beginning of May to April. The competition year will still end on 30 April so that all competition winners can be decided in time for the Annual Presentation of Trophies in mid June.

From Reel Talk October 1953.

Many thanks to past members Ted Horsley and Vern Pocklington for donating copies of early Reel Talks from 1952 to 1954, and a copy of the Constitution of the Surfcasting and Angling Association of WA from that time.

Here's the October 1953 issue, when the Club was called "The Surf Casting and Angling Association of WA."

Club Activities, October 1953.

The advent of Spring has seen an increase in the Club's activities and membership.

Our casting tournament at Rosalie Park turned out to be one of the best club activities yet organised. No less than 15 members took part and there was a keen interest shown by many onlookers. Some came along to pick up some clues, as they weren't confident enough to try out their own skill. As a result of the interest shown we plan to make it a monthly event and it will be held at Rosalie Park on the weekend after the Field Day.

Our last Field Day to the 14 mile beach beyond Mandurah was notable in that, for the first time, we all went in the one vehicle. We managed to get the use of a truck at a cost of 10/- per person which we considered very reasonable. Unfortunately we didn't get the variety of fish that we had come to expect from this spot. Large skippy, tailor, kingies, salmon, blue sharks and pike have fallen to our "traps" previously and we thought we couldn't miss. However, all could catch silver bream easily and a couple of good skippy and herring were caught. Vic Davis, just to show that sharks were there, landed a 100 lb. wobbegong on his light gear.

As we can get the truck again in October, we're going back to the same spot. We know no better and this time we'll really give the fish a bashing. The truck is large, so we're not afraid of overloading it.

Just here Noel Knight would like me to put in a word of caution to those who may wish to poke their head over the side of the truck to see where we're going. It's not bad for small scrub but it won't shift the larger banksias near the track.

So sure are we of catching fish - real fish - that we're inviting Bunbury Club to come along and try their luck with us.

Felix will need to improve the form he showed last time I or we might consider leaving him home. He even allowed Vic Davis to beat him on points.

I saw Nelson Smith tying steel cable to some huge hooks so he wouldn't lose even the big ones this time.

The arrangements should be simple. Just find your way to Lloyd Dunn's place, in Shenton Park not later than 1:30 pm on Saturday, 17th October, and have with you some "tucker" for evening and morning, some warm "clobber" for a cold night, fishing gear, bait and your fare plus 2/6 for a 'sweep' on the night's fishing.

A trip to the "4 mile" beyond Mandurah by V. Davis, P. Edwards, J. McNerney and L. Dunn failed to convince the Secretary that it was a good fishing spot, but it made Doug Edward a happy man as he was able to take home a real fish, a 10lb mulloway.

Vic Davis also took home a kingie - a six pounder. I won't tell you what the other two of us caught!

Pathfinders For Our Field Day, October 1953.

Well fellars! Vic Davis and I set off about 1:30 p.m. Saturday in the direction of Mandurah. Feelings were high, although the wipers on our eyes were busy, and assurances of good weather, the main topic of our conversation. This we found later had good effect.

Mandurah. Davis pulled his safety belt tight and yelled: "Well, Mac, here we go," Hellzapoppin wasn't in it. If you compare a cherry on a sponge cake to a dice in a shaker, then that's Davis and me. His van passenger seating is specially for keeping his mates awake for earbashing, which is plenty.

Destination reached, - The Fourteen Mile Beach - I managed to lift my head to the level of the windscreen still suffering slight concussion, raised my eyes to the sandhills about two hundred yards in front, and saw Vic gesticulating wildly for me to come up there. I drag myself up and find a beaut fishing possie spread out before us. Well by the time I'm rigged, Davis has two silver bream. I get five, he then has a dozen.

