PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1964/65

A Summary of this Club's activities for the past year must naturally be abbreviated, but it could, if detailed, cover a good many pages of this issue of "Reel Talk" which is not intended, nor is it desired, so if members observe various activities etc., which they consider should have been mentioned but have been omitted, please don't think they have not been worthy of mention, but on the contrary have been deleted because of space.

No report on a Club with our particular interests would be correctly chronicled unless our primary pursuit - the pursuit of our elusive quarry which we constantly seek is first mentioned - which does of course bring me to our Club No. 1. activity - Field Days.

This past year we did not get away to a particularly good start because, as most members know, we had to cancel out through inclement weather, two Field Days, which naturally brought about a decrease in total poundage of fish caught, but nevertheless our total poundage exceeded 2000. Our attendances of members at Field Days averaged 37 over the year and 79 members attended at least one Field Day. At the mention of Field Days, the name of Jim Strong becomes synonymous with some and to this staunch club member, I would like to say many thanks for a good job well done, and the same of course also applies to Jim's assistant on many of our Club Norm Clarke. To our Club Section Winners go my congratulations in their success, they did not win them easily, and I hope that those who missed out last year, will be the ones to come to the fore this current year.

Our "Open Fishing Competition" was most rewarding in regards to fish captures, there was really excellent fish entered in the various sections, and to those winners I would also like to say well done - one has to admire and respect their individual tenacity, foresight, and the long hours that they put in at their particular pastime. The same of course also applies to our new "Game Fish" entrants who have won recognition of having caught a game fish on standard fishing tackle, and we now have twenty odd members who have caught over 100 game fish between them. All game fish we would like to have recorded, so if just because you may have caught one and received a "Game Fish Badge" please record all fish caught

for our Club records. Keep the entries coming in even if heavier fish have been caught during the year.

Our Drycasting Competitions over the year were keenly contested and activity interest has been maintained at a high level, and on most days one could witness brilliant displays of Distance and Accuracy casting both in D.H. and S.H. Rods. The average attendance at Drycasting over the year was 24. I would like to see more of our members participating in this particular field of our activities. It takes only a few hours of a member's time on a Sunday morning once a month, and to my mind it is most satisfying developing techniques to gain distance and accuracy. Tuition is available, and ask yourself this - "what have anyone of us to gain by not helping a mate?". To the winners of the various sections I would once again like to offer my congrats and the way things are shaping, it looks like there could be new faces at the next Dinner Dance night. To Ron Kildahl and A. Bunnett, our two Casting day organisers, I would like to say thanks for the way you two have helped out and for the excellent job that they have done over the year. I am sure that we all appreciate their efforts.

In an endeavour to find a more suitable meeting room, several changes were made over the year, firstly from Perth to Jolimont and secondly to our present meeting rooms at Claremont, which I think everyone will agree are most suitable, and it is anticipated that Committee meetings will also be conducted there.

Our Monthly General meetings have been well attended and I would like to thank the following for the interesting and diversified talks and discussions which they gave: Eric Christensen, Ian Brown, Rolly McKay, Ken Wiggins, Bert Payne, Mr. McDaird of Y.M.C.A. Judo Club, Ron Shirley, Allan Bunnett, Hugh Gregory, Norrie Cross and Bob Tucker. The talks that these members gave and the slide evenings etc., that they put on were very exhilarating and greatly appreciated. I hope that we can hear more from these members in the near future.

Our Building fund was again increased over the year by a Club conducted "Raffle" and to all members who helped dispose of tickets, I would like to say thanks for a job well done. And in particular I would like to thank Ian McLennan, our Secretary, Ed Savage our Treasurer and Hugh Gregory, our Social Organiser for the parts they played in helping this worthwhile project,

In closing this brief summary for the years activities, I do so wishing each and every member every success in this current Club year - socially and competitive wise.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Statements of Receipts and Expenditure of the Club for the 12 months ended June 30 1965.

The most significant feature of our General Fund Finances for the last 12 months is that Expenditure has exceeded Income by £53.0.0d. By comparison in 1963/64 Income exceeded Expenditure by £50.0.0d. without allowing for raffle proceeds.

The current state of affairs has been brought about by both a reduction in Income and an increase in Expenditure. Receipts are £41.0.0d. lower, the main items being Social £17.0.0d. and Dry Casting £11.0.0d. Expenditure was £63.0.0d. higher than the previous year and this was made up mainly by increases of £18.0.0d. for Reel Talk £45.0.0d. for Trophies £31.0.0d. for Social, and £15.0.0d. for Rentals less decreases of £9.0.0d. for Dry Casting, £24.0.0d. for Capital items, £4.0.0d. for Stationery and Postages and £9.0.0d. for non-recurring items.

