This last year has been one of invaluable experience for me personally as many and varied things have taken place some of which I will mention briefly in this report. When elected to the position of President I gave a little speech on 'group' loyalty as opposed to club loyalty as I then believed that the former was undermining the latter. I must hasten to correct this error in judgment on my part, as, had I looked far enough I would have noticed that the club loyalty was still a dominate factor, and the majority of members still have the club at heart.

Your Management Committee has achieved much during the year which has had its ups and downs, but these ups and downs are to be expected when 12 people have a job to do and some definite and sometimes conflicting ideas on how to get that job done. It is hoped that the ensuing year with new faces on Committee will work with the zeal and dedication shown during 1972-73.

Four significant events during the year come to mind. Firstly the life-membership of Jim Strong. No-one can deny that Jim has proved to be not only one of the club's most dedicated workers, but a true friend of every angler.

After many months of patient sifting and thought, our Constitution has been redrafted and now awaits only legal opinion and members acceptance before final endorsement. The members of this club are to be congratulated on the way they handled this task.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 30TH APRIL 1973

Mr. President, Gentlemen,

I submit for your approval the attached financial statements and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th April, 1973.

GENERAL FUND

It can be seen that after allowing for depreciation totalling \$52, the Club experienced a surplus of \$192. This is once again a satisfactory result as was last year's surplus of \$31, and compares favourably with our budget for a surplus of \$200, to enable subsidising this year's "Annual Dinner and Presentation" night. This surplus can be attributed to the Club raffle which injected \$200 into each of the General Fund and Building Fund.

Main items which need commenting on are listed below:-

SOCIAL

Our social events for the year resulted in a net cost of \$28 and this, usually large item of Club expense shows a healthy trend when you compare against 1972's net cost of \$156 and 1971's net cost of \$300.

The result of the 1972 Annual Dinner amounted to a loss of \$13 income which was a particularly good effort. Our thanks must go to our then Social Organiser, Mr. R. Lerch, who conducted a small raffle on the night which helped reduce our loss by \$124.

Again, I must make mention that without the recent raffle which contributed \$200 to offset social expenses then the social loss would have been \$228 which would have prevented us from subsidising this year's Annual Dinner.

REEL TALK

The expense involved in operating our monthly "Reel Talk" reduced from \$361 in 1972 to \$213 this year. The reduction is due entirely to an abundant supply of paper carried over from 1972 into 1973.

DRY CASTING

Thissection of our Club usually is without expense but due to the Council new charging \$7 per month for the use of the oval, we will in future have to cater for the \$84 per year from general revenue.

In 1972 we had a surplus of \$34 as compared with this year's deficit of \$17.

NB: The Council commenced their charges in November 1972.

FIELD DAYS:

Revenue from Field Days increased from \$48 last year to \$85 this year. The increase is due to the good response frommembers in attending the Rottnest Field Day last August; which resulted in a surplus of income over expenditure on that field day, of \$39.

TROPHIES

The net cost of trophies increased from \$65 in 1972 to \$135 in 1973.

I thank all trophy donors on behalf of the Club and thank you, Arch Ticklie for your contribution in making sinkers for resale to members at nost cost to the Club.

MEMBERSHIP

A summary of the movement of Club members for the year ended 30th April, 1973 can be seen as follows:-

BUILDING FUND

The increase in the Building Fund for 1973 was \$560 as compared with \$329 in 1972. The increase is due to the Club Raffle introducing \$201 and increased investments resulting in increased interest.

CONCLUSION

It is my opinion that the Club has completed a successful year financially, but on anticipating this year's expenses and comparing to expected normal income and taking into account our surplus of \$192, it would appear that we will experience a deficit of approximately \$100. It is therefore recommended that a small raffle be conducted this coming year rather than increase subscriptions, to cater for the deficit.

I thank all Members for their co-operation and assistance during the past year.

AUDIT OF CLUB FINANCIAL RECORDS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH APRIL, 1973

Following procedures established in previous years, the audit of the financial records of our Club for the year ended 30th April 1973 has been completed in the usual way. I consider our Treasurer has done quite a good job again this year and all entries for the year appear to be in order.

The financial statements prepared by him and submitted to this Annual General Meeting of Members for your adoption, do, in my opinion, correctly summarise the financial activities of the Club for the year under review.

Following the procedure instituted last year, certain items of income and expenditure have been grouped to reveal a net result.

The policy instituted last year of investing surplus funds from the general account has been worthwhile as these funds are earning interest. You will recall that the Bank of New South Wales ceased to pay interest on our normal cheque account for our general funds.

R.G. KLEIN (F.A.S.A.) HONORARY AUDITOR

A.A.A. OF W.A. DELEGATES' REPORT:

Jim Strong, myself and Roy Lundy (visitor), attended the last meeting of the above association.

This was rather a lengthy meeting as there were a number of reports from the team members returning from the Australian Championships, as well as other business.

A lengthy letter was received from the Boat Angling Committee which will be forwarded to all clubs for their perusal so that they may instruct their delegates how to vote when a motion is put on the points system for boat fishing competition.

A Notice of Motion was lodged by the North Shore Cruising Club which in effect is telling the A.A.A. of W.A. to "lay off" in their negotiation for boat ramps in the Whitford area as it may jeopardise the negotiation of the aforementioned Club in obtaining a boat ramp in the area.

Two fish were passed over for further identification and query- a Sea Pike (Snook) and a Tarwhine.

The motion of the Offshore Club regarding the point of "a maximum of two delegates from any one club being allowed to hold office at the one time" was carried.

Final arrangements were made for the Convention to be held at Mandurah on the 4th August.

It is hoped that a good roll up of anglers and their wives will attend. The cost is \$3.50 per head for a well drawn up programme which will be thoroughly enjoyed. This includes luncheon and drinks for the women whilst enjoying a tour arranged for them.

Convention commences at 3 p.m. at the Brighton Hotel, Mandurah.