Vic then decides he's had bream, "Now for some bigguns," he said. In a matter of ten minutes he hooked into a grey nurse; we saw it as it lashed around, tail showing out of the water about 40 yards out on the bank. Vic starts winching him in to almost gaffing distance. I'm at the ready, with the gaff, but as he draws closer, the hook straightens and tears out, Vic said some horrid things and I went back to my rod. Yes, I put my heavy line out but had no luck, Tally time 5:30. Vic:- 10 silver bream, 1 salmon, 1 grey nurse hooked and got away, I skippy, 1 whiting. Mac:- 5 silver bream. I wish the cow would give me a go.

Vic again hooks a grey nurse, time 5:45, ratchet screams; this one is well hooked too. Vic lays into him and makes his rod and drag work overtime..... I'm in position "Do or Die," all of a sudden Davis gives an incoherent yell and the shark moves out a bit. I still stand firm; look around at Vic doing a Fandango, then back at the shark which is still mucking around, back again to Vic, hear him above the sound of the surf, yelling "He's loose." I find climbing up the gaff handle was much easier than coming down. Once again, the hooks had straightened and torn out.

Here I state that Vic's wife pins a beret on his head through his tabs (ears to you) so that he'll have some hair left when he comes home from a fishing trip.

It's good to have someone in the club in a venture so closely related to our sport and the tackle we need. Rick will be sponsoring the Open Lure fishing competition, to be known as the Barron Lure Competition.

Club Web Site Update.

"Search" sites are like an index or directory of the Internet. You put in some words you're interested in, and the search page shows you where you can find those words. The results are given to you in pages with 10 to 15 internet locations on each, and you can click on the link for one of the pages and that individual page will be displayed so you can read it.

Of course, most times there are hundreds or thousands of internet pages with those particular words in, and people will look at the first few screen fulls of the search listing, that's 30 or 40 locations, and if they find something interesting about what they are looking for, they will never get to the ones listed below that.

And of course, it depends on what people search for, and where they do the search, and there's about 357,000,000,000,000,000 different possibilities, give or take a few numbers on the first significant digits and add or subtract several 0's. (That number is made up, in case you didn't guess.)

The "holy grail" of website design is to be on the first page or screen of the list in the search results. And once you're up there, the aim is to stay there.

But who decides what order things are listed in? That's the secret of the "Search Engines", which have programs which continuously trawl around the internet looking for new and updated pages, indexing the contents, and working out how to present it.

Search engines are usually free to users, paid for by advertising, and want to give their users the answers they are looking for. If the answers aren't good enough, the users will go off to use other search engines, and that cuts the advertising and the revenue.


There's been lots written about how to get high up on the list, and the search engines have had to evolve to keep ahead of the people who have manipulated their websites just to fit what the search engines are looking for to decide what order they should be listed in. Manipulated pages don't give the user what they're looking for and expecting, and that really annoys most people.

It's all too hard to manipulate the pages and keep up with the search engines as they refine their "rules to defeat the scammers", and your web site pages risk getting dropped by the search engines if they work out you are "fiddling the system".

So I took the advice of several of the specialists who said "just put in lots of content, keep it simple, make sure that the description and titles match the contents, have lots of links between the pages, all the links work, the pages are clean, consistent and load quickly." Which seemed to make sense and was exactly what I thought people expect in a web site, because that's what I expect. Flashy sites often don't tell you very much.

How does the club's web site rank in Internet search results? Well of course it depends on what you're looking for, but here's some examples, using actual searches which have lead other people to the Club web site.

If someone searches for "learn surf casting" on the Google Search page, the first 3 entries out of about 14,500 point to the club's web site, two directly and one via the AAA web site.



If someone searches for "hints for surf fishing from beach" on the Yahoo search page, the club web page is number 6 out of 2,790

Some other searches are:- "beach fishing australia" western number 6 of about 80,400, "fishing tackle western australia" number 3 of about "surfcasting 19,900, techniques" number 9 2450, about "surfcasting australia" number 1 of about 720, "western australia club membership

form" number 2 of about 61,500 (that's an interesting search question to ask!).

