### TRE SURER'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 30TH APRIL, 1970

### Mr. President, Gentlemen,

Attached to this report are statements of Income and Expenditure, Receipts and Payments and Balance Sheet for the General and Building Funds for the year ended 30th April, 1970 which I submit for your approval.

During the year Income has increased by 59.00 overall, and there has been no major increase or decrease in any particular item. The total expenditure of 1612.00 this year is exactly the same as the amount expended last year.

Comparing the costs for the two years the major increases and decreases are as follows:-

#### REEL-TALK:-

The costs incurred this year are 28.00 less than that of last year. It was not necessary to purchase covers this year although the paper purchased increased by 11.00.

#### TROPHIES:-

29.00 more was spent in the current year than that expended in 1969 for this item.

### RENT:-

An increase of 12.00 for the year occurred for the rental of the hall for meetings.

### REPAIRS:-

In 1969 this item did not appear, but it was necessary to repair the club scales and gestetner during 1970, the total cost being 34.00. - 2 -

### TREASURER'S REPORT contd:

#### SOCIAL:-

An increase of 65.00 for the year occurred, mainly due to the cost of the hall rental for the social increasing, and also with a larger membership this year than last year, the costs of our Christmas Social and Annual General Meeting were higher.

#### BADGES:~

This year the amount expended on Badges decreased by 108.00 as Club Badges were not purchased. Also last years figures included the name badges purchased by the club and then sold to Members.

#### AIR FARE:-

In last year's figures the amount of 35.00 was paid for George Holman's fare from Perth to Geraldton. This was an abnormal expenses and will not appear again.

The final result for the year was an excess of 191.00 income over expenditure as compared with 132.00 for the previous year. This excess of 191.00 is quite satisfactory.

The Building Fund increased by 270.00 for the year as compared with 599.00 in 1969. The decrease in receipts in the Building Fund is due to nomination Fees falling by 84.00 and a Club Raffle was not conducted this year. Last year 172.00 was received from this source. Also Interest decreased by 76.00 as interest from the Bank of New South Wales was not credited to our Account by 30th April, 1970. Interest from Home Building Society increased by 38.00 as our deposits with them are higher than the previous year.

Club Memberships totalled 161 at 30th April, 1970 as compared with 156 as at 30th April, 1969. During the year 21 new members were admitted to the Club, but 16 either resigned or failed to renew their membership. The total of 161 members is made up of 6 Life Members, 11 Juniors and 144 Seniors.

Finally, the Club has progressed satisfactorily during the past 12 months and it is hoped this trend will continue in the future.

### CASTING CAPERS

I thought that "Aussie Rules" was unpredictable, however after the July drycasting competition, I am not so sure.

Who would have thought that "SNAPPER" PARKER would come out and win the L.L. Handicap in such fine style. Three nice looking casts right down the centre, (no B.O's or penalties). This is not the Eric we know of old. Is Eric going to maintain this run? It shall certainly take some doing, but judging on recent form, he looks capable of giving his handicap a further nudge.

During this event any of five casters were in the running. BOB TICHBON turned in another fine effort with his three casts, knocking spots off his handicap - twenty three of them at least! MIKE DAWSON was definitely trying and his twenty seven reduction of handicap was warranted. RUDY LERCH placed down his three consistent casts to give him an average of 402. A very pleasing effort. (Rudy lost sixteen from his handicap). GEORGE HOLMAN was another with a chance, and it has been some months since we have seen George cast this well. (We knocked mineteen off yours George). Most of the competition was conducted under overcast conditions with occasional drizzle and if anything, a slight tail wind (for L.L. Hcp).

Twenty eight members fronted and were welcome, (the more the merrier). Young MARK TICKER again gave the D.C.O. valuable assistance. One or two visitors were seen moving amongst the members, JACK KANDALL who looks likely to become a new member and BCB LESLIE from the SHENTON PARK ANGLING CLUB, were seen to be practising astutely.

Practise does not always make perfect as was borne out by the S.H. Accuracy results. During the warm-up period TOM CORCORAN, RUDY LERCH and DOUG TALBOT were heard to clobber the "BULL". On paper, "DEADLY DOUG" was the only one of this trio to fill a place.

Winning this event was the redoubtable BOB TICHBON whose score of 33/40 establishes the new mark for this year. This could take a while to catch. Bob was really in form and homed in on the target (like a guided missile), with his first cast, thereafter casting accurately. Second in this event was NOEL KNIGHT, who if he casts like this with limited appearances, what would he be like if he attended regularly. NOEL scored 32/40. Already mentioned was DOUG TALBOT with 29/40 in third place.

Others to cast well in this section were BILL UTTING (possibly unerved after the D.H. Acc.), GEORGE HOLMAN, RON KILDAHL and myself.

Unusal to members of the quality of IAN McLENNAN, RUDY LERCH, H.Y. HEW, BRIAN HANKS, TOM CORCORAN and JIM STRONG, they were strangely off target. Most of these casters have been past winners in this event.

There could have been members who scored a "bull" in the practise session of the D.H. Accuracy, if so they were not spotted.

This segment of the programme was won convincingly by RON KILDAHL with his 61/80 which also sets the mark to be beaten for the year. Congratulations Ron, well thrown. Deadheating for second was BOB TUCKER who with succeeding casts improved steadily, (glad we only have four casts). Bob usually fills a place in this one. BRIAN LETCESTER, whom we have already met, was deadly accurate, and if his second shot had followed the first? Anyway this due managed a creditable 57/80. (I wouldn't mind it). Third in this event was NOEL KNIGHT, whose first shot was certainly not the equal of his other three. Noel scored 54/80. JOHN NUICH and BILL UTITING normally rate a place in this section, however, this was not their day.

Last but not least, was the placegetters for the day's points. The honours here went to NOTE. KNICHT, DOUG TALBOT and RON KILDAHL with scores of 148, 144 and 143 respectively.

With scores from the L.L. Handicap being fairly even, the members casting accurately at the discs must forge to the front. So practise on the S.H. and D.H. Accuracy, this is where the points come from.

The longest cast of the day was gained by CRAHAM ROSS with 426 feet. There is a slight shuffle in the "TOP TEN" with BOB and DOUG having a lead at the moment.

This month after the election of committee, we may see a change in the D.C.O.'s, so may BRIAN and I take this opportunity of saying thank you to those whose assistance was very much appreciated over the past twelve months.

Next month the events will be the L.L. Handicap, S.H. Accuracy, D.H. Accuracy and the S.H. OPEN. The starting time will probably be 9.00 a.m. Please turn up and have a cast.

### METHOD OF MEASUREMENT (Amendment to inside cover):

GARFISH are measured from the tip of the upper jaw to the end of the upper half of the tail; prawms are measured along the body from eye to the tip of the tail; CRAYFISH are measured along the mid-dorsal line from the anterior edge of the pronounced ridge which joins the front edges of the rostral horns immediately posterior to the eyestalks, to the posterior margin of the carapace; CRABS are measured from tip to tip of the posterior margin of carapace spikes; MARRON are measured from the tip of the rostrum to the posterior margin of the carapace along the mid-dorsal line; all other fish are measured from the point of the snout to the end of the tail.
