FIELD DAY ON A FLAT-TOPPED TRUCK or The Ageless Panther by "ARCEE"

One cold night in February, 1953 Bert (Panther) Payne was walking along Swanbourne beach. He was empty handed and feeling a bit frustrated. The night had yielded nothing from the surf, and he was beginning to have nagging doubts whether his English fishing gear was of any use in this country.

Bert was used to greenheart rods and pasternosters, and he had fished all his life, in England and many other places before migrating here in 1949. But now he was at the angling cross-roads. He wasn't having much success, and he was going to have to do sow thing about it. Just what he was going to do was decided by the fates there and then. He came upon two anglers who had company on the beach in the form of two mulloway and a shark.

The two were Noel Knight and Nelson Smith, and they both belonged to a fledging angling club, The Surf Casters, which had 11 members and conducted a drycasting day at Rosalie Park once a month. They asked Bert where he was from, showed interest in his angling problems and invited him to come along to Rosalie Park the next Sunday.

The day turned out to be quite a milestone for Bert. It pursuaded him to throw away all his English gear and start afresh. He bought a split cane No. 1 Southam rod and Capstan multiplier geared reel from the great Gordon Hume, who also taught him how to use them. (Hume was a reasonable good man to learn from - he still holds the Australian record for mulloway - 96lbs.

At the next drycasting day, Bert's effort was 40 yards and he was proud of it. In those days, to cast 60 yards was a miracle - only the gendary Vic Davis, Noel Knight, Nelson Smith and Lloyd Dunn could do ic.

Eventually after conquering backlash, Bert and other got up to 80 yds & finally there came a day when he took top honours with 132 yds using a Graham reel.

Nowadays, Bert Payne, who is 71 but not old, is a most experienced angler. He has been retired for six years and he spends nearly half of each year fishing. His favourite haunts are in the North West.

He has been a member of the Surf Casters for 17 years and its extremely interesting to hear him talk about the early days of the club.

Bert is very blunt about one thing: "I learnt everything from Vic Davis the greatest fisherman you've ever seen," he told me. "He showed me he to read a beach, make rigs, & how to play a big fish. He held the clul together in those days & we looked up to him for inspiration."

The field days at that time were a far cry from the trips the club make now. Bert says that Yanchep was the farthest afield that they ventured "The club used to hire a flat topped truck & the whole field day - all eleven of us would go on the truck," he says. Burns, Quinns & Yanchep were just sand tracks & even the truck used to get bogged.

e year Bert holidayed at Geraldton for 3 weeks & returned with wonderful tales of sharks & big fish at the mouth of the Greenough River. The club decided to hold a long weekend field day there, & the method of travel was the same - all aboard the flat topped truck. Cnly one trouble: - they caught No fish.

he club started going father south on field days. At Miami, Bert recalloug Edwards got a 64lb Mulloway on an 18lb line with 8 knots in it.

Then Bert did it to the mob again. He had been north & was taken to the mouth of the Murchison - by Land Rover from the homestead at Murchison House Station. In those days you made your own way across country into the Murchison - there was no road.

Hec Mainwaring had a few grass shacks on the estuary & 2 blokes named Finch & Brown (not Brownie) had a single shed with beds. "It was as rough as guts" says Bert. "They gave you a bed, made you some tucker & that was it. There were no facilities for women. It was men only."

Bert caught good tailor of the Chinaman, slimy cod and squire snapper, & went back with great tales again.

turns at the wheel of the flat topped truck on the drive there & back. Same result - no fish!

Bert says that those early long distance field days were great occasion Because of the small membership, the club always travelled as one party and there was a strong bond of comradeship.

Now a days, Bert has other hobbies besides angling. He has a breath taking collection of gemstones from the North West, collects coral and shells, and he's an able photographer with his own darkroom.

Bert has 1700 slides, mainly of the North West, and showing wildflowers, landscapes and fishing.