I would be interested in what other club members search for on the Internet about fishing, so that I can check where the Club Web pages fit, and can put in some real content which might help to get the Club web pages higher up in the list.

Look at the website http://www.surfcasters.iinet.net.au or if you have a computer but don't have Internet access, I can supply you with a CD of all the files and photos so that you can look at everything whenever you like. I'll even throw in everything from the AAA web site.

Lost Fishing Access.

The following has been put out by Recfishwest. This is your chance to list all those places you can't get to now. You can send the list to Terry Fuller if you like, and I'll pass it on.

Access to fishing locations has been one of the most important issues confronting the recreational fishing sector for a long time.

In recent times the activities of those seeking to reduce or prevent recreational fishing access to coastal, estuarine or river locations are becoming more commonplace and their campaigns are becoming more aggressive. While some access restrictions may be warranted, often they are based upon frivolous or unrelated reasons and must be challenged. Some of the restrictions do not have a legislative foundation.

Ensuring equitable recreational fishing access is one of the key functions of Recfishwest and we work hard to ensure that access restrictions are minimised or justified.

However the reality is that, given the small size of the Recfishwest organisation, we have tended to focus on 'putting out the fires' as they have arisen. While this has been necessary in some cases it has drawn our attention away from the need to strategically address the broader issue of access or to coordinate and maximise the use of the available resources.

Appropriately the Recfishwest Board has determined that an important first step is to develop a clear picture of the number, size and relative impact of recreational fishing closures that already exist in WA.

Your help is important in this regard.

We would appreciate your assistance by informing us of any recreational fishing area closures or details of where you have been denied access to fishing locations in your local region.

We are hoping that a collation of the information we receive will build a comprehensive snapshot of the situation currently facing recreational fishers in WA. It should become an extremely useful tool in Recfishwest's broader access negotiations and also in identifying areas in need of particular attention.

It would be appreciated if you could provide details of any recreational fishing area closures or where you have been denied access to fishing locations in your local region. Please use the following headings and return information to us at email recfish@recfishwest.org.au

Study Shows Fish Do Not Feel Pain

James Rose, a professor of zoology and physiology at the University of Wyoming, compared the nervous systems and responses of fish and mammals and found that pain is an emotional or psychological response controlled by a part of the brain that fish do not have. The study concluded that fish brains are not developed enough to sense pain.

Previous studies which suggested fish did feel pain had confused pain with the detection of an injury by the nervous system. The new study makes it clear that they are not the same thing.

The report explained the difference as like a person who is anaesthetised in an operating theatre who will still respond physically to some external stimulus but will not feel pain.

The author is reported as saying "There are people who aren't comfortable with my findings but those who don't accept them have yet to raise any scientific challenge."

The study is likely to cause lots of debate by "experts" both for and against fishing, for example those who argue that fish and mammals are the same, mammals feel pain, therefore fish must feel pain.

One report like this won't make the anti-angling groups go away. Look after your fish, treat them humanely, and don't supply any ammunition against responsible fishing.

Notice of Motion - Dry Casting Rules.

Amend Competition Rules, Section 3.2.3 MARKERS CASTS, to read

"All markers competing in casting shall carry out their respective competition casting at the completion of each event."

Add a third paragraph to Competition Rules, Section 3.2.10, to read

"There shall be two (2) markers for each event."

West Coast and Gascoyne Changes.

The State Government has announced new recreational fishing rules to apply from 1 July 2003. See the details in the February Reel Talk.

The internet bulletin boards have been smoking with the hot comments on these changes, with the possession limits getting a lot of attention.

A lot of people are getting very hot under the collar about the 20kg limit with few mentioning the whole fish options.

There is a lot of confusion about exactly what is allowed when it comes to "whole" fish versus "fillets", with lots of different opinions flying around.

AAA asked Recfishwest about this at a recent meeting, and got their understanding of how Fisheries will apply that, based on past discussions. It seems reasonable, but isn't written down anywhere.