The addition of lower Receipts and higher Expenditure add up to an increased cost of Club operations amounting to a little over £100.0.0d. for the year. I think you will all agree that we can hardly expect our costs to get lower in the future and if our finances are to be maintained in a satisfactory state then ways and means of increasing our income will have to be considered within the near future. I will have more to say about that at a more appropriate time.

During the twelve months under review Club membership has fallen. 16 new members were admitted and 34 either failed to renew their subscriptions despite reminders in Reel Talk and by letter or have resigned. Membership at June 30th 1965 was 128 consisting of 118 Seniors and 10 Juniors.

Details of Receipts and Expenditure for the General and Building Funds are as follows, and these will be shown on the following page.

AUDIT OF CLUB FINANCIAL RECORDS. PERIOD 1st JULY '64/30th JUNE 1965

Gentlemen, I have examined the financial records of our Club for the year ended 30/6/65 and report that all entries appear in order.

All receipts written have been entered in the Cash Book and money covered by those receipts have been correctly banked into one of the two bank accounts. The proceeds of lucky numbers not drawn during the year, as recorded by the Secretary in the Minute Book, have been correctly accounted for by the Treasurer and deposited into the Club's building account.

All cheques written have been correctly recorded and all accounts have been passed for payment by either the Committee or by members in monthly general meeting and are supported by receipts from the people to whom the cheques were paid. I have sighted bank certificates covering each of the two bank accounts and the balances as those certificates agree with the balances as the Cash Book after allowing for unpresented cheques.

The Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the general bank account and the Statement of Bankings for the building account as prepared by our Treasurer, correctly summarise the Club's financial transactions for the year under review. This is subject to an adjustment to calculate the true amount of subscriptions collected for the 1964/65 financial year. The Statement shows a net £217.13.6 after deducting £25.4.0. subscriptions for the 1965/66 year. However an amount of £8.18.8 was collected for the 1964/65 year before the 30th June 1964 and is included in the balance of £221.16.0. brought forward as at 1st July 1964. The correct amount of subscriptions collected for the year ended 30/6/65 was therefore £226.11.6. There are some matters to which I wish to draw your attention:-

1. Stocks of badges, transfers and stationery are not taken into account each year. However as we record only receipts and payments, this is not abnormal. In the event of the Club ceasing to exist, these assets would be valueless, so no real case exists for any change to present policy.

2. Other assets are not recorded in any register. This year's payments include the purchase of a tent for £20 and the payment for signs on the tent of £7. Last year a second set of scales was acquired at a cost of £19. The Club owns other assets which may have some sale value. I therefore recommend the Committee give

consideration to opening and maintaining a property register. In my opinion this job should not be handled by the Secretary or Treasurer but by some other member of the Committee.

3. As far as I am aware, the Club's property is not insured against loss. Perhaps a Sub-committee of, say, two or three members could be appointed to examine this question and report back to the members in general meeting or to the Committee. Such a sub-committee need not be from committee members.

4. The building fund now has almost £400. A Sub-committee - again of floor members rather than make additional work for Committee members - could consider and report on investment of these funds at a better interest rate than is now being obtained. Any plans for use of these funds would have to be given to this Sub-committee for them to determine whether a short-term, medium or long term investment was prudent.

5. During the coming financial year, we will change to decimal currency. My recommendations for the changeover are as follows:

- A. The Cash Book is to be totalled, balanced and reconciled with the bank statements to the 14th February 1966.
- B. The usual summaries of the sundries columns to be prepared to the 14th February 1966 all in pounds shillings and pence.
- C. The Cash Book totals, the figures in the summaries and the figures in the bank reconciliation then to be converted to dollars and cents.
- D. All records to then carry on in dollars etc., from 15/2/66.

6. As the basic decimal unit of a dollar is only equal to 10/-, I recommend that future annual reports be presented showing amounts to the nearest dollar rather than in dollars and cents. It is also recommended that the preceding year's figures be shown for comparative purposes.

Gentlemen I wish to further report that I have again received every assistance from our Treasurer in respect to questions asked and information sought. Both the Treasurer and Sec. are to be congratulated on the excellent job of work each has done.

DRY CASTING 4th JULY 1965.

Considering the weather, a gusty nor-wester with intermittent showers, thirty seniors arrived at Floreat Oval to see some excellent casting, both in the accuracy and Distance events.

The best casts in the Level line distance event were recorded by Bill Bridger, 453 ft., Allan Bunnett 412 ft. and Ken Jones 375 ft. Bob Jensen took top place in this event with 357-119-476. Noel Knight with 321-151-472 was second and Tom Smith with 318-153-471 was third. ^{AV} ^{HCP} ^{TOT}

With the targets in the D.H. accuracy event set at 64 yds and 44 yds, 14 members scored with all 4 casts, but Ron Shirley was the only member to score a bull, though Allan Bunnett, Harry Barrot and Noel Knight (2) recorded near misses. Allan Bunnett topscored in this event with 63/80, Harry Barrot turned up after an absence to take second place with 60/80, and Bob Tichbon was third with 56/80.

