ELECTION OF OFFICE-BEARERS




Looks like things are getting a bit tough for us ordinary folk who just want to have quiet fish.

The weather turned nice on Sunday, but still no fish.







SAUDI ARABIA Chapter II

GETTING A HAIRCUT

I wasn't too sure what to expect the first time, but I needn't have worried. The Philippino barbers here are top class and are cheap at around \$5. But they don't just cut your hair. They will automatically trim your moustache, the hairs in your nose and ears, and probably a few other places if you don't stop them in time! And when they've finished that, they often massage your neck and shoulders, and even crunch your neck each way like a chiropractor. I told the guy I wanted a "3 month haircut", and walked out looking like a U.S. Marine. There are no female hairdressers operating publicly and the ladies rely on the services of suitably qualified expatriate wives in various other compounds.

BUYING A GUN

No. I haven't bought one, and probably wouldn't be permitted to do so. However, it appears Saudi's can, because I spotted a gunshop in downtown Dammam. As I passed, a prospective customer was being shown a rifle by the proprietor who, by way of demonstration, loaded a mag into the gun and proceeded to blaze away around the shop! I can only presume they were blanks, although in this place you quickly cease to be surprised by anything - for instance I saw a motorbike tearing down the road recently being ridden by no less than 4 (four) fully grown Saudi's, their guttra's flying behind them in the breeze.

THE BEACHES

A trip to the beach can be quite interesting. There are different sections at the main beach areas of Half Moon Bay. There is the bachelor section for men only (naturally the best and most convenient), and the family areas, where the women and kids can do their thing. Until recently. "doing their thing" consisted of the ladies paddling their feet on the edge while fully covered in their abayah's, while the kids and husbands went for a swim. Things are progressing however with the Western influence - the other day we saw a lady about 100 yards out to sea, wading up to her chest in the briny. But she was still fully clothed with abayah and veil! The abayah is a black cloak that covers all. Fortunately, a couple of miles further on is a fairly westernised beach where many western women wear ordinary bathing costumes, but we still hear stories of people being harassed by the Matawa (Religious or Morals Police). I think we'll stick to our swimming pool.

CAMELS

Yes they do have camels here! They roam freely in the desert and frequently onto the roads, even the freeways, and constitute the most likely cause of death when driving (apart from being smashed off the road by one of the locals of course). But if you do hit a camel and survive, you may wish you hadn't, because they are all owned by someone (Bedouins I guess) and they are not cheap, and instead of sympathy you'll probably get a hefty bill to pay for your irresponsible action in wiping out their treasured possession.

The Arabian Dromedary has one hump, and walks with a pacing action rather than a trotting action, resulting in the rolling motion which results in them being called "ships of the desert". (And you always thought it was because they were full of Arab sea-men.) As protection against

sandstorms they have a double row of eyelids and tan close their nostrils. It does not carry water in its hump, but it does store fat there to use during the dry season when food is scarce. The hump then gets small and flabby. It can go maybe 5 days without water, and can then drink up to 15 gallons! They also provide milk. In fact it was originally domesticated as a dairy animal before they discovered what a great desert pack animal it was.

ROAD TO BAHRAIN (pronounce the 'H')

Bahrain is an island, but that's no problem. They've built a causeway to it from here. I'm not sure how long it is but it takes about 45 minutes to drive over there. It is a marvel of civil engineering, with at least one huge bridge designed to allow ships to pass under it. Half way across, on an island, is the customs point, along with a restaurant in a rather spectacular looking building - in fact there are two, one each side of the border. It is a pleasant drive over the causeway to this restaurant, but we haven't gone right through to Bahrain yet as this requires the organisation of a visa at 100 SR each. Anyhow, there's nothing to do there except drink, and who wants to do that?

HOFUF

Two hours drive to the south is a very old town called Hofuf. It is built on an casis and is now in fact quite a large city. Just wandering around the old streets looking in the old shops and trying to bargain with the old shopkeepers is a pleasant pastime. But the surrounding countryside is also an attraction, boasting thousands of acres of date plantations. On our first visit we found our way to the local "mountain". It is a huge convoluted rock formation many kilometers in circumference, with 2 or 3 villages around its base. There is an old potter there who happily shows you how he spins up the clay and lets you take pictures as he uses his feet to spin the ancient potter's wheel, and then equally happily sells you a few pots. Inside the "mountain" are some "caves". These are really just clefts in the rock but they are quite extensive and are an interesting change from the usual moonscape.

HOW THE OTHER HALF LIVE - ARAMCO

The Arabian American Cil Company - that's how it all started. They have huge compounds at various locations, and one of the largest is 15 minutes drive away at Dhahran (pronounce the second 'h'). It has 15 or 20 thousand people, mainly Yanks, but with an ever increasing proportion of Saudi's as they slowly take over the reins as part of the Saudization programme. This compound has 3 golf courses, 70 tennis courts, and a whole lot of well-to-do Yanks who have been making heaps for the last 10, 15 or 20 years. They generally live in extremely comfortable and spacious houses and there isn't much they don't have. The ladies even get to drive their Jags and Mercs around the compound (women aren't allowed to drive in Saudi). Naturally we're making as many friends there as we can!

PICNIC IN THE PARK

We went to a local park for an afternoon picnic and took the kids' tee-ball gear. This caused quite a sensation with the locals, and before long we had a few of the Saudi kids involved, showing them how to use a bat and mitt. They were totally fascinated by this and we got the impression they had never had the opportunity to do anything like it before. A teenage

girl, fully veiled, hovered around but wouldn't join in. We realised it was our male presence that was putting her off, so Beth offered to throw a ball with her, and she seemed quite thrilled.

