For this reason section 7 of the Open Fishing Competition will now be for Heaviest Sea Kingish and of course all entries will still stand. Mr. McKay also informed us that it has now been defined ally established that the Sampson fish is an immature Sea Vingfor which should satill a very old argument on this subject.

DRYCASTING - 1ST. NOVEMBER; 1964.

At last the weather for our Drycasting was fairly good, a light south-easter which was consistent thruout the morning. The attendance is falling off somewhat, especially the junior section - so what about it you dads. Come along and bring the lads and also see what you can do.

Some of the best casts in the Level Line Distance event were Allan Bunnett 398ft., Bill Bridger 389ft. and Bob Tucker 367ft. On handicap, the winner of this event was a new member, Hew Hoy Yew, who was really sending them down. I believe Hew has only recently purchased his gear - a 607 and Penn Squidder so with only a little more practise will be giving Allan and Bill a run for their money. Hew's score of 334 - 180 - 514 is the highest score we have had in a long time but boy! did he murder his handicap, 180 down to 116. Second was Bob Tucker with 359 - 112 - 471 and third was Jim Strong with 315 - 148 - 463.

The D.H. Accuracy resulted in a win for Norm Clark with 47/80, Bob Tichbon was second with 44/80 and Bill Utting and Allan Bunnett tied for third with 38/80. K. Jones, R. Kildahl, B. Payne, R. Tucker and R. Tichbon scored with all four casts while Allan Bunnett recorded the only bull.

FIELD DAY - JURIEN BAY - 14TH & 15TH NOVEMBER, 1964

Weather conditions: Gusty southerly winds with weed along most of the beaches although this did not deter any of our eager anglers. Considering the distance involved the attendance of 32 seniors, 3 juniors and 3 visitors for a total of 38 was excellent and all on the venue voted it a highly successful outing. A total weight of fish of 550lb, might easily have been doubled with an earlier start and had conditions been more favourable on the second night. The weekend's capture was the best we have had since June 1963 when we landed 775lb, of fish at Yallingup and has boosted our poundage to 1008 for the year. Quite a number of sections in the competition have changed hands making it very interesting for all members.

Many thanks are due to the trail blazers, Horrie Muirson, Ron Kildahl and party for the excellent job they did erecting Fish signs on the right tracks to make things much easier for late arrivals. Our party - Bob Tichbon, Ian McLennan and myself travelled up with Jack Harvey in his Combi van. After quite a bit of backing and filling around the East Bullsbrock area we finally found the right road and proceeded to Gingin and on to Dandaragan. After stopping for lunch and filling up with petrol we continued on our way having been told by the locals that anglers, loaded down with gear, had been passing this way all day. As we approached Jurien Bay we found the sign indicating the track North and began the trip over ten miles of ideal Redex Trial country - soft sand, rocks, gullies, hills etc.

Much later!!! we finally reached our destination and set up camp and erected club signs, scales etc. Not long after the lads started reporting in - some of whom I was pleased to see were Ian Edgar, Tom Vivian, Horrie Muirson, Ian Brown, Bob Lilly, Hugh Gregory, Ted Savage, Gerry Windus, Kon Kildahl, Bob Klein, Don Beadon, Doug Talbot and many others

It didn't take most members long to head off for their various fishing spots and what hot spots most of them proved to be. The Kingie hole further north was the main attraction and when the lads came back for the weigh in next morning I was staggered at the sight of some of the captures. Bob Tucker's catch was a beauty, Ian

Brown with a 121b. Jewie in his bag did well and Allan Livesey not to be out done weighed in 301b. of fish. Bill Bridger was all smiles with his captures and Arch. Ticklie kept up his good run with 2921b. Allan Bunnett cracked it at last and proved to everyone that he can catch fish as well as cast.

Ron Shirley's Blue Whaler Shark took off the award and also the section in the Fishing Competition which incidently shows considerable alterations with six changes including three members tieing for the heaviest Mulloway section. The effort of visitor John Buszolich to take off the heaviest bag with 451b. of fish, not to mention many other fish which were not eligible having beer caught prior to 7.00 p.m., was outstanding.

Junior Don Bridger weighed in a fine Mulloway of 921b. and Ken Jones with some excellent Tailor was one of many who did very well. It was a pity that the Field Day did not commence earlier as many fish were caught prior to 7.00 p.m. and had they been weighed in would probably have brought our tally nearer 6501b.

Sunday night conditions deteriotated somewhat but our party decided to try and get our names on the tally book so we journeyed to the bay where Don Webb and Gerry Windus had done so well. A ray was the first victim followed shortly by three good sized Tailor all over 3½lb. Then the sharks struck but I failed to land one owing to the weed and my gammy leg. Ian McLennan soon got cracking and in short time landed 8 Tailor on mullet, while several herring were caught on whole scalie bait.

Altogether the fishing was not as good as Saturday night but not too many members complained and as the stories came to hand is was obvious that everyone had a thoroughly good time. This area has a terrific potential and will be a must for a venue next year. It was very pleasing to recieve the help and co-operation of all members at the Field Day and it would be difficult to single out anyone for special praise. Eventually we loaded the Combi and the journey home commenced. It had been a great Field Day and when the awards are presented at the December Meeting I am sure many of the highlights will be relived. In the meantime tight lines and a merry Xmas to all members and their families.



Many factors affect the growth of a fish once it has reached maturity and developed fully from its newly-hatched or alevin stage. Perhaps the most remarkable feature is that unlike mammals and human beings, whose bones grow up to a certain point and become "set" - beyond which stage they grow no larger - fish have bones that can develop and grow as long as they live. Providing water conditions are satisfactory, and food is constantly available in sufficient quantities, fish may keep on growing until they die. In fact, other minor considerations are necessary, but the principal holds true for nearly all fish.

Food being more plentiful in the continuous continuous developments and fish.

Food being more plentiful in the sea than in the rivers and lakes, marine fish usually reach a larger size in old age than those from freshwater. It is worth remembering that there is no such thing as a full grown Tailor or a full grown Mulloway. The rate of progress of growth varies a good deal with different kinds of fish, and in different stages in a fish's existence, but the increase in size is generally constant. A fish never really stops growing at all from the moment is leaves the egg but of course the fastest rate of growth is in the very earliest stages.

The scales of a fish can be "read" for positive signs of growth and development just as tree-rings can be interpreted by the forester. The cartilaginous, or bony fishes grow fastest, and the water temperature also has a good deal to do with the speed of growth. Fish in cold seas also grow very slowly, although they may sometimes - for example - reach much greater sizes in the long run. Food supplies influence the rate of growth, and animal food, primarily other small fish, increases the rate of growth more effectively than vegetable or insect diets.

When maturity is reached and a fish is ready to spawn, growth slows down considerably, because food products are needed for reproductive purposes. Many fish starve themselves during spawning, and so have to build up depleted body tissues afterwards before they can grow appreciably again.

As a rough average a fish can breed at about one-third of the way through its life span. After the final stage, growth is usually only slight each year, and depends a lot upon spawning. As far as we know, only serious depletion of available food will cause a fish actually to shrink after a certain point has been reached.
