MAL & JENNY HEAD'S TRIP 2009

This is Jenny Head's story about her and Mal's trip to the 31st National Angling Championships and Convention at Wallaroo, South Australia and beyond to Melbourne, Brisbane and Cairns March – June 2009.

After many months of talking, planning and organising, it was time to leave for South Australia. Car serviced, camper checked, 18ft PVC pole for rods, mail sorted, lawns organised to be cut etc ... all done. Now what day will we leave? Wednesday, "No" Mal has to go to the Club meeting and collect the cans. Okay, Thursday, "No" Jenny has developed a tooth ache so it's off to the dentist. So, now it will be Friday. Friday 13th, well that doesn't matter, we are not superstitious, so it's Friday we leave. Up early Friday morning, all packed up, rods tied on, camper hooked up, all ready to go. Down the road, stopped at the lights, BANG. What was that?! Oops, Mal had forgotten to put the pin in the tow ball to the camper trailer. The camper had jumped forward straight into the back of the car and number plate. "Not to worry", said Mal, as he pushed the camper back onto the tow ball. Lucky the chains were put on properly. No problem. Off we go again, heading to Norseman for the night with a big dent in the car and Mal's pride also dented.

Next day heading to the border, down the 146.6km road, "Australia's longest straight road". Sailing along at a steady 100kph with coffee and lunch breaks, changing drivers every two hours. Happily singing along with Slim Dusty, Marty Robbins, and Jim Reeves. Stopped at Eucla Caravan Park just 12km to the South Australia border. Next morning, off to Border Village, photo sessions with the Big Kangaroo and the Welcome to South Australia Border sign and then it was off again. Finally into South Australia, heading to Ceduna. It was perfect weather for travelling. The Nullabor consists of low scrub and when you get to the Nullabor Roadhouse, it changes into windy road and trees, quite a contrast. Everything was so lovely and green, a beautiful drive. As we drove into the Nullabor Roadhouse in the middle of nowhere, there to greet us was a family of six dingoes. A great photo shot along with the "Big Whale".

It's amazing you don't see many cars and caravans on the road, plenty of road trains (three trailers long) roaring down the highway. But when you stop at the roadhouses, there are cars and vans everywhere. Where do all these people come from? It's the same in the caravan parks, people seem to appear from nowhere.

As we headed to Ceduna, we passed through Penong. It was back into civilization again, houses, football fields, tennis courts, school zone, lovely rest area and 50km speed limit. Penong is a wheat growing area and they have had plenty of rain. All the soil looked so rich and green. Then it was through the South Australian quarantine check station and onto Ceduna. Our text messages started going off, back into mobile phone coverage at last. This is definitely civilization again. Arrived at Ceduna mid-afternoon, set up camp, time for a stroll along the beautiful foreshore and the jetty. Water, sea air and a glass of wine. This is the life for us.

On the road again next morning heading to Port Augusta, getting well into this tourist mode. Varying countryside, beautiful day, sun shining and Kenny Rogers singing to us "My World Begins and Ends With You". (How romantic is that?) Heading to Kimba for lunch. When we arrived, six caravans, four cars are already there having lunch at the rest area. As we got out of the car, there in all its glory was the "Big Galah" (not Mal) and I mean Big – 8 metres high, 2.5 metres wide and weighing 2.3 tons. Definitely a photo shot. The sign across the top of the shop read "Half Way Across Australia" and we were starting to feel that way. Eyre Highway, here we come. Down through the town of Iron Knob, an open cut mine (iron ore), right on the highway, then on to Port Augusta. The Flinders Ranges were a picture to be seen, a few white clouds just sitting on top of the ranges and the sun shining brightly, what a beautiful sight. Arrived at Port Augusta; Adelaide here we come, tomorrow. As we headed to Adelaide, passed through Port Wakefield and checked on the Yorke Peninsula sign when we need to come back to the Championships. Dual carriage way from Port Wakefield into Adelaide, easy driving. Arrived at Glenelg, our caravan park right on the beach. This will do us nicely for the next three days. Time to catch up on some washing, relaxing, walk along the beach, see our friends, and just be a tourist. No set plans, just do as we please. Life could not be any better. Three lovely days in Adelaide, it was time to move on, up the Port Wakefield Highway to the Yorke Peninsula then heading to Wallaroo for our 7th Championships. Arrived at Wallaroo around lunchtime to be greeted by Leonie, Bob and their brand new caravan. Unpacked and set up camp, then time to catch up with some Victorian and New South Wales opposition who had also arrived today.

