

Reel Talk Publishing Deadline.

The Reel Talk is published so that it gets to the members early in the week before the first event held in the coming calendar month. But it also depends what else is going on and what the Editor wants to do with his life.

The Reel Talk is produced progressively through the month, as stuff becomes available, so that the whole article is on the same page, and to avoid a few lines separated from the rest of the article. Of course Microsoft Word makes it possible to zap the articles to any page, and the list of contents is updated almost automatically. But once the front pages are set out properly, it's just extra and unnecessary work to insert stuff. So items which come in early generally ends up towards the front of the magazine, and late stuff towards the back.

Items received electronically can be put into the magazine in a very short time, subject to space. It's a juggling act, and first in generally has the best chance of getting published that month.

The Reel Talk contents is always an even number of pages, and the pages usually have something on them with not too much blank space. Late items which need parts of extra pages and need a rearrangement of other stuff to keep to the "even number of full pages" might just get deferred to a later issue.

Help the Dry Casting Markers.

Come on, dry casting people, help the markers in the distance events, and help yourselves.

Anyone who has done any marking in winter or in windy conditions will know what I'm talking about.

Do you want your leaders and your weight mangled? Do you want long delays while the markers search for your weights of dig them out of the ground? No? Well you can easily help. Anyway even if you don't care, the markers do and cooperation works both ways.

Some of the weights bury themselves 150mm into the soft grass making it hard to get the sinkers out. Heavy leaders and a decent sized ring or swivel means the weight can be pulled out backwards. Light leaders and tiny swivels are a pain in the \$%#\$ by breaking off and the weights having to be dug out and mangled.

Please use heavy leaders – 50 pound / 25kg **MINIMUM** and preferably heavier - or else risk damaged leaders and lost weights and frustrated markers.

Independent scientific research has shown that the difference between a cast with a light leader and tiny swivel and a heavy leader and decent sized swivel averages 0.033m, which is much less than the error a tired and frustrated marker might make in rounding your cast distance down to the shorter number of metres rather than up to the longer number of metres.

Weights with short plastic tubing are very hard to find, since only a little bit of the tube is visible when weights bury. Please make sure all of your plastic tubes are close to the maximum length of 250mm. It's also very hard to see short tubes as they come through the air.

When it is windy, it is sometimes hard to find where the weight has landed. If you or any of the watching casters know where the weight has landed, PLEASE indicate to the markers by pointing in the direction and waving the markers further out or closer in.

September Dry Casting Report.

With 14 of the regular club casters away at Yeppoon for the AAA National championships, we were never going to get a big rollup for the September dry casting day.

Even so, six seniors and four veterans, a lady and a junior turned up for a total of 12 on the day.

A "stranger" to dry casting in the form of lan Cook turned up for the first time for a long time. Hope to see more of you at dry casting, lan.

The day turned on some very good weather, with warm sunshine and light winds, and a good morning was had by all.

With the small number of casters, some shortcuts were taken in setting up the courts. We moved through the events fairly quickly. In fact so quickly that some people were not ready when their turn came for their next cast, and there was some good-natured ribbing about getting into gear and staying awake.

Tony D'Alonzo top scored for the day with 222 points, which included a very creditable 146 out of 200 in the double handed accuracy. Terry Fuller top scored in the single-handed accuracy with 31 out of 40.

Tony, Terry and Filomena scored bulls eyes in the single-handed accuracy.

Visitor Joseph Laundy seemed very impressed with the improvements to his casting distances and accuracy after being given a few simple tips on how to get the best out of his fishing gear. He ended up casting 75 metres and some accuracy casts with scores of 13 and 15.

Our President, John Romano competed in the dry casting and found some of the tricks and traps involved.

John and Maria supplied the special sausages for the sausage sizzle which were really appreciated by all who tasted them. You might have a permanent order there, John.

Review of the Caravan and Camping Act.

A discussion paper reviewing the Caravan Parks and Camping Grounds Act 1995 has been produced for comment by key stakeholders and members of the public. Comments close 23 November.

Some of the issues raised in the paper include:-

methods of enforcement and penalties available under the current legislation; and the regulations governing where people may camp.

This is a very important issue for club anglers who wish to camp out while fishing. Anglers may have to continue to put up with draconian laws preventing them from even having a sleep in their vehicle.

South Coast Recreational Fishing Rules.

The Fisheries Minister announced the outcomes of the South Coast Recreational fishing reviews which will come into effect soon.

This will introduce a three category list like the West Coast, but the species and bag limits have some differences which club recreational anglers will need to know about. These include:-

Swan River Commercial Fishing Changes.

The Labor Government made some commitments just before the last State election about some reductions to commercial fishing in the Swan River. There have been some recent developments:-

Voluntary Fisheries Adjustment Schemes.

Voluntary Fisheries Adjustment Schemes aim to reduce the impact of commercial fishing on the quality of recreational fishing, particularly species important to shore based anglers like our club members.

VFAS include fishing for species like salmon, herring, sharks, black bream, all estuary species, crabs, bait fish affecting predatory fish, etc with a possibility of extension to some other important recreational fish.

Recfishwest has information and is looking for comments from recreational anglers.

Compulsory Rock Fishing Safety Equipment.

Following another recent death while rock fishing on the South West coast, the Government is being urged to legislate for, and is considering, that compulsory safety equipment must be worn and used while rock fishing.

Rock Lobster Pots in Front of Your Favourite Shore Spots.

A submission has been considered about the problems of rock lobster pots, ropes and floats being placed right in front of many shore based fishing spotsincluding rockwalls and groynes.

These mean you can kiss goodbye (long distance) to any decent fish you might hook because there's a big chance it'll end up wrapped around a float or rope.

At present, it doesn't look like this submission will be going anywhere.

More Attacks on City Four Wheel Drives.

A recent survey is urging the Government to put more costs and restrictions on four wheel drives in city areas and to require a special driver's license to be able to drive a four wheel drive.

Integrating Marine Reserves Science/Fisheries Management.

A very interesting article has been found which sets out the American experience in quantifying the benefits of Marine reserves for fisheries management. Surprise, surprise - the claims for benefits of better fishing from having Marine reserves are not all supported by the facts.

Research Priorities in Marine Reserves.

There has been much research quoted in the field of Marine Protected Areas but little of it actually driven by those most affected by the results of such research, and much of the research, frankly, has been to 'prove' the value to MPA's rather than assess if they have any value for fisheries that are already managed for sustainability.

A workshop to discuss stakeholder research needs with regard to Marine Protected Areas was held on Wednesday 24 August. The workshop was designed to allow fishermen (both professional and recreational) the opportunity to say what research they would like to see carried out on MPA's. This was a chance for fishing stakeholders to say what they want. The outcomes were:-

Releasing Fish and Catch and Release.

A draft policy on "Releasing Fish" is near completion. This covers releasing fish for all reasons including deliberate catch and release fishing. Some useful thoughts in here which might help the club.

Recfishwest Board Meeting Report September 2005.

Some of the main points from the September 2005 Recfishwest Board Meeting were as follows:-
