TREASURER'S REPORT.

Before submitting the 1965/66 Income and Expenditure Statements for your approval, there are two changes requiring explanation. First the Statements have been prepared showing amounts to the nearest dollar and second the 1964/65 amounts are also shown for the purpose of comparison. This has been done in compliance with the recommendation contained in last year's Auditor's report, and is designed to give Members a charer picture of Club Finances.

During the 12 months under review, the action taken to correct the adverse trend reported last yar has been successful with the result that Income exceeded Expenditure by \$164.00. In 1964/65 there was a deficit of \$50.00 This improvement has been mainly due to a \$280.00 increase in Income.

There was only a small increase in Expenditure, but this has been possible only with the help of our good friends who have been so generous in donating trophies both in cash and kind. This has already been suitably acknowledged by our President in his report. The net result was \$54.00 less expenditure on this item in 1965/66.

It was again necessary to subsidise Social functions this year but to a somewhat lesser degree. \$132.00 this year compared to \$196.00 last year. The balance to be carried forward includes \$116.00 Subscriptions paid in advance at June 30th, which is shown separately in the Summary as this amount is correctly income for Nevertheless, in my opinion, we are in good firnext year. ncial shape. However our duplicator bought second hand seven years ago is giving trouble, and consideration will need to be given to its replacement in the near future. Expenditure on this may not be inconsiderable so the need to keep our finances. sound remains constant.

The Building Fund has continued to grow, and towards the end f the year passed to \$1000.00 mark. It is my hope that we will entinue to push this with yigour and enthusiasm.

Membership at June 30th totalled 134 members, consisting of 125 Seniors and 9 Juniors. During the year 16 new members were dmitted, and 10 members resigned or failed to renew their subs.

As I am not seeking re-election this year, I would like to nank you Mr. President, and Committee Members both past and present or the assistance and co-operation always given me, which has made the job a most enjoyable one.

AUDIT OF CLUB FINANCIAL RECORDS - 1ST JULY 1965 to 30TH JUNE 1966.

The financial records of our Club for the year ended 30th June 1966 have been examined and I report all entries appear in order. All receipts written have been entered in the Cash book, and money covered by those receipts has been correctly banked into one of the two bank accounts. The proceeds of lucky numbers not drawn during the year as recorded by the Secretary in the Minute Book, have been correctly accounted for by the Treasurer, and deposited into the Club's building account.

All cheques written have been clearly recorded and all accounts he been passed for payment by either the Committee or by members in monthly general meeting, and are supported by receipts from the people to whom the cheques were paid. I have sighted bank certificates covering each of the two bank accounts, and the balances of the certificates agree with the balances in the Cash Book, after allowing for unpresented cheque. The Club's bank manager has confirmed the bank is holding on behalf of the Club, Cert. No. 1293 for \$800 onfixed deposit with the Home Building Society. The Secretary's Petty Cash book has been checked and is in order.

The Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the general bank account and the Statement of Bankings for the building account, as prepared by our Treasurer, correctly summarise the Club's financial transactions for the year under review. In keeping with suggestions made last year, the Statement of Income and Expenditure is in even dollars and comparative figures are shown. Adjustments were necessary to the figures for the 1964/65 to cover the comment in my audit report last year relating to subscriptions paid in advance at 1st July 1964. A property register has been opened, and worthwhile items have been insured for an All Risks Insurance co ertotalling \$339.

The conversion of the Club's financial records to Decimal Currency was made in the Treasurer's usual efficient manner.

INSURANCE POLICIES.

- 1. Cash in transit \$200. The policy with Norwich Union has been mislaid, I obtained a copy direct from the Insurance Company and report this is in order.
- 2. All Risks on Club Property \$339. This policy with Continent of Australia Insurance Co. Ltd. was held by the Insurance Brokers, Simon Warrender (Adelaide) Pty. Ltd. I obtained it for examination and can report that it is in order.

AUDITORS REPORT CONTD.

Personal Accident on Dry Casting Markers \$4000. This policy with Provincial Insurance Co. Ltd. was hended tone by the Treasurer for examination. It is in order as a personal accident policy to apply to members only, not the public, and only to members when they are acting as "Markers" at a dry casting function organised by our Club, and only while they are performing their duties as "Markers".

