READ THIS - IT MAY BE THE MEANS OF SAVING A LIFE - BERHAPS YOURS.

THE SURF EIFE SAVING ASSOCIATION OF AUSTRALIA, W.A. STATE

Firstly, the list of Dont's published by the Association is simple and does not call for increased intelligence. Their observance at all times may save your own, your friend sor someone slife. These at shown hereunder:

DON'T get excited if caught in an "under-tow" or current. Signal for help by raising your arm in a perpendicular manner, and adopt a floating position until help arrives.

DON'T struggle if seized by cramp. Signal for help by raising your arm, and maintain a floating position. Try and keep the effected part still. Cramp alone cannot drown anyone, fear does.

DON'T struggle against the current; swim diagonally across it.

DON'T bathe directly after a meal.

DON'T bathe outside the area indicated by the flags on the beach.

FON'T bathe in quiet or secluded spots where the beach is unattended.

DON'T bathe when the beach has been closed and a sign "Beach Closed - Surf Dangerous" in red letters on a white background is displayed.

DON'T bathe where the water is calm. Always choose a spot where the waves are rolling evenly shorewards. (Still waters run deep). Onentering the water select a suitable landmark onthe beach, and see that the cross-currents do not carry you away from that point, as you may drift onto an order running current.

DON'T stay in the water when feeling cold or numb. Come out immediately or cramp may result.

DON'T interfere with life-saving gear.

DON'T leave rubbish, bottle or tins on the beach.

Secondly, to emphasise the points arising from the Scarborough tragedy, and to outline where common sense and hinderance conflict, the following factors are recorded:

- (a) If someone collapses or is observed under the water near you, obtain assistance and get them to the shore.
- (b) If the person is unconscious or has difficulty in breathing, send someone for assistance immediately. If you know anything about resuscitation commence in action straight away. If you do not, the following simple rules will assist until amore qualified person comes along.
 - (1) Bend the head backwards to obtain maximum extension of the neck. A rolled up towel or pile of sand under the shoulders will make this possible.
 - (11) Clear all obstruction from mouth or air passages.
- (c) When patrol arrives, hand over patient immediately and ask if you can assist in any way.

Thirdly, always remember that fresh air is essential not only to the patient but also to members of the patrol. If the shade temperature is in the 80's, it will be at least 140° in the sun and possibly higher still on hot sand. This makes breathing extremely difficult at any time. Working space is an absolute necessity. Therefore do not join the crowd that normally gathers at scenes of this nature unless for the purpose of assisting. The quitation "CURIOSITY KILLS THE CAT" is very apt, but in cases like this, it is the patient that dies, not the cat.

LANCELIN VENUE - NOVEMBER 1967

After a week of perfect weather, Saturday threatened rain, although this didnot materialise. The largest contingent to date arrived on venue finally totalling 63 in all, of which were included 14 welcome visitors.

Shortly after setting up base in the caravan park, Tommy Vivian arrived and sportingly scouted the Southern beaches reporting shallow ter and fair heaps of weed, and consequently all but nine headed north and an almost deserted camping area was the result.

The following morning we shot back to the Beacon area and from about 4.30 a.m. until 8 a.m. we were privileged to see one Tailor, just legal size pulled from the water.

At about 8.45 the outlying anglers began to arrive at weighin, and but for the use of a pair of peper-scales we couldn't have registered a weigh on the usual ones.

The final tally of 292 lbs with a top catch of 23 lbs by Eric Sullivan tells it own story. Jim Strong's 9 lb. Mulloway took off the largest fish and gave him a grand total of 9 lbs. What happened to the rest of them Jim.