The Convention is held every two years in different States. The WA Casting Team arrived on Saturday. They had flown to Adelaide and hired a bus to Wallaroo. Time for some serious practise each morning before the competition on Wednesday and Thursday. At the Opening Ceremony, each State raised their flag. The Western Australian Team looked very smart in their black and gold uniform. The casting all went off well. Well done to all those who participated and congratulations to the winners. A good time was had by all and we look forward to the next one at South West Rocks, New South Wales in 2011. After two weeks at Wallaroo, it was time to say farewell to old friends as well as the new friends whom we had met. We will be heading to Melbourne to see our daughter, son-inlaw, and two beautiful grand-daughters who are eagerly awaiting our arrival. Time to check out Melbourne tourist spots and see some AFL football games before we fly up to Cairns for two weeks, and then catch the Sunlander train down to Brisbane to catch up with friends. We'll return back to Melbourne to pick up our car and camper and begin our journey home to Perth. We hope to be back in June, so keep all the cans and bring them along to the June General Meeting.

If the answers are **NOT** the same, then answer this:-

Question 5. Why are you doing that?

Why would anyone say they want to achieve something, but act in a way that will not actually achieve that? "Designed and guaranteed to fail," "waste of everyone's time" or "hidden agenda" come to mind.

Yes, I know, these are simple motherhood questions, everyone knows that, etc. But do they do it?

RANDOM THOUGHTS

The following uses parts of an article from the October 2004 Reel Talk with some updates. These thoughts and suggestions are based on what works for me and what doesn't work as well for me, or what goes smoothly and what goes less smoothly, experience and lessons from successes and failures and mistakes. Of course, nothing is ever always good or bad, because there can be shades in between. And you might think differently.

Why is this in this edition of the Reel Talk? What's the relevance to the Surf Casting and Angling Club at present? I'll leave that for you to work out.

"Do they know enough to know what they don't know?" Or do you? If people don't know enough, they can think that they do know it all, simply because they don't realise the limits of what they do know.

There's so much to know, and we can't all know about everything. But we can all ask questions, we can all get other people's opinions and ideas and knowledge, we can all do some research and homework and get informed and collect the details before we start on deciding what to do.

Questions. Never ask a question or force an answer if you already know and/or might not like the answer. Find a different way of handling it. Or you might regret you asked that question.

Know the other side and what he is likely to do, how he will react. Be careful of starting a fight you might lose. Be careful of winning on a few issues, but losing out overall.

The Message or the Messenger? If you don't like the message, do something. But first make sure you really do understand the whole message and haven't misunderstood. Read or listen to it and think about it all - don't just react to it or react to the messenger.

If the message fits you, then accept it and deal with it; but don't just "shoot the messenger".

Evading or avoiding or ignoring the issues in the message or the person raising them is not actually dealing with them. Sometimes it takes a lot more time and hassles to avoid an answer than it would take to just do it once and do it properly. Some issues may need to be handled by agreeing to disagree.

Play the man or play the ball? If you attack the man, not the issue, you will lose or risk losing lots of support. Attacking the issue can be just as effective, and can be used to show all the problems. It should focus on what has or has not been done, but should not be a personal attack. If you don't have a good case to put about the issue, how do you expect to convince others to support you?

If you attack the man, what sort of cooperation from him can you expect in future? Beware of winning on one issue and losing out big time for the rest of the time and you might still need to get his cooperation on some things.

Cooperation or confrontation? You can get more done by cooperation than by confrontation. Give credit where it is deserved. Criticise what has been done, not the person who did it. Save that for much, much later when and only if rarely it might be the right thing to do.

Like them or not, some people have influence, contacts and knowledge, and/or are recognised by people as someone who **should** be listened to. Who loses if you refuse to work with them? Use them where they can help. Do your own thing where that works and you know enough. If something doesn't work, think about it try something else.

The truth. The truth stands - but just being true is not enough to justify it. Some part-truths can be just as bad as lies if they mislead and especially if you know (or should know) that they will mislead.

It's a lot easier to always tell the truth, or enough of it not to mislead, or if that doesn't suit the purpose, just say nothing. Remember the old saying "you can fool all the people some of the time, you can fool some of the people all of the time, but you can't fool all of the people all of the time."

Putting a case. Don't overstate the case or risk getting proved wrong. If the case is weak, informed people who care enough will respond and show the weaknesses in the case and the weaknesses in the processes.

