CASTING DAY - SUNDAY 23rd NOVELBER:	
Only 20 members and their families attended Floreat Fark oval and McLean Park for the CombinedCasting and Picnic day arranged for November. A fairly warm day with a slight sea breeze, plus dozens of ice cream and gallons of GINEER Beer should have attracted twice as many starters, particularly as the refreshments were on the house. The Open event was the first to be contested and in it we saw some excellent casting by John Bellman, Noel Knight and Alan Livesey They averaged, 121, 122 and 107 yards respectively.
