EDITORIAL:

A few of us want to broaden our outlook and realise that once the competition or the format under which the Club operates is decided upon, we should make the best of it.

As I have said to a lot of new members; the club has the facilities available for you to get what you want out of it and it is up to you to make up your mind what you want. If you want to fish or dry cast competitively, the facility is there. If you want good companionship and a more social atmosphere, this is also available but the choice is that of the individual! I think this reasoning could apply in answer to the above.

TO THE EDITOR.

Sir,

The rejection of my request for consideration of two divisions for competition on club field days was naturally disappointing. However, if the Committee so ruled, then that is that, but I would like to expand some important points which prompted my request.

Actually it should have been the case of the four wheel drive and beach buggy users asking for a separate division for themselves, considering that for many years after the formation of the club conventional vehicles and feet were the normal means of conveyance with the general use of four wheel drives and buggies being an introduction during the last few years.

One club member stated that four wheel drives are an advantage only on a few field days. This is not so. There is a definite advantage on every one of the eight land based field days for this current year.

A club member stated that the enjoyment of fishing is the main thing on field days. This is generally true, as it would be silly to attend field days if you did not enjoy fishing. I do repeat the present club President's statement that the club is trophy oriented, and nobody disputed this when it was said. As a conventional vehicle fisherman I have very little chance of winning a trophy under the present conditions, but I would be very happy to know that I could compete against the twelve or fifteen other regular attending members who are restricted o a small amount of beach in the same way as myself.

Our field day officer took great pains to underline in this journal the fact that lifts were given to the beach at the Flinders Bay field day. This point is acknowledged, but what does it prove. Very little, apart from the fact that there is a large group who should have a separate division.

A lift along the beach could also be an embarrassment and a handicap to the passenger for the following reasons.

- (a) The passenger has to be ready at the time the driver wishes to leave. This is fair enough, but leaves no choice to the passenger.
- (b) The passenger may be dropped at a point say 2-3 miles along the beach, and if his choice is wrong he can only go left or right as far as he can walk, lumping his gear, or he must remain until the vehicle returns to carry him back to the weigh-in point, possibly after a long wait.

There is no doubt about the advantage held by four wheel drive and buggy men. Have a look at the Top TEN listed in this magazine if you are in doubt. It is fantastic and hardly credible the length of beach permitted to be fished on a field day. Murchison is a good example where some four wheel men will travel as far as Middle Bay to fish. Why not have the field day located there if it is so much better. I consider that the first year of my club membership was the most enjoyable, when the beach area to be fished was a mere couple of miles and members generally returned to a central point by foot in the evening. I still admire Jack Harvey as Field Day Officer for refusing to allow himself be bludgeoned into extending the beach area which would have automatically scattered club members over a large distance. It is fortunate we have a few field days at Rottnest and Garden Island, otherwise the only time we would see many members would be at the monthly club meeting.

Why do many members use four wheel drives and beach buggies? A conventional vehicle is more comfortable except in one or two cases only. A conventional vehicle will travel from home to venue at a faster, safer speed, and is less tiring. The answer is simple—a four wheel drive gives a great advantage in the finding of fish and I suggest that some members might be jealous of the advantage they have with their mobility.

Some members would probably immediately brand it as poor sportsmanship if a conventional vehicle man declined to pay the entry fee for a field day. Yet, knowing there is little chance of him winning a field day except on a rare occasion, why should he have to subscribe to the petrol of someone else to drive along many miles of beach unable to be covered by himself.

Finally, let me make it quite clear, I am not against four wheel drives-I would have one if I could afford it. If I did have one, I would still be in favour of two divisions.

Jim Strong and myself, along with Roy Lundy (visitor), attended the March meeting of the Division. The meeting was a little disorganised as the Secretary was not present, but points of interest arising from the meeting were as follows:-

The motion, increasing the affiliation fees of the Clubs' to the A.A.A. of W.A., to \$8.00 was carried.

So for those of you who wish to got to Kalbarri next year around the long weekend in March, here is a golden opportunity to obtain a real bargain!

AN AMAZING RUN AT RED BLUFF:

We settled in at Kalbarri on Saturday afternoon and hit the sack early and slept in Sunday morning, getting up fresh and eager to start doing a little angling around the different spots.

Sunday was a day of looking around, Norrie Cross's Tailor spot was very dirty, the sea had a little swell rolling in, making a heck of a lot of places unfishable. Things will have to improve for the coming weekend field day.

Down Red Bluff Beach we learnt that other holiday anglers were really catching small tailor between the first two reefs.

After nosing around amongst them, we found that a big fish had been smashing their light gear, even our holiday neighbour mentioned to me that a spear fisherman had fired his spear into a large shark on the edge of the surf-line- SMASHING his 2501b cord line like butter.

That's all the information I needed, so I decided to have a got at whatever it was. It was evident that tailor is the bait to be used, however, all I had in the mobile freezer were gardies, mulies and bony herring. Sunday evening was spent making gear up for that big one.