Don't make a statement unless you are sure of the facts. Instead ask a question to find out. Then quote and list the sources of all information or "facts" used.

Repeating things. Just saying things many times, or saying the same things more forcefully **doesn't make them right.**

Repetition and forcefulness are techniques used very successfully at times to passive or one-way audiences, especially in the media. If people see the same things in different places, some will think it must be right, mustn't it?

But it's dangerous and a waste of time to use that repetition technique on informed people who can see what is going on, and will challenge and put the alternatives or the facts so that people get to see the other alternatives.

Do it once, do it properly...

Doing things takes valuable volunteer time, or costs money. How can this time or cost be reduced? Do it once, do it properly, record it and then move on to the next task makes a lot of sense.

How much extra time will it take to record how the job was done, so the next time it comes up it can be handled with the same consistent result? What if a different person has to do it the next time? How can he be expected to know how to do it and get a consistent answer if none of the method, issues and history are recorded? How much time will be wasted investigating and deciding instead of just using the records from the first time or previous time it was done?

Fireman or Fire Prevention Officer? Who is most valued? Who is the first to get cut back when someone is trying to "save" money or cut staff? Who is always welcomed when the fire's blazing and disaster looms? Who often doesn't get any credit when there weren't any fires this week/ this month/ this year?

Who is seen as just a pedantic pain in the backside with fire prevention regulations and rules stopping people from doing risky things they think they should be able to do? See "do they know enough to know what they don't know?"

So if you want to be valued by people who don't think too hard, then become a "fix it" person who is good at putting out the fires, mending things, fixing up the hassles and getting people out of trouble.

But the <u>really valuable person</u> is the one who works in the background and stops those unwanted things and those hassles from ever happening, so the fixes aren't needed, things run smoothly and people's valuable volunteer time is spent on <u>new and essential</u> <u>productive work</u>, not wasted redoing and rehashing the same stuff over and over and over again.

Recfishwest Report for Surfcasters General Meeting 8 April 2009

1. Meeting of the Shoalwater Islands Marine Park Focus Group 30 March 2009 - Point Peron sanctuary zone proposal.

Background:- This sanctuary zone had been proposed by the then Minister and local member Mark McGowan in 2006, very late in the process and outside of all of the accepted consultation processes. The Focus Group had refused to include it in the 2007 Management Plan, however the plan listed that further discussion would occur.

Objectives for the zone had been prepared by Dept of Environment and Conservation staff for consideration by the Focus Group, with proposed boundaries including two alternative *"concessions"* to recreational fishing.



Objectives

- 1. To protect a representative area of high diversity macroalgal dominated subtidal reef and the intertidal reef habitats (which are not adequately represented in the other sanctuary zones in the Shoalwater Islands Marine Park).
- 2. To facilitate the monitoring and research (in collaboration with Perth's tertiary institutions) of representative intertidal and macroalgal dominated subtidal reef communities
- 3. To provide accessible protected areas of diverse habitat and species for local schools, tertiary institutions and the community for marine education programs.
- 4. Provide divers and snorkelers a unique opportunity close to Perth where they can view a wide diversity of large fish and invertebrates by swimming straight off a readily accessible beach. To protect the existing Pt Peron snorkel trail.
- 5. To maintain a portion of Cape Peron for families and individuals for shore based fishing.

There were comments that the objectives were unrealistic and unachievable considering the degraded state of the near shore area, and that objectives had been assembled to justify the chosen area, rather than areas chosen to meet objectives.

There were the usual "sanctuary zones are essential to preserve biodiversity" claims, and "they are not fisheries management." There were very conflicting opinions about the impacts already on the inter-tidal zone. Major concerns seem to be the about heavy spearfishing pressures resulting in low numbers of resident fish remaining. Agreements on resource sharing is the main issue.

A summary of major points from the meeting, to be written up, and considered further by the Focus Group is:-

Activities and threats - must deal properly with ALL the pressures, including non-extractive activities.

Must do proper risk assessments and prepare targeted responses. Eg, the impact of fishing for pelagic species such as herring, skippy, tailor and salmon and what would be the real benefits of banning these highly valued activities.

No take areas displace fishing effort and the impact on nearby areas must be understood.

Objectives must be realistic and achievable.

The area has a range of social values for a large and increasing nearby population, including fishing, conservation, education, etc.

Must build knowledge about these values and activities and all their impacts.

Must have current benchmarks for the areas before changes (good or bad) could be measured.

Enforcement could be costly or the zone may be ineffective.