Gentlemen, like many other members, I was under the impression we were insured against dry casting accidents involving members of the public. We have NO Public Risk Insurance. The three policies listed are the only ones on which the Club pays premiums. It is my recommendation therefore that the members consider arranging Public risk Insurance. I also recommend we consider some arrangement for other events, such as dry casting with the Collie Club at a function organised by them.

REGISTER OF MEMBERS.

The Committee anticipated a suggestion I intended to incorporate in this year's audit report. At the October Committee Meeting they voted to institute a register of members. I was not aware of this until I examined the Minute Book. It was then too late to call for this register. Therefore I have not been able to check this record, but will do so and report to you later in a supplementary report.

CONCLUSION.

Gentlemen, I wish to again report that I have received excellent co-operation from our Treasurer. He, the Secretary and their assistants are to be congratulated on another excellent years effort on behalf of our Club.

WHALER OR POINTER.

In view of the fact that the shark has existed almost unchanged for sme 2000,000,000 years, it is a pity that most of us tend to misname the more common species of the genus of elasmobranchs.

How often do we hear in a person's account of an encounter with a shark, even when it consists of a line bitten cleanly through that the miscreant was a Blue Pointer? This and other more exotic sounding names such as the Tiger, or the Grey Nurse, are the ones that spring more readily to mind in the excitement of a hard strike and a screaming reel? How much more likely, though is it to be the Whaler, or one of its many sub-species!

The various members of this family to which we append such names as Bronze Whaler, Black, Whaler, Blue Whaler, Grey Whaler, White Whale: and W.A. Whaler, abound on all parts of the Australian coastline, feeding close to the shore in channels and around the edges of reefs. Even an experienced ichthyologist would be hard pressed to readily identif some of these sub-species, and we could be exceed for using the general term "Whaler" where only partial identification can be made.

In shark identification, simple keys can be applied which divide these predators into main groups, and the application of further keys quickly divide these groups into their various species. Of course, certain species such as the Thresher, Hammerhead, Wobbegong and Shovelnose Shark are so easily identifiable as to be excluded from the following lists:-

EYE - LARGE AND DARK COLOURED

White Pointer, Blue Pointer, Tiger.

EYE - SMAIL AND YELLOWISH WITH NARROW BLACK PUPIL.

Grey Nurse, All Whalers.

Another identifying feature which is positive in separating the Grey Nurse and the Whaler is the nictitating membrane or third eyelid. This is a protecting membrane, whitish in colour, which in the species which possess it, slides across the eye to protect it during an at ack when the shark is guided solely by its highly developed olfactory and gustatory senses. The whaler has this membrane but the Grey Nurse does not.

BLUE POINTER

TEETH. Long and pointed and slightly curved like those of the Grey Nurse, but without cusps at the Base, placed apparently haphazardly along the jaws but clustered most thickly in the centre

NICTITATING MEMBRANE -- absent

SIZE -- Up to at least 1200 lbs and a length of 15 ft.

FOUND -- In the open oceans of the world. Rarely encountered really close to the shcre.

BLUE WHALER.

TEETH. Broad and slightly serrated in the upper jaw, narrow and slightly serrated in the lower jaw.

NICTITATING MEMBRANE -- Presunt

SIZE — at least 500 lbs and a length of 10 ft. in Aust. waters. Up to 20 ft. in other parts of the world.

FOUND -- Open ocean. Immature species feed closer to shore along beaches and reefs.

Another feature of the Blue Whaler is the unusually long spectoral fin which is equal in length to the distance from the tip of its nose to the first gill slit. Misidentification is sometimes caused by the prevalence of black tips on fins and tail lobes of a number of sharks found in local waters. Those are sometimes loosely called Black Whalers, but most species of Whaler have black tips. Generally those are not so prominent on dorsal and pectoral fins as on tail lobes, however they are clearly marked on the Black Tipped Shark (Mapolamia spallanzani) a tropical species growing to ft. in length similar in general build to the whalers.

A good rule when identification is doubtful and the specimen too large to convey to the museum, is to obtain profile photos of the sairk and then to extract its jaws. This is afairly easy job to with a sharp thin bladed knife. The extracted jaws set hard in a few hours, and besides being a worthwhile trophy, may assist in faitive identification of the species. Use great care when hadding or working on shark jaws as some species i.e. Grey Nurse razor sharp and can give you an unwelcome reminder of the owner's potential menace to all who live in the ocean.