His favourite fishing spots in the North West are Monkey Mia and Quobba. Bert and his wife Pearl travelling in a Toyota station waggon and towing a caravanette, now go to these spots and others four times a year for about six weeks at a stretch. And they've come back with some mighty fish. Bert at one stage held the State Spanish Mackeral record at 61½lb (he got 11 that trip), and four years ago he caught four big golden trevally in one outing - the biggest a 48 pounder. Another fish he's proud of is a 54½ lb cobia, or black kingfish, a great fighter at ording to everyone who has ever encounted them. And mulloway! "We got fed up catching them," says Bert. "An average trip yields 11 or 12 mulloway between 24 and 45 lb., and we always give them away because we armn't prepared to pay 3 cents a pound to freeze them."

In one fabulous night on the Monkey Mia jetty, Pearl Payne landed five pink snapper on 121b line. They went 25,18,16,14 and 12 lbs. One of there most memorable exploits was landing two Spanish Mackeral (19,17½) which they hooked in the Geraldton ocean swimming pool.

Bert has fished hard in many spots that are a talking point within the club at the moment. He has high regard for Horrocks Beach, and is keen on Lucky Bay and Sandalwood Bay.

He has seen a boy land 14½1b. tailor at Horrocks, and says that eight and nine pounders are common.

Bert is still a keen clubman. He is the only man who has a complete record of every issue of Reel Talk from March, 1953 to the present day,

At one time he owned 15 rods and 11 reels and today he still has ven good rods. Its interesting and good propagands for Alveys to note that at 71 he has joined the swing to side cast, after using every reel under the sun in the last 27 years. He's had Grahams, Capstans, Penns, Ambassadeurs (his favourite) and finally he's come home to roost with an Alvey.

If you can't lick em join 'em! But of course, being 71 isn't really a factor with Bert Payne. "I'll still be fishing when I'm 93, " he told me.

I believe him.

CASTING NEWS Most casters would be content with one 'Bull' during the day, however, TONY SMITH doubled up. One in the S.A. ACC and the other

A couple of members were heard to remark that it could be TONY'S pipe bringing him luck. This could be so, as he and the pipe are inseperable. These comments of course are just jealously, with profoundation what-so ever. A Rose Brian pipe you say TONY! What wacco was that?

Enough of this frivolity and on with the report. Twenty six hopeful members ventured onto the course to face up to the elements. One member was slightly late, because of this the A.D.C.A. was caught partly unprepared, and although the sections were laid out was without sheets and distances for the days events. (the D.H. ACC & S.H. ACC were only a few feet out from those scheduled). Quickly writing down names onto a pad in reasonable order, drawing up a few lines I had the semblance of a sheet, when, who should appear but BRIAN. Some excuse about an early morning finishing party and not being able to read the time correctly. Well that's your story BRIAN and you stick to it!

At this time the rain which had looked threatening started to fall. Most of the starters had water proof gear with them and no time was wasted in putting them on.

The S.H. Open was conducted under these conditions and the ultimate mer BOB TUCKER threw exceedingly will to register an easy victory. GEORGE HOLMAN and TOM CORCORON had an interesting duel for second place, with GEORGE gaining the honour. These three members were clearly superior to others in this event.

Congratulations to those three, as this was also the order of the final points in this event for the year.

As this event neared completion the shower faded away and the sun pushed its way through the clouds (poetic). Anyone for ginger beer? Not many takers.

Figuring prominently in most sections was our old friend HEW, HOY HEW. It appeared from the results, as though HEW had put in plenty of practise since we last say him. He has lost none of his skill. -

BOB TUCKER with a good points score took the honour for the day with HEW running second (not bad for a young fellow) and RON KILDAHL finishing third.

Casting with precision BILL UTTING established a new figure of 68/80 for this year D.H. Acc best, to win from BOB TUCKER, also with the good score of 60/80 and HEW (he bought the rain) finished third with 54/80.

As in the D.H. Acc, BOB TUCKER figured also in the S.H. Acc to win the 28/40. HEW moved up a peg here and finished in second place with 25/42 whilst HARVEY BARROTT, who only makes an occassional appearance cast well and finished third with 20/40.