The S.H. event of 124 ft. and 94 ft. was won by D. Clegg with 32/40, the highest score this year and only 2 short of Bill Bridger's record. Bill Utting's 29/40 was second and Bob Tucker 26/40 third. 7 members scored with all 4 casts and Eric Sullivan and R. Kildahl scored a bull each.

Six members scored with all 8 accuracy casts, they were H. Barrot W. Utting, E. Sullivan, D. Clegg, R. Tucker and Ken Jones.

The first of 4 D.H. Open events was conducted after our normal casting with 4 members scoring over 400 ft. They were Bill Bridger 456 ft. (2 ft. short of his own record) A. Bunnett 412 ft. Ken Jones 427 ft. and Bill Utting 411 ft. - excellent casting.

FIELD DAY GARDEN ISLAND 17-18TH JULY 1965

Weather conditions - Gusty Nor-Easterly winds with beaches in excellent conditions, and a lack of weed, but the venue produced plenty of fish mainly salmon, skips, tailor and herring being weighed in. An excellent attendance of 40 seniors, 1 junior and 2 visitors, which shows that Garden Island is still a popular venue amongst the members, especially after the weigh-in which produced 580 lbs. of fish plus about another 100 lb. of scale fish caught before 4 p.m. Saturday.

It was good to see amongst our members some who we do not see very often, mainly Andy Shack, Ian Edgar, Stefan Knezy (getting quite a regular now he has returned from the East) and new members Denis Bodle, Warren Minnett and Terry Mannion.

Some of the lads travelled to Garden Island on the early boat 9.30 a.m. Saturday to make sure of getting their favourite spot, and this certainly paid off for Hugh Gregory. Hugh's spot was the Skippy Hole just north of the rifle range and this hole certainly produced fish - Salmon before 4 o'clock and mainly Skips after 4 with an occasional Salmon and tailor thrown in. Hugh took off the heaviest bag of fish award, only beating Tom Smith by a mere $1\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. Ted Savage also managed to squeeze himself into this spot and again recorded a good catch to place him on top in the pointsper pound. Section - nice going Ted. Further South, the Rifle Range produced quite a bag of fish notably Allan Bunnetts 10 lb. 1 oz Salmon (equal heaviest Salmon Fish on venue) Don Bridger, Eric Sullivan, and Bill Bringer all recorded good captures here, although Ron Shirley was heartbroken and almost cried as he and Andy Shack had an exasperating time watching the other lads hauling in their fish. Better luck next time Ron and Andy.

Further South again Mike Dawson had a lively time with a Salmon on his flick rod and after scrambling over rocks etc., managed to land some. A mighty effort amongst those rocks. Lofty Griffiths and junior Les Newton returned from the South end with these parts of a bran bag full of herring. Lofty's bag was 43 lb. and Les weighed in $26\frac{1}{2}$ lb. all herring.

As Norm Clark was heading accross to the Back Beach about 3 p.m. he mentioned he saw Bob Jensen staggering back to the huts

with 3 or 4 Salmon all caught from "Bob Jensens Bay" early in the afternoon. Quite a few of the boys fished here, Alf Rutland, Arthur Horton, Ken Hunt, but apparently all the fish were pulled out of this spot before 4 p.m. and after 4 it was almost fishless.

At the second bay North on the Back Beach, Ron Kildahl, Bob Klein and Terry Mannion thought they were in for a harvest, for when they arrived Ron said the Salmon were everywhere, but apart from Bob Klein landing one (his first I believe) on his first cast, the results were poor, although Ron did weigh in a nice Mulloway at 6.1/4 lbs.

Further North again, just south of the Guns, Ian Edgar had a birthday, everywhere Ian tossed his bait there seemed to be a fish waiting. Tom Smith, Bill Utting, Dave Latta, Phil Neri and I caught Salmon in this area, and I might say one nearly pulled me in as I was a bit exhausted what with the Flue etc.

In the far North the catch was very poor although 4 Salmon were caught by Jack Harvey's party at the caves area.

Several of the lads were stricken down with Flue and spent several days in bed as a result namely Bob Tichbon, Eric Sullivan and yours truly, however I'm glad to say we are now on the improve (thank goodness)

Well chaps, so closed a wonderful week-end and the anglers in the right places had a feast of angling. Many thanks to all who assisted on this venue, and to the award winners. The loading and unloading of the boat went extra well, all members pitching in and helping.

Bring for a good roll up to the August Venue, Garden Island. Don't forget to wear your Club Badges on this trip, and please place a plastic covering on your gaff as corks soon fall off and then accidents can happen.
