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# SPINNING FOR REDFIN by Ross Cusack

Curiosity may or may not kill the cat, but it nearly always kills the poor old redfin.

This fine freshwater fish, often abused by trout snobs, may be sitting pat on a full stomach - but whizz the right lure past him and he just can't resist it.

He's a sucker for the right colour, the right action and the right sound. The best redfin lures, combining all three requisite are the Abu Sonettes and Reflexes. Orange, red or yellow Sonettes with their bronze revolving vane and whirring, helicopter action, are dynamite on redfin.

Many times I've had at least 20 fruitless casts in one spot with a Sonette, and then suddenly, on the 21st a redfin has hit the lure.

Why? their curiosity get's the better of them.

My redfin perch stamping ground is the Collie River which, on the other side of Collie, is a series of big, disjointed pools. Phil Bodeker and I spent five years, from about 1960, discovering redfin waters in this area. We walked many miles, opening up new waters on each trip, and now we know of spots, spread over a big area, where we can catch redfin.

We pioneered lure fishing for redfin in these waters. Till we tried, the locals always used bait - mainly live creek minnows and small gilgies. They used a handline of about 10 lbs breaking strain, without sinker or float.

Phil and I took to spinning with flick rod, 6 to 9lb line and Sonettes and our techniqur was to fish 50 yards apart, casting in every likely spot, persevering if we struck fish, but moving on if we had no result.

In the early days we had tremendous catches because we were fishing pools where the perch had never seen a lure before. We both got State record redfin, the biggest 21b 12 & 3/4 ozs, and many many fish between 11b and 2½1bs.

After the first year or two we learnt not to overfish a pool, because the perch seemed to become lure-shy. We had fewer casts in more pools, and tried to establish which colour was most acceptable to the reddies. In retrospect, I think the orange Sonette is tops. Red seemed to take fish when the water was clear, and yellow had its good days, but orange always produced the most fish overall.

The redfin is not the world's best fighter, but he's not gutless either. He has a good, solid strike (you sometimes think you're snagged, because he has a habit of stopping when he hits the lure) and he fights deep. Redfin are also most attractive fish, with their brilliant red fins, uniform stripes and handsome shoulder hump.

Redfin have been plentiful in the rivers around Collie since 1910, and probably earlier. It's thought that a Collie doctor named Rigby stocked the first fish in the Collie River around 1904.

When reddies are schooling, catches of 50 to 100 are not uncommon. They have a habit - like tailor, for example, of schooling in fish of uniform size. We used to see schools of half-pounders, pound fish, and on memorable days, schools containing nothing under 21bs. There are definitely much bigger fish, the biggest ever recorded being a 51b 13oz whopper taken in the Capel River in 1910. Incidently a photo of this beauty - caught by a man known only as Tom - was the pride of the Capel Hotel bar for more than 20 years, till someone pinched it.

The statistics of Tom's 1910 beauty reveal some interesting growth characteristics of the redfin. His fish was 17"long. However the 21b 12/3/4 oz reddie we took was 17% in length.

Tom's fish was a full 31b heavier. The size of the two would indicate that the maximum length of W.A. redfin is 17°. It seems that the really big 'uns' after reaching this length, just grow deeper and fatter.

In conclusion, I don't think anyone would expect me to set out, for all to see, exact details of all the redfin areas we found, but I would be most happy to give this information to any club member who would like to do a spot of redfin fishing.

Oh, I nearly forgot - they're darn good to eat, too. The flesh is a very clean whitis - pink, and has a good tangy taste.

# DRY CASTING NEWS by D.C.O.'s Brian Hanks & Les Reid

This was one competition when one's handicap was reduced. Who would have expected winter in the early part of summer? We had a slight taste of this for our November Dry Casting (almost wet casting).

After a slight amount of confusion, brought about by myself deciding to throw towards the Perry Lakes end, the fellows helping with the equipment promptly placed it by the gate. Then, "hold it"!

"To take advantage of the expected S.W. breeze we shall cast towards the northern end." There were the usual good natured mutterings, can't they make up their bloody minds and the like and so picking up the gear once more marched down, and placed it at the southern end. "Yes we know what happened, the breeze (what a joke) came from

the N.W. and blew at something like 20 knots. However as I am like George Washington who couldn't tell a lie, BRIAN was the culprit and he was solely to blame. (How's that for a bit of dobbing in). Seriously who would have expected the wind from the N.W., only those who listened to the early morning forecast. Brian or myself were not amongst those that did.