Monday morning, up and away at dawn with MAY, GLENDA and friend, who fished on the Red Bluff rocks with flick rods to catch some tailor for bait. The locals had not arrived as yet and I fished for tailor on Bluff Beach catching oneevery cast, quite close in; by this time, the locals were arriving like ants, so I moved down one more reef space to get away from them. My first cast I landed a 201b Mulloway, 2nd cast hooked a small tailor, on retrieving through the trough of the wave (which was running up the beach), I had the tailor right almost at my feet, when a large shark latched onto it and the jolt broke the tip runner on my rod, and scared the hell out of me. That's that, walked back to the Landcruiser which was with the girls, got down my 807 rod with $7\frac{1}{2}$ inch Alvey, loaded with 481b line, picked up some bony herring, and fresh tailor, walked back to the spot again, passing the mob fishing all in one spot landing tailor hand over fist.

Back to the second gap and nobody fishing there, which I could not understand, carefully put on a whole bony herring and cast out just behind the breakers. I didn't have to wait long, the heavy line took off, loading the rod; this fish was heavy but not a shark and within minutes, on heavy gear, landed a 481b Mulloway- to my surprise it wasn't worried about two big hocks attached with heavy wire. Again with care, rebaited with bony herring, cast out to the same spot, again it picked it up and ran north in line with the beach; it was really a big fish and when I struck, the fish dropped the hocks. On winding in, the bait was missing, so on went a fresh tailor whole, bang into that same spot.

Someone sang out and I noticed a chap's rod bent over. He was down on his knees hanging onto his rod, his butter churner with line running off spool emptied and broke off with a crack.

A good 10 minutes passed when the line started to buck, not run, - picked up the sinker, it ceased for a few seconds, (boy was I itching to strike). It begai again, this time he lifted the sinker, I struck hard and boy, this fish was big! To my surprise it did not run out to sea, but swam up and down in line with the beach; by moving in the opposite direction the shark would keep turning towards me, up and down he swam with the 807 rod bent over without an ounce of leverage left in it; this kept up for 10 minutes, then it showed itself right on the breaker line, head well down; tail well exposed out of the water.

My thought right then was: I've got a bloody large shovel nose ray.
My hopes dashed, I gave it everything I had for 5 minutes. Now it was inside the breaker line and still showed its large tail with small dorsal fins, but still kept his head down.

Now everyone came to watch the fun of trying to get him on the sand and I am convinced it is a shovel ray now for sure. Everyone offered to gaff the shark, but I held on until a really good looking wave came and ran back, pulling with all my might. It landed on the sand with the water running back; so did he. The chap ran down to sink the gaff and then I realised it was not a shovel nose ray, but a good sizedsharkwhich snapped at the gaffer, who rapidly got out of the way then handed the gaff to another chap who seemed braver than he. Another wave brought him right up this time and the second gaffer got the same treatment as the first. The gaff changed for the third time and the water ran out and the shark was in swimming water again, but beaten this time. The next wave came in and the shark ran south over the rocks and floundered there. The thrid gaffer didn't even move, as we could see how really big he is... high and dry....

My back was killing me now and I fell backwards onto the seat of my pants.

The gaff did not go in! Back on my feet again, calling out to gaff the darm thing undermeath, but too late, as more water came in and washed the shark off the reef and placed him again in front of the sand floating in the backwash water. Now a really good wave, with full pressure on the rod, line and reel, I ran back with the water leaving the shark this time right high and dry, no fourth gaffer this time, sank home the gaff, but he waited to see if he got the same treatments as the other gaffers, but he was really beat and did not move.

It required four men to drag him clear of the water line and I dropped again to my seat, exhausted.

The whole event had taken 30 minutes. After recovering I wondered how in the dickens shall we get it off the beach. We drove the Landcruiser down to the shark and the anglers rallied and then lifted it whole into the back of the Landcruiser. Then it came to life, chewed a spare tube, puncturing it in many places.

On driving off the beach, I met Ron Shirley, who just arrived to do some ballooning on Mackeral Rock, and discussed the problem of weighing the shark, and we identified it as a Grey Nurse Shark, weight unknown.

I had to call in and get Gary Gildersleeve to give me a hand to weigh it. We got Bob Lilly's 2001b scales and Mrs. Crocos lent us a chain block which we hung on the kids swing, on lifting the shark up, he came back to life, kicking. Fortunately, the swing held up to such a shaking without damage.

Transferring the shark onto the scales, up they went to 2001b with the head still on the ground. Well it had to be cut, so the tail section was cut off. Gary Gildersleeve got to work and his butchering trade came in handy, but I got caught and did not stand clear and got covered in blood. The main body section went 1851b. Tail section went 491b - Total was 2341b.

Then the usual picture taking. I was pleased with myself. I had a 3-1 and a club record, also open shark section.

Then Mrs. Crocos came to say that Ron also got a large shark and could be weigh it here.

Ron arrived a little later and what a beaut looking shark it was - a Blue Whaler.

Ron backed under the lifting gear, up went the shark to the scales, up went the scales to 169lb (I will leave Ron to tell his story).

The field day arrived, the water was good and I managed to weigh in 15 oz of tailor against 3201b, approx. a week earlier in one morning.

I would like to thank members who willingly helped Ron and I weigh in our sharks.