Point Peron is already heavily affected and is not a good choice for biodiversity preservation.

Where would/does this zone fit into the BIG picture? Shoalwater Marine Park boundaries are very small and restrictive. Those objectives may be better able to be achieved elsewhere or nearby, eg Garden Island, recent Rottnest sanctuary zones, Marmion Marine Park's seven-year overdue review.

2. Cockburn Sound Crabs

Recfishwest has had the first meeting specifically aimed at deciding the fishing arrangements for Cockburn Sound Crabs later in 2009. The Department of Fisheries has now acknowledged that commercial crabbing under the previous commercial management rules is unsustainable in Cockburn Sound.

3. Future Consultative Structures and Recfishwest

One of the significant changes to result from the Integrated Fisheries Management (IFM) system will be to better define the roles and responsibilities of the commercial and recreational sectors in managing their share of the resource. The Minister has expressed a strong preference for only a limited number of groups to provide him with advice.

The Recreational Fishing Advisory Committee and Regional Recreational Fishing Advisory Committees have been advised that regional recreational consultative structures will change.

It is likely that Recfishwest will play a much greater role in the future. Accordingly, Recfishwest has considered what this will require of its Board structure and staff, and a Strategic Planning Meeting of the Recfishwest Board is planned for 9 May.

4. Fishing Restrictions Proposed for Green Pool, Denmark

The Dept of Fisheries has issued a media release with details of consultation about the proposed closure of fishing in Green's Pool, approximately 15 kilometres west of Denmark, popular almost year round for swimming or fishing, due to the protection provided by the surrounding rocky headland.

However, conflict between users has led to a number of requests over several years for fishing to be prohibited. It has been suggested the presence of fishers, as well as fishing hooks and other tackle left behind or lost in the water, are a hazard to swimmers, snorkelers and beach visitors.

The proposed prohibition would apply to the take of all marine life by line, net and spear within a defined area covering approximately 600 metres of beach and headland.

Public comment was being sought from as many members as possible in the local Denmark community as well as surrounding areas. Closing date for submissions is 29 May 2009.

5. Yellow Tail Kingfish Escapees From Failed Jurien Bay Aquaculture

Many reports are coming in of tame and easily caught under legal size yellow tailed kingfish at Jurien, Green Head and other places south of Jurien, including Yanchep and Rottnest.

Western Kingfish's Jurien Bay aquaculture farm suffered severe fish stock losses from bacteria in November 2008. The deaths of more than 30,000 fish, along with the difficult economic climate forced the company into voluntary administration in December 2008. Some company assets have since been sold.

It is believed that some of the yellow tailed kingfish escaped from the six cage system farm stocked with yellowtail kingfish reared in the hatchery from adults which had been captured nearby.

The Western Kingfish website <u>http://www.wkl.com.au/</u> has not been updated for some months, and still has details and photos of the operation late in 2008.

6. Recfishwest Membership

Recfishwest is the peak body representing the interests of recreational fishers in Western Australia. Last year when the organization was under threat, recreational fishers supported Recfishwest, but <u>we need you to continue that support</u>.

Decisions to be made in 2009 will affect future fishing opportunities for your children and grandchildren. Recfishwest intends meeting these challenges and assures you that we will be the most effective vehicle for getting your views heard in this crucial year.

Drink Up

- · Fluid replacement should be part of every sports person's activity plan.
- · Exercise causes sweating, which deprives the body of vital fluids.
- Thirst is a poor indicator of your level of hydration.
- · Dehydration can cause headaches, nausea, dizziness and heat stress.
- Adequate fluid replacement before, during and after physical activity will lessen the dangerous effects that dehydration can have on the body.

Fluid Replacement Guidelines

- · Always start exercise well hydrated.
- Participants of sport and those undertaking regular physical activity should note the following guidelines.
 - Before Activity drink 300-500ml, 45 minutes before activity. During Activity - drink 150-300ml every 15-20 minutes of activity. After Activity - drink plenty of fluids even if you don't feel thirsty.
- Coaches and parents should remember that children are at a greater risk of heat stress and should be encouraged to regularly take in fluids, have more frequent breaks and train for shorter periods of time.

What to Drink

- · Cool plain water is the best fluid replacement drink.
- Most sports people do not exercise at an intensity to warrant the use of a sports drink for rehydration. However, sports drinks are ideally suited to high-intensity and endurance sports to aid in recovery.

So beat the heat, keep your fluids up, get up, get out there and get active!
