#### MARCH GENERAL MEETING:

Brian Leicester opened the meeting with a special welcome to Bob Fredericks who has made a good recovery after his recent heart operation and we wish him continuing good health. Good wishes also to Ron Kildahl who has been given the all clear after his long illness. Bob Fredericks donated a bottle of Dimple Whisky for us to raffle which was duly won by Rick Parker. It netted the Club a grand total of \$31; thanks to Freddo!

Brian, on behalf of the members, presented Jim Strong and Ron Kildahl with Life Membership badges - very appropriate for two loyal and hard working members.

The Treasurer's report showed we have a balance in the General Fund of \$791.65 and in the Building Fund \$905.47.

Graham Reeley gave the Drycasting Report in the absence of Peter Conroy. Unfortunately, we haven't had the date confirmed for the next Drycasting venue, but should be through by the time of print.

Tony Richardson gave his report on the split field day. All the details will as usual be in Tony's report.

Our Recorder, Brian Cusack, has an application from Ron Flynn for a 2 to 1 ratio badge for a 47.5kg Bronze Whaler Shark. Results of line test should be known by next Committee Meeting.

The Property Officer, George Holman, told of how the bookings were down for Kalbarri house, mainly because of the six-month booking restriction. A motion was put forward that this restriction be lifted as we must get as many bookings as we can to help pay off our debt. This motion was passed. There was a suggestion that it is about time we thought of selling the Kalbarri House in the near future. I feel that this is a step in the right direction and I'm sure there will be more discussion on this subject.

Kath Tompsitt and Brian Leicester made comment on the method used by the Denmark Angling Club for their weigh in which was done in an open space with public in attendance. Their members weigh in in the order of their sign on, with all fish and species being recorded. They have on their Field Days what they call incentive fishing, with a prize for the member with the greatest variety of fish. They certainly have a good roll-up with 40-60 attending their Field Days. Their next Field Day is decided at the weigh in by the members present.

Brian also received an open invitation from the Denmark Club for our Club to fish with them at any time and they will send one of their members with each of our groups to show us the best fishing spots in the area. Salmon of up to 7.6kg are being caught in the area at this time, plus a cross section of Mulloway and other species.

The \$2 note was won by yours truly. Meeting was then closed so we could continue with the films for our instruction period. The first film was on fishing for Tarpon in the Florida Keys and a lot of the fishing is done with salt water fly tackle. The photography and close-ups were really something to see, especially the close-ups of the magnificent leaps of these giantTarpon as they cleared the water with characteristic head shaking to try and dislodge the hooks. The other good part of the film was the fact these Tarpon are caught for sport and then released. The other film was on Lake Erie where they catch white and small mouth Bass, and once again most of these fish are caught for sport and released. Again the photography was first class and all those present I'm sure would have enjoyed these films.

#### THE OCEAN BOILED AT SUNSET:

As the sun sank on the horizon the ocean on Garden Island's west coast suddenly exploded into life. Along two miles of coastline big glistening Salmon erupted from the water struggling to escape the hook, and 49 anglers strung along the beach, hung grimly onto bucking bending rods. In a few hours 72 Salmon and 60 Tailer, several Kingies and Skips and one 201b Schnapper, had been gaffed, and hauled on to the sand. The total catch weighed 8471bs. Everyone caught fish. It was the memorable days, fishing in the memory of the Surf Casting Angling Club and of Garden Island. Salmon of those quantities at this time of year— it's unheard of!

The Club's 46 members and 3 Visitors arrived at Garden Island early Saturday afternoon for the field day. The first Salmon hit just before 4 p.m. But it was close on sunset when the school of Salmon closed in on the beach, and realy started biting. We could see the big fish swimming through the breakers gorging themselves on mulies. The big Tailer were in amlong the Salmon and as the fish flapped up onto the beach they vomited out freshly swallowed mulies and these were baited up and used as only one angler was lucky enough to bring mulies for bait and he caught most fish. Young ERIC SULLIVAN, scooped the Pool with 671bs of fish, six salmon and five tailor. Bob Jenson caught next biggest and salmon including a 13 pounder. Vic Davies was third with 4 salmon and seven tailer. What a glorious field day. Everyone caught fish.

