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



The excellent weather on the Saturday turned nasty overnight, with wind, rain, and the drouded weed. Most of the successful anglers caught their fish on Saturday afternoon and evening. Mulloway Fremantic managed to find their fish at 9 mile. Surfcasters fished from Flat Rock up to the Greenough Rivermouth. The Reelcy's found heaps of mulloway, easily getting their 5 bag limit, but had difficulty finding tailor. John came fourth overall, and he only needed a bit of luck and a few tailor and could very well have taken off champion man. Many thanks to Dad John and Uncle Graham for taking the minis out, and congratulations to all the Recleys for a job well done. Filomena had an excellent bag, a very well deserved result, as she stayed up all night and fished, no sleep except some nodding on her tock. Many thanks to both Filomena and Tony. Tony was awarded the veterans team trophy, but could not fish for both the vots team and the mens team. ESPERANCE CLUB TRIP

SATURDAY 11 OCTOBER TO SATURDAY 21 OCTOBER

On the Saturday morning three groups, Leigh and Nella, Eric and Mal, and Ian and Derry left from Leigh's factory for the trip to Esperance.

The trip down was very pleasant and relaxing. A large area of the Lower Great Southern region appears to have been very dry this winter. In comparison the Esperance-Ravensthorpe area has had extremely high rainfall with a lot of road and bridge damage and crops affected by flooding. We arrived in Esperance late in the day so unpacked and set up our gear.

Sunday morning some of us were up early and I had a look around the town. I worked in Esperance in the 60s and the difference now is quite startling. About lunchtime we drove out to Hellfire Bay which is on the east side of Cape Le Grande. We fished from some high rocks but the fish were not there. Leigh and Nella were advised by the Ranger that they may not remove anything from a National Park (except rubbish) and that included the dead firewood they were collecting. We met some of the local Surf • Casting club members at Hellfire Bay car park.

At dusk three of us tried Salmon Beach just west of the town but again it was very quiet. We then had a barbecue with Tony and Jackie Richardson. They have a very nice new house with a spectacular view over West Beach and out to the islands.

Monday morning we made an early start and went out to Alexanders about 80 miles east of Esperance. We drove about 10 kilometres along the coast which involves driving up and down creeks and over some difficult rocky areas on the beach. We fished the eastern edge of the rocks and caught Salmon, Salmon Trout, Skippy and Berring. Pieces of a wrecked wooden fishing boat were scattered around this area. There was some very nice looking gutters in this area also.

Tuesday was a lay day with shopping and preparations for the field day.

Wednesday we headed for Thomas River. I managed to get on the wrong side of a washed out bridge so had to do a lot of back tracking. Initially, we fished at the river mouth towards the eastern end of the beach, but before dark we went back to a gutter system further west. Towards dark the fish started to come on the bite. At this stage the weather blew up with very strong winds and rain. We had a good tea together in one of the tents and then fished till about 11 o'clock. We fished again in the morning but the fishing was very quiet. At about 9.30 a.m. we packed up and drove back to Alexanders and completed the field day there. We caught some more good fish but after the end of the field day.

On the way home Leigh and Nella (to get even for a prank earlier in the week) put barricades of branches across the road in two places as well as planting tree branches. Derry and I removed and replanted these. Friday we want to Dunns Beach and fished the rocks there. After lunch, as there were no fish, we drove over the headland onto Rossiters Beach and all the way along this to the car park at the beginning of the Cape Le Grande national park where we spoke to the Ranger. On the way back from there to Hellfire, we saw a lot of Grey Kangaroos (40). We got out of the vehicles and got to within about 20 metres of them before they would move off. We all took a number of photographs. Hellfire again didn't produce many fish. We then high-tailed it to Tony and Jackies again for another barbecue. Bruce Mehan gave a special field day prize for the heaviest skippy which Mal Head won.

FIELD DAY REPORT 11TH - 12TH NOVEMBER

HILL RIVER

Weather was mild cloudy with light West to Southwest winds with overnight showers. The swell was low with low seas. High tide was 20.00 hrs.

After the sign on at the Cervantes water tanks we drove up the track towards Hill River. This road is good except for a few sand drifts. On arriving at the area of the old shed Peter took us on a series of excursions up overgrown tracks to desdends trying to find a way around the river. We ended up going South and driving up the beach in very soft sand. The D'Alonzos and Graham Reeley were already set up when we arrived.

