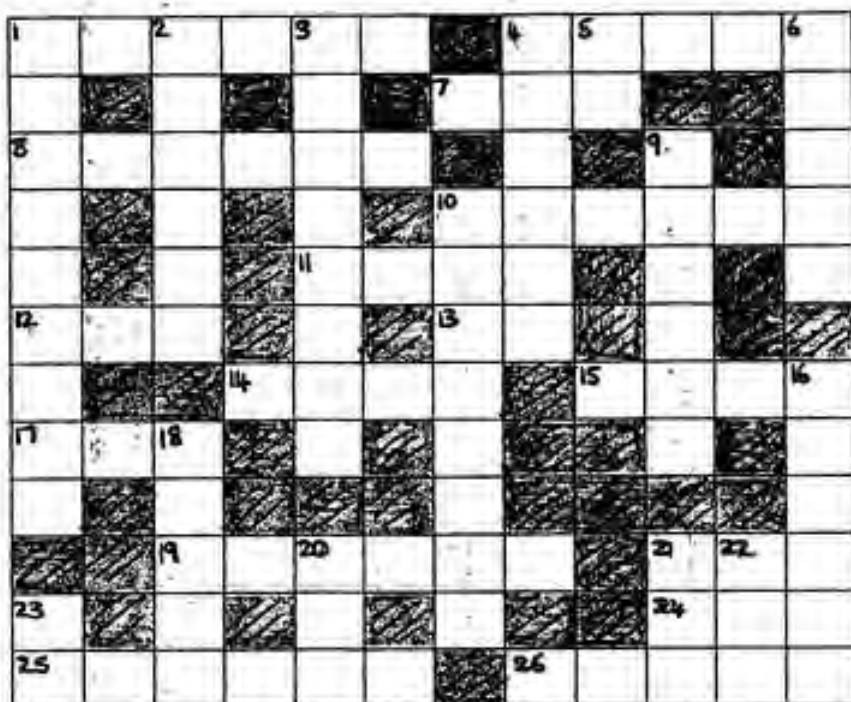

Burley takes many forms. Some just sprinkle stale bread on the water surface, some use a mixture of wheat and bran made into a dough. Others prefer off meat placed in a tin punched with holes and tied with a long string to toss into the water. A piece of dead rabbit or old fish heads enclosed in wire is often left at a spot for a couple of days to attract bream to where the fisherman wants them. So as a little reminder, Keep everything you don't like to eat off a fish (skin, roe, heads, gills, intestines etc) and freeze them for burley for your next fishing outing.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST FISHING HINTS

EXTRACT FROM 1962 REEL TALK

Don't drop oil on your line when oiling your reel. Always wash salt off line in fresh water before storing.

Watch the guides, rod tip, reel pillars and spools for rough spots and cracks. A magnifying glass will help.

Examine your line for worn places, particularly near the tip end, as this is the part of line that receives the most wear. It is wise to cut off a foot or so periodically.

Always use a swivel when casting with a spinner, and a double swivel if your plug or lure is a heavy one.

When walking through a bush track with your rod hold it with the reel in front and the tip behind you. There is less likelihood of the tip of your rod being snapped off through contact with low bushes or undergrowth. The same applies when placing your rod in rod holders on your car.