When JOHN DEVITT failed to make an appearance it was speculated who would win the open event. After a keen struggle, the ultimate victor was GRAHAM ROSS, with GRAHAM BASKERVILLE and ERIC PARKER finishing closely in that order. Only 23 feet separated their best casts, this adds to the interest. ERIC has improved immensely over the past few months and has the potential to cast further (who's the coach?).

A noticeable fact was that the placegetters in the OPEN failed to gain a point in the L.L. HANDICAP, mainly as a result of a B.O.s to each of them. This certainly reduces the average. Of course it could be that they don't want to be greedy and deliberately have a B.O. now and again to give the others a bit of heart. Good for you fella's keep at it! (Ed. I think he means the Break Offs.)

GEORGE HOLMAN has had more than his fair share of penalties in recent months. Newcomer WALLY FLEETON also had accuracy troubles as did the former D.C.O. DAVE LATTO. These three all incurred 63 penalty points. You'll have to keep your eyes on the more accurate casters and copy their style. However in view of the conditions the casting in the Hcp. was better than expected (as far as penalties if not distance). DOUG TALBOT put down three long casts into the wind and scored top points with BILL UTTING and RON KILDAHL in close attendance.

The D.H. Acc. if it could be called this, gave difficulty in the gusty breeze, blowing almost at right angles to the line of cast. One had to aim upwind to compensate, and this wasn't easy. If your judgement was astray. Speaking for myself I could hardly reach the longer distance let alone some of the newer members. This event caused a few surprises in that DOUG TALBOT usually right on target had a lapse of form, also RUDY LERCH and JOHN NUICH threw well below their best. DAVE LATTO looked likely to score a "Bull" but floated off to the side to give a nice nineteen (19). Winning

this event was one of the old hands (in fishing not age) BOB TICHBON. Finishing in a tie for second, were two more competant hands in BOB TUCKER and RON KILDAHL, with GEORGE HOLMAN close behind for third. BRIAN LEICESTER, IAN McLENNAN and BRIAN HANKS were others who scored consistently and showed that it could be done.

Did anyone realise that baskful BRIAN LEICESTER had made a re-appearance so quiet unassuming, shy, he took a bit of spotting, keeping as he did in the background.

It was the last occasion that RICK ROWLANDS was to be casting with us, as he has been transferred to Darwin for a period of 2 years. Rick hopes that the fishing up there will be good and should catch some of the bigger ones that get away. Best of luck Rick!

In the S.H. Acc. we saw GRAHAM BASKERVILLE take this event easily with some accurate casting. Graham's first and second casts gave that "bull" a fright and he scored nine consecutively. IAN McLENNAN came into the picture here & finished 2nd to Graham, with DAVE LATTO handling the Acc conditions better than the Hcp. to finish 3rd. While their event was in progress we observed BOB TUCKER giving instruction to a bunch of the lads on the art of telling humerous stories. Know any more Bob? BRIAN LEICESTER was doing his best to play King Canute with the wind, however Brian's humour was a bit misplaced as his accuracy was the one to suffer. Better luck next time Brian.

Gaining top points for the days casting was RON KILDAHL with BILL UTTING & BRIAN HANKS filling the minor placings. Incidently Brian has cut 6" off his 3904. We will be looking forward to Brian breaking his handicap.

There are some changes in the TOP TEN CASTERS with some new names appearing and a close competition at the top with only 39 points separating 4 members. # HOW TO LIVE WITH A FISHERMAN:

Fishing fever infects millions of people every year. But what about all those other millions, the long-suffering people that the people who fish are married to?

Consider the wife of an ardent angler. All her husband talks about is fish, fish, fish. He dreams of fish. He even smells slightly of fish. His tie is embroidered with trout flies, and his tie-pin is a miniature rod and reel. His beer glasses are decorated with leaping fish. Instead of carrying his children's pictures in his wallet, he has a snapshot of the 20 pound beauty he caught last summer.