Glen and Heather Osborne had just purchased a very nice and tidy second hand beige coloured Subaru and this was their first excurion in 400 country. Both the drivers and the vehicle performed, very well. I think we have two potentially very active fishing members here, so keep up the good work Glen and Heather.

The members all fished along a 100 metre section of beach in front of the banked up Hill River mouth. A group of young chaps set up their gear just North of us and put out a good berley slick. From about 16.00 hrs. onwards they proceeded to catch small Bronze Whaler Sharks about every half hour. I saw them land seven before it got dark. They were fishing at the south end of a gutter formed by the beach and seagrass beds about 75 metres offshore. The sharks may have been running the gutter and then out to sea. as the sharks didn't turn up along the rest of the beach in any numbers.

Peter Osborne was the only one to see any action and he had two strikes at the same time. While he was bringing the first shark he was controlling the other Alvey with his foot. The second shark was in close enough to see, when it cut through the line as Pete was trying to turn it. He found out on examination of the rigs he had hooked it on his small rig and white bait.

Most of us fished with big gear, looking for Tailor and "ulloway which did not appear. Tony and Philomena fished with small gear and both got good mixed bags. Graham and I fished the southern end for one fish each, mind you I think Graham may have spent most of his time snoozing in his deck chair.

Northern Districts fished a couple of kilometres south of us and one member had his rod and reel leap out of the rod spike and disappear into the water before anyone could stop it. A couple of minutes later Hughie caught a small Mackeral while casting hoping to jag the lost gear. One would assume that a school of Mackeral went past with some very large members in the school.

This area at Hill River is easily accessible and has several areas that look petentially good so it would be an area to look at again next year for Field Day Venues.



SAUDI ARABIA

FROM SID WHITING

MUD IN YOUR EYE

I've spoken earlier of the dust storms here, but even when they're not actually raging, the atmosphere is usually full of dust, which has some interesting effects. For instance, I can spend an hour in the sun without a shirt on in the middle of a 48 degree day in July and not even look like getting burnt. Or on those rare occasions in winter when it spits a few drops of rain, each drop picks up its own weight in atmospheric dust on the way down, and it actually rains mud. Great when you've just cleaned the car!

OF OLD MEN AND DONKEYS

Up the track a little is an island village called Tarut, joined by a short causeway to the mainland. Life here hasn't quite kept pace with the bigger towns, and the villagers still live in old mud houses in some parts, with goats in the backyard. We found an old white donkey in the keep of an even older man who let the kids sit on the donkey. He then hitched the beast up to an ancient wooden cart big enough for 4 people, and up we climbed - all 7 of us. Our first mistake was not negotiating a price, while the second was not finding out where we were going to be taken. As it happened we finished up clattering our way round a tour of the whole island (or so it seemed). At the finish, one of the others, obviously inexperienced in the gentle art of negotiating, imprudently produced a 50 riyal bill. Quick as a flash, the old bloke held out his hand for another one! Still, it was worth it, although the donkey wouldn't agree, having just been beaten around the island with his masters cane.

SAUDI HOSPITALITY

We were at the beach late one afternoon, with the kids playing on the swings and slides. A Saudi family were there mum, dad and the baby in the front of the pickup and 5 more kids playing alongside ours. When walking past their car I greeted him, which he returned. A few minutes later I turned to see one of his boys approaching behind me, gazing up out of huge brown/black eyes, offering me a small cup of the sweet Saudi tea (ie Liptons with about 4 desert spoons of sugar. Diabetes is a big problem over here!). Touched by this ice-breaking gesture, I returned to near his vehicle, and he got and we struck up a conversation. It didn't exactly rollick along, as his English was about as good as my Arabic. She remained in the car where Beth joined her and the baby. While it was subtly obvious that I wasn't supposed to converse with her, she nevertheless remained unveiled and I found it hard not to keep stealing glances, as she was a beautiful woman. Many of the Arabian women posses a rare kind of beauty - rare in more ways than one, as men rarely get to see it due to the custom of women remaining fully covered to other than immediate family. The Bedouin women have slits in their veils exposing just their eyes, which are the most attractive part of them, and they seem to enjoy looking tantalising at you as you pass in the street you can never quite tell if they are smiling, or what! We finished up at these peoples' house for tea. This is not much

We finished up at these peoples' house for tea. This is not much fun for the male visitor, who is shown into the front guest room and that's as far as he gets. Both lots of women and kids disappear into the main house, leaving you to pass the time with him - bit of a drag when you don't speak each other's language. And he's generally not as attractive as his wife either!