DUST

We were driving to a town 200Km to the North when we struck our first bad dust storm. First it looked like cyclone Alby was bearing down on us, what with the red-brown sky and eerie gloom, then it hit us like a wall and we were in it. The road was a freeway with 3 lanes each way, so we pushed on hoping to come out the other side, but it just got worse. We had to slow down from the usual 75 mph to around 50 mph, and when the freeway turned into single carriageway deathtrap, we drove even slower. On this road we saw 2 semi-trailers piled into each other. All in all it was a dangerous trip which we won't want to repeat if we can help it. The storm turned out to be Kingdom-wide and lasted a whole day. Our headlights were etched opaque.

MAIL

Don't ever send anything valuable here in the mail. Many items just simply disappear. Others show up after weeks or months. If you want to send anything written that is important, facsimile is the way to go. Going the other way can be just as tricky - Australia looks just like Austria to the local postal people. We've learnt to write Australia in Arabic now to help get the letters pointed in the right direction. We've also started using an interesting courier system - if you get letters from us franked or stamped in Australia, don't be surprised, its part of the system. USE AIRMAIL.

RIYADH

This is the capital and it's 4 hours drive across the desert - on a 6 lane freeway of course. Just point the Chevvy East, set the cruise control to about 140, and sit back with one finger on the wheel. We saw hundreds of camels in the desert en route, including some tiny ones which looked only days old. Also many wrecked vehicles including large semi's, one quite freshly smashed - highway hypnosis must be a major problem on roads like this. Riyadh is a big city and the drivers there make the Dammam maniacs look like Sunday school teachers by comparison. It is built near a magnificent escarpment that affords fabulous views. Too bad we couldn't see it, as we picked a dust-stormy weekend to go there. We had a barbeque at the base of the cliffs and the flies made their Australian counterparts look like (you guessed it) Sunday school teachers! Found a long curved part of the cliff face and discovered it behaved like the famous Whispering Gallery.

GETTING ARRESTED

Shortly before the religiously significant month of Ramadan it is apparently customary for some over-enforcement of the Muslim customs. Muslim women must wear an abayah (black cloak covering their entire body) and a black cloth covering all their hair. It seems generally understood that western women don't have to comply, but they must wear loose fitting clothes which don't show much arm or leg. But nothing is ever clear cut over here. Beth went shopping at the wrong place and time and got nabbed by a Matawa for not having her hair covered. She was marched with her driver around to the Matawa office where they were lectured, and the company driver had his iqama (residential permit and ID - get caught without it and you've had it) confiscated for 2 days. It was only returned after a lot of wrangling after which the company had to send letters to all advisors

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urging upon us the necessity to ensure we adhered to Muslim ways! At the time it was quite traumatic for Beth.

RAMADAN

The Musiim (Hegira) calendar starts from 622AD when Mahammad made his pilgrimmage from Makkah to Madinah. The year here is 1409. The months are lunar, so we are 11 days short each year. Therefore the seasons gradually move around the Hegiran year. The 9th month is Ramadan, during which Muslims fast from dawn to dusk. And there's no mistaking the deadlines—they let off a bloody great cannon to let you know when to start and stop fasting. Westerners are obliged to follow suit in public. This means no eating, drinking, smoking or sex in daylight hours. So a big breakfast becomes the order of the day. The locals often take it the extent of not swallowing saliva or mucous so their is lots of ostentatious spitting into rubbish bins at work, or even on the floor of shopping arcades. (I didn't feel like lunch anyway!) The purpose of the fast is somewhat defeated by the inversion of time—everyone sleeps all day and then gets up and yahoos on all night till dawn. Just before the gun they stuff themselves before praying and retiring again for the day. Except the poor old workers of course—someone has to keep the show on the road.

MUTTON GRAB

Traditionally the Saudi's don't use cutlery, I guess because that was unheard of in the good old days. The traditional meal is called a kabsa, and I have been invited to a couple since I've been here. Opposite to our usual format, all the socializing occurs first over numerous cups of tea, coffee and dates. Some hours later, just when your tummy thinks it'll never make it, they bring on the grub. The table consists of a sheet of plastic on the floor around which you all squat. The food is great joints of Saudi lamb in beds of steaming rice, with side salads and cans of pepsi (bebsithere's no 'P' in their alphabet). Saudi lamb leaves the Aussi stuff for dead in tenderness and taste. You eat by ripping chunks of meat off the joint with your right hand along with balled up handfuls of the rice. At the end of the meal everyone just ups and disappears within minutes - the evening is over!

Lee and Melba Clifton put a lot of effort into the night and the result was indicative of their efforts. Well done!



All who attended had a good time I'm sure.



TAGGED NORTH-WEST SNAPPER

North-west snapper are being tagged by the Fisheries Research Branch as part of a four-year study of movement and growth. If you catch a tagged fish we'd like to know about it.



Measure from tip of nose to fork in tail

The latin name for the north-west snapper family is <u>Lethrinus</u>. We are specifically interested in three species: spangled emperor (<u>Lethrinus nebulasus</u>), yellow-failed emperor (<u>Lethrinus muhsena</u>), and the sweetlip emperor (<u>Lethrinus chrysostomus</u>).

We'd like the whole fish (frozen please), but if you can't bear to part with it... **please** measure any tagged fish you catch from the nose to the fork in the tail. If you can return the head to us it will help us find out how old the fish is.

Return the measurements, a few scales, the head if possible, where and when you caught the fish, and the tag to one of the addresses listed below.