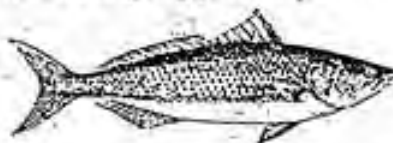

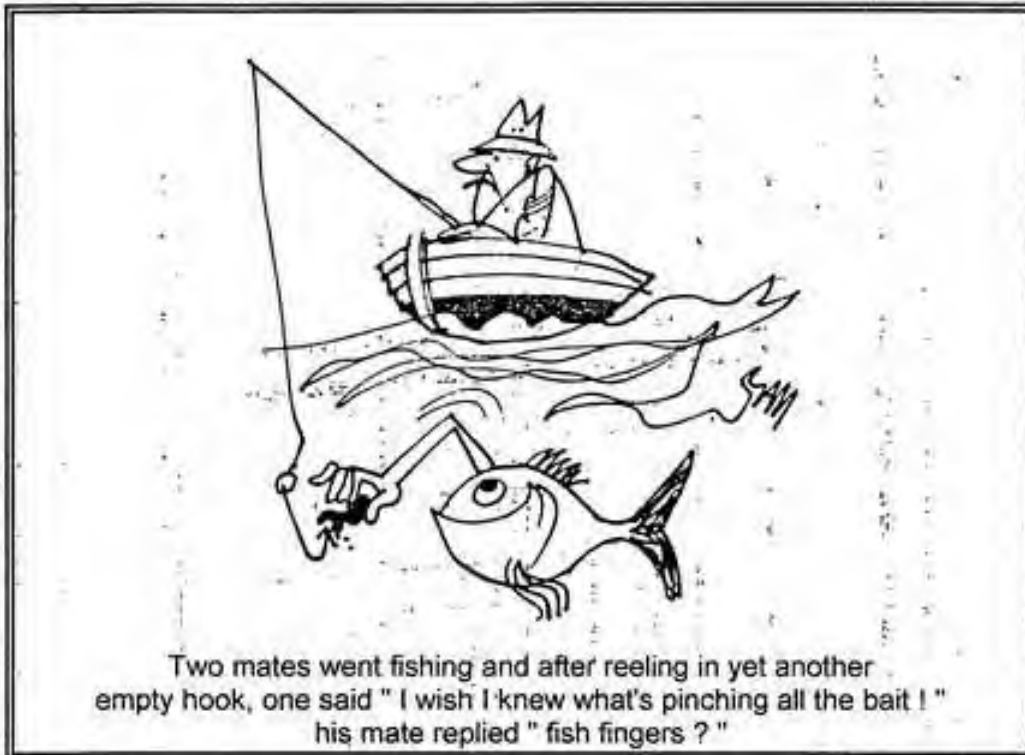

A TRIP TO FALSE ENTRANCE

Our destination - Shark Bay.

We caught up with Ian & Phil at the 440 roadhouse outside Geraldton and had an easy drive northwards. A brief stop was needed at the Billabong roadhouse to fix the coax cable on Allen's CB aerial. (It was only working within 100 metres - we could have got more range if we'd used 2 tin cans and a piece of string!) Our intention was to get to False Entrance before dusk to set up camp, but no luck as we arrived about 8pm and it was well and truly dark. Rom and Sue saw our headlights from miles away and greeted us over the CB with the great news that we had the spot to ourselves. We arrived to a howling 12-18 knot southerly wind which preceded to make our life difficult in trying to set up the main tent. (having all of the tent poles would have helped!) After much cursing, puffing and grunting we finally had something that resembled a campsite and bedded down for the night.

Everyone was up early the next morning in anticipation of ballooning for some great fish. It was to be Ian and Allen's day for Mackerel with the first Spaniard weighing in at a hefty 14.5kg (caught by Ian in the first hour). Murray and Phil - zippo! No club open competition possibilities yet.

We managed to drag four good sized pink snapper onto the rocks but lost many more who dragged our lines into the rock snags. I managed to get one particularly good sized snapper beached on the platform below only to lose it at the gaff. The hooks pulled out when the gaff hit the Snapper on the head or so I'm told by the gaff man (Phil). When we got back to camp and weighed the biggest Snapper it pulled the scales down to 5.1kg (sorry George I). We were also informed that Sue had secured her game fish badge on a healthy 6.25kg Shark Mackerel caught off the point on a lure using 6kg line. Rom at this stage had also secured a couple of Spanish Mackerel as well as losing 2 Bronzies at the gaff.

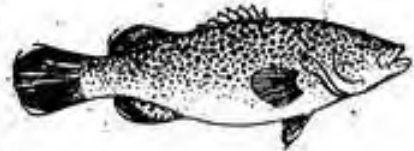

COOKS CORNER

GRILLED MACKEREL STEAKS

8 Mackerel Fillets	2 ripe tomatoes
butter	2 lemons
8 bacon rashers	parsley



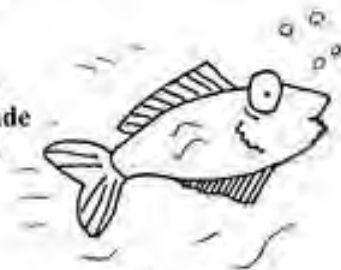
Cut the Mackerel steaks straight across the body of the fish, leaving the bone in the steaks. Place under a hot griller with a knob of butter and cook for five to six minutes. Squeeze lemon juice over the fish and cover with slices of tomato and bacon. Cook until bacon is crisp and serve garnished with parsley.

BBQ MACKEREL

Wrap in foil Mackerel fillets, butter, lemon or lime juice, diced fresh garlic, parsley and pepper. Bake in the weber or cook straight on the BBQ plate.
It's cooked when a skewer passes through easily (about 10 mins)

CITRUS-GLAZED MACKEREL

4 Mackerel fillets	1 tablespoon orange marmalade
3 teaspoons olive oil	1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 teaspoon butter	4 orange slices
3/4 cup fresh orange juice	4 lemon slice
juice of one lemon	fresh parsley



In a frying pan, heat butter and oil and saute fillets on both sides over a low heat. Remove from pan and keep warm. Add orange and lemon juice, lemon rind, and marmalade and stir. Boil until liquid is reduced by half. Garnish fish with a slice of lemon and a slice of orange and spoon liquid over fish. garnish with parsley and black pepper.
