### FIELD DAY VENUE, MURCHISON RIVER - MARCH 1967.

The field day began for some members about a week early when Bob Tichbon, Tom Vivian, Ted Horsley, Terry Fuller and myself arrived to give the venue the works, and find out where the fish were.

We arrived to find the water somewhat dirty, and the weather up in the high 90's, with hot nights to boot.

Conditions were relatively calm, and during the week the five lads mentioned worked the Bluffs and Cyster Reef constantly. Unfortunately, the week yielded 2 Mackerel only and a few Tailor, plus a very few small sharks, most of which were obtained by ballooning.

On the Friday preceding the field-day, the Mackerel arrived in large numbers, together with hundreds of Tuna but, sad to relate, although well within reach of anglers, would not be stirred into taking our baits.

During Friday, also, various members began to arrive, and Snow Tate, Doug Newton, George Holman and others were seen around the place.

Yours truly wandered over to the main camping spot, and by the light of a torch found Snow Tate's camp. Much to my surprise, Snow was perched very precariously on top of his car's roof rack, together with sleeping bag and mattress, whilst large Sargeant Anta played havoc inside his tent. If he'd turned over in his sleep, at least the resulting fall may have squashed a few of the little beauts.

During Friday afternoon, Ted Savage, Ron Kildahl and Ron Mansfield tried their skill, but without the expected success, as the Mackerel seemed to be expert at mashing a bait, and leaving the hooks

Saturday morning, saw more arrivals, and at the usual time the lad were on their way and fishing. Conditions were reasonably good and the Bluffs Bay was a mass of multi-coloured balloons, so much so, that most fish must have thought they were being netted by the solid line of wire tracers, but still they struck and escaped the hooks, giving the ladsplenty to use their choicest language about. At about dusk there was a mass exodus to Chinaman's beach, and it was there that a number of lage Mulloway decided to co-operate. Notably Yerry DeJussing's fine specimen which was more notable in that Terry did not arrive on venue until 7.00 p.m. that evening.

At we him that evening, in addition to the Mulloway, Doug Newton weighed in his fine shark and hopes were high for Sunday. At dawn many lads were in position on OysterReef, and at the Bluffs. Apart from the 3 Mackerel which were landed by Terry Fuller, Ted Horsley and myself at the Bluffs, may I be excused if I record here that at 7.10 a.m. a large shark burst my balloons and streamed away with approximately 37.1/2 lb. line leaving about 50 yards on spool. At 9.40 a.m. he managed to straighten the hooks and went his sorrowful way, but not half as sorrowful as my own. Various estimates put him at 12 to 13 feet long, and I'm ready to believe anything of a fish that can put up a 2.1/2 hour fight.

A further two items of note were Dave Hancock's effort. Dave is a visitor but with an imtermediate fixed spool reel, split can rod and '4 lb. B.S. line, he came up with a 28 lb. Spanish Mackerel. Well well Done Dave!

The second incident has more notoriety than most, inthat Arthur Horton, Keith Rundin, Don Garnett and Dave Harcock decided to proceed up river in an 8 ft. dingy in search of bream. At about 2 miles upstream, the wind decided to take a hand, and, with the 1/2" freeboard the boat's occupants had allowed, quickly swamped and sank, despite Arthur's efforts at baling with his shoe. (You should have used Keith's - size 10 are better than size 7 in a case such as this!) The outcome was a two mile walk back to camp for Arthur and Keith, whilst the lighter pair brought back the now reasonably loaded boat. No gear lost fortunately!

By Sunday evening, it appeared evident that, though many Mackerel had been in the vicinity, they were still up to their game of hit and run, and sadly the tally increased by only two more.

With Sunday might to go we were barely up to our Wedge Island total in poundage, but at least the captures rarely fell below 20 lbs. individually.

The final weigh-in took place on Monday morning, and our ngling marvel, Joe Strange, came along with a pair of fine fulloway from Bluff Beach to keep up the good work. With one field day to go a very large haul willbe required to pass Joe at the top of the table.

On the whole the lads had a good week-end, and we must agree that the Murchison has everything.

Just a point of interest, the few of us who remained for a nurther week had mixed luck. The conditions were very poor nothe Tuesday, but with better luck Wednesday brought cleaner ater, and as a constation, I was able to land a Blue Whaler hark tipping the scales at 107 lbs. By Thursday the Mackerel eturnedand strike after strike was made, but the tally to the nd of the week was Terry Fuller 2, Norrie Cross 2, and myself

A point worthy of note was my 7 strikes on Thursday without capture until the 8th strike which yielded a fine specimen f Nor-West Blowfish, to top it off, on returning to the caravan I tried to walk through the scales which were hanging cutside! It goes that way occasionally.

To all members who attended the Committee hope you found the cip worth while, and for those who missed out on the fish - all there's always another time.

#### LEARN TO TIP THOSE WEATHER CHANGES.

Trying to predict the weather several hours in advance is a tough and often impossible assignment for even the experts - but it doesn't take an awful lot of skill to make a short-range forcast. Nature almost always offersclues of what it has in store. The trick, of course, is learning to recognise these and all fishermen should learn.

Fishermen would do well to remember one basic fact about the weather; to change, it must move, and to move, there must be a wind. It may not always be a surface wind, however. Any movement of the clouds means that some wind is present. Whenever a breeze starts to blow or shifts from another direction stay alert for a possible change.

Cloud movements and formations tellan important story Stationary or slow-moving fluffy white clouds usually indicate fair weather, small dark oily-looking clouds seen moving across the sky in an opposite direction from lower clouds be prepared for a stretch of unsettled weather. If streaks or patches of white clouds start to pile up on the horizon after a spell of fair weather, a change can be expected with wind and rain likely.

No discussion of weather could be complete without at least a mention of fronts. A front occurs when two unlike air masses meet. The warm and cold masses do not mix well so the heavier cold air tends to slide under and lift the warm air. The sharply defined sloping boundry between the two massesof air is called a front. As the front passes over, wind, rain and generally unsettled weather will be noted.