AAA will prepare a letter to the Minister and Recfishwest setting out the problems and asking for public statements on how any definitions of "whole" fish and "fillets" will be applied. AAA will also put up a case about the "no filleting at sea" rule which the boaties have problems with.

Another hot topic is managing of the professional catches. It's happening, and some announcements are expected very soon, but it seems that unless the Government makes some changes ahead of the formal process, management for the professionals will not be changed very much when the recreational changes come in.

AAA will be putting a pretty strong case to the Minister, Fisheries and Recfishwest that some management of professional catches must come in at the same time as the recreational changes, or these should be deferred.



Thanks to Chas Riegert for a suggestion to improve the Reel Talk by listing the individual accuracy scores in the dry casting report. The scores are recorded on the day but will take some extra work to put them into a spreadsheet and it will then be simple to copy them, and they will be included as part of the Dry Casting report in future Reel Talks.

Out of bounds and break offs during distance events will be included in results as "Out" and "B/O" in future months results. Accuracy "zeros" indicates it landed too far away from the target to score!

Give the Dry Casting Markers a Go!

After the rain last dry casting day, some sinkers were burying themselves up to 200 mm into the softened ground. They don't come out easily. Tony said "should have brought along a bobcat to dig some of them out."

Sinkers with a strong leader are easier to get out because the marker can use this leader to pull the sinkers out of the ground "backwards", after loosening up the grass a bit if necessary.

If you don't use a good strong leader, and that means 40 to 60 lb, not just a wimpy 25 lb, then you risk having your sinker mangled and/or your leader chafed because the marker has to dig through the grass for the sinker with pliers and drag it out of the ground with the pliers, and it's hard to know where and how deep to dig. And that grass is tough.

All this slows down the scoring and the casting, and put your next casts at risk of a leader breaking off because it has been damaged.

Please check the length of your plastic tubing, Some ended up only 20 or 30 mm out of the ground, and that makes finding them very difficult. Use near the maximum length of 250mm rather than the minimum length of 200mm, please.

You might think a heavier leader and longer tube would cost you some distance cast, but it might only be a small distance. A strong leader and enough tubing makes the markers' job a lot easier and helps them look after your gear for you. Of course if you're trying for maximum distance down to the last few parts of a metre - then it's up to you.

The distances for the double handed and single accuracy events were handed out in December. The usual arrangement is that the distances are not known until the casting day. New sets of target distances will be chosen for the rest of this competition year, so you can throw away that list.

How to Get to Bluff Creek.

A good map is the RAC's "Albany Region Tour Planner". I can't print a copy here because it's copyright.

From Mount Barker, there are two main ways to get to Bluff Creek. If you get yourself a copy of the map it's obvious.

1. From Mount Barker, take the Porongorup road to the Chester Pass road, turn right (south) go 3 kilometers, turn left on to a gravel road, go about two km and take the right fork. About 3 km on take the left fork and continue on Mindijup road until you cross a ford over the Kalgan River. That's 11 km in from the Chester Pass road.

A few km on you'll hit the bitumen at the entrance to a mine site. 5 km from the ford there's a T junction with Deep Creek Road - stay on the bitumen for another 3 km until you reach Palmdale Road. Turn right into Palmdale, go only a short distance and then turn left into Fish Track road (gravel). It's 7 km to the South Coast Highway (Albany-Jerramungup Road). From here, it's 5 km to Manypeaks, 6 km more to Cheyne Beach Road, 7 km more to Bluff Creek Road (gravel) on the right, 9 km in to the start of the track to the beach.

2. From Mount Barker, go to Albany, out the South Coast Highway (Albany-Jerramungup Road) to Manypeaks, and continue as above.

If you are travelling at night, the Mount Barker service station closes at 10pm, so if you need fuel, you may need to go to Albany to refuel at the 24 hour station in Yorke Street.