# "THE ECHOES OF MY MIND": By Basil Marsh:

The results of field day fish capture records published in the March edition of Reel Talk make very interesting though unhappy reading, but also are very timely. The drop in fish weights since 1972 is dramatic and requires some thought being given to the reason/s for this decline. The questions which went through my mind were:-

Are other fishing clubs experiencing the same problem?

Are we in our club losing our ability to catch fish?

Is our selection of field day venues wrong regarding fish locations for the different seasons?

Were the numbers attending field days in 1979 less than in 1972?

Have we developed a "BIG FISH ONLY" mania in the club and consequently are neglecting areas where the fish are "normal" size merely requiring to be harvested?

Are we making sufficient effort to assist or teach new club members the skills to catch fish, remembering that the main purpose in joining a fishing club is to be a member of a group who regard themselves as being more skilful than the average angler in fishing techniques and expertise?

The rocketing price of petrol is a cause for serious concern regarding field day locations. It is obvious that petrol and other costs will continue to rise. A field day venue up to 300 miles from the city, with an average of three club members per vehicle works out at approximately \$30 per head. This includes fuel, food, bait, refreshments, accommodation if used and vehicle wear and tear. If each member present on the field day were lucky enough to catch ten fish, then each fish would have a value of \$3. Admittedly the social and health value of the trip is generally worth a great deal, provided you don't suffer from extremes of temperature.

About four years ago, a club member suggested at a General Meeting that a bus capable of carrying about thirty members plus gear be chartered for a long distance field day. The idea fell on deaf ears because many members were then "INTO" four wheel drives and were enjoying their independence. The idea of a chartered bus now appears tempting and shouldbe considered. I have been told that in the early days of the club history a truck was often used with the members and their gear sitting on the back of the truck. It may have been bumpy, but at least they had "TOGETHERNESS".

A couple of years ago, Jim Strong spoke at a club meeting about areas close to the metropolitan area which produce fish of smaller size than the "tiger country" areas but were seldom visited by the club on field days. With the present cost factor there is a lot of sense, financially, in considering these areas as occasional field day venues. Is it really worthwhile doing a 600 mile round trip for possibly two or three fish, even though they may be of reasonable size.

In the last two years there has been an upsurge of open and split field days. In the 1979 fishing year twenty five percent of the field days were "open". These open and split field days have been very convenient at the time for some club members, but care should be exercised to ensure that they do not defeat the purpose of their creation. Let us have a look at two recent

examples:- The March long weekend field day was shown as Wagoe/West Cape Howe (split). Firstly, where the devil is West Cape Howe? Anticipating that the two places are about seven hundred miles apart, it means that if you could not make it for the whole weekend, or it was too expensive for just three days, or you fished somewhere in between, you could not weigh in. Reel Talk gave little information on the venues and if you missed the General Meeting you had a problem.

The April field day has been changed to a split field day after a member suggested that you could not take a family group to Rottnest. Why not?

Nearly everyone at the meeting accepted the point without thought and without realising that Rottnest is a family group Island. I can see very little difference in camping out on Rottnest or Cervantes or Wedge. A quarter of an hour was then spent in crazy discussion on where the additional area should be. If the boat return time from Rottnest is too late for some members, then let us charter a boat like we did some years ago. Field days to both the Islands were always very good.

The main problems arising from split and particularly open field days are firstly the hassles which will arise deciding on locations for split field days. The Committee, I should think, have enough problems deciding on one location per month without having to find additional locations. On an open field day, do we require a field day officer if there is no necessity to sign on and the weigh in is held at a convenient house of any one of the club members. Those who might have fished but caught nothing will not worry about going to a weigh in. In a few years time when the club again wants to produce details of locations of fish captures and a quarter of the field days were "open" it will be difficult to pinpoint with any accuracy the information required.

One Club President a few seasons ago told us wewere a trophy oriented club. If this is still the case, then let the field day venues be decided at the beginning of the fishing year with no variations during the year except for a very important reason. If on the other hand a more leisurely and social type field day is the order with our expanded membership style then so be it, but once the field day venues are nominated, again leave them as they are.