Throughout the year the entrance hall of her home is littered with rods, tackle boxes and gaffs. His waders leave wet prints on the living-room carpet, his sopping trousers are hung across the fire screen to dry. Fish scales stick to the kitchen floor for her to skid on.

He dumps his live white-bait in the tropical fish acquarium so they'll keep nice and fresh overnight. The other day a worm fisherman's wife petitioned for divorce because he parked his night crawlers in her pot of Africian violets, and forgot to tell her.

A golfer's wife has a chance to get acquainted with her husband once rain comes, but the angler's wife is lucky if he recognizes her when they pass in the street. During the worst winter months he sorts through his tackle or buries himself in a fishing catalogue, nodding vaguely and murmuring "Hmm?" when his wife tries to make conversation. As spring approaches he sits at his desk practising casts with a ruler or absently turning the handle of a pencil sharpener as though winding a reel. On fishing days, he leaves the house before dawn, doesn't show up again until dark, and goes straight to bed after dinner so he can get an early start next morning. If his neglected spouse packs her suitcase and flounces home to Mother, it may be several days before he notices that she's gone.

Such maritial spats may be avoided if the angler's wife displays a little tolerance and follows a few simple rules:

- RULE 1. In talking to him, learn to employ the right terms.

  A purist will wince perceptibly if you call his splitcane rod, a stick or his expensive line, a string or his imported reel, a winder. Equally important, when he brings back a solitary, very small fish, don't say, "Isn't it cute!" Bolster his ego by exclaiming., "Wait a minute dea, till I get the camera".
- RULE 2. Don't fly off the handle when he filches your manicure scissors or a spool of silk thread. Avid fly fishermen keep their eyes peeled for any useful material and are unable to resist plucking a coupld of tail feathers from the budgerigar, or unravelling some wool from the baby's jumper, or snipping a few strands from your chinchilla coat. Grit your teeth and smile sweetly as he cuts out the palm of your rubber kitchen glove to patch his waders.
- RULE 3. Never (repeat never) touch his fishing tackle. Take the wife of a fisherman I know who decided to clean while he was away. She emptied all the contents of his various tackle boxes into one carton labelled FISHING GEAR. She removed his lines from their respective reels and wound them up together like a ball of yarn. She took every thing out of the pockets of his canvas jacket and sent it to the cleaners, and then gave his battered fishing hat to the church jumble sale. It cost him five dollars to buy it back.

He left home for a month's salmon fishing a grew a beard. What's more, he refused to shave it off until she promised never to set foot in his tackle room again.

- RULE 4. If his fishing partner is planning to pick him up at 5 a.m. the understanding wife will set her alarm for 4 in order to wake him and get his breakfast ready. Usually he will go back to sleep again until the horn honks in the driveway. Then he'll finish dressing as he dashes about, shout that there's no time for breakfast, and bolt out the front door.
- RULE 5. When he's telling about the big one that got away, don't let on you've heard the story a thousand times before or remind him that the fish has gained weight with each telling. If you have dinner guests, encourage him to show the colour slides of his trip. He will be delighted and you'll get rid of the company early.
- RULE 6. Don't try to share his hobby by accompanying him on a fishing trip. You'll spend the whole day running to fetch his gaff or climbing a tree to disengage the hook he hung up on a back cast. Then you'll have to listen all the way home while he explains that the water was too high or too low, it was too hot or too cold, the wind was too windy, or you got in his way while he was casting. If you do go along and catch a larger fish than he does, remove the hook when he isn't looking and let your trophy swim away. It's better to lose a fish than a husband.

A final suggestion. Never ask a fisherman why he goes fishing because he can't tell you. How can he made you understand that it's more than just the fish? It's the sound of running water, the smell of damp rocks, the slap of the waves on the sand. It's all the memories that crowd in on him of other fishing trips, of campfires he squatted beside, of friends he used to know.

So if he comes home at night with his nose running, a blister on his heel and one eye swollen shut where a sand-fly bit him, don't feel sorry for him; he's had a marvellous time.

You're the one who rates sympathy. You married a fisherman.

All shops etc. which have scales for weighing goods must by law have their scales tested, and it is considered to be no real hardship to use tested scales for weighing fish if you intend to claim a record or 3 in 1 badge. For obvious reasons some standard must be maintained in this matter.
